



R. J. SPROULE; carrying on a respectable country store at Flesherton, Out., for some years has been obliged to assign. He carried a stock of about \$10,000; and the liabilities will exceed several thousand. He owns the store, subject to mortgage.

THE N. Y. Insurance & R. E. Journal says : The North British and Mercantile Insurance Company of England has appointed Mr. Thos. Wallace, of the Institute of Actuaries, to fill the position as actuary to the company in the place of Mr. Chisholm, who has retired.

THE Caledonia Insurance Company of Edinburgh, Scotland, organized eighty years ago, well known in Canada under the management of Messra. Taylor Brothers of this city, has opened a branch establishment in California, with Baltour, Guthrie & Co, general agents.

According to the Lumberman's Gazette, the belief is becoming general that the business of barrel-making will sink into insignificance in the future, and that the barrel of the future is the paper barrel, which is said to be stronger, cleaner, cheaper and better every way than the common barrel.

A WINNIPEG hotelkeeper, Mr. John Paisley, has been sold out by the sheriff. He carried on in the same line at one time in Orangeville, and owns the property known there as the Paisley House, which is, however, heavily encumbered. His liabilities footed up several thousand dollars.

Mr. J. H. Willoughby, who resumed the dry goods business in Trenton about a year ago, again finds himself surrounded by troubles. He was formerly in the same line at Brighton, but had been clerking for some years prior to his last unfortunate endeavor. He had but very little capital to begin with.

Brockville and Maitland in Ontario, as well as Ogdensburgh, Canton, Hewelton, Richville, Potsdam and other points in the State of New York. The Timber Trades Journal, referring to the arrival of the spring lumber fleet from-Quebec, says:—The cargoes come out at a very opportune time, the present London stocks of yellow pine being lower than ever known. The dock stocks consist of 1st and a few 4th quality, but at the mills we understand, there is considerable quantity of 3rds, as well as some of the next lower descriptions.

Messus. L. L. A. Grison, dry goods retailers, Ottawa, held a meeting of their creditors in this city last Monday, and proposed a compromise at 40 cents in the dollar, which was not agreed

A CANADIAN ABROAD.—The Diamond Fields Advertiser of May 30th contains a highly satisfactory report of the Kimberly (South Africa) Water Works Co. for the year, which posseses no interest for our readers beyond that a well-known Canadian, Mr. F. R. Despard, manager at one time of the Dominion Fire & Marine Ins. Co., of Hamilton, is general manager, and received a hearty vote of thanks at the meeting.

The mackerel fishing for June is reported to have been a partial failure. A despatch from Wellfleet, Me., says:—The fleet from here number 29 vessels, many of which are unable to pay expenses. There have been 7:00 barrels landed mostly small mackerel. The mackerel receipts at Provincetown for the month are 900 seapacked barrels of threes; total this season, 1,550 barrels. This is not bulf the receipts of last year to date. Buit still continues scarce and in good demand

FROM several of the best agricultural districts of Ontario complaints are made of the destruction wrought by insects in the clover fields. The Belleville Intelligencer says: Another insect pest has appeared to dishearten the agriculturist in the form of a small worm that has secreted itself by the thousand in the heads of clover, entirely destroying the vitality

A rink of barristers in Ingersoll, Ont., are obliged to consult with a number of clients and other creditors owing to the result of investments in the North West. The former are interested to the extent of about \$30,000 -D. Patterson & Co., of Ridgetown, Ont., machinists, recently referred to as being troubled with the sheriff, made an assignment to the town who in return concluded to release them the building and machinery for another six months' trial, which it is hoped may enable them to pull through.

From the third sentence of the notice of Mr. McCabe's letter on the subject of the assessment system last week it might have been inferred that his object was to explain that the company was not an assessment association. It is the "commercial plan" of the North America which he wished to defend from such an identity, the annual payments in which are based upon a tabular cost of insurance and no risks admitted above a certain age. He did not deem it necessary to say that the company has nothing of the "Assessment method" in its constitution.

Joseph Portelance, jr., a clerk in La Banque du Peuple, this city, is the latest addition to the list of defaulting bank clerks. It appears a part of his duties has been to enter the paid checks in the cash book. By an oversight of the paying-teller a check for \$700 was paid without being cancelled with the stamp of the bank, and passed over to Portelance to be entered. He detected the omission, put it in his pocket, and gave it to a friend, who went to the bank and eashed it again. Portelance also falsified the cash book to cover his tracks, but the fraud was detected. He had been living rather too fast for some time. His salary was \$500 a year. One or two money brokers will also lose small amounts. The greater portion of the money has been recovered, and the bank does not seem inclined to prosecute.

INSOLVENCY LAWS.

The mercantile community of Belleville has prominence thrust upon it by a series of four letters published under the above title, with the explanation that they appear in pamphlet form, because of the leading commercial journals of Toronto and Montreal refusing their publication, though payment was offered to each at advertising rates; (?) the writer therefore" is constrained to bring the "subject forward in this form at con-"siderable personal inconvenience and "expense," from which it appears that the sympathy of the members of the President's Board has not reached their

packets, and the pamphlet bears no evidence of having received their approval. The style of the writer has at least the merit of novelty, each letter being headed by something in the nature of a text; these are summed up at the end of the last, in a manner not far removed from the style in which some preachers, within the recollection of such as may not merit the distinction of the "oldest inhabitant" can readily recall, the whole capped by a "conclusion" in the same solemn strain, thus: "By all that is right "and just between man and man, and as "we are responsible to our Maker," etc., etc. The invocation of the Deity in matters of commerce, and especially in questions relating to projected commercial legislation is of course unusual; it is alopted in the present instance with something of frequency and force, possibly on the score of harmony with the special style aimed at, and out of consideration for the quarter whence the laws and the writer's inspiration emanated. This feeling is impressed on the reader by such passages as: "There are " laws above us, and above Kings and " Parliaments, pertaining to trade and "commerce * * * Teach men to "recognize those immutable laws and "that they must be obeyed, whatever " earth or hell may say to the contrary . " * * * or suffer the penalty attached, " not by man, but by God." Then we are told that Insolvency laws are wrong, " furnishing occasion and opportunity for "men to overlook their responsibilities "and neglect their obligations to God." The fervency of spirit appears from time to time in strains less grand, as in the case of the farmer, who is commiserated for having no "city of refuge." The commercial journals of Montreal and Toronto are credited with a pretence as though "they would make by the new "insolvency law everything beautiful, "bright and heavenly * * * they "refer with horror to the dark days of " the past when the dungeon awaited the "debtor, but it seems now, they would "substitute for the prison the shackles "of the slave, and a whip of scorpions, "while side by side with an article "in the columns of one of these papers " came one of these laments in pleading "terms crying How long? It is further revealed to us, that " to make such pro-"vision on our statute books, is equiva-"lent to furnishing a premium for men "to neglect their duty and defy the laws " of the Eternal!

As a foil to such exalted writing, there are descents to vulgar contrasts, which may, according to the standard which

prompted them, be in appropriate artistic taste, as, for instance: "The President of "the Board of Trade of Toronto has adopted a device in his circular to the House of Commons, namely, what is vulgarly termed drawing a red herring across the track;" again, these speculating adventurers are free to credit right and left to all sorts of persons," while "the rights of the people being trampled on "at the instigation of a few designing men in Toronto and Montreal."

The reader will find that the laws of nature and of ethics, as well as those of the Eternal are drawn upon in support of the writer's views, and the tone in which the principles are laid down leaves nothing to be desired on the score of authority, should the conclusion arrived at he that invective is not argument, and that a forcible statement such as "indeed "a greater proportion than ninety-nine "in a hundred of all who reflect on the "subject at all are decidedly and em-"phatically opposed to it," is very far from being an incontrovertible truth, there is abundant justification for so thinking. The reader will form such opinions as the homilies warrant regarding the standard by which the words have been weighed and the amount of credence to be given to views that are admittedly at variance with the legislation of Ontario and-this for the information of the author-of Quebec. In that fact, there is some slight ray of hope for ordinary mortals, and although the proportion of established fact in these letters is somewhat in the ratio of Falstaff's morsel of bread to the quantity of sack, it is a relief to find on the authority of Mr. Ritchie that firms in England having large business transactions in the Dominion, strongly urged upon him that there ought to be an insolvency law in Canada for the credit of the country and its fair fame, and that credit was refused by these firms to some buyers wholly, to others partly, which would have been obtained to the full extent sought, had there been a low here to secure an equal distribution of assets in case of insolvency. (The italics are his) He also admits, what no one will probably doubt, " that of "those in the retail trade, but a very "small percentage indeed, succeed in " making a living, and but a solitary one " liere and there, acquire enough to retire "comfortably in old age." The logic of every-day life would recognize in this state of matters the necessity for providing means to deal fairly by the creditors of the very large majority of retail traders. Any who adopt the views of Mr. Ritchie as to the cure to be applied

are of course at liberty to practice them, but the course of dealing will not suffer a revolution on that account, and Mr. Ritchie will perhaps arrive at the conclusion that his assumption of superiority to all the wisdom of the Boards of Trade at the great distributing centres, here and abroad, to say nothing of the collective wisdom of the Legislatures of Great Britain. Ontario and Quebec, places him very much in the position of those he speaks of as attempting to lift themselves to the sky by their boot straps, or trying the experiment of dashing their heads against a stone wall.

THE LONDON ADVERTISER AND THE C.P.R.

We venture to hazard the assertion that our London contemporary's remarks on a recent article of ours, pointing out the unfairness of the course pursued by the exponents of the Opposition policy towards the principal shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Co. are more likely to cause surprise than those which he has undertaken to criticise. We readily admit that in our occasional notices of the C. P. R. we have labored, as we still labor, under the disadvantage of not knowing much more of the conditions under which the stock was subscribed than that a certain cash bonus was to be given to the company in addition to a land grant. As between the original shareholders and those who subsequently invested in the shares, and also as between both and the Government, we are wholly without information, and are not therefore in a position to discuss with the Advertiser the propriety of the mode of allotting shares. What we do know is that the organs of the Opposition have been persistently unfair in their criticisms.

The Advertiser in his article of 3d inst, states the aggregate subsidies granted by the Government, and then adds: "For this they were to build the road," thus conveying the impression that the original subscribers to the stock undertook that, on condition of receiving certain subsidies, they would bind themselves to devote their private fortunes to the construction of the Pacific railway. We find it difficult to believe that the Advertiser really holds such an absurd opinion. The gentlemen in question have been generally considered to be men of good business talent and sagacity, but if they had deliberately entered into such a contract they would have earned the character of consummate blockheads. Such an act would have been one of sheer madness. What we understand they actually did was to undertake to form a company for the construction of the railroad on the usual terms of limited liability. They were required to take among them 50,000 shares of \$100 each, and to pay for them at par, and the shares were to receive interest at 6 per cent until the completion of the road.

The Advertiser states explicitly "so far they have contributed nothing" although in another part of the same article he admits that they not only took 50,000 shares at par but 200,000 more at 25 making \$10,000,000 at 40. To prevent misunderstanding, we may remark that we have heard on what we believed good authority that the shares of the directors really stand them nearer 45. Be that as it may, what we objected to as both untruthful and unfair was the systematic charge that the directors were getting 6 per cent on 25. We presume,-but we must beg our contemporary to bear in mind that we have no reliable information on the subject,-that it was originally hoped that the public would subscribe at par for a stock having a 6 per cent guarantee and the liberal bonuses granted by the Government, and with the encouragement given by the directors in taking 50,000 shares at par. The appeal to the public was not successful, and eventually lower rates had to be accepted, and in order to equalize the position of the shareholders, the original subscribers increased their holding by an additional \$5,000,000, at a rate which it cannot be denied was a fair average. At all events the public at large have had ample opportunity of buying at less than 40.

As to the interest the Advertiser cannot be unaware that it was reduced long since from 6 to 5 per cent, and that when, in order to induce people to subscribe, a Government guarantee was purchased, the rate was reduced to 3 per cent. The people who complain like the Advertiser are not the stockholders, who would be the principal sufferers if there had been any unfairness. The Advertiser has not ventured to defend the dishonest proposition made by the leaders of the Opposition, that the value of the Government annuities of 3 per cent, on the faith of which the stock has been changing hands for a considerable time back, should be diverted from the purpose for which they were granted, and applied to the construction of the road. A more audacious proposal to repudiate a Government pledge was nevertimade. evident that it was too bad for even the Advertiser to defend, and he has proved

in his late article that he does not stick at trifles.

We should like the Advertiser to explain on what principle the shareholders in the C. P. R. should be called on to do what the eminent capitalists who subscribed for the original stock in the Grand Trunk were never asked to do. We should also like him to explain whether he thinks it would have been just that the original promoters of the company who evinced their confidence in the undertaking by subscribing \$5,000,000 at par should have received the same rate of interest on those shares as the new shareholders, chieay foreigners, and yet this would have been the effect of allotting their second five millions on the same terms as those obtainable in the open market. As we have already stated, we labor under the same disadvantage as the public at large in having very imperfect information, but there is quite enough in possession of the public to enable us to refute the calumnies of the Opposition press.

A CANADIAN TABLE OF MORTALITY.

At a meeting lately of some prominent insurance men the question was asked: Why have we not a Canadian table of mortality?

It is difficult to satisfactorily answer this question, without assuming that the lack of such a table is due to the carelessness or indifference of our life insurance companies. There should naturally exist among our companies a desire to increase our knowledge of vital statistics, and it would seem reasonable to suppose that they would be the first to suggest the construction of atable that would accurately denote the normal rates of mortality among insured lives in Canada as soon as their experience would justify its compilation. We would like to see such a table as soon as it can properly be constructed; not only because we believe it would be of great use to our Life Companies, but also from a sense of national pride and gratification.

When the American experience table of mortality was made from the recorded experience of the Mutual Life Iusurance Company of New York, we believe that company had no greater experience than the combined experiences of our own companies. There would therefore seem to be no good reason why we should not have a table of our own that would adequately express the normal death rate among insured lives in this Dominion.

If, as we believe, our mortality is lower than the mortality in the United States,

we would by all means like to have the fact demonstrated beyond any doubt. Our plea that the frugality, carefulness, and industry of Canadians make them more desirable as insurance risks than residents of most other countries would thus either be dispelled, as an illusion or confirmed beyond any further doubt or question. Our premium rates, that are lower than the rates charged by conservative companies in other countries, would thus receive their condemnation or would be verified as abundantly large enough to cover our risks. In any event it would be a good thing to settle this question beyond the shadow of a doubt, and therefore-having the interests of our home companies at heart-we say let us, by all means, have a Canadian table of mortality.

A comparison with the figures quoted in our tables of wholesale prices current will serve to show that there is here a very fair margin of profit and from which country merchants may take a hint. It is not for lack of sufficiently high prices that city grocers usually fail to become rich; the trouble is more frequently due to the extreme prices necessary in order to counterbalance the losses by the many bad book accounts; for somebody must pay for the goods that

enter the mouths of the family of him who practically proves his belief that the world owes him a living. The number of failures among retailers, on the other hand, contributes to increase the price to the middleman, and thus the rate of living is gradually increased to him who paysuntil one ceases to wonder why the cost of living is in many respects becoming too high in Canada. The foregoing list is taken from an account rendered for June, a minth in which several of the commodities are cheaper than during the winter and spring seasons. It will occur to many that though grain is low, the other products of the farm bring rather exorbitant prices, and here lies a hint which the farmer should not neglect.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND QUESTION.

We have noticed with much pleasure that the Government has, though rather late in the day, abandoned its policy of imposing a duty on Newfoundland fish products. We must at the same time express our conviction that it would have been wholly impossible for the Imperial Government to have sanctioned the retaliatory duty on Canadian bread-stuffs which Newfoundland proposed to lay on. The duty in question would have had the effect of discriminating against a. British Colony in favor of a foreign nation, and would most assuredly have been disallowed. The objection to the Canadian duty on Newfoundland fish products is sufficiently obvious. The subsisting arrangement is substantially the same as that which existed with the United States, and which Newfoundland has never proposed abrogating. We believe that it must have been pressed on the Government by the representations of the people of the fishery districts on the St. Lawrence, and the coast of the Maritime Provinces, and that a strong pressure has been made on the Government to prevent the charge. We can scarcely doubt that the Governments of both countries must have been unwilling to enter on such a war, and that both will be glad to lend their aid to restore the status quo.

While on the subject of the fisheries we would again point out the inexpediency of entering on the subject of a reciprocity treaty until a settlement of the long-disputed question of the rights of foreigners under the subsisting treaty shall have been determined. It must be borne in mind that in negotiating, while our rights are unacknowledged, we labor under a serious disadvantage. We are virtually compelled to limit our claim to what the United States admit, and we therefore

cannot obtain adequate compensation, It would be a most fatal mistake to enter on a negotiation with the object of obtaining equivalents for the surrender of rights which the other party holds do not exist. Moreover the disputed interpretation of the treaty is, we believe, the only subject on which there is any danger of collision. The very arrangement that has been recently made, temporarily, and which is anything but an equitable one, has been rendered desirable, chiefly because, owing to the existing uncertainty as to the meaning of the treaty, there would have been constant danger of collision between the vessels of the two nations. When once the rights of both nations have been satisfactorily determined there can be little doubt that the respective Governments will issue such instructions as to render any serious collision improbable. If, as we implicitly believe, the right of Great Britain to exclude foreign fishermen from those bays, in which they have by treaty renounced their right to fish, were once acknowledged, we should have a most valuable privilege to exchange, and even if the decision should be against us we should really be no worse off than we have been for many years.

THE NEW LOAN.

The new loan has been placed on the London market at a rate, which will net about par, and in view of the recent conversion of the maturing 5 per cents into 4 per cents, it was doubtless deemed more expedient to offer the new debentures at 4 than to sell 32s at a discount. It is not a little singular, in view of the fact that all the Canadian loans that have been placed on the London market, during nearly half a century, have been negotiated by the same agents who are alone known to the operators in the money market that Canadian critics should almost invariably approve or condemn the transaction according to their relations to the Canadian Government of the day. We find an article in the Toronto Globe, criticising with some severity, the Finance Minister, because the late 4 per cent loan offered by tender in the open market by Messrs. Baring Bros. & Co. and Messrs. Glyn & Co. did not bring a higher price; and we also find a statement in the same article that the loan of 1876 was negotiated by Sir Richard Cartwright. If it is imagined that a Canadian Minister of Finance can negotiate a loan in London on favorable terms, it is manifestly absurd to pay a commission to the financial agents, through

whose influence the loans are placed on the market.

We readily admit that Sir Leonard Tilley is not entitled to any special credit for the late negotiation. To use a well-known simile of Sir Richard Cartwright, the Minister of Finance is in regard to the negotiation of a loan in Lon. don "like a fly upon a wheel," and has, really no influence whatever in the matter. It may be fairly said that the Opposition journals of this present day are only imitating the course followed in 1876 by their opponents, who treated Sir Richard Cartwright with the same injustice that is now meted out to Sir Leonard Tilley. We defended Sir Richard Cartwright then, on the ground that, being on the spot, and having the best advice that it was possible to obtain, he gave the necessary authority to place the loan at a fixed rate. The Globe heads its article on the subject " A Dishonest Compact " a term which is strictly applicable to its own remarks on the subject. When all the circumstances are taken into consideration, it must, we think, be admitted that it was expedient to fix the rate of interest at 4 per cent, and it could not be reasonably expected that they would be tendered much above that rate.

The following paragraph, which we find in an exchange is not irrelevant to the criticisms on the late loan:

The bankers of Berlin, Prussia, condemn the issue of Prussian bonds bearing only 3½ per cent interest. They claim that no loan at less than 4 per cent can succeed in the present state of the money market.

THE IMPERIAL BANK.

The report of the proceedings atth e tenth annual meeting of the Imperial Bank of Canada will be found elsewhere, and, as usual, is highly satisfactory. Notwithstanding a very large appropriation for possible losses in Manitoba, the Rest is 32 per cent of the capital. The large amount of the deposits is an indication of the confidence in the good management of the Bank. Owing to the death of Senator Benson and the resignation of Mr. Fiskin, who has been for some time in bad health, it has been necessary to fill two vacancies on the Board, and the Hon. Alexander Morris and Mr. Robert Jaffray have been elected.

THE UNION BANK.

The report submitted to the shareholders of the Union Bank at their twentieth annual meeting will be found elsewhere, and confirms what was generaally known in commercial circles that the bank has been a severe sufferer by the collapse in Manitoba and the North-West. For many of the losses the local manager is not considered personally to blame, but on the other hand he appears to have concealed many important operations from the head office, and was accordingly dismissed in September last, as announced at the time. Under the circumstances the directors recommended an application to Parliament to reduce the capital stock by 25 per cent, and this was concurred in by a large and influential meeting of shareholders. Apart from the business in the North-West and in Three Rivers, where the same manager had been prior to his removal to Winnipeg, the business seems to have been satisfac-

SECURITY FOR BANK CIRCULATION.

[COMMUNICATED.]

In previous communications the disad vantages to the banks and the public of a change from unsecured to secured bank issues were discussed; we have now to consider the drawbacks of the present system, and the advantages of those proposed in lieu thereof.

DANGERS OF THE PRESENT SYSTEM.

It must be admitted that the elasticity of the present note issue is greatly in its favor, and were the issues restricted (as in Scotland and Ireland) to a few well known banks, most of the objections to them would be removed. Such a limitation, however, we believe to be impossible of adoption here, for reasons hereafter noted.

We cannot fail to remember against the present system the facilities which it offers to speculative banks to force out circulation beyond their legitimate proportion, thereby tempting them to accept business beyond the lines of safety, for the sake of the double profit to be earned; and the inducement which it offers for the formation of new banks to take advantage of this profit.

It is plain that a system which may have served a good purpose when banks were few and well-known, and the whole business of the country more or less compact and restricted, may be found utterly unsuited to the larger needs and wider fields of the future. We have now a system much resembling that which prevailed in the United States during the ante-national-bank days, but with some important differences in our favor, in a conservative direction. Notwithstand-

ing these differences we are exposed to the danger, in the future if not in the present, of losses and troubles such as forced a change on the American people. We are under the same conditions, in kind if not in degree, but we need not wait for a breakdown before taking measures to put our currency on a permanent and secure basis.

And although it may be quite true that there is no immediate danger from this cause, yet if the system is faulty, and if it appears clear that in the future some change may be forced on us, the prudent course obviously is to make the change now, when the effect will be comparatively trifling, and not to wait until it is forced on us, possibly under conditions when either to move or to refrain from moving may be a perilous thing.

No one familiar with the history of currency, looking at the future that lies before us, can be satisfied with a system that places it in the power of any set of men to issue currency, who can scrape together enough real or nominal capital to meet the requirements of the law; and that, by granting this power, tempts speculative men to embark in a business where the speculative element is a public calamity.

It is greatly to be desired that our system of banking and currency should be placed now on a foundation that will serve to support our future growth, however great and widespread it may be. No time could be better than the present for a change. The commercial business of the country is generally sound, within moderate dimensions, and well under control; the financial position is remarkably easy; and we are on the eve of the completion of a great national work that must influence every branch of finance and commerce,

LIMITATION TO EXISTING BANKS.

Various modes of meeting the difficulties mentioned have been brought forward of late.

Those that look towards the limitation of issues to existing banks have much to commend them. This is the method adopted in 1844 and 1845 for the banks in Great Britain and Ireland, which has there undoubtedly had the effect of maintaining sound banking institutions. But the conditions are not favorable to its introduction into Canada. The community is but a fraction yet of what we hope it may be, and any endeavor to limit so great a power and so useful and necessary a function to the banks now in existence would be an injustice to the needs of the future, which the future would certainly remedy.

NO MONOPOLY POSSIBLE.

But the method is, I believe, impossible of adoption here. Public opinion on the subject, as far as it is formed, is probably this, that the right of establishing new banks, and of securing for them exactly the same privileges as other banks, is a "vested right" of the people who have or may have capital to embark in such ventures; and the creation of a monopoly would, in all likelihood, be regarded with great disfavor.

Indeed it is very doubtful if such a measure could become law. The American system is manifestly so much more equitable, as giving an equal right to all persons to engage in banking, and at the same time so effective for the purposes under consideration, that it would be sure to commend itself to the majority of our legislators. The struggle, if ever there be one, will be between the supporters of this system and those who look to the issue of currency solely by the State.

GOVERNMENT ISSUES,

The most important substitute for existing issues of currency is that of an issue by the State.

This has many things to recommend it. The function is one which affects the whole community, the capital provided by it is furnished by the public, and it would seem equitable that the people should reap the benefit.

But the reasons against such issues we think entirely outweigh such considerations. The world has learned by bitter lessons that convertibility, the touchstone of the soundness and real usefulness of a paper currency, can only be certainly looked for when the issues are entrusted to those whose commercial life or death depends on the due fulfilment of their " promise to pay on demand." Governments seem to have no moral backbone in such matters, and, however sound their theories may be, in practice they gradually depart therefrom. Even the necessity for legislation is of little value as a check. An amendment in the direction of greater ease is so easily made law that practically there is little safeguard in this respect.

The arguments for and against a Government issue have been brought forward in this Journal of late, and need not be repeated here. It may be added that, even with a moderate limit of issue on securities, and a provision for covering all further issues by gold, and granting that the observance of these conditions might be relied on, the plan has little to recommend it. It

would certainly give us a note at all times as "good as gold," but the cost would be ruinous. It would involve the practical annihilation of a large amount of capital sorely needed for the development of the country. It would discourage the formation of new banks; and, whatever effect the covering of issues by bonds might have on the accommodation granted to the public, and on the rate of discount, s uch an arrangement as this would affect the public on these two points far more seriously.

The public may be entitled to share the profits gained by paper currency, but let it be content with establishing a moderate home demand for its bonds and with the general benefits which accrue to the country from the judicious extension of the banking system.

THE NATIONAL BANK SYSTEM.

These considerations bring us to the conclusion that of all the methods open to us for the improvement of our currency, an adaptation of that in use among our neighbors is most suited to our needs.

It has been said that the National Banks are the fruit of National Bankruptey, but this is scarcely a fair statement. They were established during the war, but the necessity was forced on the administration as much by the frightful condition of the State banks as by the necessity for securing a market for Government Bonds. Indeed the effect, as far as the latter is concerned, appears to have been regarded by Mr. Chase (who introduced the Bill) as a secondary consideration altogether.

A system of currency secured by a deposit of bonds had been tried early in the history of the country, and found successful. It may be of interest to note that one writer says of English banks in this connection,-that had the country banks been willing to accept this system, and deposit Government securities for their circulation, the Bank Charter of 1844 would in all probability never have been passed.

It has in itself powers of growth and adaptation to commercial needs that make it invaluable in a new and growing We may be accused of discountry. loyalty for favoring an American system rather than following the wisdom of our forefathers, but we have the same needs, and are under the same economic conditions as our neighbors to the South, and have little in these respects in common with our brethren across the sea. It is not therefore to be wondered at if we find the institutions already established on this Continent the more suited to

our wants. They are, after all, but the adaptation of principles recognized and practiced elsewhere.

WESTERN CHAR TRADE.—The cigar trade of London, Ont., seems to be in the depths of depression. It is only recently that we recorded the collapse of W. T. Rutherford and the resolution of the creditors to wind up his business, and now the Advertiser tells us that, owing to the depression in the cigar business, the manufacturing establishments of the Union Company, Dundas street (Dan. Arbuckle, manager), Matthew H. Lawson, King street, and William Kelly & Sons, Dundas street, have closed down indefinitely. The annual license fee of \$75 which each manufacturer is required to pay fell due on Dominion Day, but the above three manufacturers decided not to apply for another license, in view of the present stagnation in business throughout the Province. The firm of Kelly & Sons is an old-established one, and at one time employed 50 or 60 hands. The Union Company's business has been established about five They employed about ten hands. Lawson has been in business at London between three and four years and used to employ about eight or ten hands. Most of these employes are now out of work, the depression, according to the Advertiser, being general in al parts of the Province. Owing to the death of Mr. Lewis Olmstead, the business in which he was a partner, it is understood, will not be carried on by his brother. This will reduce the number of eigar manufacturers in London to about six. All the factories there have discharged several of their employes within a short time, and some of the houses are running with only half their former staff. In conversation with a reporter Mr. Brener, a manufacturer, affirmed that the cigar manufacturing industry of Ontario had depreciated within the past few years fully 50 per cent. He stated that on an average half the factories of Ontario have closed down, and those now in operation have discharged many of their former He affirmed that the Scott Act is employes. slowly killing the cigar business, and the recent increase in duty on tobacco exported from the States caused many to give up business and deterred others establishing factorics. Mr. Brener formerly employed some 43 hands but now has only 22 He has serious thoughts of retiring from the business himself. Last year he used to turn out in sales for the local trade between 80,000 and 100,000 cigars a month, and now he can only sell about 33,000 a month at most. Some of the dullness is doubtless owing to the better facilities possessed by the large eastern manufacturers, firms like S. Davis & Sons and one or two others, who Davis & Sons and one or two know how to cater to popular requirements, and do not hesitate to spend a little to make their brands well-known.

THE Collector of Inland Revenue at this port has received an order from Ottawa not to accept payment of excise duties on Canadian spirits and manufactured tobacco unaccompanied by a deposit and an obligation from the owners to pay any additional duty that may be imposed. This order will affect all entries since Monday of this week. amount of additional duty has not yet been made known, and the business is somewhat excited. The Collector of Customs has not been made aware of any contemplated changes in imported goods and payment of duties is

being made on the old basis unaccompanied by any restrictions.

MESSRS. Rose & Arbuckle, London, Ont., purpose to carry the cigar manufacturing business in the premises lately occupied by W. T. Rutherford, having bought his stock and plant from the assignee at a nominal value. Mr. Rose was formerly bookkeeper for W. T. Rutherford and Mr. Arbuekle is a practical cigar maker.

The tenth annual general meeting of the Imperial Bank of Canada was held, in pursuance of the terms of the charter, at the bank-ing house of the institution, 2nd July, 1885. Cassels, William Wilson, W. T. Kiely, R. H. Ramsay, John Bain. Q. C., John Foy, D. R. Wilkie, etc., etc. The chair was taken by the president, Mr. H. S. Howland, and Mr. D. R. Wilkie was requested to act as secretary. The secretary, at the request of the chairman, read the report of the Directors and the statement of affairs.

THE REPORT.

While the above statement shows that the general business of the Bank for the past twelve months has been good, yet for the reasons stated in the circular issued to the reasons stated in the breath assect to ano shareholders in May last the Directors have felt it to be their d ty to pass the dividend that would otherwise have been payable on that would otherwise have been payable on the second instant, and to apply the net earnings of the year, exclusive of the dividend of the 2nd January, 1885, towards making provision for bad and doubtful debts, and towards meeting heavy losses sustained by the Bank, mainly at Winnipeg Branch. The serious reverses which have followed the over-trading, and land speculations at Winnipeg, during the past few years, have led to very heavy losses by merchants and bankers, directly and indirectly interested in the trade and commerce of the North-West. Of these our Bank has unfortunately suffered its full share. For a considerable portion of these losses no blame can be attached to the Manager, for the reasons siderable portion of these losses no blame can be attached to the Manager, for the reasons above stated, but with respect to other losses of large amount, incurred upon accounts for advances, the nature and extent of which, and of the obligations untertaken by him, he carefully concenled from the Cashier, and the Head Office, it is impossible to avoid coming to the conclusion that he entirely disregarded the interests of the Bank. Since his dismissal in September last, Mr. Balfour has taken charge of the branch at Winnipeg, and the Directors are satisfied that under his management every exertion will be made to do a safe and proexertion will be made to do a safe and pro-fitable business and to realize all assets to the best advantage. For the past six months the office has yielded a good return of net earnings, notwithstanding the largeamount of unproductive capital charged to the branch. The Bank has also had to meet losses in the Three Rivers brauch, of a somewhat similar character to those at Winnipeg, though much less serious in extent. The unfortunate results of the business at these branches, have left accounts to be col-lected and assets to be realized of such doubtful and uncertain value, that in the opinion of ful and uncertain value, that in the opinion of the Board, they should in the meantime be written off from the capital of the Bank. Your Directors therefore recommend that application be made at the next session of Parliament, for an Act authorizing the reduction of the capital to such an extent, as will leave it intact and

free from all doubtful assets-with at the same time a further amount for a rest to nicel contime a further amount for a rest to nicet contingencies, and ensure the future regular payment of dividends. The reduction necessary to effect this end must depend in some measure on the result of the current business of the Bank, and on the success that may attend the realization of questionable assets during the next six months; but the Directors do not feel justified in assuring the shareholders that the required percentage will be less than 25. Apart from the exceptional losses above referred to, the business of the Bank for the past year has been good and profitable, when it is remembered the business of the Bank for the past year has been good and profitable, when it is remembered that a part of the capital has been unproductive—and that there is no rest to assist the profits—the net earnings of the Bank as given in the above statement establish that the business is an excellent one for the capital employed. "HEAR BOTH SIDES."

To the Editor of the Journal of Commerce.

Sin,—I believe that the public are indebted to Mr. Ritchie, President Board of Trade, Belleville, for the favor of a very skilfully and neatly-written little pamphlet on Insolvency Laws. He has I think succeeded admirably in presenting the subject in its true light. He has shown I think quite clearly that such an act is oppressive to the people, that it is class legislation, that it is foisted upon the country by * * * * * a few designing persons to the detriment of the country at large.

I think that Mr. Ritchie has accomplished a great task, and he has richly carned the grait

I think that Mr. Ritchie has accomplished a great task, and he has richly carned the graitude and the praise of the whole Dominion. It is the first attempt within my recollection of the subject being presented in its true colors from the standpoint of the country merchant.

I may as well say that I base my claim as to the right of being heard upon the subject attribution the ground of experience. I have

entirely upon the ground of experience; I have been engaged in business as a merchant for over

twenty years.

The position of the country merchant in many instances is not an enviable one. In too many cases he is completely under the thumb of the wholesale man, and that without the aid of an Insolvent Act, and I am quite sure that there is no necessity for such an Act to make him (the

retailer) more helpless than what he otherwise would be. For any man or any set of men to presume that the country is in favor of such an Act is just simply an insult to the intelligence of the people; it is to say simply that we wish a return of the dark days of '76, '77, '78, that in fact we rather relish having our credit "busted," our good name gone abroad, a reputation as a country of bankrupts, etc. No, gentlemen, it won't do. We are in something the same position as the Western farmer was when he gave a parting advice to his son, said he "Be honest, John. It is the best policy. I've tried both." So have we tried both, and we find by experience that we can get on much better without an Insolvent Act than we can with one.

The theory which has often been the subject of debate belove now, as to whether it would be advisable to abolish all laws for the collection of debts contracted for merchandise above a certain fixed sum, say two hundred dollars, I think is worthy of consideration. It certainly would have one good effect. It would reduce business to a cash basis, and the people would be the gainers, because the people have to pay for the credit that is given, and when the wholesale merchant relies upon a Bankrupt Act to get his pay he must of necessity sell his goods very high in order to cover losses, and this also has to be paid for in turn by the people.

As we deal elsewhere with Mr. Ritchie's pamphlet from a neutral point of view, we deem it but fair to our old subscriber, " A Country Merchant," who will not be convinced, to give his opinion of the matter also. The great majority of our wholesale firms have the interests of all well-meaning customers at heart, indeed it is difficult to conceive how it could be otherwise. The number of casualties among the wholesale dealers themselves do not prove them any more exempt from the vicissitudes of trade than are the retail dealers. Let us point to the wholesale dry goods trade of Montreil; how many of the seemingly prosperous firms of ten years ago are in existence to day? The goods bought with their capital and their credit have gone to clothe the farmer and the artizan and their families, and the losses sustained have not by any means left their competitors harmless; they as well as the surviving retailers have suffered in the premises. Were the credit system abolished we fear it would fare badly with many peoble of all classes. How, for example, would the farmer exist without the credit granted him by the country merchant while his crop is ripening and his young live stock growing up ?-[Ed. J. of C.]

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

JULY 9, 1885.

The wholesale trade has been generally dull this week, and quite a number of business men are spending a portion of their time in the country. Correspondents of leading houses state the supplies of general storekeepers have been well reduced, and that the crop prospects are most satisfactory. To-day in London, British consols opened at 99 13-16 and went to 99 7-16-Canadian Pacific stock sold in London at 42 3-8 and in New York at 41 7-8. The street rate for money in London was 3 per cent. On this market money loaned on call at 3 to 4 per cent. Sterling Exchange has been slightly more active the past week; 60-day bills between banks were quoted at 8 9-16 to 8 5-8 prem; demand 83 to 8 15-16 prem; New York funds 1-8 discount to 1.32 ditto. Counter rates a trifle higher than the above. On the Stock Exchange this morning, Bank of Montreal was strong, selling as high as 1931, sales subsequently at 1931 and 193. Merchants changed hands at 1102 and 111, and Townships at 104. A lot of Commerce sold at 1201, sellers 60 days, interest 3 per cent. At the Afternoon Board of the Stock Exchange, Bank of Montreal was strong, with sales of 225 shares at 1932. Peoples was placed at 604, Ontario at 106, Toronto at 180 and 1791, Commerce at 121 and 1214, Richelieu at 582c, Gas at 182 and 182} and Canada Pacific at 414. \$2,000 Corporation 6 per cent stock due May 1886, at 1003. 
CHEMICALS AND DRUGS.—There has been considerable arrivals of heavy chemicals, but the actual business done during the week does not amount to much. Advices from England note few changes but bleaching powder is firmer. Regarding drugs, it may be stated that quinine has continued flat at the decline. Camphor has advanced considerably, and a further rise is looked for. English is up to 40c and 45c and American to 35c and 40c.

COAL AND WOOD.—A few large private sales were made during the week and some public contracts were closed. American anthracite in a wholesale way is worth about as follows:—Stove \$5.65, nut \$5.35, and egg and furnace \$5.15. Ordinary distributing prices, according to quantity, are: stove, \$5.75 to \$6; chestnut, \$5.50 to \$5.75; egg and furnace \$5.25 to \$5.50. Cape Breton \$3.10 to \$3.20; Pictou \$3.50 to \$3.60, as to mine, and Scotch steam at \$4 to \$4.20. Cordwood is dull. Yard prices per long cord are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch \$5.50; beech \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; Hemlock, \$4. Wharf prices about 50c lower.

PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS .- The butter market has continued quiet. Finest creamery is held at 20c, but 19c is about all that can be got from exporters. Our quotations of dairy butter would be exceeded for choice selections. Cheese during the past few days has been cabled strong and higher. Yesterday most of the supply available was engaged at 71c to 71c, Liverpool cable quoting 40s.. Some holders ask 8c, but buyers are timid and not inclined to go so high. Sales have been reported of 250 boxes of fine at 7ic; 500 at 71c and about 1,000 at 71c, and it now looks as if all the June cheese will be wanted Reports indicate that parties in the trade at Liverpool have unduly depressed the British market; it also appears that the production in several important sections in the United States 12.770 boxes of June make sold at 7½c to 8½c. At Belleville there was a fair demand, with sales at 7c to 7 5-Sc. Provisions .- A moderate jobbing trade is being done at our revised quotations. Eggs are steady at 131c to 14c. Cheese in Liverpool to-day advanced 6d to 40s 6d.

LUMBER,—The enormous output of pine along the Upper Mississippi, in Wisconsin and Michigan is having a depressing effect on prices to the extent of \$1 to \$3 per thousand for common qualities. There is a good demand all over for first quality pine, and the markets in Great Britain are getting decuded.

has been materially lessened, makers being disheartened by the low prices and successful Canadian competition. The outlook is therefore better. At London, Ont., yesterday, 19,678 boxes were boarded, principally June make, and, there were sales at 74c to 84c. At Woodstock, Ont.,

Day Goods .- Travellers are generally home from the special trip and are about starting on the usual fall journey through the country. Crop prospects being good and stocks well broken, storekeepers will probably be easily induced to buy freely. Goods appear cheap, and any change in prices is more likely to be disadvantageous to buyers than otherwise. Remittauces, so far, this month have proved satisfactory and better than was expected; short paper due from the first to the fourth insts. was met well. The city retail trade keeps up to a fair volume. Despite some grumbling the expression of opinion is generally of a hopeful tone. The cotton business, especially in colored goods, has not as yet shown much indication of recovery from the drop of about 7½ per cent which mills were recently compelled to make in order to cheek the movement. in order to check the movement threatened by the heavy trade sale in New York noted at the time. White goods are sold at cut-threat prices, and greys are simply being manufac-tured for the benefit of the consumer. An improvement is looked for as the fall approaches.

FREIGHTS.—Business is dull but rates have improved. Grain has been taken for direct ports at 2s. For cattle, 70s has been asked, but unsuccessfully, and 60s to 65s may be quoted. Deals by steamer to Glasgow, 45s; Liverpool 50s; London 50s to 52s 6d; by sail, 55s to

ports in the United Kingdom. Phosphate 5s to 6s as to part. River Plate freights are unchanged.

Fruit.—The feature of the market to-day was strawberries; receipts being enormous the market was completely glutted, and sales were made at 4c to 8c. Oranges \$9 to \$10 per case, \$4 to \$4.50 per box. Lemons scarce and in good demand at \$5 to \$6 per box. Pineapples are about done for this season. American harvest apples sold at \$6 to \$6.50 per brl. and 50c to \$1 per box. Cherries \$1 to \$1.50 per basket. California pears, \$5 to \$5.50 per case; plums ditto, \$2.50 to \$3 per box. Red bananas, \$1 to \$2; yellow, \$1.50 to \$2.50.

Grain and Frour.—The amount of business done in grain has been trifling, and prices are more or less nominal. For flour a fair local demand was experienced and a few thousand barrels of Superior were sold on export account. There has also been some business in Manitoba Strong bakers. Prices have been reduced, as will be seen elsewhere, and the market closes in buyers, favor. British cablegrams to-day reported floating of wheat, quiet but steady; corn nothing offering; on passage, wheat steady and corn slow. Liverpool and spot wheat slow and corn steady. Prices were unchanged all round. In the West provisions opened steady to-day and sagged off a little. Provisions opened easier and then improved.

GROCERIES.—The demand for goods has not improved and the volume of business is moderate; some say that payments are giving more satisfaction. Tea.—Seven to eight hundred half-chests have been sold at 20c to 25c.

The market has been poorly supplied with teas under 30c, and is steady. There have been a few arrivals. Sugar has been unsettled and easier, but is now steady at 7 1-8c to 7½c, the inside figure being for round lots of granulated. It is reported that a refinery declined to accept a bid of 7c for 300 brls. Fruit.—Good Valencia raisins continuescarce and are held at 7½c to 8c; first quality prunes in 50 lb. boxes are also in light supply and 6c is asked. In other articles there is little change. Tobacco and liquor dealers are excited over the threats of an imposition of additional duties at 0ttawa. It is said that the small distillers and the small match manufacturers "must go." An effort is being made to advance the price of matches.

HAY, STRAW AND FEED.—The market for loose hay was firm, with sales at \$12 to \$15 per 100 bundles, as to quality. Straw was unchanged at \$5 to \$6 per 100 bundles. Pressed hay steady at \$16 to \$17 per ton; straw in bales, \$8 to \$9 per ton. Shorts quiet at \$17 to \$18 per ton; bran weaker at \$14 to \$15, the former for Montreal and the latter for Upper Canada; moulie \$24 to \$26, as to quality; buckwheat 65c per bushel.

Hides.—Prices have not varied to any extent this week, No. 1 Montreal inspected being still quoted at \$9. Business has been light, we note sales of North-West dry hides at 15½ c to 16c. A few changes will be found in ourprices current. Imported horse hides reachinghere from New York have sold at \$3 to \$4.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—The demand for pigiron has been of a hand-to-mouth nature, business falling below that of last week. Holders have made no concessions, but continue to ask ormer terms for all brands. Cablegrams state



Some 300 tons have been sold at \$3.00 to \$4.00 the past few days. Competition for steel rails in New York is rather keen and buyers are inclined to hold back. About \$27 at works is still the nominal price for heavy sections. Nail manufacturers here report an improved enquiry this week and look forward to an active trade in the near future. Price lists are unchanged this week.

LEATHER, BOOTS AND SHORS.—The leather trade has been more active, there being a good demand for fall cutting. There is no change in prices which, however, are steady: stocks do not accumulate. Some large lots have gone into the hands of cutters, upper leather principally. The boot and shoe men are most of them in receipt of numerous fall orders, and are getting actively to work.

Live Stock.—The exports of cattle keep ahead of previous years and to date have reached 23,657 head. Total shipments of sheep this season 4,401. There has been a fair enquiry for shipping cattle at 5½c to 5¾c for good to choice. Sheep were in demand at 4½c to 4½c. Live hogs are scarce and quoted at 5½c to 5½c. There was the usual local demand from city butchers at lower prices for medium to good stock. In the British mar-

Wool.—There was a fair demand for all descriptions, and prices are steady. The London sales are still going on. A report of the New York market says:—The supply and assortment of domestic fleeces available at the seaboard, while not remarkably large now, must tend to increase under the present slow rate of demand. Many dealers, to be sure, are refusing to invest, but consignments come along in fair quantity, and at this period of the clip it is difficult to fairly manage the flow of supplies. As so frequently asserted during the fail and winter, no great objection is entered against the ruling line of cost, and, indeed, it is admitted that a small advance would not be out of the way on some of the staple grades, but until goods work around into more promising condition there seems to be no chance for any liberal sale of the material, no matter how cheap it may appear.

TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS, (Revised by Telegraph.) Toronto, July 9, 1885.

Wholesale trade is quiet As compared with previous weeks the situation is unchanged, and no improvement is anticipated until harvest time. The weather has been excessively hot. No important changes are reported in prices, and sales generally are for small parcels. The money market is dull, with rates comparatively

easy. There is no demand for call loans, and rates are nominally unchanged at 41 to 61 per cent on stocks and at 4 on debentures. Time loans are quoted at 6c. Commercial paper is in moderate offer; A 1 is discounted at 6 to 61 per cent, and the general run at 7 to 7½ per cent. Payments are fair. Sterling exchange is dull; 60-day bills are quoted at 108 5-8 to 1084 between banks and at 108 7-8 across the counter. Demand bills 108 7-8 between banks and 1095 across the counter. 

BUTTER.—The r arket has ruled steady the past week, with receipts only moderate. There has been a little demand for low grades of old, but the chief business is in jobbing lots of new at 12c to 12½c for choice; inferior lots sold at 10c to 11. Old tub rules at 3½c to 8c per lb., the former for rejected lots. Eggs are in more limited supply and prices firmer, there being sales of case lots at 13c and 13½c per dozen. Cheese is in fair demand and prices firmer; the best jobs at 7½c to 8c.1

COAL AND WOOD.—The trade in coal is slack and prices unchanged. Allkinds of hard as well as first quality of soft, sell at \$6 a ton delivered. Wood is also easier at \$4.50 a cord for first quality of hard, \$3.50 for second quality, and \$4 for pine.

Coal Oil.—The demand for burning oils is quiet and prices unchanged. Barrel lots of Canadian job at 16c per gallon, and five to ten barrel lots at 15½c. Carbon-safety unchanged at 19c. American oils steady, with sales of prime at 22½c, and water white at 25c. Crinde in Petrolia sells at 78c to 78½c, and refined at 11½c per gallon in car lots.

DRUGS.—There is a quiet trade, with no particular feature. Quinine and morphia continue easy in prices. Castor oil 9c to 11c; opinm \$3.75 to \$3.90; glycerine 17c to 20c; quinine, \$1.00 to \$1.05; morphia, \$2.25 to \$2.35; bicarbonate of rotash, 18c; potass iodide, \$3.90 to \$4; tartaric acid, 55c to 60c; cream of tartar, 38c to 40c; linseed, raw, 65c; do, hoiled, 66c to 67c; best Dutch madder, 12c to 14c; cochineal, 40c to 45c.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—The flour trade has been dull and depressed all week. There has been little or no enquiry until yesterday when the feeling improved. Transactions have been few, and quotations are nominal at \$4 to \$4.05 for superior extra, \$3.90 for extra, and \$3.75 for spring extra. The stock in store is 3,000 barrels as compared with 3,375 barrels a week ago and 2,000 barrels at the corresponding period of last year. Wheat has also been dull, with little or year. Wheat has also been dull, with little or no business. Owing to the decline of outside markets, the demand has been checked. Holders are generally firm, No. 2 fall offers at 90c July delivery, and it is held at that price for cash. No. I spring is nominal at 91c to 92c, No. 2 spring at 88c to 89c, and No. 3 fall 86c to 87c. The stock in store is 261,571 bushels as compared with 142,311 bushels at the corresponding period of last year, and 180,277 bushels for the same week of 1883. Bariey is dull and prices purely nominal. The stock in store is 11,723 bushels as compared with 11,678 bushels last week and 2,500 bushels at the corresponding period of last year. Oats are firmer, the demand being fair and receipts lighter; sales of car lots were made the first part of the week at 34c, and yesterday and to-day at 35c on track. The stock in store is 21,503 bushels as against 19,903 bushels last week, and 7,934 bushels at the corresponding period of last year. Peas are in moderate demand and steady; No. 2 are quoted at 67c to 67½c in carlots. The stock in store is 12,108 bush, as against 10,214 bush. Inst week and 410 bush, at the corresponding period of last year. Rye is purely nominal and no stocks in store. Canadian Corn is nominal at 55c to 58c. Outmeat quiet and prices steady; car lots sold at \$4.20, and small lots job at \$4.50. Bran is moderately active and prices firm; car lots are worth \$10.75 to \$11.

GROCERIES.—There has been a quiet trade this week. Sugars are slightly easier, with granulated now quoted at 7c to 71-8c. New arrivals of teas are just at hand, and Japans are said to be lower in prices, and Congous firm. Fruits are firm. Tobuccos and liquors are somewhat irregular.

HARDWARE AND IRON.—A fair business is reported for the week, but no important changes noted in prices. The demand for tin plates has improved and prices are firm; I. C. Coke is quoted at \$4.25 and I. C. Charcoal \$4.50. Na.1s are unchanged at \$2.05. Manilla rope 114c to 12c. Ordinary bar-iron \$1.75 to \$1.85. Pig iron is quoted at \$19 to \$20.

HIDES, ETC.—The receipts are moderate and prices rather firmer. Sales of cured have been made at 9c for steers and 84c for cows. Green now being 84c for steers and 8c for cows. Calfskins are unchanged; green are quoted at 11c to 13c, and cured at 14c to 15c. Pelts are in good demand and firm at 25. Lambskins are arriving in small lots and bring 35c.

Live Stock.—The market is slightly lower this week, the demand not being as active, and the stock offering being of rather inferior quality. Freight rates are up a little; good export cattle sold on Tuesday at 5½c, but really fine would have brought 5¾c. Good butchers sold at 5c and medium grass-fed at 4½c. Inferior ruled at 3c to 3½c.
