### Express Crashes Into the Side of a Light Engine

Fatal Accident in Grand Trunk Yards This Morning.

Englneer John Phibbs, of, Sarnia Tunnel, the Victim.

Caught in the Wreck and Instantly Killed-Fireman Injured-Passengers Escaped Unhurt.

In the fierce storm of the early morning a wreck occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway today, resulting in the death of an engineer, the slight injuring of a fireman, the demofishing of one of the locomotives, the partial demolition of another, and the smashing of a baggage car. The wreck occurred at the coal shutes in the east end, a passenger train crashing into

a light engine. It was dark and stormy shortly after 6 o'clock this morning, when No. 7 express, in charge of Conductor Burton and Engineer Robinson, of the Tunnel, approached London from the east. About the same time Engineer Wm. Phibbs, and Fireman James Norwood, also of the Tunnel, had just finished loading their locomotive with coal at the shutes, and were proceeding with the engine, No. 839, down the siding to a switch to cross the main line and get onto the north track to a freight Several Days Will Be Rewhich had been brought through from York and which they were to proceed with westward to the Tunnel. Just as No. 839 ran foul of the main line No. 7 express same along and crashed into the side of the light engine, striking the latter at the cab. The crash was a terrific one. The tender was torn from No. 839, the tank pulled from the floor, and the whole demolished. Engineer Phibbs apparently did not realize what was about to occur for he remained picked up under the baggage car. It seems that the impact had hurled him from his seat, and under the wheels passed over him and a pulp, and he was otherwise terribly

Time after time these cables were broken by the locomotive, a big Richmond compound engine, which attempted to right the wrecked baggage car.

These gentlemen say that the Llano earth produce a larger percentage of radium than that of any other known deposit.

#### Britain in Frozen Tibet.

The fortunes of the British expedition into Tibet are now being followed with interest bordering on anxiety. While the expedition is on a diplomatic is nevertheless equipped as a fighting force, being accompanied by 5,000 or so picked troops. British diploitself if resisted. It was assumed that the impression produced by the formidable array of troops and guns accompanying Col. Younghusband's mission would be enough to bring the Tibetans to terms. But it now appears that there may be some fighting, and the threat of the lamas to appeal to Russia if the British advance continues lets the cat out of the bag in more than one respect.

Loose talk of England's intention to "grab" Tibet may be disregarded. England does not want that vast icy plateau, and would gladly leave the lamas at peace in their frozen seclusion but for the Russians. Tibet, overhanging British India on the northeast, serves as a buffer state against Russia's advance Indiaward so long as the country is independent under the nominal sovereignty of China. But Russian agents have been intriguing with their usual success in the lamaseries (Tiber is ruled by the Buddhist priests, or lamas), and pushing their outposts toward Lhassa itself, the mystic city of the Tibetan hierarchy. How well they have succeeded in establishing their influence is shown by the Tibetans' threat to appeal to Russia.

Primarily, the object of the British expedition is to countervail this Russian clandestine advance, and to produce in the Tibetan mind a counter impression of England's power. Russia will not be allowed to establish itself in this coign of vantage as a constant menace to India's frontier on the northeast, any more than in 'Afghanistan, on the northwest. Strategically the cases are similar. In each case the existence of a buffer state against the Russian glacier must be main-

> The other coincidence concerns the supply of radium. Sir Oliver Lodge spoke confidently of the early coming of the day when radium may be easily and cheaply made out of common and simple elements, and that eventually radium may be secured as cheaply as aluminum or or even common soda. Yes terday's papers contained the statement that Prof. Alexander H. Phillips, of Princeton University, has conducted a number of experiments with carnotite ore from Utah, which contains oxide of uranium and vanadium, combined with other oxides that produce radium. From this ore radium was extracted by the Curie method, and arrangements have already been made for the manufacture of radio-active agents on a large scale, by the owners of several mines of carnotite. Prof. Phillips says the American source of supply is practically limitless.

> A paper from the mining district in Cornwall, England, reports the discovery there that quantities of pitchblende have for two or three years past been exported to the continent, for what purpose was not known, as its ultimate destination was kept secret, but now that the Cornish pitchblende is known to be rich in uranium, and presumably in radium, there is likely to be a general overhauling of the mountains of mine waste that have for generations made the mining district hideous.






