THE LATE MURDER IN OSPREY.

Arrest of the Murderer. He Hangs Himself in his Cell.

TO EVENING MERCURY.
Owen Sound, Feb. 11, 1873. Last evening two constable arrived here, having in charge the man Beggs from the Township of Osprey, on a charge of murdering his wife in bed the previous Saturday.

He was placed in his cell in the gaol

When found he was still warm, and rasping the end of the sheet firmly, his head not being much more than two or

three feet from the ground.

The Canadian Pacific Railway. The test of the Charter of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, five columns in length, appears in the Globe of this (Tuesday) morning. Knowing that our readers feel a deep interest in this collossal undertaking we give a summary of its leading

The Canadian Pacific will extend from some point on or near Lake Nipissing and on the south shore thereof to some point on the shore of the Pacific Ocean, both the said points to be determined by the Gov ernor in Council, and the course and line of the said railway between the said points to be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

The capital stock of the Company shall be ten million dollars, which shall not be increased but by Parliament. The company shall construct, equip, maintain, and work a continuous railway of the width or gauge of four feet eight and one half inches. The Company shall build a branch line of railway from some point on the railway to some point on Lake Superior, in British territory and also another branch line of rail way from some point on the railway in the Province of Manitoba, to some point on the line between that Pro-

in the Province of Manitoba, to some point on the line between that Province and the United States of America, the said points and the courses and lines of the said branches between the said points to be determined by the Government, the said branches to be of the gauge aforesaid, and such lines of railway shall form part of the railway and portions of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The Company shall, within two years from the 20th day of July, 1871, commence simultaneously the construction of the railway from the Pacific Ocean towards the Rocky Mountains, and from a point in the Province of Ontario, hereinafter to be determined by the Government, towards the Pacific Ocean, to connect the seaboard of British Columbia with the railway system of Canada; and further, shall construct the Manitoba section by the 31st day of December 1874; the lake communication between Lake Superior and Red River Ly the 31st day of December 1876; shall proceed with and construct the eastern and western sections simultoneously; shall proceute the work of constructing the railway with all due diligence; and shall complete the whole railway within ten years from the said 20th day of July, 1871, and set the last mentioned period shall be calarged by Act of Pacilament in which case the Company shall complete the whole railway within such extended period.



AT BOND'S

DET STEAM.—Sir William Fairbairn, at recent meeting of the Manchester the time is not far distant when manufactures will turn out their goods at a relaxion of one-half, or probably more, of the present cost. "Dry Steam" is the new fairy that is to work this further wonder. The vaper, Sir William says, is now not rightly managed, and the greatest part of its power is undeveloped. It must be isolated from water, have a much greater expansion given to it, and be used at double, or even at treble, the present rate of pressure. He asserts that this is safely possible. All that has to be done is to provide "scmething strong enough to hold it." He added that he already has stood a hydraulic testing of 400 lbs. to the square inch, and which he believes would not yield adouble that amount. As the power of resistance is increased, the bulk, he states may be lessened. Thirty years ago the pressure at which engines were worked was from seven to ten pounds. The rate has now been raised from sity to seventy pounds, half the fuel being saved. What is proposed to be done is not much more astonishing than what has been done.
