COLLISION IN THE STORM
A G.T.R. Mail Train Crashes Into a Stalled Express.

FIRE ADDS TO THE HORROR OF THE WRECK.
One Man Cremated, Two Fatally Hurt, Ten Others Injured.

The Chicago Express, Stuck in a Cut Near Weston, Topped by the London Mail, Despite the Placing of Torpedoes on the Rail and Attempts to Flag the Train—The Wreck Takes Fire, Six Cars Being Burned—Frank Joseph, an Ontario Government Employee, Cremated—Engineer Mainwaring and Court Reporter Monahan Fatally Injured—Judge Burton Seriously Hurt—Justice Osler, B. B. Osler, Q.C., and A. B. Aylesworth, Q.C., Severely Shaken Up.

Through the stalling of No. 4 Chicago express train on the Grand Trunk in a snowdrift near Highfield, a mail station 1 1/2 miles west of Weston, yesterday and the failure of the trainmen of No. 6 local from London to hear the fog signal placed on the track by a brakeman in a short time previously, and a train to warn them, a pitch-in occurred which resulted in the death of one passenger, the fatal injury of a second passenger and one of the trainmen and injuries to more or less serious to nearly a dozen other passengers. Owing to the fact of the steam heating apparatus being frozen the stoves had lighted in the cars a short time previously, and when the collision occurred the stoves upset and the cars took fire. The Pullman cars, Detroit and Jamaica, two baggage cars and two passenger coaches were totally consumed.

THE DEAD.

STORY OF THE WRECK.
No. 4 (Chicago) express, due to arrive in Toronto at 8:15 a.m., left Brampton at 12:22 in the snow. It consisted of one baggage car, one express car, two passenger coaches and the Pullman cars Detroit and Jamaica. There were about 60 passengers on board, including Justice Osler and Burton. B. B. Osler, Q.C., and A. B. Aylesworth, Q.C., were also on board. The train was in charge of engineer Mainwaring and Court Reporter Monahan, who had boarded the train at Mitchell, where they had been engaged on the South Bay station train. The train was travelling at a distance of three-quarters of a mile and placed two fog signals on the track. It then retraced its steps a short distance and stood between the rails and flagged the train. A terrific snowstorm was raging at the time and in order that the flag might be seen by the engineer of No. 6, he held the burning over his head between his hands. Engineer Mainwaring evidently did not bear the report of the fog signals in the rear of the train and proceeded to back the train into the snowdrift without stopping to see if the train was stalled.

Joseph was severely injured in the collision, and his car was completely destroyed. The trainmen were unable to see the signal in the storm, and the Chicago train proceeded to back into the stalled London train.
