From the hat to the boots, in all types of dresses and their accessories, stripes have an almost paramount hold.

Never before were diaphanous materials so much in evidence at the seashore resorts as they have been this season.

Dark blue seems to be the favorite fabric for suits, frocks and wraps. Still there is a vogue for black and white combinations.

Plain colors in self-materials are rather freely used in combination on front and back panels, wide knee bands, sailor collars and cuffs.

A notable feature in hat trimming now is that we no longer see the ribbon bow or flowers placed at the back. All trimmings are gradually working around toward the front.

 White felt hats have come flying over the sea and their vogue for autumn is undiminished. They are generally simply trimmed with a bow of black velvet or taffeta ribbon.  
 Rickrack, the old-time serpentine braid that everybody was crazy about a generation ago, has returned, but now it is used for curtain and drapery decoration instead of dress garniture.  
 In most of the tailored coats of the hour the sleeves are like those of men's trousers, put in without fullness at the top, cut straight and finished off with a small turnback cuff or a few buttons.  
 Cotton foulards, which in reality are a sort of batiste, with silk foulard patterns, are delightfully cool, and in dark or medium colors may be worn for the best part of the summer without visiting the laundress.  
 Foulards are again appearing in veiled effects, the new veiling being in every shade and design, with the lovely chiffon cloth or voile or marquisette swinging away from it in drapery or in deep folds, fuchs or ash ends.  
 Black velvet bands, one or two, studded with gold or jeweled buckles, are for the classic style of corffere, while the more coquette girl uses them finished with a band on each side, a spray of silver aigrette on one side, or a bunch of drooping silk rose balls.

### The Assault Case.

William Beer, 19, cabman, Long's Hill, and Cyril Robertson, 22, cabman, Queen Street, were before Judge Conroy to-day charged with indecent assault on the complaint of Ellen Murphy, 17, Petty Harbor. Inspector General Sullivan conducted the prosecution and Mr. W. McNelly appeared for the accused. The evidence of Ellen Murphy was to the effect that she came in from Petty Harbor to see the Races and stayed at her sister's house, Mrs. Power, on Patrick Street. She knew Beer, the cabman, having seen him at her house several times when he was out that way driving. She never saw Robertson before. Going to the Races with Mrs. Power on the morning of the Regatta, she met her sister, who is a domestic servant with Mrs. Pike on LeMarchant Road. She spent the forenoon with her on the race course and in the evening lost her in the crowd. She met a girl from the Goulde whom she knew, Lizzie Pizzelle. While walking on the road between Ross's and the lake side, Cabman Beer drove up and invited them to go for a drive around the Lake. Robertson was sitting in the cab with him. They got in and drove down beyond where the tennis are, and then turning, Beer drove back to the place where they got in the carriage. They alighted there and she parted with Miss Pizzelle and again went to look for her sister. About 8 o'clock she was passing along the road where the dancing stand was when she saw Beer and Robertson again. They were sitting in the carriage driving along slowly. Robertson was in the back seat. Beer stopped the carriage and Robertson asked her to get in and have a drive. She refused several times. He then jumped out of the carriage and catching her by the arms forced her along to the side and pushed her in. Beer whipped up the horse and they drove off. She did not know where they were going but it was away from Quidi Vidi Road, and they soon lost sight of it altogether and got on a lonely road where there was woods and no houses. It was then quite dark. The carriage lights had been lit. When they reached a very dark part of the road Beer stopped the carriage. Robertson got out and pulled her out by the arms. She struggled and scratched. Beer drove on out of sight along the road. Robertson attempted to assault her. He tried to throw her down but she held on to a fence that was there with all her might. Before this he pulled out a bottle of rum and asked her to take a drink. She refused. He then took a razor out of his pocket and said, "I'll kill you if you don't take a drink." She said, "If you do, I will haunt you till the day of your death." She struggled with him there for about 20 minutes till he had torn her inside clothing in pieces. Beer now drove into sight again and getting out of the carriage held her hands while Robertson tried to carry out his designs. She screamed with all her might now. Beer finally stopped and said, "Come, get into the carriage with us. I will drive you home to Patrick Street." She got in and sat by his side on the front seat. Robertson sat on the seat behind them. He kept putting his hands over the back of the seat around her and tried to molest her in the same way as he did on the road. Beer did not try to prevent him. He only laughed. An automobile passed them. She screamed aloud for help. The auto did not stop, but a man's voice sang out, "Hello, lady! What's the matter?" The auto sped on. Further along the road they met a man on horseback. She again cried out for help, but he passed on without stopping. When they got to King's Bridge she recognized the locality and, watching her chance, leaped to the ground out over the back of the carriage and made her escape. She saw a gentleman and lady there walking along and ran to them for direction as to what road to take in order to get to Patrick Street. The man said he would conduct her safely to where she would get help, and he accompanied her to the East End Fire Hall, where an officer, Const. Savage, came and conducted her up Water Street towards her home. Going up she met her cousin, Peter Power, looking for her, and he turned and went with her to Patrick Street. It was midnight when she got to the Fire Hall. She did not intend to make a complaint to the police, fearing the annoyance that it would cause her parents, but when she saw Mrs. Power, she went to Petty Harbor next day for her parents to come in. They then brought the case into court.

Mr. McNelly cross-examined the witness at considerable length, after which the further hearing was adjourned till 3 p.m. to-day.



The majority of poets sing of the deep blue sea. But the sea is not always blue by any means. There are any number of colours to be observed.

The Mediterranean, however, is

true blue, because very few large fresh-water rivers enter it, and, being practically landlocked, and exposed to powerful sunlight, it has the greatest evaporation of all seas.

Ten years ago the sea off the Californian coast turned almost black, and fishing came to an end, but no cause could be assigned for the phenomenon. The dull-reddish tint of the

Red Sea which has given it its name is due to millions upon millions of microscopic algae or seaweeds and subaqueous plants. The Yellow Sea of China owes its colour to the floods of muddy water the great river pours into it.

Generally speaking, the blueness of the sea water is in constant ratio to its saltness. In the tropics the tremendous evaporation induced by the blazing sun causes the water to be much saltier than it is in the more northern latitudes. For about thirty degrees both north and south of the equator the waters are of an exquisite azure.

LONDON, Aug. 7. The last phase of the fight over the Veto Bill, which is designed to restrict the powers of the House of Lords, was entered upon to-day, when the Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, leader of the Unionists moved a vote of censure upon the Government. The Chamber was filled to its capacity. Mr. Balfour's motion was as follows:

"That the advice given to His Majesty, by His Ministers, whereby they obtained from His Majesty a pledge that a sufficient number of Peers would be created to pass a Parliament Bill, in the shape in which it left this House, is a gross violation of constitutional liberty, by which, among other consequences, the people will be precluded from again pronouncing upon the policy of Home Rule."

The former Unionist Premier emphasized that he was conscious of the gravity of the situation and the seriousness of the step which he asked the House to take. He thought that it would be admitted that never in all history had there been a more serious case, or one which more urgently deserved or required the consideration of Parliament and the emphatic condemnation of Ministers. Ministers, said, Balfour, have grossly abused their rights and put themselves above the Constitution. They have acted wholly without precedent, and not as Mr. Balfour conceives to meet any great question of State, but in order to further a party arrangement between the different sections who support them, and in order to prevent the people of the country from pronouncing their opinion upon Home Rule. Mr. Balfour asserted that the Ministry had placed the Sovereign, who had just come to the Throne, in a cruel position. The King was the fount of honour, but by their advice, had corrupted the stream at its source. He dubbed the proposed new peers as "supers in the sordid drama."

LONDON, Aug. 7. The Arbitrator chosen to effect a settlement between the employers and the striking dock labourers, has given an award in favor of the men, but the dockers have decided not to resume work until the grievances of the coal porters and lightermen are satisfied. Unless a settlement of the strike is speedily effected a serious situation must result. The strike on Saturday consisted of thirty thousand coal porters and others; thus threatening an entire stoppage of the London transport trade; and this would incidentally affect thousands of other workers, and lead to a general cutting of food supplies.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7. Fifty British tramp steamers, now in port, may be tied up indefinitely by reason of the strike ordered by the Sailors and Firemen's Union of Britain. While sailors on the vessels of the Trans-Atlantic Companies sign for the round trip, sailors on most tramp steamers sign separately for a journey each way. The Union having issued a new wage scale, embodying an advance all around, seamen have been instructed to refuse to sign except under the new scale. Members of the American Union are not allowed to take the places of the strikers.

HALIFAX, Aug. 7. Admiral Kingsmill has received a wireless from the Noble, saying that she left Charlottetown at six o'clock to-night, and is proceeding under tow to Halifax. The Cornwall and other steamers towing are expected to reach Halifax at noon to-morrow. The Cornwall's injuries caused by touching, yesterday, are slight, and confined to the outer skin. Her seaworthiness is unimpaired.

BERLIN, Aug. 7. For the first time since the Franco-German conversations over Agadir arose, the official North German Gazette refers to them as negotiations concerning African questions. This is apparently an admission that Morocco itself has been definitely banished from Germany's demands, and that the German Foreign Minister is now bargaining for the best compensation it can get elsewhere.

**Motorists Meeting**

A meeting of the motorists was held at the Board of Trade rooms last night with a view to forming a Motor Association, which is considered a long felt want and will, it is expected, do much good for the country. Hon. J. D. Ryan was voted to the chair. The constitution and bye-laws submitted by the committee that had been chosen at a previous meeting to do this work were adopted with a few changes. A copy will be sent to every motor car owner in the city. The rules are about the same as those of the Royal Automobile Association of England. The objects of the Association are (1) to encourage the use of motor cars and cycles among the people; (2) to foster the spirit of road improvements; (3) to take practical part in mending the roads, improving the surface and widening the high-ways, and securing such places as may be considered dangerous; and (4) to take steps for the suppression of inconsiderate driving. Amongst those present were Messrs. M. Mayers, S. K. Bell, H. J. Blatch, G. M. Barr, R. A. Squires and Dr. McLoughlin, all of whom were most enthusiastic in bringing about this inauguration of such a long felt want in the community.

### When We Think Best.

At What Time of Day Does Your Brain Become Brightest?  
Lord Alverstone, the Lord Chief Justice of England, in an address to a gathering of students some time ago said that he had found from his own long experience that the early morning was the time when he could think best.

There is no doubt that our power to think varies greatly during the day. Some people, like Lord Alverstone, think best in the early morning—before breakfast, but after an early cup of tea; others think better in the evening or last thing at night.  
Our power to think appears to depend on the quantity of blood circulating in the brain, and any device that will increase the flow of blood to the head will usually enable us to think better.

Rousseau, the great French writer, would think baredhead in the sunshine; while Bossuet, the French bishop and theologian, would work in a cold room, with his head wrapped in furs. Schiller, the German dramatist, and the friend of Goethe, would immerse his feet in ice-cold water.

**In Favour of Fasting.**  
Everyone knows from experience that the brain is not at its best after a heavy meal. The explanation of this is simply that all the available blood in the body is drawn from the brain and the extremities to help in the work of digestion.

For the same reason we can usually think best after a period of fasting, and it is known that clerks do better work before lunch than afterwards.  
Upton Sinclair, the author of the "The Jungle," says that he never felt more capable of intellectual effort than when he was "undergoing" the fasting cure, and he is convinced that great poetry will be written when poets fast for the sake of their work.

The late Professor Mayor, of Cambridge, when engaged on his latest book would occasionally go without food for a day or more at a time, and for several years before his death his food cost him no more than twopence a day.  
Prolonged periods of sleeplessness produce a sensitiveness and irritation of the nerves, or, as the doctors call it, a state of hyperaesthesia, which is frequently favourable to thought. Some people can think only when walking, and others only in the noise of streets and crowds, or with the buzz of conversation all around. But most people require silence and solitude.

### Killed by Train

on Intercolonial.  
Moncton, N.B., Aug. 3.—While at his work in the round house early this morning, Timothy Donohue found a man's hat on the pilot of a locomotive and blood stains. Finding that neither the engineer nor the fireman knew of any accident, he walked along the track to his home in Sunny Brae and while en route was horrified to see the body of a man dead at Hall's Creek bridge, lying in the road about forty feet below the track. Dr. Harris, the coroner, found the dead man's legs both broken, one of the bones sticking out of the trouser leg, and that one shoe was torn completely off and his foot badly mutilated. His head on the left side was smashed in and part of the man's brains were lying within a few feet of him. His arms were broken and his clothes badly torn.

No trace of his identity could be found, the only articles in his pockets being 5 cents, a small piece of tobacco, and a handkerchief and collar button. The man was wearing a blue suit. The hat found on the engine was stamped with the Sussex Mercantile Company's trade mark. This is the only clue. The man was evidently struck by No. 9 express coming into Moncton.

### New Armor Plate Called a Wonder.

Rare Metal Called Molybdenum Used With Nickel Steel—Used for Fine Edged Tools Because of Hardness and Toughness.  
London, Aug. 2.—After recent elaborate tests the Admiralty has reported that the new armor plate is to be of greater power of resistance against projectiles than any armor now in use. In the process of manufacture a rare metal, molybdenum, is used in combination with nickel steel. The standard of resistance is said to be 15 or 20 per cent. higher than that of recognized armor plate. The thickness of armor plate could, therefore, be reduced, thereby lessening the displacement of vessels and affording the necessity of carrying large guns. Molybdenum is a brittle grey metal, with an atom weight of 96 and a specific gravity of 8.6. Its use has been employed in the making of fine edged tools because of its hardness and toughness.




