### CANADIAN LIQUOR SHIPPED 10 U.S. IN CHRISTMAS TREES

Newark, N. J., Jan. 5 .- Canadian liquor dealers utilized the Christmas spirit and more specifically the Christmas tree to smuggle vast quantities of whiskey over the border into the United States during the holiday season, according to internal revenue agents here. This, they said, today was the chief reason for the flooding of the tree market which resulted in many dealers giving their stock away. Federal agents asserted that in the firry branches had been concealed many a quart of "red liquor," and that after these "decorations" had been removed added supplies of trees had been offered dealers already overstocked in the hope of reaping again the rich revenue of 1918.





### REJECT BRITISH **GOVT. OFFER OF** HIGHER WAGES

London Railwaymen at Meeting Decide Plan Is Unsatisfactory.

SIXTY SHILLINGS A WEEK

Plan Regarded That Amount As Average Minimum To Be Paid.

LONDON, Jan. 4 .- (By the Assolated Press.)-The Government's offer to the railwaymen, made public tonight, which conceded considerable advances in wages, was rejected later at mass meetings of the railwaymen held in the east end of London and at Northampton. The men decided that the offer was unsatisfactory.

The plan of the Government was the same as that unofficially reported last week except that 60 shillings a week was to be regarded as the average minimum wage for the different grades of workers, some grades being paid as low as 56 shillings and others being paid higher rates. Taking the situation as a whole the increase offered was 100 per cent over the pre-war rate. Under the plan, should the cost of living increase before next September, wages would be raised one shilling for every five per cent in the rise in prices. After September there would be a sliding scale, varying with the high cost of living.

Another important point provided for the creation of a cent al wages board, five members of which were to represent the railway administratives and five members of the unions. The board would deal with any further conditions of service which might arise. If the loard was unable to effect a settlement the disputed points would be refer ed to a national wages board, consisting of four representatives each of at Northampton. The men decided





MR. DEWART AND HYDRO BOARD. In a letter to Premier Drury, Liberal Leader Dewart points out that a previous letter to Mr. Drury suggesting that the Liberals be given representation on the Hydro Commission has been misunderstood and misinterpreted. Mr.

Dewart's explanation is as follows:

Toronto. Newspaper reports and the interpretation placed upon my recent letter regarding the composition of the hydro board indicate that a word has been omitted which has quite

altered my meaning. What I intended to convey was the suggestion that there would be no partisanship in the appointment of a Liberal representative upon the board, which already comprises Sir Adam Beck (Conservative) and Lieut.-Col. Carmichael (representing the U. F. O. and

The fairness of having all three existing parties in the province represented cannot gainsaid. The necessarily early retirement of Mr. Lucas will leave a vacancy and allow the representation of the large body of Liberal voters on the board. Such balance can in no way savor of partisanship. As to the two additional positions upon the board, I understand that you promised that there should be one municipal representative. My idea was to suggest for the remaining and fifth position also "the appointment of a man of known and proven ability as an engineer such as Brig.-Gen. C. H. Mitchell, etc."

Needless to say, I had no communication with General Mitchell, and my own thought was to suggest for your consideration the further non-partisan appointment of some man of such outstanding engineering ability as would give added strength to and confidence

I had no intention in my note of discussing how appointments are being made or should generally be made. That will be a matter for discussion later. Yours truly,

H. HARTLEY DEWART The point Mr. Dewart clears up is that he did not suggest that General Mitchell be named as the Liberal representative on the board, but that he should be appointed because of his eminence as an engineer. Mr. Dewart's suggestion deserves the greatest consideration. General Mitchell would be of immense usefulness to the Hydro Power Commission because of his ous enterprises involved. The trouble with hydro is that it has been under the control of one man, Sir Adam Beck. The stupendous projects involved in the development of Hydro in this province should be handled by a number of the most competent experts the Government is public's money is being placed in Hydro affairs, and only by the employment of the most capable and experienced engineers and financiers can the Government and the public be properly protected. General Mitchell is eminently fitted for such a task, as Mr. Dewart suggests. Partizanship has nothing to do with the matter.

### TURKEY A PROBLEM.

What to do about Turkey appears to be the big problem facing the Allied Council at the present time. The reports from London and Paris as to what will be done with Constantinople are conflicting, but it is generally believed that Constantinople, because of its association with the Mohammedan religion, will remain the residence of the Sultan, while political and commercial control will rest with an international commission. The refusal of the United States to take over Turkey as a mandatory has probably driven the other powers to a system of joint control. Great Britain, Italy and France have too many direct and vital interests in the future of Turkey not to have a say in it. The Bosphorus and the Dardanelles possess strategic and commercial value too great to be imperilled by one nation control. Had the United States agreed to accept the mandate she would have acted as a disinterested outsider and her ruling would have been acceptable to the other nations. As it is, under joint control, the Turkish Empire will probably be split up into spheres of influence dominated by Great Britain, France, Italy and Greece-a condition that will always tend to dangerous friction and

### FROST PICTURES.

"Build high the logs, O love, and in thine eyes Let me believe the summer lingers late. We shall not miss her passive pageantries, We are not desolate:

Kind winter flings her flowers and her stars." 'Twould seem a wistful, remembering fairy had somehow strayed from the land of summer, and bleak, winding ways, had dreamed for sweet remembrance, forests of fancy, great, great, drooping, tropical growths, ferns of immense fronds, and flowers of frailest daintiness upon the window-panes. Such luxuriant frost pictures are traced by invisible fingers to make one pause and forget the blustering wind and crunching snow! With the urge of memory one sees vast, green distances, cool valleys and hills of tree clusters, from which swing swaying vines and through which drifts the fragrance of flowers all on a winter's night. Or better still, by the side of a cosy grate-fire and a softly shaded lamp, one can lounge in a great chair and looking windowward, study a silver-set picture of tangled wood loveliness such as is seldom seen in summer wanderings. The wonder of the raised, rounded stems and gleaming, perfectly veined foliage; the massed thick soft-

ness at the lower edge of the pane to denote moss and lush grasses in which shy flowers hide or feathery bloom of what might be the ghosts of golden rod or scarlet sumac plumes. Pictures in frost diamonds wrought by a straying fairy, all on a winter's evening!

### A SEQUEL TO DICKENS.

One of the great books of the day is Sir Harry Johnston's novel, "The Gay-Dombeys," a sort of sequel to Dickens. Sir Harry, long famous as an explorer, naturalist. African administrator, candidate for parliament and brilliant writer on African and slavery subjects, began his career as a student of painting at the Royal Academy, and now in his sixties makes a striking entrance into the field of prose fiction.

Though writing of the Dombeys and other Dickens people in the next generation, the veteran author does not at all approximate to Dickens' style or method. He deals with a world that he knows by experience, the world of big business, colonial grab. Joe Chamberlain (who figures as a colonial secretary of 1897 under the Dickensian and contemptuous name of Choselwit), and the imperialism that succeeded Dickens' day and preceded ominously the Great War. The people of Dickens' creation have got on in the world, some of them knighted; but most of them are not otherwise; improved. In a style very different from that of the great Victorian, Johnston displays the society of the 1890's, the age just before the Flood, so to speak, its hardness, materialism, sensuality, but growing clearness of vision and frankness of manner on the part of its better minds. Johnston's style is crisp, cheerfully cynical at times, with the hitting but goodhumored energy of the successful man of action. It is a relief from the wordiness of much recent fiction, even, say, of Wells and

It is surprising, perhaps, that we have not more of this sort of story, the sequels of famous books. In the eighteenth century Fielding thought Richardson's novel "Pamela" so absurd in some respects that he undertook a burlesquing sequel. Richardson having made Pamela marry Squire B-, Fielding filled out the name as Squire Booby. In a more respectful spirit Thackeray took "Ivanhoe" in hand, and not being satisfied with Scott's ending, the marriage of Ivanhoe and Rowena, arranged subsequent matters so that the story should finally end in the reunion of the hero with the true heroine, Rebecca, in Spain. At the same time he playfully parodies the style and matter of the Wayerly novelist. Sir Harry Johnston neither parodies nor echoes either the style or matter of Dickens, but by taking up his characters and their children at a later date gives a lively impression of how "the world do move." and how as wealth accumulates men often decay. We shall hope for other stories from this vigorcus hand, however he may lay their lines.

The coast of the Canadian Labrador is one of the very least known districts of our province; and some considerable interest, therefore, attached to illustrated lecture given about it by the lord bishop of the diocese. Bishop Williams, like his father before him, and like Bishop Dunn, whose episcopate came after that of the first Williams and that of the present bishop, has made long episcopai visits to the coast, traveling partly by land and partly by water. He is therefore well acquainted vith many of the features of the coast, which should really be visited by more of our people. The natural history, the rivers, the sport, the people and their occupations, the fur-bearers, and not least of all the dogs, which are used as beasts of burden, are all extremely interesting. One of the missionaries or the coast reports that last winter his wife, her little son, her adopted Eskimo daughter and another little girl, having to remove from Bonne Esperance to Mutton Bay, traveled by dog team overland, in mid-winter, being seven days on the ic withstanding the hardships from which they suffer at times, is a striking illustration of the fact that "there's no place like home." It is ardently to be hoped that the winter isolation of these poor people may soon be broken by a successful solution of the problem of winter navigation,

### SOAP BUBBLES ARE DURABLE.

The transfent existence of the soap bubble is proverbial, but Professor J. Dewar, in a discourse delivered at the Royal Institution in London, explained how soap bubbles could be made to last for months, and exhibited several specimens. The first requisite is that the air used in blow-

ing the bubble shall be free from dust. In Professor Dewar's process the air is filtered through cotton wool, and the bubbles are blown by opening a stopcock in the air-supply tube. For the soap solution he prefers the purest oleic acid (tested by the todine number) and ammonium soap (not potassium o sodium).

To make a bubble durable the sac of liquid must be removed from its bottom by suction through tubes applied from outside. The lecturer showed bubbles more than half a yard in diameter, blows in glass vessels containing pure air at atmospheric pressure. A little water is kept at the bottom of the vessel. A uniform temperature of about 50 degrees Fahrenheit is favorable to longevity.

One of the most curious marine phenom known to sailors is that called by Norwegian sailors "dead water," which without any visible cause makes a vessel lose her speed and refuse to answer her helm. The sailors' only definite knowledge of its origin is that it exists solely where there is surface layer of fresh water resting upon the salt

waters of the sea. Several explanations have been advanced by the captains of ships for the effect of dead water, the commonest of which is that the two water layers move in different directions. The true explanation however, recently offered by Swedish navigators, and verified by mathematical calculation and direct experiment, is that in addition to the "resistance waves" at the surface, the vessel creates a second line of subaqueous waves between the two strata

Further experiments were made to verify the sudden loss of speed due to dead water. A boat model was drawn across a tank and the towing string suddenly slackened when the boat was about half way across. In cases where the tank contained salt water only the boat stopped gradually, moving some boat lengths after the towing string had been slackened. When the tank contained a layer of fresh water resting on salt water, on the other hand, the boat slackened quite suddenly, and moved only a short distance.
