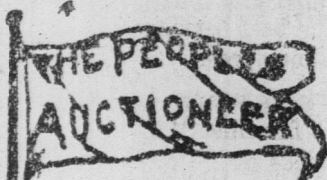

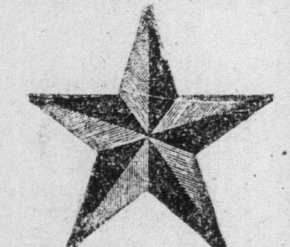

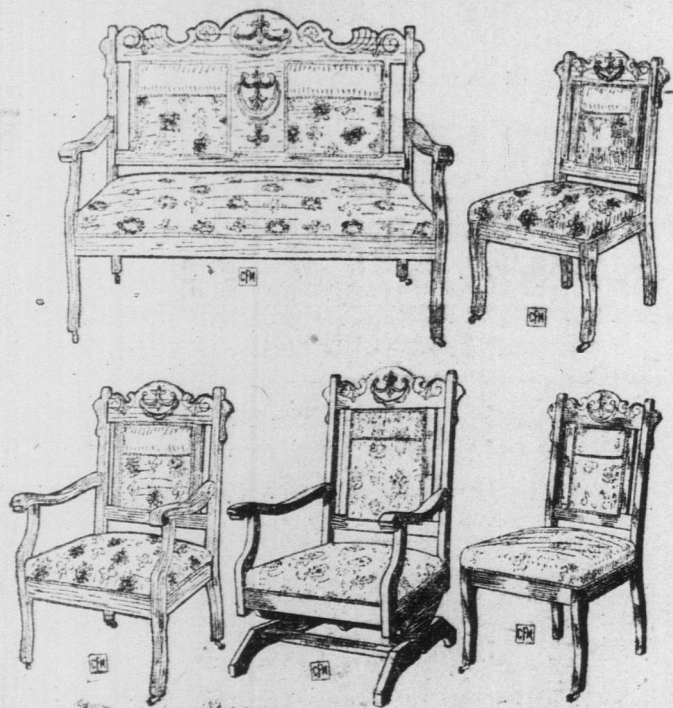

**Reorganization of
Fishery Department.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I was very much pleased to hear Mr. Kent, when speaking to those Fishery Resolutions lately introduced by Sir Edward Morris, suggest the re-modelling of the Marine and Fisheries Department.

The hon. gentleman thought that the Department should have a staff of qualified men, fitted by their scientific training to make enquiries into all matters relating to the fisheries.

That, I think, Mr. Editor, is an eminent and practical suggestion, and one which I think also the Government would do well to act upon.

As at present constituted, it can only claim the distinction of being a life saving station or bureau, that I think, is about all that members of the present Government claim for it, it is, at any rate, all that Mr. Cashin had to say of it a couple of days ago. Mr. Conker, however, claims that it has other duties, such as giving out of lobster and salmon labels.

To my mind all interference with the fishery question will be more or less empirical and unsatisfactory until we shall have had some exact scientific ground to work upon. As regards cull and standardization, such questions can of course be settled by men who from long experience in the handling and marketing of fish, know how to apply the remedy for such ills as at present exist. Apart from these more or less simple questions of cure, cull, etc., the Committee will be asked to consider "the protection and propagation of lobsters, the protection of the seal fishery, the effect of the prosecution of the whale fishery on our bait supply, and the supply of bait."

Now, as regards lobsters, what reliable data, based on exact knowledge, has the Committee to work upon, may I ask?

What information has the Committee, as a ground work for its deliberations?
Is it Mr. Dee's Report, and, I am

not aware of any other compilation on the subject. Mr. Dee's Report, apart from the array of figures which are useful in a sense, is of very little account to anybody; there is even some doubt as to the reliability of the figures.

Mr. Dee has fully covered the ground as far as his duties led him, and I believe he is a most painstaking and industrious worker, and one who is thoroughly interested in his work, but his report has no value in the deliberations of a Committee, such as the one proposed.

As regards propagation it is a matter of experiment only. I cannot, therefore see the force of submitting such a question to a Joint Committee, such a proposal is gotten up merely for display. Why not go ahead and experiment with a hatching or two, and have done with all this empty parade.

It may be that the lobster is doomed to extinction whatever we may do; conditions may so have changed as to induce that end. Who can tell us; will the Committee be able to prove or disprove it? I believe not.

The history of our planet as revealed to us in the rocks is replete with evidences of growth and extinction of whole genera. Each period and epoch has had its distinguishing fauna. Each type of creature has had its day, run its race and died out. It may be that the lobster is but following the natural order and is doomed to extinction.

In nature we find that when a certain kind becomes very plentiful, another comes along to prey upon it, and in this manner whole genera may be destroyed.

The codfish is looked upon as being the greatest enemy the lobster has. In all likelihood the lobster came first to our shores, to be followed by its enemy—the cod, which in the natural order was meant to succeed it as the possessor of our waters. Man greatly helped the cod in his work of extermination.

It may be, too, that the food of the lobster has become scarce, or some other condition of its habitat has pre-ordained its doom. These are questions that the Committee cannot answer.

Neither is the Committee able to tell with certainty what the effect of killing whales has had on the bait supply. It may gather the opinions of fishermen, which is so conflicting as to be worthless.

I cannot see what good the Committee is going to do. It can only serve one purpose and that is to make a big show of doing something, which is Sir Edward's only loop-hole of escape from his present rather awkward position of doing nothing, when not working mischief by ill-advised undertakings.

Mr. Kent's suggestion of a re-modelled Fisheries Department is the proper course. All suggestions for the improvement of the Fisheries should properly come from the Fisheries Department, it is not for Parliament to take upon itself the burden

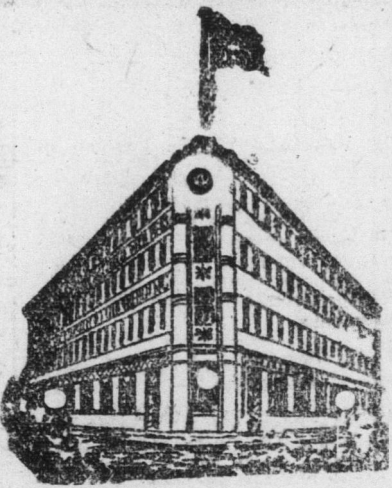

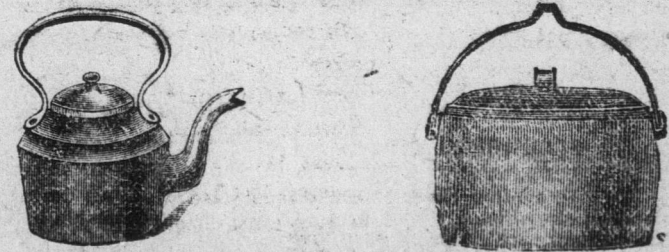

**ATTEMPT TO LEVY

The Petition of the Citizens' Committee.

We direct the attention of our readers to two letters which we publish to-day on the matter of the petition which the Citizens' Committee ask the civic electors to sign. One letter is from Mr. Gosling, the President of the Committee, and the other is from the Hon. John Harris, who served a term on the Municipal Council. Both are strong supporters of the proposals which are now before the Municipal electors. We direct attention to these letters as contributions on a matter of live public interest. We may say also that we have been much impressed with the earnestness, sincerity and whole-souled activity of the Committee in their efforts to direct attention to the need of improvements in the conditions of the city. For this reason, we have refrained from publishing attacks on the good faith of the promoters which have been sent to us to publish anonymously. But we are not convinced of the wisdom of interfering with the Municipal election machinery and particularly with the proposal to substitute appointment by the Governor-in-Council for popular election even though the appointments are temporary. Although the power of appointment must be vested in the Governor-in-Council for the Legislature at the instance of some thousand petitioners, we should still doubt the wisdom of the step. Petitions, however numerous, sign cannot carry the same weight as the marking of ballots.

Distressed Vessey

Rescued by S. S. Prospero.—The Vessey is—S. R. Bradley, which Dr. Cook had on his Expedition to North Polar Regions.

On Saturday a message was received in the city as referred to in the Telegram, that an unknown schooner was in the ice off St. Mary's and flying distress signals. On being informed Mr. J. Munn, with typical promptness, communicated with S. S. Prospero, which was then a starboard, ordering her to the assistance of the schooner near Point Le-Haye, off St. Mary's in a helpless and disabled condition, being anchored and jammed in the ice about two miles from the shore. The schooner proved to be the James R. Bradley and had all her sails blown away while the crew had no water to drink. She was then taken in tow and brought to Burin, where she is now lying at anchor. The James R. Bradley was owned by the Gordon Pew Company, and was eighteen days out from Gloucester with a load of frozen squid for St. Pierre. This is the same vessel that took the famous Dr. Cook on his expedition to the North Polar Regions. We understand that it was the intention of Mr. Emanuel Pike, of the West Coast, to charter this same vessel and sending her to the Gulf seafront this spring.

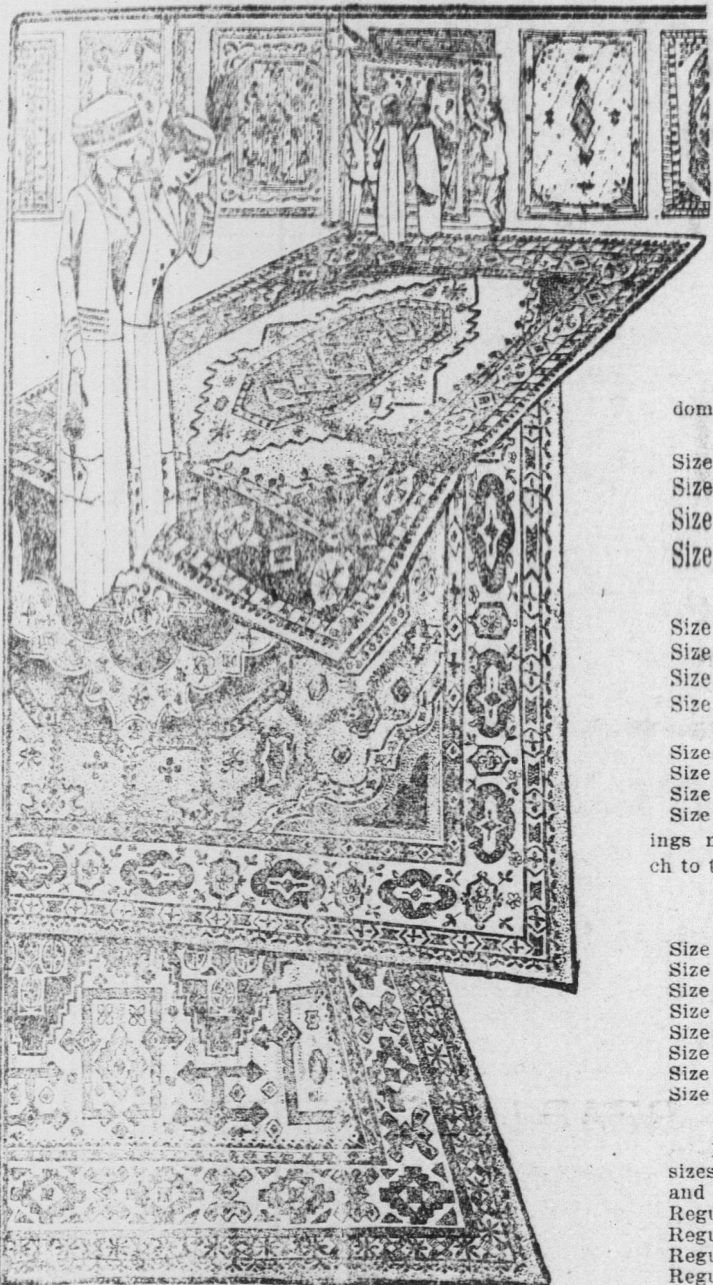

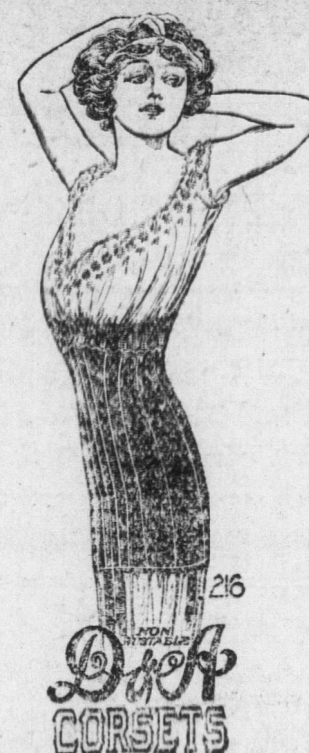

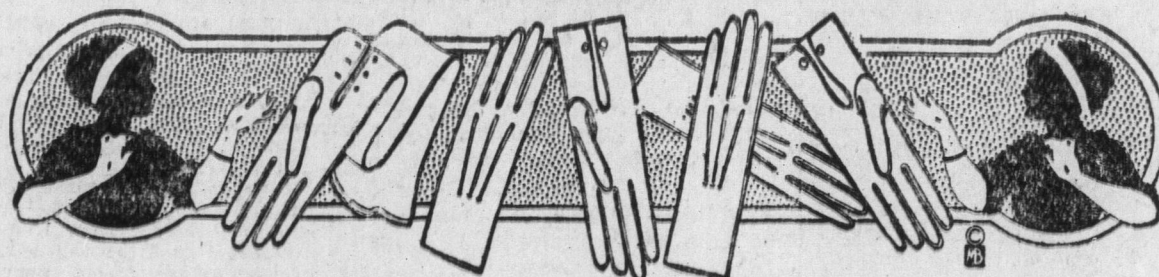

The Municipal Petition.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—A few days ago I wrote a letter to the Daily News, pointing out that the Committee, for whose appointment a petition is being circulated, would have no power to spend money or levy taxes which had not been proposed by the present Municipal Council and passed by the Legislature.

No sooner was this objection disposed of, than the enemies of progress in the city busied themselves raising other futile arguments against the proposal. It has been stated that the Citizens' Committee are plotting to appoint themselves take charge of the city. But anyone who reads the petition will see that the Governor-in-Council is to select and appoint the Committee.

Then it is argued that the franchise must not be interfered with that if we give up our right to elect the city government, even at our own request, for the stated time of one year, and for a very urgent purpose that we will never get it again.

It is difficult to discuss such a foolish argument with patience, and I think I need only state that the Citizens' Committee are strongly democratic in their ideas, and would resist as firmly as anyone in St. John's any permanent interference with the franchise.

I cannot believe that this argument was intended seriously, and I feel sure that it will deceive nobody.

It is amazing to find the opponent of the movement, one moment loudly deprecating any interference with the franchise, and the next, proposing that the present Municipal Council should be continued in office for another year, apparently oblivious to the fact that it would be just as much an interference with the franchise to continue in office the five men now composing the Municipal Council, as it would be to appoint the proposed committee of twelve. If both cases the authority would be derived from the Legislature, and not from the exercise of the franchise except that in the case of the committee there would be a strong petition in favor of it. It will be in the power of the Governor-in-Council to appoint the whole or any part of the present Municipal Council on the committee, and if the Citizens' Committee should be consulted on the matter, I feel sure they would make a recommendation to that effect.

But the same ends would not be served by continuing the Municipal Council as at present constituted, in office for another year.

The Citizens' Committee are convinced that it is of the first importance, for those who are entrusted with the framing of a charter, to be in a daily touch with the government of the city. They think that this important duty should be given to a committee of twelve citizens to be selected by the Governor-in-Council.

Without wishing to prompt the Government in the selection, it is perhaps not amiss to say that the Citizens' Committee have supposed that the committee might be composed as follows: A proportion from the present Municipal Council, a proportion from past Municipal Councils, and a proportion of citizens whose assistance might be considered of value.

I think that such a committee could command the confidence of the community, and I believe that they could perform a valuable and much-needed work for the city.

There is, so far as I can see, only one reason for objecting to the proposal, and that is, that St. John's is not good enough for us, and that no improvement is needed.

I trust, however, that the people do not think this way are in a considerable minority.

Our London Letter

(FROM A SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

The Acting High Commissioner for Canada.

Pending the appointment of a High Commissioner for Canada, Mr. W. L. Griffith, the Permanent Secretary in Victoria Street, has additional responsibility, and I need hardly say that it is in safe hands. Mr. Griffith has held his office for ten years and has been Permanent Chief Secretary of the High Commissioner's office. Mr. Griffith has been identified with Canadian affairs for much longer than the term of his Secretaryship. Born at Bangor in North Wales, he went to Canada as long ago as 1882. He engaged in farming in Southern Ontario, and in 1897 he was appointed Canadian Commercial Agent in Wales and later was sent on a special mission to Portugal whence he brought to Canada the Welsh Colony which had settled in the former country. Since his appointment as Secretary of the High Commissioner's Office he has made a name for himself as a lecturer on Canadian subjects and has found time to become the author of one book "The Dominion of Canada."

Mr. Griffith enjoys wide popularity on account of his recognized ability and quiet tactfulness and is a prominent member of the Canada Club and a well known figure among London Canadians. Lately he has frequently had to represent Lord Strathcona on public occasions owing to his chief's advanced age. It is not likely that his broad shoulders will feel any weight from the additional responsibility now cast upon him. Farming experiences in Canada are still apparently to be traced in his present interests, for he makes his home in the pleasant country of Kent and interests himself in the breeding of pure bred cattle.

Canadians at Lord Strathcona's funeral.

It was curiously interesting to look about Westminster Abbey on the day of Lord Strathcona's funeral and distinguish familiar Canadian faces. It was also interesting to notice how unlike the English type is to the Canadian; the latter has an expression of keenness and alertness which is quite perceptible to the observer. There

"Oh," he said, "there will be no difficulty about that. I shall make up any deficiency. What I want you to do is to write down everything that is necessary in the way of organization."

"One Squadron, two, or what?"

"Anything you like."

"So I told him a regiment of three Squadrons was the most suitable organization. If money was no object."

"He replied, 'No, no object. I should like to do the thing well, and I want the Mother Country to pay them only what she is paying her own soldiers.'"

"It did not take me long, with Colonel Robb's assistance, to sketch out the establishment required, and our only point of difference was that Strathcona insisted, in his quiet way, on having a great number of clerks. Himself a Protestant, he desired to keep on good terms with the Catholic clergy, amongst whom he had many friends; and the number of clerks accompanying the Regiment was certainly redundant, in our point of view. Lord Strathcona paid nearly £500,000 for our Country."

Sunshine in the City.

The change which has come over the mental attitude of the city during the last week or two is little short of marvellous. Right until the close of 1913 the minds of financiers seemed steeped in pessimistic doubts as to the possible outcome of a dangerous concentration of circumstances all too plainly to be described. With the bank rate steady at five per cent., investors were quite content to wait until the clouds lifted. Then, presto! some magician's wand waved, or, to borrow a simile from the West, some kindly chinook wind warmed the poor cold feet, and every thing is different. A good sign of times is that the Dominion of Canada loan, which was none too warmly welcomed at its recent issue, now stands around 4 per cent.

The further lowering of the Bank rate to four per cent. and then three helped to improve investment conditions. That naturally brought out the bulk of the deposits and we, whose interest in the stock markets has been chiefly that of trying to sustain or confidence in steadily depreciating securities, have recharged our stores with the optimism of which the had been so sorely depleted.

Quick Subscriptions.

Under the improved conditions no capital issues have been readily subscribed. It was suggested that the simultaneous issues made at the end of last week by the cities of Gothenburg in Sweden, and Calgary, Alberta indicate whether there was any truth in the suggestion that the British investing public had become comparatively tired of Canadian securities. As both were fully subscribed within a few hours of the opening of the lists, and as moreover the Pacific and Great Eastern Railway issue which followed them met with the same cordial reception, it seems that the investing public are quite pleased to send their money to Canada as elsewhere, provided the security is good.

Expert Opinion.

While stockbrokers are thus rejoicing in again having a decent volume of investment orders to handle, it is satisfactory to find that the responsible officials of the Canadian bank in London, believe that the present improvement in conditions is not spasmodic but a genuine return of confidence. Any great rush to take advantage of the present opportunity of crowding capital issues on the market, or by the promotion of enterprises of dubious nature, would however be strongly deprecated. Confidence, it is suggested, is a delicate plant whose shoots are only brought to maturity by tender care. The thing which is to be desired is a return to the recent non-receptive attitude.

Canada does not want to be identified in England with speculation for now. It has gained its reputation for progress, it would be wise for it to become synonymous with stability for a season.

London Banker's Talk.

Meanwhile these high priests of finance, the charmen of great banks, such mysteries as international finance and the gold reserve, which are at times to millions of those who suffer when something interrupts or unduly augments or depletes them, have, as benefits them, been preaching the doctrine of caution to their shareholders and to the public. Thus, Sir Edward Holden, at the meeting of the London City and Midland Bank, strongly criticized Britain's financial position. This he declared to be unsound in view of the huge liabilities of the Joint Stock Banks and the small amount of gold held in the Bank of England. As a result, he suggested that with the recent enormous borrowing operations, it was her obvious duty to go slowly, to expend less, and to borrow less. At the same time it is satisfactory to note his belief that it would be a mistake for investors to button up their pockets so long as

the securities were of a first-rate character.

So too, Sir Felix Schuster, at the meeting of the Union Bank of London, while recognizing the improved position of the European money markets and the slackening of trade drew attention to the desire in this and other countries to use the more favourable conditions as an opportunity for augmenting gold reserves. He apparently does not concur in the hasty belief that we are on the eve of a prolonged commercial depression accompanied by dirt cheap money.

Why English Millers Hang Back.

In spite of the alarms of reduced output from Argentina and Australia, millers are assured (writes my Mark Lane Correspondent) that they will not be in urgent want of Wheat. Even though the alleged reduced Australian supplies be diverted to the East—Japan is taking them freely—the Canadian shipments which have been excessive will presently be swelling the stocks on this side. While admitting that Canada will not again put forward such quantities for some time to come, buyers are convinced that Russia is now holding back to a great extent until prices reach a more profitable level. Even Argentina has been somewhat reluctant to press her wares for the same reason.

All this, of course, is counted for strength by the bulls; but the market has found (and the remark applies not alone to this country, but to France and Germany) that native wheat is coming forward much more readily. It is of interest to note that recent farmers' deliveries are showing a decided improvement in quality.

The one argument to which the filler is always open is the sale of its flour, and as this has been dragging, while prices range at 1- to 2- below those current at this period of year, it is not possible to inspire him with the hopefulness that shall lead him into large purchases of his aw material.

McLaren Brown, who replied for the Ladies, or, as the vigorous Toast-master expressed it, "I say silence for Mrs. McLaren Brown, the Champion of the Ladies' Year in a country where clove picking in public is by no means confined to the male sex Mrs. Brown's speech attracted delighted comment from the guests. The other speaker was Mr. J. G. Colmer, C.M.G., and Mr. Hennessy Cook, and among those present at the beautifully decorated tables were Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Allan, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Fraser, Mrs. Colmer, Mr. and Mrs. Obed Smith, Mr. E. H. Turnbull, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Junkin, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Reid, Mr. and Mrs. F. I. Cooper, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Le Roy. Replies to Shimri. Cable News.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Sir—It appears that my reply to Shimri in your issue of the 17th inst., has disturbed the equilibrium of that gentleman judging from the fact that he has "brought down the wrath of the High Church party (whatever that may mean) upon his devoted head. Let me assure him, however, that the Catholics of the Church of England in this Colony are not in the least worried about him, as this is a purely individual effort and pledges no party neither high nor low to the views I have given expression. He professes amusement at my hatred of the word "Protestant" a term he assures us has been applied to Church people of this Colony for the last two hundred and fifty years. As I have not received my religious training from the men in the street or possibly in our legislative halls; so I am not concerned with what one in that capacity may choose to call those who happen to own allegiance to the Bishop of Newfoundland. The word Protestant is a term of quarrel. It implies no special attitude of resistance to the world, the flesh and the devil, but a surly attitude of suspicion always ready to break into violence towards the beliefs and practices of Christians. At one time Protestant was a respectable epithet, but as a good penny may in course of war and tear become a very offensive and dirty penny such as suggests contention and the need of washing, so that the word Protestant is now so used a word that to apply it to a man is to insult him. If a man takes upon himself and glories in it he glories in his shame. "Shimri" asks what is meant in the "Bill of Rights," 1688, by the expression "Protestant Religion," this is merely a phrase adopted by a secular tribunal owned and controlled by William III, who was saturated with the orthodoxy of Geneva, and as might naturally be expected professed great veneration for the "Protestant Reformed Religion and the Church of England" in this particular. This claim was rejected root and branch by the Ecclesiastical Synod known as Convocation, representing the parliament of

the Church and for this act in not coquetting with Protestantism her Convocation was silenced by this secular tribunal for one hundred and fifty years. So much, then, for Synodical Authority provincially expressed. It is written somewhat earlier on Statute 29, Henry VIII., (Cap. 29, (some ignorant people say this much married gentleman was a Protestant) "Our said Sovereign the King and all his national subjects as well spiritual as temporal, continue to be as obedient, devout Catholic and humble children of God and Holy Church as any."
 Of course Thomas Cranmer and those associated with him did evince a certain amount of sympathy with the Continental reformers and utilized the services of some of them in their work of revision; this historical fact may or may not be interesting enough in itself but we are not concerned with what Cranmer, Latimer, Ridley, et al believed or taught, as it is known to everybody the former literally boxed the compass upon the Doctrine of the Real Presence of the Sacrament of the Altar, up to the time that he was reduced to ashes. The criterion which we are to go by to-day is that which is set forth in our authorized formularies and not merely the individual views of any one no matter how eminent they may be. I am pleased to see that "Shimri" admits that the Church does not officially style herself Protestant; that is my contention and that is why I endeavoured in my former letter to recall his mind to the forgotten facts of history and to show him that his misapprehensions such as treason to the principles of the English Reformation.
 The promise of your correspondent of another letter dealing with the Sacramental system will be awaited with interest, but I would like to remind him that in the type setting of my former letter the reference to Article 16 was due to a typographic error, as I had written Article XX which dealt exclusively with Sacraments.

STOP COUGHING

Special to Evening Telegram.
 LONDON, Feb. 22.
 That the Government does not propose to exclude Ulster from operating in the Home Rule Bill is the statement made by Reynolds's Weekly whose parliamentary correspondent has more than once made correct prophecies. It claims substantial grounds for stating that the concessions offered by Asquith will be: (1) Additional representation in the Irish Senate for the Ulster minority; (2) Fresh provisions limiting the power of the Irish Parliament in certain matters affecting the minority; (3) Administration of the Customs and Post Office to be retained by the Imperial authorities; and (4) An opportunity to be given any county, including Ulster, to vote itself out of the operation, even before the Irish Parliament be constituted. Reynolds admits that it is useless to attempt to disguise the fact that Bethnal Green election was a bad blow, and that there is a steadily growing opinion in the part of Government supporters that things are not going well while the Government is blamed for needlessly precipitating the by-election. Masterman, after a few weeks' rest, will offer himself for election in another constituency, probably Norwich, or another London seat. Both Government and Opposition press show indications that the optimistic feeling that the opening of Parliament would find a solution of the deadlock, is disappearing and the Conservative press is again inquiring of the delay on the part of the Premier in not relieving the tension.

QUEENSTOWN, Feb. 22.
 Fourteen lifeboat men were drowned when they went over from Ferndale to rescue the crew of the Norwegian barque Mexico, which was driven on the rocks, near Westport, at night. Two of the lifeboats saved the distress call of the Mexico, which was bound from Legun, Mexico, to Falmouth. The first of the men was saved, but the lifeboats were unable to scramble on board the wrecked Mexico, when they remained all night, when the crew of the barque and the lifeboat men were landed safely on one of the islands. To-day they found the second lifeboat, which had waited all night, had sunk with her crew of fourteen men.

PEKIN, Feb. 2.
 It is estimated here that the bandits, led by White Wolf, massacred 300 men, women and children, who were sacked Luan Chow, on Jan. 9th. On that occasion they murdered Father Richard, the French Jesuit missionary, capturing and holding two others for ransom. An Army of 5,000 Chinese troops is now converging on White Wolf's strongly entrenched position, where he has a force of 2,000 bandits, half of whom are armed with modern weapons. It is stated here that the opportunity is being seized for exterminating White Wolf and his followers, fearing the will form a centre for another rebellion. The troops, however, show strong disinclination to come to close quarters with the bandits.

A QUESTION OF HONOR.
 Among other anecdotes of University life, Dean Hole tells of an occasion when there was some doubt as to the locality of a city mentioned in a Greek text, and the lecturer addressed a youth who had just come up from the famous Shrewsbury school.
 "No, Mr. Bentley, you are a pupil of our great geographer, Dr. Butler, the Atlas of our age, who carried the world not on his shoulders, but in his head, and you can probably enlighten us as to the position of this ancient town."
 "I believe, sir," was the prompt reply, "that modern travelers are of the opinion that the city ought to be placed about ten miles to the southeast of the spot, which it now occupies on our map."
 After receiving respectful thanks for the information, the informer told Dean Hole as they left the lecture room that he had never heard of the venerable city before, but that for the honor of Shrewsbury and the reputation of Dr. Butler he felt himself bound to say something.

The Goat.

By GEORGE FITCH,
 Author of "A Good Old Stewash."
 There are two principal varieties of goats—the comic artist's goat and the farmer's goat.
 The comic artist's goat is very familiar in America. It is a small animal with a reinforced head and the digestion of a cement mixer. It lives in the comic supplements of the newspapers, eats tin cans and playbills, and is used mainly to transport candidates for initiation into secret societies to the borders of the great beyond.
 The other goat ekes out a precarious existence in this country and is not highly thought of. But in many other countries the goat supports one corner of the nation on his shoulders, and has no time to butt, because he is so busy producing wealth.
 The foreign goat produces milk, cheese cloth, wigs, leather and steaks. He picks a living from blades of grass, tender young rocks, trees, barbed wire and weeds, and in return enriches the family which has enough fortitude to live in his vicinity. In America the man who owns a goat asks for sympathy on the strength of it. But in Switzerland two goats make a family fat and four make it rich.
 We devote a great deal of valuable time in America to the conservation of natural resources, but we have overlooked the goat. We have allowed the impression to grow up that, outside of political investigations, there is practically no use for a goat in this country. We should look at Switzerland, Palestine, Egypt, and India and be ashamed. If these countries can make a national asset and a bulwark against starvation out of the common lumbering variety of bullet-headed, shin-whiskered goat, what would they do with our imposing wealth?

Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting.
 Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it, its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vibrate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:
 Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.
 He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.
 I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which, with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewis, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—1895.17

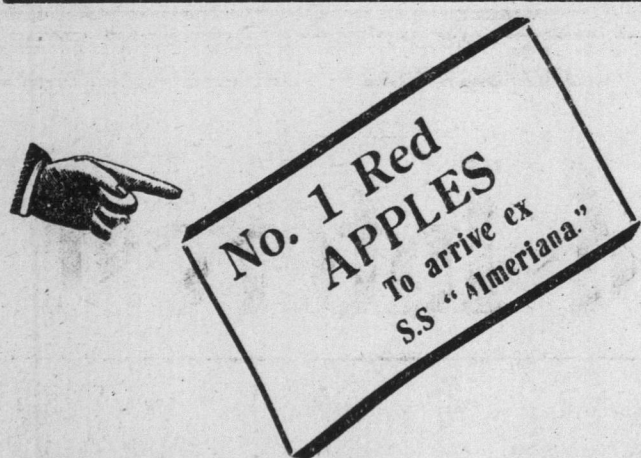

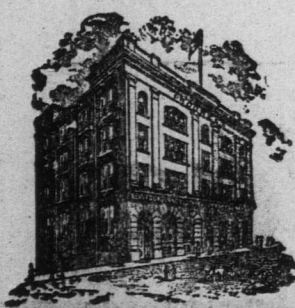

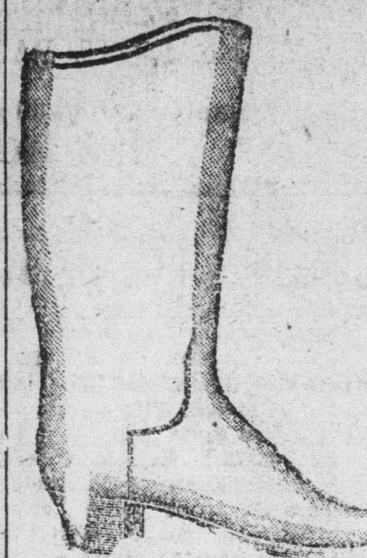
