There is a great difference in more ways than one between banks loaning money on bank stocks and on other stocks in general.

The failure of even one bank might send the stock of every bank in the country

down below zero, and make it impossible to realize on them at almost any sacrifice.

This could never happen with stocks in general. Express stock or Toronto gas stock for instance would readily bring nearly what those stocks are now worth, even though half the banks in the country went down.

This is a serious consideration, for banks practically hold little security, for money loaned on stocks, besides the stocks, and in

CUSTOM HOUSE DELAYS.

REASONS WHY THE AFFIDAVITS AND OATES ARE STRINGENT.

Red Tape in all Government Departmen -Keeping an Eye on United States In

Since The World printed the remarks of "Importer" on Sauturday calling attention to alleged delays and red-tapeism at the custom house, a couple of letters from other importers on the same subject have reached this office. A World reporter yesterday made numerous enquiries about the matter. A simple look at the wickets from which peep the manifest clerk, the computing clerk and the cashier at the custom house often shows a blockade of wholesale clerks passing their entries. But it should be remembered that business at the Toronto custom house is increasing wonderfully, and for the first eleven days of wonderfully, and for the first eleven days of November, deducting Thanksgiving day, Sunday and half Saturdays, the entries passed numbered 1722, or an axance of about 215 per day of seven flows actual work or an entry for every two minutes. One day last week there were 278 entries passed, the largest number in the history of the Toroato custom house. The present system of passing entries no doubt could be simplified, but the department at Ottawa are compelled from the many attempts that are made by respectable business houses in the United States to defraud the revenue, to make the provisions for collecting enue, to make the provisions for collecting the customs very stringent. It is a well known fact that the customs officers of the two countries keep each other "posted" on the different devices attempted to cheat the customs. Thus the invoices of certain firms are kept under constant surveillance. It is for the sereasons that the forms of oaths and affidavits are made so stringent. for the sereasons that the forms of oaths and affidavits are made so stringent. The present system of passing entries is the one introduced by Hon. Isaac Burpee, Mr. Mackenzie's minister of customs, with some few alterations passed by orders in council of the present governmet. It is a common complaint with people who have to deal with government officials, and more particular with reference to the departments at Ottawa, that the amount of red tape that they have to swallow is appalling.

THE ECONOMIC MINERALS OF CANADA. The Dominion of Canada, stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, has its southern boundary fixed on or about the 49th parallel of latitude. Northwards we may go to the pole, if we choose, and are able to get through, but the present boundary rather peremptorily marks out our south. ern limits. In view of the important fact that we may press northwards but not southwards the question how far north we can go and profit by the operation is one of much practical interest. It is only within these few years past that we have become thoroughly aware of the existence of a vast wheat-growing region this side of the Rocky Mountains, stretching very far away to the northward. The researches of geolothe Dominion lying pretty far north, there are to be found large and valuable deposits of economic minerals. We have every reason to believe that the mineral resources of Northern Ontario are not yet half explored or discovered; but we are not without men who are devoting themselves with a good deal of energy to this very work. Among those who deserve mention in this connection is Mr. D. G. Charles, C. E., of Vorkville, who has had considerable experience in geological surveying and exploring, and who at the recent exhibition here showed a valuable collection of phosphate of lime and its manufactures.
