



The altar itself is modest enough a ordinary trestle table, - covered with a fine linen cloth beautifully abroidered in a primitive design few cheep brass bowls and candle sticks hardened with toil, and a grudely carven wooden figure of the Virgin and Child, garishly colored, is all it: decoration.

But the setting of the altar is one of strange beauty. Towering walls of glistening sait, proudly lifting their Gothic arches to dim obscurity form its background. Highly powered electric lamps on high standard light the walls with a magic touch and they glitter and scintillate, each facet of the salt rock catching and reflecting the light, until the whole seems one vast shining cathedral formed of living jewels.

As though hushed in reverence the clang and clatter of the salt miners at work reaches this quiet corner as a low under-current of rbythmic sound, now rising to a higher note, now falling to a wistful murmur. All day long the quiet of the little shrine is at once stirred and accentuated by the softened music of the toiling men.

Occasionally a miner clad in flapping white trousers and voluminous blouse creeps away from his work and, doffing his broad-brimmed hat, lays with clumsy reverence a fresh rose in the hand of the Child. Kneeling for a little while with raised face and eyes softened with mystic fervor he prays audibly-fluently. Morning and evening, as the min-

ers begin and finish the day's toil, the altar is thronged. Daily, fresh flowers are brought from the world above, and so great is considered the favor of arranging them that lots are drawn, the fortunate one retaining his office for a week. Jealously regarded by the rest, he adds half an hour to his day's work in joyful attendance to his labor of love.





Mining Men May Oppose MELTING OF GOLD COINS. SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 23-(A ?.)-One of the major problems to ome before the 27th annual convenion of the American Mining ! Congress, when it meets here September 29 to October 4, is the huge loss the country is said to suffer every year through the destruction of gold coins. At present no law prohibits the melting down of gold coins and the use of such metal in the manufacture of jewelry and in the arts. Proponents of a ban on such melting conend that five, ten and 20 dollar gold vieces, minted at the expense of the axpayers, are thus removed from irculation and from the media-of exchange, to be turned into luxuries. Their opposition is based principally on the fact that gold has a fixed price. set by the government, unaffected by supply and demand, unlike other commodities

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An anti-destruction law for gold coins will be agitated at the convention and the attitude of the entire mining industry will be sounded out. If the sentiment is favorable, steps will be taken to have such a bill presented in congress

Mexico May Ban Hunting

OF BIG GAME BY ALIENS.

TUCSON, Ariz., July 25 (A.P.)-The American big game hunter may find himself barred from Mexico, it was stated by Ben Tinker, who guards Mexico's game by appointment of the Mexican government and is back at his home here. Tinker said there was a growing sentiment in Mexico against foreign hunters. He attributed this to the alleged ruthlessness of some of them in slaughtering deer and other game. He described Mexican officials as determined to prevent Americans from enjoying the big game hunting afford-

Big game has been diminishing rapidly in Mexico, Tinker said, and President Obregon has determined to put a stop to wanton and useless destruction. THOMAS BEST OF EXETER, 1752. Although the County of Devon was well and creditably represented in Trinity in the eighteenth century, there is only one man in the old Church Registers who is recorded as having come from Exeter in that county, and that man was Thomas Best. The city of Exeter is situate on the river Exe ,that empts into the English Channel at Exmouth. There was no ocean trade-route between Exeter and Newfoundland, and those who came to us from Devon were largely from Torquay, Brixham, evonport and Plymouth; and the najority of those came to us as ungsters who had become attracted us by the coming and going of the shipping between Newfoundland and hose scaport towns of Devon.

**Legislative Council** 

## OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS.

FRIDAY, August 1. House met at 4 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

Hon. Mr. Morine tabled report of the Comptroller and Auditor General for Revenue and Appropriations Accounts for period ending June 30th. 1923. Report of C. and A. G. on Section 33 of Audit Act up to February 28, 1924 and Supplementary Report on same to date.

On motion the following Bills were read a third time and passed, namely: 1. Bill entitled "An Act to amend Thapter 3 of 11 George V., entitled An Act to authorize the Montreal Trust Company to do business in the Colony of Newfoundland.""

2 Bill entitled "An Act to amend 14 George V., Chapter 7, entitled ,'An Act for the Encouragement of Shipbuilding.""

3. Bill entitled, "An Act to amend Chapter 24 of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), entitled 'Of payment of certain fees and charges by stamps.""

4. Bill entitled "An Act to further and protect the Activities and Interests of the Boy Scouts Association in the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies."

5. Bill entitled, "An Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery."

6. Bill entitled "An Act respecting the Game and Inland Fisheries Board."

The House then went into Committee of the Whole on Bill entitled "An Act to confirm an agreement with the Newfoundland Milling Company, Limited." Hon. Mr. Millev in the chair. Hon. Mr. Ellis asked if the place where the mill is to be erected was decided upon.

Hon. Mr. Morine replied that a site was under consideration on the Southside of St. John's, and it was understood the mill would be erected there. The Committee reported the bill with slight amendment and with the unanimous consent of the House it was then read a third time and passed. House went into Committee on the War Pensions Bill. Hon. Sir M. G. Winter in the chair.

Hon. Sir Patrick McGrath in reference to section one increasing the number of the commission from two to three, said that in 1920 when the number had been reduced he had strongly opposed the changing of the number from three to two. This he did on the grounds that at times one or other of the members would be absent from the country and sometimes both of them. On one occasion when this happened temporary appointments had been made and con-



ee originally consisting of three members, but now of two, both members of the Executive. One of the original members has been dropped acause as this commission was to report to the Government and he was not a member of the Government it was thought unnecessary. Added to this was the fact that it had been claimed in some quarters that he was one of the original accusers so it was thought best to proceed with the other two. The idea of the appointment ofa Joint Committee of both houses to enquire into War Pensions conditions was one he did not favor as being an evasion by an Executive of its duties. Such inquiry ought to be by the Executive itself and if that proposed revealed necessity for inquiry into the Pensions Act it would be undertaken by the Government. With regard to the last speaker's remarks re hardships existing in some cases in the matter of claims for pensions, he felt the Government and Legislature would be disposed to give the most liberal treatment to all who went to the war and would look favorably upon unfit men who did their bit, because they encouraged others to go and help in a great many, ways by doing work that released a strong man for harder service elsewhere.

Hon. Sir P. T. McGrath with regard to the appointment of a Legislative Commission he did not agree with Hon. Mr. Morine, that such an appointment was merely the evasion of Government responsibility. In the case of the loggers Bill in the Lower House it was referred to a Legislative Committee and it was not proposed that the Government was shirking or evading responsibility.

Hon. Mr. Morine said this was a different matter altogether. The one was dealing with public moneys while the loggers' bill was dealing with noney of a private concern.

Referring to section 2 of the Act Mr. Morine stated it referred to bonuses which were granted two or three years ago for one year only, but were ontinued to be paid ever since and would be up to June 30, 1925 and probably thereafter. These bonuses which were after the Canadian system were being paid illegally and the amendment was to legalize the payments.

Hon. Sir. Patrick McGrath said the same thing occured in Canada which resulted in a conflict between the two branches of the Legisature. The pensions were increased 50 per cent. and paid from year to year. Last year at Ottawa the Legislature decided to make the bonus permanent, but the Senate objected and thought two years more sufficient when the bonuses should be dropped. There was no reason why we should not adopt the Canadian system and if the Canadians reduced bonuses we would probably do the same, but we should not do so until careful inves-
