This, if true would of course be sufficient to cause some considerable increase in price, while the manipulation of the market by the gamblers in oil might easily do the rest. It is quite probable too, that the oil as well as the coal, stored up in the bowels of the earth will some day become exhausted as a result of the tremendous drains which are being made upon them. But there is not much probability of this occurring in our day, and doubtless before this does occur, the ingenuity of man will have devised some better and cheaper method of securing light and heat than is now obtained through -Ir the price of oil keeps on increasing for a little while longer the way it has been

our, the ingenuity of man will have devised some better and cheaper method of securing light and heat than is now obtained through the instrumentality of oil and coal.

It may be true that the increase in price is not owing to any combine on the part of the producers. Indeed, there is little to combine. The Standard Oil Company has gobbled up, or crushed out, about everything in the shape of opposition or competition, and being now practically master of the situation upon this continent, is able to arrange prices about as its magnates choose. These men have made colossal fortunes within a little over a score of years. John D. Rockfeller, of the Standary Oil Company, is the richest man in America. Within a few the richest man in America. Within a few years he has accumulated no less than \$145, the richest man in America. Within a few years he has accumulated no less than \$145, 000,000, while his associates are not far behind him in wealth. Not content with what they already have, these men seem anxious to secure the rest of the earth and the fullness thereof, as there is little doubt that the present doubling up of the price of oil is the result of their scheming. Thus, without a shadow of reason, save to satisfy the greed of men who already have more than they know what to do with, and certainly more than they can make a good use of, the consumers of oil the world over are to be fleeced to the tune of hundreds of millions a year. And just at present there seems to be very little the general public can do about it, except to grin and bear it. It is just such circumstances as these which give rise to
