



Paying and Non-Paying Public Ownership.

Lord Avebury has been addressing the people of Great Britain on the "great increase of national and municipal expenditure." He warns the mother country against the too reckless enterprise of local authorities, who, if making a profit from municipal ownership, are not always making commercial companies. Indeed, Lord Avebury doubts if in the most of the municipal trade in Great Britain there is any profit at all. Many municipalities, he says, are not paying their way, as shown by the fact that they have increased their loans in England and Wales in the last ten years from \$1,-000,000,000 to \$1,715,000,000. In the same period the increased expenditure has been no less than \$340,000,000.

The greatest sinner of all in the way of spending public money, however, is the Imperial Government, whose expenditure has gone up in twenty years from \$430,000,000 to \$830,000,000 a year. It is true that the excuse for this enormous increase in expenditure has been the necessity for Great Britain keeping pace with the naval and military outlay of confinental nations; but this deduction is not warranted, as in the last ten years, Russia, Germany, France and Italy all together have only increased their naval and military expenditure by \$135,000,000 a year, whereas Great Britain alone has increased her naval and military outlay to the extent of \$250,000.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the London county council are asking Parliament to give them power to borrow a large sum of money to complete their tramways to the Thames Embankment and London bridge. Lord Avebury's speech is made at a time when the statement by the chairman of the London highways committee with reference to the municipally controlled tramways has special significance, as it shows that money can be made in some municipal ventures if properly managed. These tramways, after paying interest and sinking fund charges, cost of transporreduction of rates. It is further shown that the London county council makes much more from lines on the south side which are municipalized than from the northern lines which are worked under lease by private companies, and give the public a slow horse service, while charging them 50 per

cent higher fares. To us it seems that it all depends o how municipal government is carried on. If the men in charge are economical in their management of civic affairs, as they are in many municipalities in Great Britain, then it pays to have municipal control. These are commendable sentiments. and the new Liberal Premier of the sister province is to be congratulated on the high stand which he is taking on an important part of public policy. It will be well if the Quebec Premier gets at the root of the backwardness of popular education in his province. We believe it will be found in the chronic indisposition of the public to properly remunerate teachers. This shortcoming is common to Ontario, as well as to Quebec. Statistics show that the poorest-paid teachers in the country are found in the neighboring province. How a girl can keep body and soul together on the miserable pittance that is paid to a teacher in some

districts is a marvel. In Ontario, we look upon education with as favorable an eye as Premier Gouin looks on it: but when it comes to engaging teachers in many school sections it is not the qualifications of the teacher that are most generally canvassed. The all-important question is. For how small a sum will he or she work? Little wonder so many teachers regard the profession as a vocation to be forsaken as speedily as possible when the remuneration is so small and the prospects of advance-

ment so poor. Meredith in Case Against London Township.

"If a corporation takes gravel from a man's farm and pays him therefor, ought the said corporation to further recompense the said farmer for the damage to his property caused by the excavation?" This was the question that faced Mr.

Justice Meredith in the Middlesex assize court yesterday afternoon. Although the case—that of Wright vs. Henry, McLeod and London Township -was a minor one, four counsel argued the matter before the bench, a large number of witnesses were called, and damages plaintiff deservations a finish was not made until 6 o'clock. payment for the gravel. The case was very amusing at times. A large number of farmers were to be seen among the spectators in the courtroom, for the principle involved caused the case to be a very interestng one to the farming community. His lordship decided the above question in he negative, although allowing the plaintiff \$50 on account of special cir-

umstances. Walter Wright, butcher, owns a farm near Pottersburg, occupied by a ten-ant. The evidence went to show that Township Councilor McLeod engaged Thomas Henry, a contractor, to draw gravel from a certain lane which ran alongside plaintiff's farm. The contractor and his men, it appears, dug right through the lane into plaintiff's property, opening a gravel pit therein, about 70 feet long and 15 feet deep. Plaintiff did not stop them, knowing that the corporation has the right to take gravel from any farm, and that they would pay for it. In fact, the councilor and the contractor paid defense, said that if plaintiff was paid over \$47 to plaintiff for the gravel. for the gravel he should not consider also \$10 to the tenant for putting down that the hole left behind was anything the fence.

Plaintiff, however, instituted action against the aforesaid defendants to re-cover damages for alleged depreciation in the value of his farm, caused by the presence of the said hole. I. F. Hellmuth, K. C., was for the plaintiff; E. Meredith, K. C., for the township, and Hessrs. Jarvis and Fisher for McLeod and Henry respectively. The court dismissed the action against the township with costs, but awarded the plaintiff \$50 from the other two defendants. This sum represents the remainder of the value of the gravel and covers damages due the plaintiff from the fact that he was not notified in the legal way that gravel brought in a true bill for murd was to be taken from his farm.
