



### Murdock's Big Job.

MINISTER OF Labor, JAMES MURDOCK, if judged by recent utterances, is not in favor of unemployment insurance. He places himself on record as favoring "employment insurance," probably on the ground that if a position of industrial prosperity is brought about there will be no need for unemploy ment insurance.

Canada should not need unemployment insurance. We are a small people numerically, living in a wonderful country that is big enough and rich enough to provide a living for all the people who are here and for millions more.

Unfortunately, we have had seasons of unemployment in various lines of work in Canada, and in recenterears they are becoming of ore marked severity in the larger industrial centres.

If Minister of Labor MURDOCK can show the way out, all power to him. If he can even make an improvement he will have done much.

Take a concrete case, for example, A factory becomes busy by reason of certain orders it has received. It puts up the sign "Men Wanted" at its employment office, or in some other way spreads the information that men can secure employment. These men come and go to work. As long as there are orders to keep them busy they are on the payroll, and there is no need for outside assistance to be extended to them in any shape. But, for the most part, they cannot save—the cost of living, taxes or rent, clothing and schooling for children, make it out of the questton to lay much aside.

What then? As soon as the orders at the factory are filled the place becomes slack. In many cases manufacturers keep these men on making up stock, in anticipation of other orders, but there is a limit to which they can go in this way, determined by their financial strength and the probable future demands of the markets for the output of their

When this goes on for a while it is necessary to lay men off. It is one of the most unpleasant things a firm has to do, but there is no other way out.

The man laid off is probably one of the men receiving the same treat ment, for it will generally be found that most industries are busy or slack together. Of course, there are exceptions, but these exceptions simply prove, rather than disprove, the rule.

When this thing has taken place in a number of cases we have the situation we are facing and have

been facing for the past year or so. Then, again, Canada, in common with other countries, has it share of seasonable occupations, principally in the building trades, for which winter work is generally scarce, if to be had at all. If a man has to make enough in nine months to keep his family for a year it stands to eckoned on that basis, otherwise he is going to be asking for assistance between seasons.

We doubt very much if the solution of Canada's problem of unemployment is going to be solved through the intensified development of our industrial life. The industrial centres of all nations are subject to imes of depression, and it is in the industrial centres of Canada today that the greatest appropriations have to be made for the assistance of those who are out of work and have nothing in reserve.

JAMES MURDOCK has seen enough of life to know the problem of the common people, and also to realize that the solution of their problem is, in a large sense, the solution of the happiness of the nation.

The settlement of industrial disputes is a big matter, but it takes second place to an honest attempt to grapple with the situation of the man who really wants to go to work but can find nothing to do.

Information now available shows that there is an actual operating loss of \$1,761,344 for the calendar year ended December, 1921, while the actual amount the country is set back for the privilege of owning a merchant marine of its own is between eight and nine millions. The gross operating revenue for the year was \$10,916,248, and the gross operating expenses \$11,816,292, or a deficit of \$900,044, to which must be added overhead charges, wharfage, etc., amounting to \$861,300, making the total deficit given above.

Taking the actual investment, however, and making allowance for interest and depreciation, the loss is very much larger.
