





Mr. Henderson asked if any improvement would be made in the cold storage on those Atlantic vessels, as serious complaints were made last session that the cold storage was not up to the mark.

The minister of customs read a report from the Alian Steamship Company, in reply to criticisms made in the house last year by Mr. Smith of South Wentworth. The company pointed out that in many cases perishable products were received in the steamers, at a high temperature, and that frequently purchasers in Liverpool allowed fruit and dairy produce to remain for days on the docks, which meant delimination and loss. Discussion on this point continued during the freater part of the evening.

HEROES OF LONG AGO. Site of Graves of General Prideaus and Col. Johnson Found After 146

Years.

For over a century the exact site of the crave of General Prideaux and Col. Johnon have never been satisfactorily located In a quotation from the diary of Sir Wil ohnston, p. 395, vol 11. of Stone's Life, are found these words: "July 28th, Life, are found these words: "July 28th, 1759. Buried Brig.-Gen. Prideaux in the chapel and Col. Johnson, with a great deal of form. I was chief mourner." The location of this chapel has been definitely rettled by the discovery of two plans of Fort Nugara ia the British Museum by J. Ross Rebertson, beautiful photographs of which, full size, are now in his historical collection of Cenadian pictures. The first of these is dated 1766 and shows the chapel as located in the centre of the ground surrounding the fort, the statement being made that the "church interior" is "out of repair." The second plan is dated 8ept. 25th, 1773, and shows the chapel in the same location. Miss Janet Carnachan and other historians of Niagara have searched the archives at Washington for some trace of the position of this chapel, but without result. Peter A. Porter of Niagara Falls, N.Y., found that the chapel had been taken down and the materials removed to Fort Schlosser for building purposes. It is not likely that the bodies were removed at the same time. The plans referred to are drawn to a scale, and so exact are the locations in the old fort that in five minutes the site of the grave might be determined. It is proposed to mark it with a flat stone. Mr. Rebertson's collection, which consists of some 10,000 pictures, embraces all the important sites connected with Ganadlan history. Buried Brig.-Gen. Prideaux in the



To Dr. Bascom, Uxbridge, Ont.: Dear Sir, -Your letter of the 7th of January to hand. I will gladly give you any tract of land you mention, but I am told

tract of land you mention, but I am told that it is very good land. It is hard to find land in Cuba that is not good for something. Provided the company is solid, you have an opportunity of a lifetime in buying this land at \$10 per acre in small lots. Large tracts of 2000 or more acresare still for sale at this figure, but it is almost impossible to buy small lots. The land you think of buying is good for oranges, and some of it for tobacco, and all of it for pineapples.

Do not put too much faith in making money by growing other crops between orange trees. This no deubt can be done, but it is yet in the experimental stage, and one must first find what his land will grow and the cost of delivering to market. You will find in Cuba two fields side by side, and one will grow a certain crop and the other will not. The land is of all shades of grey, black and red in streaks and patches; all, however, will grow oranges, and this I consider the best investment on the island, providing shipping facilities are good.

The prospectus you send me states that oranges should be worth \$1.00 per box on the tree? This is a fair, conservative estimate. I would suggest that you try to get the company to give you a written contract that they will pay you this price for your crop, but do not bind yourself to sell to them at this price, as, if the shipping facilities are good, you should do better.

I purchased my land from the Development Company of Cuba. an American company, with offices at 23 William-street, New York. It is a very wealthy company,

and they have spent an enormous sum of money here. They started two and a haif years ago selling land at \$10 per acre. I bought six months ago at \$50 per acre, and on the first of February it goes up to \$60 per acre. Nearly all this company's land is now sold, and they are trying to buy more. About \$900 acres are planted with oranges and planting is still proceeding rapidly.

We have about 100 Americans and Canadians here, hotel, school, general store, telephone, town hall, billiards and bowling alley, acetylene gas, and a newspaper promised in a few months.

If you are thinking of coming to Cuba I would recommend you to look into the sugar industry. This was destroyed by the war and is just springing into life again. If you can buy suitable land at a reasonable price near a sugar mile, and this can be done in some parts, for an investment of \$6000 you can clear yearly (first year excepted) \$2500. It is, to my mind, the best proposition on the island for anyone who does not want to wait four or five years for oranges to mature.

Tobacco requires experience or the service of an experienced man and a great deal of work; each plant must be examined daily for bugs, and a day's mistake in harvesting will halve the value of the crop. It is uncertain, but if you succeed the profits are enormous. I do not think there is any profit in banamas, unless you are near a mill that makes banama flour; several of these are being started on the island. If I can be of any further assistance to you, you have only to write. If the Canada-Cuba Company is solid, as I presume it is, I certainly advise you to buy. There are more opportunities of making part of the world.

Was glad to hear from you and to know that you have am sorry that I cannot give you some account of the tract of land you speak of, as I have never been down in that part of the island, but there are some of the largest sugar mills down in that part of the island, and no doubt the tract you refer to, being at one time an old plantation, some of your questions, but am not certain yet as to how things will go here. The across. It has a fine climate, ranging from 60 to 85 Fahr. A cool breeze blowing from the coast modifies the temperature, making it a very pleasant place to live. fine. Sugar cane is one of the principal industries, and pays from \$50 to \$60 per acre, over and above ex-

Schools connected with Protestant churches have several English lessons a day. The people are a very mild and quiet, inoffensive people, and will use you right if you treat them right. Many of them are well educated, some of them being educated in Germany and France, as well as in the States.

The wet season begins about the first of May and ends about the first of November, but there are occasional rains during the dry season, and the rains during the wet season are not continuous, having dry spells of one or two weeks. I wish you might find time to make a trip down here and see things. If you could come I would be glad to go with you over the island and would try to make it as pleasant for you as possible. I think there is a great future for this island, and good land hought in a good location is bound to make a man money.


