HEARST WIN DISTASTEFUL TO ONE OF HIS COUNSEL

Judge Has Been Designated to Take Charge of New York Mayoralty Recount.

New York, Nov. 24.—Personally, the success of Mr. Hearst will be distasteful to me, as it will be to most of his counsel, said Austen G. Fox, counsel for W. R. Hearst in an argument before Justice Amund in the supreme court today on Mr. Hearst's effort to open the ballot-boxes of the recent city election for a recount. "I supposed that this action was in the interest of the people of the city for honest elections," continued Mr. Fox, "but it is a measure which the motion by all means bear it out."

The first real test of the question whether the ballots shall actually be recounted came today, the previous proceedings having been merely an examination of tally sheets and election returns in search of errors. Judge Amund, however, in his opinion, Justice Giegerich, Chief Justice, objected to taking the case before Justice Giegerich, and said: "We think it is in all a part of a plan to so overload the special term upon which Justice Giegerich is sitting that we cannot get our redress, and it will be impossible to complete the work before Jan. 1."

Mr. Fox, for Mr. Hearst, said it made no difference to him which of the Justices heard the argument, and added the statement quoted above.

Justice Amund referred the matter to Justice Giegerich, who, in turn, referred it to the appellate division of the supreme court. Justice Giegerich had been designated to take charge of the election cases.

Seven indictments in election cases were handed down today in Brooklyn by the grand jury.

The four election inspectors arrested last night for neglect of duty pleaded guilty absolutely today, and were held in \$2500 bail each.

Deputation From South Rosedale Will Ask Help on Monday.

At Monday's meeting of council, Ald. Church will introduce a deputation of South Rosedale residents including members of the taxpayers' association. The city will be asked to join forces with the residents in asking the government to repeal the city-in-council annexing North Rosedale. Ald. Church will urge that the city should take action at once without waiting to get Mr. Fullerton's report, and declares that since South Rosedale has had to pay heavily for the Sherbourne-street bridge, the government has put into effect legislation of the worst kind. Ald. Church says that the aldermen of the Second Ward, to which North Rosedale would be added, are solidly opposed.

NOT VIEWED WITH ELATION

Hamilton Herald (Ind.): Upon the whole, we do not think that the Laurier government has much cause for congratulation in the results of the four by-elections held yesterday. It is true while the buoy was being hauled back to the steamer for another passenger. At the time this accident occurred there were seven passengers and the crew of 23 men remaining on the Argo.

The life-saving crew, when their ship broke, realized the peril of the situation, again took to their boat in a desperate effort to reach the steamer.

The last man of the crew of the steamer Argo has been brought ashore. Captain Stewart is still on the steamer and reported a short time ago that the pounding has not yet started the ship heaving.

Unless aid comes to the Argo within a few hours it is thought that she will surely go to pieces.

The Argo is a steel steamer of 740 net tons, 178 feet long, and 31 feet in beam. She is valued at \$90,000.

FARMERS ARE ANXIOUS

Montreal Gazette: The constituencies in which by-elections were held on Wednesday were all of the agricultural class, in which farmers constitute a large or the largest element among the voters. Farmers contribute much to the wealth of the country, but it is the result of simple living and small economies. The defects or falling off in the majorities of the Laurier candidates indicates that the farmers are becoming anxious about the consequences of a high living and reckless extravagance of the men in power at Ottawa.

OPINION IS CHANGING

Montreal Gazette: The meaning of the changes referred to is that opinion during the past 12 months has been turning against the government. On other ground can the general cutting down of its majorities, by one-half the voters, be explained? It is not the usual thing, either for Canadian constituencies or by-elections to declare against the dispensers of political loaves and fishes. The acts of the government during the last session, the unduly large expenditure in its responsible for, and the generally unpopular pension business have affected public opinion against it. What happened yesterday will encourage Conservatives everywhere.

LABOR LEADER DROPS DEAD

Quebec, Nov. 24.—George Levesque, President of the Federated Trades and Labor Council of Quebec and Levesque and vice-president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, and one of the best known labor men in the province, dropped dead this morning.

Toronto Theatre Fire Recalled.
Missoula, Mont., Nov. 24.—Daniel E. Handmann, a Shakespearean actor of note, and one of the best known residents of Montana, dropped dead at his ranch near here last night of heart failure, superinduced by acute indigestion. He was 66 years of age, and was born in Cassel, Germany. He leaves a widow and family.

Mr. Handmann was starring in the Grand Opera Stock Company, Toronto, when the Grand O. or H. Co. was burned down and lives lost in 1873.

GUILD CONTROLS OUTPUT

GROCCERS SUGGEST REMEDY

Hamilton Company Makes Startling Claim Before Tariff Commission.

Hamilton, Nov. 24.—(Special).—The tariff commissioners spent a busy day with the manufacturers of the city. They will complete their work here Saturday at noon. The plea for more protection. They complained that there had been an extraordinary increase during the past two years in the number of stoves imported from the United States. They complained particularly of the way the Americans were cutting into the trade of the west. One reason was that the Americans enjoyed more favorable freight rates.

The Grocers' Wholesale Company made the most startling claim. They said that they had been refused goods by the Redpath sugar refinery, which said that its whole output was consigned to the Wholesale Grocers' Company and that it would be necessary for the wholesale grocers to join that guild to get goods. The starch manufacturers, canners of vegetables, and so forth had been forced by the guild to decline orders from the wholesale grocers, and for this reason the grocers asked that all these articles should be placed on the free list.

Mr. Campbell of the International Gas Appliance Company asked that cotton used for Auer light purposes be admitted free, and that a specific duty of two or three cents be placed on mantles. The F. W. Hore Company, wanted the minimum specific valuation placed on spokes, shafts, and poles for wagons, and carriages. F. P. Dalley & Company and the Canadian Manufacturers Company asked for protection from foreign makers of shoe polish. They also wanted Carnauha wax placed on the free list. Dixon Bros. asked that the duty be reduced on strawberries, cranberries, plums, peaches, almonds, grapes, and nuts. J. L. Nichols, Toronto, and other picture dealers asked the commission not to pay any attention to the lithographers who want a duty placed on chromos, ollographs, etc. F. W. Hand & Company complained that the Canadian manufacturers of fire works were shut out of the United States by a high tariff, the American manufacturers could bring goods into Canada free in bond. They asked a 20 per cent duty on manufacturers of undertakers' supplies, represented by Semmens & Ebel, said that finished coffins could be imported into Canada at a 25 per cent duty, while Canadian firms had to pay that amount for raw material. R. Campbell & Sons requested a 35 per cent duty on Rockingham ware, jet ware, etc. Mr. Campbell also complained of freight rates. From Liverpool to Montreal the rate for handbags was 21 cents, and from Hamilton to Montreal 22 cents.

Police Makers Heard.

Manufacturers of cigars and cigar makers were the first to be heard. They argued on lines different from the London manufacturers. They asked that the three stamps—black, red and green denoting that the cigars are made of foreign-made and Canadian leaf respectively, should be retained. While not opposed to the use of the Canadian leaf, they said that experiments would have to be conducted for years to obtain a satisfactory article. They asked the commission to recommend the establishment of experimental farms for the growing and curing of tobacco until it could be brought to a state suitable for making good cigars. They would be satisfied with the reduction of the excise for the manufacture of cigars. Mr. F. P. Dalley asked for protection against foreign cream separators. The drawn steel manufacturers, wanted a 20 per cent duty on finished steel shafting, and free importation of cold steel for manufacturing purposes.

Railway Needs.

The city has asked the railway commission to grant a level crossing over the G.T.R. at Ferguson-avenue gates at Wellington-street, a subway at St. Matthew's-avenue and an overhead bridge at Emerald-street.

All arrangements for the union of the Congressional Union and the Women's Franchise League in Christ have been completed, but the amalgamation cannot be formally completed until next October when the U. B. church conference meets.

Cataract Co. Compromised.
The Cataract Power Commission has agreed to allow the city's claim with reference to the street railway service, the percentage of receipts on the Jockey Club line, and limited to a satisfactory agreement can be reached on the street lighting contract. The board of works will lose no time in furnishing information to support the city's claim for a reduction in the rate.

Knives in Hotel.
Donald C. McClelland, the U.S. Infantry lieutenant who tried to commit suicide by cutting his throat because an investigation had shown that he was short in his accounts, spent two years in Hamilton as an employee of Patterson & Forsyth, the promoters of the radial railway.

Crushed by Load of Wood.
London, Nov. 24.—Charles Hall, a farmer about 35 years of age, who lives in the vicinity of Parkhill, me, with a most serious accident, while driving a load of wood into town yesterday. The wagon upset, and the load fell on Hall, crushing his body and breaking one leg, one arm and several ribs.

Bad Boys Will Be Punished.
Five times the Church-street school has been broken into and over \$500 stolen. Principal Groves reported the thefts to Inspector Hughes, yesterday.

Prison for Knife Wielder.
Bertha, Nov. 24.—Rheinhardt Bauman of Waterloo was today sentenced to fifteen months in Central Prison by Judge Chisholm for having stabbed a man named John Kropp, with whom he had a quarrel over a girl affair.

Sydney, Nov. 24.—(Special).—The schooner Columbia, from Charlottetown for Newfoundland ports with produce, lumbered in Fortune Bay, Newfoundland, during the gale of Friday last, and her crew perished. The vessel was a three-masted schooner, James Tibb and was of about 100 tons registration.

The schooner Rigue from this port for St. Pierre with coal was driven ashore on Langley Island, one of the St. Pierre group on Friday and it is a total loss. The crew escaped.

President Loubet's Gifts.
President Loubet, on his visit to Spain, made presents to an almost oriental extent. Not a member of the Spanish royal family, from the queen mother to the youngest infant in arms, and not a person of any standing; at each royal residence he presented a costly present for the municipality of Madrid. This list and that to the queen's mother represent the different ladies which adorn the table of the emperor on rare state occasions of the first magnitude. The gift to the municipality was a costly Sevres vase of perfect workmanship. It stands six inches high and is ornamented at the sides with highly effective bronze work.

Had to Leap Too.
The European "resident" of a government station in Java is an important person held in great respect. One day two young men, told of one resident who was thrown out of his dog cart while descending a hill. He had barely recovered from the stunning fall when he caught sight of his secretary, who had been following in his own carriage, coming bounding down the steep road like a big India rubber ball, rolling over and over in the dust. "Hello! Have you been upset too?" asked the resident. "No, resident," sputtered the fat little secretary, scrambling to his feet again, "but I thought if the resident leaps, I leap, too."

Duel on Bicycles.
Spain has developed a novelty in dueling. It may be described as the duel wheel, and is fought on bicycles. Two young men of Granada named Percy and Marcus have originated the idea. It is not told the cause of the quarrel, but the disputants, who are ardent cyclists, agreed to fight it out with knives, or navagas, on their machines. In the first encounter Percy drove his knife thru his adversary's arm, but in the third set-to Marcus avenged himself by plunging his blade into Percy's right leg. Death took place shortly afterward.

Will of Baron Rothschild.
The will was proved in London September 22 of Baron Nathaniel von Rothschild, of Vienna, a partner of the banking house of Messrs. S. M. von Rothschild, of Frankfurt-on-the-Main, eldest son of the late Baron Anselm von Rothschild. The value of his English estate is £25,448, and the amount of his fortune abroad is not stated. That it is enormous is apparent from the fact that sums amounting to £11,259,000 are left to charity.

Attempt to Interfere With "Prophet" Leads to Riot.

A fatal riot was caused in the village of Reuillet by the police attempt to arrest a man named Augustus Buissere, who claims to be an inspired prophet.

Meanwhile Buissere made his escape, and has not yet been found. He has received the sum of over £200 in free will offerings from his dupes during the last two months.

HALIFAX GARRISON SAILS.

Only 200 Imperial Troops Now Remain in Canada.

Halifax, Nov. 24.—(Special).—The Dominion line steamer Kensington arrived late yesterday afternoon from Montreal, to take the second contingent of the Royal Garrison Regiment and other troops to Liverpool. The troops consisted of R. G. regiment, R. U. artillery, R. A. medical corps, and school staff. The Kensington sailed tonight. There are now less than 200 imperial troops remaining here, including headquarters staff, R. E. and fifty members of R. G. regiment.

U. S. TRADE WITH "COLONIES"

Expected to Reach Enormous Figure of \$125,000,000.

Washington, Nov. 24.—The commerce of the United States with its non-contiguous territory in 1905 seems likely to exceed by many million dollars that of any preceding year. For the nine months ending with September the shipments from the United States to its non-contiguous territory amounted to \$26,662,174, against \$24,829,073 in the corresponding months of the preceding year, and that the shipments to the United States from its non-contiguous territory in the same period amounted to \$6,638,165, against \$7,114,188 in the preceding year.

The figures given relate to merchandise only. Alaska shipped to the United States \$7,000,000 of gold produced in that territory, and \$5,000,000 of foreign gold, which presumably originated in adjacent British territory.

The estimate is made that the total commerce with the non-contiguous territory for the entire year of 1905 will approximate \$125,000,000.

Applications should be sent to the General Office of the Company at Harrisburg, Pa., on or before December 15, so that orders may be mailed by December 30 to all clergymen entitled to receive them.

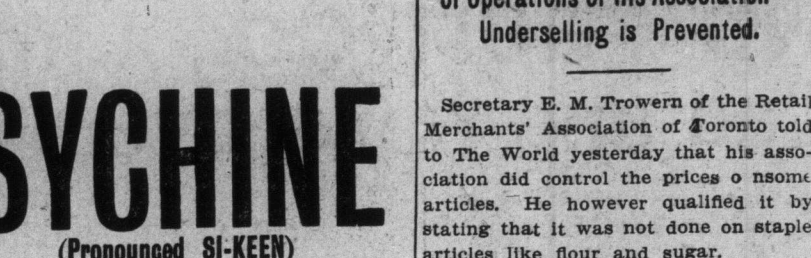
