First. An addition to the Criminal act raising the age at which female children may legally consent to sinful conduct from thirteen years, the present period, to sixtage.

Second. Extension of the law prohibiting second. Extension of the law promotests moliditing to both sexes.

Third. Denial of any additional power overwomen to the police that will be aimed at the suppression of crime and not at the suppression of vice—that is, complete legal liberty for voluntary immorality between adults contracting on equal terms, but rigorous repression of sexual criminality in all cases in which the parties are under age or the elements of full, free, and intelligent consent are absent.

Fourth. Greatly increased stringency in the laws against producation.

Such may have been the result in the office of that newspaper; but outside of it we cannot believe there is anyone whose detestation of vice was not increased by the terrible pictures from the pages of the Pall Mall Gazette. To reproduce those pictures in this country is to put our people on their guard against the growth of like abominations here. They do not incite to sin any more than the pictures of Hogarth.

The losses referred to at this and other recent bank meetings have been most y made some time ago; but there need be no doubt of the fact that present business is both safe and profitable, as will, we hope, be seen by this time next

Was There a Political Motive? 



You speak of arbitrary action and uncalled-for interference, as if the refusal to grant licenses was something new and without excuse or precedent. On the contrary, it is a well understood principle both in England and in this country that public parks or pleasure resorts should, i possible, be kept free from the associations engendered by the sale of intoxicating liquors. I point to the Montreal Mountain park and Island park as examples. Hitherto the press of the city, I believe without exception, have approved of the refusal to grant liquor licenses to the Island, and it is certain that the vast majority of the citizens are of the same opinion. It is therefore to be regretted that The World, which is generally in the van in defending the right, should now take an opposite course. In 1833 licenses were refused and the press supported the commissioners in their refusal. A little grumbling was heard at first, but it soom died out; whether the law was strictly enforced, as it ought to possible, be kept free from the association first, but it soon died out; whether the law was strictly enforced, as it ought to have been, is an open question. In 1884 the commissioners again refused to grant licenses, but the dominion authorities in the face of public epinion granted five licenses.
