At every turn from leaving the station boards are to be seen stuck up against houses, announcing in characters more or less symmetrical, "Lodgings and I hot meas at all hours," and in the neighbourhood of the show ground searcely anything is to be seen but canvas, which covers either refreshment booths, small shows where some of the most wonderful phenomena of nature are to be seen for a consideration, or which form tents where pug nosed puglists give exhibitions of their skill in the fistic art for their own benefit and the edification of boys from the country. The pickpockets had not an opportunity on Tuesday of proving their dexterity at somebody's expense. The crowd was not yet sufficiently large to admit of their operations, nor was there even an attempt made to chisel the verdant and unwary by thimble rigging, three card monte or any of those other villianous devices so well known to a formidable force of blackguards. We have said that Tuesday scarcely saw the business of the show fairly begun. Nothing ill can be said of the show ground, but much may be spoken in its praise. Its elevated situation, and the sandy nature of the soil render it peculiarly well adapted for the purpose to which it is appropriated, for the heavy rains which almost invariably fall about the time of the fair have less of an impression on it than on the heavy clay soil which on some invariably fall about the time of the fair have less of an impression on it than on the heavy clay soil which on some grounds people, horses and cattle are obliged to tread until it becomes as sticky as bridlime. Paris, 22nd.—Official despatches from Spain admit that insurrection has broken out at Madrid and in Seville, but its existence in Muria and Gallwa is denied.

London, 22nd.—Despatches from Naples report that an insurrection has broken out in Calabria and Sicily in favor of an Italian Republic. The Italian Government has taken prompt and strong steps to put a stop to the disorders.

Taris, 22nd.—The grams for the John has here confirm the news of a rising in the south of Italy. The Temps fear that the Italians desire the overthrow of monarchy under Victor Emmanuel. The Gaulois asserts that Francis II., the ex-King of Sicily, is the prime instigator of the movement and that the Eebels are merely acting under pretence of Republican principles.

New York, 22rd.—The Herald's London special of last evening says: Advices from Madrid, dated yesterday evening, the 21st, report that a government decree has been issued in the capitol accepting the resignation of all the members of the Bravo cabinet. The decree named Gen. Jose Concha as President of Council of State in the Queen's name, but he had not formed a ministry when the telegrams were despatched.

The Madrid Gazette of the 21st announced that a revolt against the Government had taken place at Cadiz and Seville. The Government had formed that formed the content had formed the content of the content of the formed that the

A provisional government has been formed in Seville which declared Espertro as President. The forces of the insurgents are astimated as numbering fourteen thousand soldiers with five thousand sallors serving in eleven ships of war. The revolt makes progress at all points.
