To Ensure Protection.

An interesting feature of the report of Mr. F. Longley, on the city's water supply, is the suggestioon with regard to fire protection. The inadequacy of the existing system has been often demonstrated during the progress of a big fire, but in the event of a fire occurring in both ends of the city at the same time this town would be in imminent danger. He submits a full report on the matter of complete fire protection, the principal feature of which is the proposal of laying a 20-inch main along Duck-woorth Street, to act as a storage reservoir in case of such an emergency as before stated. At present the wa-ter mains on Water Street are only 6-inch pipes, and are altogether too small. The cost of a complete water service that would guarantee adequate fire protection would be about \$168,000 less \$20,000 which the Com-mission has already figured on for an improvement of the system
