From Crown Attorney Badgerow he asked certain conditions, the exact purport of which heither he nor the Crown Attorney is pre-pared to state definitely. But Mr. Badgerow, when questioned last night, said enough to give one the pretty good idea that the Crown will convent to Wood's being admitted to ball until his trial at the summer assizes, and the amount will probably be \$1000 or \$2000.
