

SMALL FRUITS FLOURISH AT RIDGETOWN



J. C. Smith's thimbleberry patch has been found a profitable investment. Mr. Smith's system of cultivation has proved highly successful, and he thinks preferable to general farming any day.

The above picture shows a three-acre black (thimble) berry patch on the farm of J. C. Smith, one mile east of Ridgetown, Mr. Smith acquired the property about ten years ago, and after putting the soil in a high state of cultivation, went into the small fruit business. About four years ago he had little better than three-quarters of an acre of bearing black-berries, and from this patch he picked \$800 worth of fruit. He has added to the patch each season, until now he has three acres of berries, and two acres more of the land has been fertilized and prepared for the same fruit, which will be planted next spring.

Mr. Smith has made a study of the driving business for some years, and is one of the best-posted men in this line of gardening in the district. He has a system of muching this saves the has a system of muching his berries as fast as they are ready.
