

APPLE DELECTO COOKIES

cup sugar

cup shortening

Stir sugar, mile and eggs until sugar is dissolved. Then rub nortening into the mixed flour and powder. Add half this to the exture and the two cups DE_ECTO that has been put through the food chopper then the balance of the flour. If too soft for rollout add a little more flour, Roll out to one-eighth, of an inch k, cut in rounds or in squares with a knife. Bake about ten twelve minutes in a hot oven.




