Mr. Walker will take charge on Monday, so that there will be no interruption in the regular routine of school work.

Canada and the United States. directs attention to the very intelligent and friendly tone which has characterized the discussion by the American press of the proposed Re-ciprocity Treaty, and points out the great change of feeling which has taken place in the States regarding the future relations between the Dominion and the Republic. change of feeling has been observable for some time, though we do not recollect that it has before been taken notice of. We well remember how, until very recently, the American press—especially the N. Y. Herald and a few others of the same stripe-scarcely ever mentioned Catempt, and looked upon it as a mere appanage of the Republic, to be gobbled upon the first fitting opportunity. Such were the dreams of the old fire-eaters, who were firm believers in the American legend, faithfully handed down from father faithfully handed down from father Mr. Blake.

The Scottish American adduces another cause for this change of sentiment, and we cannot do better than give these in its own words:—"It is also dawning upon the mass of newspaper readers in the United States that there is across the border a community of four millions of peeple, with an area for an indefinite expansion of three and a half millions of square miles, and with a productive energy which in portions of Upper Canada has achieved material triumphs as striking as any which have been witnessed in the most progressive, sections of the Union. When bank discounts show an increase in one year of \$12,500,000, equal to twelve per cent, on the gross amount; when foreigh trade has reached an annual value of \$240,000,000; when, with trade on a specie basis, the country is proceeding to the energetic development of public works, for which money can be borrowed at a lower rate than by any community in the Union, the progress of Canada is as unmistakable as the favourable conditions which it presents for that progress. Reciprocity will be of advantage to both countries, but the mutual good understanding which it will serve to maintain may prove of greater importance still.

No further action has been taken in the matter of the proposed Durham Extension from Clifford to Durham, and the Owen Sound Extension from Pailey to Owen Sound. Your Directors have been powerless to act, in consequence of the G. W. R. Cc. not having yet agreed to equip and operate the innes, if constructed, but they yet hope to give the people of their sections the Railway facilities they so much desired.

Your Directors regret that the southern extension still remains unepened, it being held by the contractors for an unpaid balance due them. The bonds that the Company have been allowed to issue have been all exhausted, and the muncipalities which contributed bonuses have paid them all in full, and the proceeds have been applied to the payment of the debts of the Company. To meet the balance due the contractors, we rely upon the Government aid already mentioned and the proceeds of the issue of bonds to the other of the 15th February, 1871, which authorizes the issue of bonds to the extent of \$12,000 per mile on the length of the sidings, providing the consent of the G. W.
