It has given way already. The region of the attack, just east of Monastir at the opening of the great Variar Valley, is a critical part of the Bulgarian defence system. It is too early yet to know whether the attack, if it continues to succeed, will turn east, with the object of flanking the formidable positions on the Struma, or continue ap through Serbia towards Uskub and Nish, but the latter alternative seems the more probable. Developments will soon make the point clear.

The reason and significance of this bresh offensive are to be seen in the Mport, made simultaneously, that Bulgarian troops have been moved to the western front. They will be moved back again. The Allies see a last be-

AVIATORS DO GOOD WORK.

LONDON, To-day British Army and Navy aviators, in the last 48 hours, have dropped thir-teen tons of bombs on the docks at Bruges, and a German airdrome in Belgium, says an official straement from the Admiralty. In air fighting eleven German airplanes were destroyed. Five enemy seaplanes which approached the East Coast of England were driven off by four British ma-chines, one enemy machine being de-stroyed. Three hostile airplanes on a night bombing expedition were brought down inside the British lines last night, according to the official statement on aviation. Fourteen enemy machines were destroyed alto-gether and five others were driven down out of control.

ITALIAN OFFICIAL.

ROME, Sept. 18. The official communication from Italian Headquarters to-day says: North of Monte Grappa five enemy counter attacks in an effort to retake ground at the head of the Serien val-ley were repulsed. The number of prisoners taken in minor operations between Cesilla valley and Coidelorso, yesterday morning, was 442; twenty machine guns were also taken. On the slopes of Monte Nozzolo, south between reconnoitering parties; in the Ordi Valley a hostile outpost was cap-tured. The enemy artillery was partilcularly active along the Piave in the Montello Region and near Fagari.

"We Shall Strive Only to Achive Victory."

BRAVE WORDS OF LIEUT. HEDLEY GOODYEAR, ON THE EVE OF BATTLE-HIS LAST LETTERS TO HIS PARENTS.

France, Aug. 7, 1918.

Dearest Mother,—This is the evening before the attack, and my thoughts are with you all at home. But my backward glance is wistful only because of memories, and because of the cause of memories, and because of the sorrow which would further darken your lives should anything befall me your lives should anything befall me in to-morrow's fray. Otherwise my eye is fixed on to-morrow with hope for mankind and with visions of a new world. A blow will be struck to-morrow which will definitely mark the turn of the tide. It will be one of a grand series of victories which will humble the selfish and barbarous Prussian and eyelf the bearts of these Prussian and exalt the hearts of those who are suffering for freedom. I have no misgivings for myself in tomorrow's encounter, It does not matter whether I survive or fall, a great triumph is certain, and I shall take part in it. I shall strike a blow for freedom, along with thousands of others who count personal sectors. others who count personal safety as nothing when freedom is at stake. In a few moments I shall make the final address to my men, and shall strengthen their hearts, if they need strengthening, with the language of men of war. We shall strive only to achieve victory. We shall not hold our own lives dear.

The hour is all the more dramatic

for mp, because for the first time since came to France, I am close to the spot consecrated by the blood of our own gallant dead. It was here that noble Raymond fell, and Joe and Ken-neth shed their blood for freedom's cause. I trust to be as faithful as

shall not return from the field of hon-our, but in case I should not, give my last blessing to father, and my lates blessing to Roland and his family, and to the others who survive me. I have no regrets and no fear of temorrow. I should not choose to change places with anyone in the world just now, except, perhaps, General Foch!

How glad I am that at last the hour has come for me to taste vengeance! I shall be my mother's and father's on to-morrow.
Again, God bless you all.

France, Aug. 17th, 1918. Dear Mother O' Mine,—The last let-ter I wrote you was before the big show, and as it was written in a hurry, I forgot to number it; however, it was No. two (2) and the date was August 8th. It has not been possible to write until now. I did manage to salvage a piece of paper and an envelope to send word to Joe to cable that I was all right.
Well, the big show is over, at least

as far as we know. You need have no further fear for my safety, the Hun can't get me. I was on most intimate relations with him this time, but I did not get a scratch. My friend John Palmer says I'm reserved for hanging. It was a great day, and the company to which I belong distinguished itself. There seems to be a Providence disposed to order things with justice. Strangely enough, I found myself the in the fight. When we neared our final objective, which was a wood, we found it full of the enemy. I had eight machine guns and over a hundred of the best troops in the world at my command. I ordered every gun to op-en up and every rifle to operate on the blue beasts in front of us and overcome their fire. It took us ten minutes to gain superiority of fire. At the end of that time I saw signs of breaking on the part of the Hun; some of them threw up their hands and came towar us, others beat it to the rear, but the bulk of them stuck to their guns. I thought the moment opportune to charge, so I gave the word and the boys went in with the bayonet. We did not count the dead and wounded, but they were numerous. We took 90 unwounded prisoners, 14 machine guns, two trench mortars, and all sorts of loot. The wood had been used as a reserve camp; we found literally barrels of booze of all kinds, and vast quantities of stores— as rifles, ammunition, revolvers, field glasses, etc. We had three officers in my company hit early in the fight; thus I was left in sole command, and in a position to wreak the full measure of my wrath upon the Kaiser's Huns. I had no mercy—until they quit fighting, then I did not have the heart to shoot them. I even gave all my water to their wounded and nearly famished myself. But it was a great day, and we were terrible in our charge. The boys yelled like fiends as they landed on top of the Boche. He surely had his match that day. I have just a moment to finish this





A Metal Which Fights.

The chemists tell us that aluminium is one of the commonest minerals, though it is never found in a free state. Much the same applies to its use in our fleet-building yards.

No engineer would dream of using the soft, white metal alone, but in alloy with copper and steel it enters into every part of a warship, from the gun-sights and the wireless trapeze to the engine-beds and the keel-plates. Every class of ship is dependent for its success on aluminium.

Aluminium is an all-British product; its cres are drawn from the mountains of Antrim, reduced by the electricity generated by a wild Highland stream, carried to the Clyde for mixture with this metal or that, and then cast or machined to the required shape and

An engine-bed of aluminium-steel is one-third the weight of an all-steel product for the same purpose. The standing parts of marine engines can be equally reduced—a fact of immense importance in torpedo craft and submarines at least.

Aluminium, however, has faults and limitations which science is gradually removing. The mineral will not weld. The two ends of a broken rod will not run together, but will set up a third zone which causes weak joint-

The helmets which are used in our trenches as a protection against snipers and shrapnel contain a considerable proportion of aluminium.

Kaiser as Profiteer.

The Kaiser's greatest war profits come from the Krupp gun-works at Essen. Just how large his holdings are cannot be determined, as the Krupp concern refused to show its books in the recent profiteering investigation conducted by the Reichstag, and that body has no power to enforce its demands. The statement. however, is made on the authority of Geneva bankers who recently returned from Frankfort that the Kaiser before the war had been a large shareholder in Krupp's; in fact, one of the largest holders of the shares next to Frau Bertha Krupp von Bohlen. Since the war began the Kaiser is said to have increased his shares in the works by purchases amounting to £5,-000,000.

That the Kaiser, long before the present war, was an enormously wealthy man was nowhere denied. As King of Prussia he enjoyed a Civil List of £850,000 a year. He is the greatest landowner in Prussia, and has an immense private income. His grandfather left him a fortune of £2,500,000. He has many castles and palaces in various parts of Germany, upon which he has expended immense sums. He bore practically the entire expanse of maintaining and conducting the Imperial opera in Berlin, and when he travelled on his magnificently-equipped railway train it cost him £10 a

The King of the Belgians has conferred upon Mr. Hoover, the American Food Controller, the title of "Citizen of Honor and Friend of the Belgian
