It is very difficult to get seamen at present, especially for sailing vessels, notwithstanding that they are paid \$35 a month and found. In rare cases \$40 is offered and there is no response. Conditions are similar all over Canada and seamen are not to be had at the principal seaport places even at fancy wages. We have it from master mariners of long standing, recognized to be competent authority, that in the very near future it will be almost impossible to get any experienced sailors to go to sea in St. John's, at least, and the same applies to the whole island. The result is that most of our experienced seamen have decided to part with their old friend Neptune and engage at more profitable employment with less risk, and a great many apprentice seamen are playing their part in the great war, some with our Newfoundalnd and others on board British warships. However, if the predictions alluded to, are realized, the matter will be a serious one for our foreign going fish carriers.





GREECE FIRM WITH GERMANY. LONDON, To-day,

The Reuter's Telegram Co., says it learns that the Greek note to Germany is a very firm demand that the Greek troops be brought to the Swiss frontier in order that they may be conducted to a Mediterranean port, from which they will be taken to Greece. The Greek Government guarantees that they will not be forced to serve against any enemy of Germany (?) and at the same time disavows entirely the action of General Hadjapoulos, who it is claim-ed disregarded orders to transport the troops to another Greek port.

LONDON REVIEW.

LONDON, To-day. In another effort to retrieve part of their lost territory the Germans on Wednesday, despite bad weather, made violent counter attacks against the ricent counter attacks against the French over a three mile front in the region of Priez farm and Bouchavesnes north of the Somme in mass formation. The Teutons threw attack after attack along the line from 9 o'clock in the morning until dark at the end of the day, the French everywhere helding their nositions, accordwhere holding their positions, according to Paris. The battlefield at points ing to Paris. The battlenerd at points is covered with German dead. During the fighting the Germans penetrated the northeastern part of the village of Bouchavesnes, but here the French met them with the bayonet and dislodged them. Four assaults at Priez Farm in which the Germans Priez Farm in which the Germans came on in waves, were repulsed by the French, whose observers assert that the Germans at last withdrew in disorder, leaving many dead behind them. On the British front inclement weather still holds the opposing sides to artillery duels. In the eastern theatre in Russia and Galicia, Berlin and Vienna report the repulse of heavy Russian attacks in the Lutsk sector of Volhynia, southeast of Lemberg in Galicia. Local successes for the Russians in the Carpathians are conceded by the Teutonic Allies, who say that on the whole Russian attacks in this region were repulsed. In Transylvania, where the Roumanians are fighting against the Austro-Hungarians, the invaders have met with a serious reverse in the region of Hatzog, where they have been driven back by the Teutonic Allies over the Transylvania Alps, and the town of Petroseny and the Szurduk Pass through which they entered Transylvania in this region was re-captured from them. In Dobrudja, where the Russians and Roumanians have been heavily reinforced along the line south of the Constanza railway from the Black Sea to the Danube, the tide of battle is fluctuating. Sofia reports successes for the Bulgarians at certain points, while Bucharest claims a victory for the Roumanians near Eniga. The west end of Macedonia is still the scene of violent combats. The Bulgarians, according to Athens, have hastily evacuated Viglista, at the extreme end of the line and fallen back upon Sevdza for a stand in pre-viously prepared entrenchments, which if captured will necessitate the evacuation of Monastir in Serbia. Berevacuation of Monastir in Serbia. Ser-lin reports that the Germans, who are co-operating with the Bulgarians, have repulsed Entente thrusts near Florina in Greece. Rome admits that the Italians on the southern slopes of Monto Beles have been driven back by the Bulgarians.



The Battle of the Marne.

(St. John Telegraph.)

Mr. Frank H. Simonds, war editor of

ae New York Tribune, who was in France of late, says that many French military writers, intelling of the first military writers, in telling of the first credit for winning the Battle of the Marne without British help. In spite of excisions by the censor, says Mr. simonds, the works of these writers nake it clear that they think the British were so deceived by Von Kluck before Paris that they lost an opportunity to make the victory more decisive than it was. This is an issue that may well await final victory. We do not know-we never shall know-what might have happened before the Marne or at the Marne, had not Britain sacrificed the flower of its army in holding back the German rush after Mons; or what might have happened in the first three months of the war but for British sea control. It is not necessary now to speak of the British stand that stopped the German 'sweep toward the French Channel ports. At the Marne, as was said of another famous battle, "there was glory enough for all." Sober French thought will do full justice to the British share in the war, to what the British did by land and by sea, to the influence of Britain's "silver bullets," and of Britain's workshops, to the meaning of Britain's action in contributing four or five millions of men to the Allied battle lines though the expectation early in the war was that the British Empire's share in the land fighting would not exceed 250,000 infantry and their complement of cavalry and guns. As to the Marne and the question of distributing credit among the generals with justice, none of the too hurried judgments is at all sure to stand the test of age or of complete information coldly examined. Prejudice is difficult to banish. The Germans, for example,

are taught that Blucher won the battle of Waterloo! The Marne, after two years, looks bigger than ever. That it lost the war

for Germany is now the view of most military writers. That is, French leadership in that first stage of the war which closed with the Marne and the beginning of trench warfare at the Aisne, dislocated the whole German plan, which was, briefly, to crush France, turn upon Russia and deal her a staggering blow before she was effectively mobilized and munitioned. and then strike at the British. Success in the first part of the program might have kept Italy out of the war and stampeded Greece and Roumania. But France dissipated the whole scheme at the Marne in a battle which students of the military art will analyze for generations to come. If, as seems the case, Joffre planned to turn upon the advancing enemy at that river and hold them at grips until a reserve army from Paris fell upon their right flank, it was Foch, as many military publicists now tell us, who really turned the tide of battle. The opposing lines extended from Verdun to centre. With his own left wing practically beaten and his right severely mauled, he contrived to borrow from the general on his left a fresh division of infantry. Instead of using this to stiffen his hard-pressed wings he employed it to lend weight to his centre and threw that straight at the enemy. He had guessed, or learned, that the German lines in his front had been thinned to reinforce Von Kluck against the flanking thrust from Paris. Foch's blow hit the weak spot, and though the Prussian Guard was there, the French went through, Fearing the breaking of their whole line and the rolling up of the ends, the Germans began a general retirement. That is the story they are telling of Foch, and it is good enough to be true.

It may be hoped that British reviewers will not now be so eager or so passionate in replyng to French criticism of Britain's share in the Marne battle as to forget for an instant the full measure and meaning of France's fighting contribution to the cause of the Allies. Controversy over the Marne is not useful now; but justice and honor alike demand that leading men throughout the Empire shall follow the example of some Englishmen in dwelling long and often upon the heroic and decisive quality of French leadership and French valor at the Marne, at Verdun, and on many another field whose name our children's children will hold in honor.

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
