FIFTY-SIX ARE NOW REPORTED DEAD.

Details Of Dread Disaster Told by Colonist Correspondent---Volcanic Eruption or Earthquake Disturbance By Some Held Primary Cause

As the entire population of Frank is estimated at not more than six or seven hundred, the awful magnitude of the calamity may be appreciated.

Indeed the most specific and authoritative report yet to hand is in the form of a telegram addressed to the Fernie Board of Trade by the sister body at the devastated territorial town, which reads as follows:

We suffered from a very large rock slide. There are very few injured; we can do nothing and want no help. Please discourage anyone from coming here.

The Dominion and Territorial governments are using every effort to succor the injured and alleviate the distress created by the dread disaster.

Routine Was The Rule

Deadlock in Legislature Continues to Delay Business.

Attorney-General Administers a Vigorous Castigation.

"The Lying Slanderous Tongue" Caustically Referred to.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor met yet having intimated his intentions with respect to bill No. 16, and the House being still disposed to refuse consideration to any legislation of vital importance until this measure has been given the force and effect of law, yesterday another sitting of the legislature notable only for its dull monotony.

Indeed the only debate of the entire afternoon arose upon a frivolous motion for the return of the proposed lease of Deadman's Island, which the motion stated to have been prepared by the government and signed by Mr. Ludgate, although it has never been carried into effect.

Very varied and divergent views of the desirability of the Ludgate bargain were expressed by the Vancouver members, while Mr. McBride directed attention to the alleged division of the cabinet on this matter, which has placed quite an important part in the whole of the day.

Mr. McPhillips maintained that it was strange that the government had sought to take any action in dealing with this island, while the matter of ownership was before the court, and that it was a matter of course that the government should have taken counsel at a critical period of the proceeding.

Mr. Curtis seized upon this to renew his attack upon the Attorney-General, intimating that as in other matters the interests of the province had suffered because they came in conflict with the interests of the firm of which Hon. Mr. Eberts is a member.

Mr. Curtis, Mr. Tatlow and Mr. McPhillips spoke adversely to the Ludgate bargain, while Mr. Gilmore showed wherein it would be of considerable advantage to Vancouver and the province.

In reply to the challenge of the member for Rossland, Hon. Mr. Eberts observed that while "there is no way of stopping a lying, slanderous tongue," he could refute each and every one of the Rossland member's "insinuations."

He took up each of the cases mentioned, and by statements of the simple facts, showed how utterly untrue was the assertion that private interests of his business firm had been allowed to affect his duty as attorney-general.

The Deadman's Island case, Messrs. Bodwell & Duff, who originally had the conduct of the case, had presented a bill for \$2,900. This the Deputy Attorney-General had checked down to \$2,400, on the next appearance of the case, Messrs. Bodwell & Duff were ordered to pay a payment of \$500 down and so much per day thereafter—or they declined to do so.

Naturally the government resented this form of indignity, which amounted to a rebuff, and the Attorney-General was authorized to employ other counsel, whom the government selected, and who were not of the same high professional and unprofessional for the member for Rossland to intimate that counsel had been changed.

Mr. Eberts made the most of his case. With respect to the Deadman's Island case, Hon. Mr. Eberts showed how soon as his firm's interests conflicted with the crown's interests therein, he had been changed to Messrs. Bodwell & Duff. In another matter, his firm had never been retained, and he had advised the reference of the whole thing to the court.
