RAILROADS UNDER CITY OF PARIS

Marvelous Network of Roads from Western New York, passed through Which in Thirty Years Will

Be Public Property. London, Aug. 24.—Londoners are very proud, and rightly so, of their tube railways, which have proved such a boon to city men since their inauguration, and whose rapid development is watched with so much interest. In the French capital also attention is absorbed by the progress of the underground electric railway system, which has made such giant strides since the concession was first granted to the Metropolitan Company in 1898. The realization of the plan then laid before the municipal authorities has been greatly accelerated by the fact that the term of 30 years was fixed during which the company was to construct the lines and work them for their own profit, at the conclusion of which period the whole system becomes the property of the city, so that the sooner all the lines are open for traffic the greater will be the benefit accruing to the promoting company.

A fact which is very noticeable as emaccruing to the promoting company.

A fact which is very noticeable, as emphasizing the utility of the lines, is that on the various routes already opened on the various routes already opened rents have risen over 100 per cent, while even on those which are still "in the air," the prices of apartments are augmenting with alarming rapidity, and the tenants who have agreements are congratulating themselves.

A glance at the plan of Paris will show how great a change will be effected in the matter of communication between the various parts of the city when the entire project has been carried out. Three lines are now in working order, the principal being the Great Central one, opened to the public during the exhibition of 1900, and running from the west end of the capital at the Porte Maillot, at the gates of the Bois de Boulogne, to the Porte de Vincennes, at the east end, a few minutes' walk.

This line passes under the entire length of the splendig whence the great Vincennes wood is but a few minutes' walk.

This line passes under the entire length of the splendid Avenue des Champs Elyses and the Rue de Rivoli, known to all English visitors, owing to its proximity to the Place de la Concorde, the Palais Royal, the Tuileries and the Louvre, and is dotted with stations, as are all the lines, at every 500 or 600 yards.

At the Arc de Triomphe there is a short branch leading to the Porte Dauphine, another entrance to the Bois de Boulogne, while from the same spot starts the line proceeding to the Trocadero, right opposite the Eiffel Tower. Towards the north, again starting from the Arc de Triomphe, is the line passing along the outer boulevards, and serving the Parc Morcpau, that charming little resort so much favored by children; the districts of Batignolles, Clichy, Montmartre, La Chapelle, La Villette and Belleville—the poorer quarters of Paris—until it again approaches, at the Place de la Nation, the central line first mentioned.
