New Armor Plate Called a Wonder.

Rare Metal Called Molybdenum Used With Nickel Steel-Used for Fine Edged Tools Because of Hardness and Toughness.

London, Aug. 2 .- After recent elaborate tests the Admiralty has reported that the new armor plate is to be of greater power of resistance against projectiles than any armor now in use. In the process of manufacture a rare metal, molybdenum, is used in combination with nickel steel. The 15 or 20 per cent. higher than that ness of armor plate could, therefore, be reduced, thereby lessening the displacement of vessels and affording the necessity of carrying large guns. Molybdenum is a brittle grey metal, with an atom weight of 96 and a specific gravity of 8.6. It occurs chiefly in the mineral molybdenite, which is found in America, South Africa, Australia and Scandinavia. 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

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

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
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
