About 350 candidates were ex-amined. Of these 225 matriculated com-pletely; 37 have to take a supplemental ex-amination in September; 19 others will pass on the presentation of II. class certificates from the education department; in all 281 were successful in obtaining a university standing in arts. Thirty-four failed out-right, but have an opportunity of presenting

were successful in obtaining a university standing in arts. Thirty-four failed outright, but have an opportunity of presenting themselves again in September.

The man of the year is John Herbert Brown from Owen Sound Collegiate Institute, who stands first in honor classics, mathematics, English, history and geography and German and sixth in French. This is an extraordinarily good placing. He wins the Mary Mulock classical scholarship and the Frince of Wales scholarship.





The Windy City's Fep.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The official rough estimate announced by the census bureau to-day shows the population of Chicago to be 1,086,570. This is an increase during the decade of 505,381. 
