The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the first Sabbath of every month. Parents are desired to give previous intimation of their intention to present their children for Baptism.

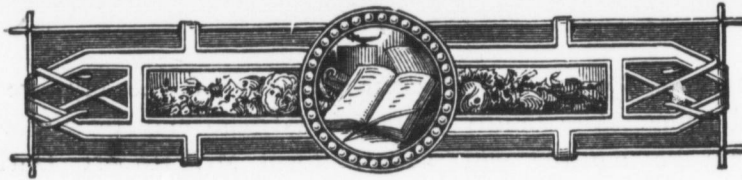
The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is observed on the last Sabbath of January, April, July and October.

The Board of Management meets in the Managers' room on the third Wednesday in January, March, May, July, September and November after the prayer meeting.

Allocation of Seats. A member of the Committee on the Allocation of Seats will be in attendance in the Managers' Room each Wednesday evening after the prayer meeting.





Address of the Session.

THE history of the congregation for the past year has been marked in many ways by quiet prosperity ; and if in some ways the advance has not been as marked as in some recent years, this is not difficult to account for in a satisfactory manner, and, as the Session believe, indicates no diminution of interest in the congregation. During the year 45 have been added on certificate, and on profession of faith, 24, in all, 69. On the other hand, 39 have been dismissed to other congregations, 8 have been called away by death, and 16 names, either of students who have entered the ministry, or of a few of whom we have had no information for two years past, according to a standing rule of the Session, have been dropped from the roll. This leaves on our roll at the end of 1889 the names of 688 communicants, a number greater by six than was reported last year. The fact that as compared with the past three years so few have been received on certificate has its sufficient explanation in the fact that our sittings are about all taken ; so that we are able to receive very few from outside except as room from time to time is made by deaths or removals.

The Session are glad to see in the addition of the twenty-four on profession of faith, a large part of whom were from our Sabbath School, evidence that the blessing of the Head of the Church is not absent from us ; while, at the same time, when we observe that the number is smaller than for two or three years past, we shall all see call to renewed zeal in labor for souls, and prayer for larger blessing from the Lord in the year before us.

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In the Sabbath School, while the numbers in the younger classes have remained much the same as before, it is very gratifying to note the largely increased attendance on the Young Men's Bible Class, under the charge of Mr. Ferguson. Nothing more important can well be named pertaining to the local work of the Church than the instruction of our young men in the Word of God; and this increased interest among these which has been observable within the year is matter for much encouragement and thanksgiving to God. The Bible Class for young ladies, taught by Principal Kirkland, has continued about the same in number as last year. It is attended largely by young ladies from the Normal School, but not so much as could be desired by the young ladies permanently resident in the congregation. The Session hope to see a growth in the class in this direction; no better training school for those to whom we must look for teachers in the Sabbath School can well be named than such a class as this. The Sabbath School and Bible Class collections for various purposes of Christian beneficence as will be observed, are \$432, a sum in excess of any former year in the history of the school by the amount of \$33.49.

Our various missionary organizations have held on their way successfully during the past year. The Murray Mitchell Auxiliary reports a membership slightly in advance of last year; the Mission Band an average attendance slightly smaller, which means simply that some who formerly attended the latter have transferred their help to the other society. The Wayside Gatherers, comprehending younger girls of the congregation, have contributed \$56.65. In all, the contributions of these societies have been larger than last year by about \$12. The Boys' Missionary Society has been maintained with interest and success under the efficient care and superintendence of Mr. Steele. Their contributions have been slightly behind those of last year. Perhaps a little more active pushing of systematic collection from month to month among the boys of the congregation would be of service to the treasury. As regards both this Society

and the Wayside Gatherers, the Session would remind the parents in the congregation that much depends upon themselves as to the interest and efficiency of these societies. Composed as they are for the most part of the younger children of our families, they can hardly be expected to remember always without forgetting, the existence of their society or the dates of its meetings; and we must depend upon the parents to keep this in mind and refresh their memories as occasion may require. Neither should membership in such an association be left quite to the option of the children any more than attendance on the Church or the Sabbath School. In their place as training classes for the development of the missionary spirit, they are of no less consequence to Christian nurture and education than the Sabbath School.

In our city mission work, the special event of the year has been the ordination, as pastor of St. John's Church across the Don, of our much esteemed brother, the Rev. J. M. Scott, to whose faithful work the great success of our enterprise in that part of the city is under God largely due. It is pleasant to record that that congregation, though, of course, not yet financially strong, has pledged itself to raise during the current year, the sum of \$600 toward Mr. Scott's stipend of \$1,000, in addition to \$200 toward other current expenses. For the remainder of this \$1,000 our congregation has become responsible, and it is expected that this amount of \$400, already less by \$100 than was given last year, will continue to be diminished by the amount of \$100 per year, till in the near future they shall have passed, as we have every reason to anticipate, beyond the necessity for any further aid. It may be added that at the date of the issue of this report the whole number that has been received to the communion of this young church has been 99; deducting the names of a few who have removed or died, this leaves the present membership of the church at eighty-six. The congregation will agree that we have reason to be very glad and thankful at the speedy and abundant result that with the blessing

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of God has followed our labours and investments in that field.

During the past year, as most are aware, has been organized a Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour on the general plan of the large number of such Societies elsewhere in the United States and Canada. These organizations of the young people of the Church, for mutual spiritual help, and for active Christian work, already number many thousands; and it appears to be the unanimous testimony of pastors and Christian workers everywhere that they are proving a most efficient and valuable aid in the work of the Church, especially among the young. The beginning that has been made among us abundantly warrants the expectation that, with the blessing of the Lord, the Association of our young people will be no less fruitful of good among us than in many other places. It is important to observe, perhaps, to remove any possible misapprehension, that the Society is in no sense an organization apart from the church. Its motto, "For Christ and the Church," correctly defines its position, and its relation to the Church is as close and vital as that of the Sabbath School. Indeed, if we might call the latter the Church's school for Bible study, we might call the former the Church's school for Christian work. Already among ourselves many of our young people, who could never have made a beginning in public testimony in any other way, in the meetings of the Society have gained confidence to take part in the public services of worship, and are thus being prepared for a degree of active usefulness for Christ in the church which had not otherwise been possible. With all these things in view, the Session take pleasure in commending the Society to the confidence of all; and especially to the active cooperation of the younger members of the congregation.

In the past year, which has been marked by unusual financial depression, it has been all the more a matter of gratification that not only have the various Schemes of the Church been sustained as hitherto, but a material advance of about \$500 has been made in the

total contributions for purposes outside our own congregation. The work undertaken and pledges made a little more than a year ago, with reference to the support of Rev. Mr. McGillivray, have been more than redeemed, and the hearty practical interest in him and his work in China is evidenced by the fact that at the expiration of about ten months from the beginning of our special relation to him, both the full stipend of \$750 promised has been paid in for the first year, ending October 31st, 1889, and, already, at the date of writing, about \$520 has been received upon the second year, of which only about three months have elapsed. It will be observed from the financial reports herewith published that the sum raised for Foreign Missions—and it is pleasant to add for Home Missions also—was greater for the last year than in any previous year in the history of the congregation. We also note with much pleasure the very liberal manner in which the congregation responded to the appeal from China for aid for the sufferers from famine; a relief of no small practical consequence, not merely in the meeting of extreme bodily need, but also in the way of winning the confidence of the people of North China in the missionaries sent to them from Christian lands. This perfectly spontaneous contribution of nearly \$600 has given new evidence that when once the reality of a need is fairly brought before our people we can depend upon a hearty practical response to an appeal. In this point of view the Session feel persuaded that the deficit which is reported by the Managers in the income for current expenditure for the past year, due to a number of concurrent causes into which we need not enter, now that the facts are before the people, will not continue nor be allowed to recur.

And, finally, in regard to the whole question of contributions to the work of Christ, whether among ourselves or elsewhere, we desire to commend to all with confidence the very encouraging promise made with reference to this very matter in God's Word:—"God is able to make all grace abound toward you; in order that ye always having all sufficiency in all things unto

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every good work may abound therein, to the praise and glory of God." Entering in reliance on this great promise, which is sure not to fail us, upon the work of the coming year, we have no fear but that, in the future as in the past, the records of the congregation will show a constantly increasing growth and fruitfulness in benevolence as in all good works.

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ABSTRACT OF

Minutes of Congregational Meeting.

TORONTO, JANUARY 29TH, 1890.

The thirty-sixth annual meeting of the congregation was held in the school-room, on Wednesday evening, 29th January, 1890. In the absence of the pastor, who was detained at home on account of sickness in his family, the opening exercises were conducted by Mr. Wm. Kerr.

Mr. Thomas Kirkland was then appointed Chairman, and Mr. John Paton, Secretary of the meeting.

Upon motion to that effect the minutes of the last annual meeting of the congregation were taken as read.

The Secretary having read the Managers' Report and Treasurer's statement, Mr. Ferguson moved, seconded by Mr. W. E. Long, "That the Managers' Report and Treasurer's Statement be received and adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Managers and especially to the Treasurer for the manner in which they have discharged their duties." Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wm. Kerr and seconded by Mr. J. Y. Reid, "That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the members of the Choir for their very valuable services, and the Managers are hereby requested to pay Mr. John Douglas the sum of \$300 in appreciation of his services." Carried.

Nominations were then received for the seven vacancies in the Board of Management, and a ballot having been taken the Scrutineers appointed by the Chairman

declared the following gentlemen duly elected, viz.:—
 Alex. Nairn, W. D. McIntosh, John Paton, W. M.
 Douglas, James Buik, John Y. Reid and Charles
 Thompson.

Moved by Mr. W. E. Long, seconded by Mr. John
 Gowans, "That the Managers be instructed to continue
 the financial support to St. John's Church as follows:—
 For first year, *i.e.*, 1890, \$400; for second year, *i.e.*,
 1891, \$300; for third year, *i.e.*, 1892, \$200; for fourth
 year, *i.e.*, 1893, \$100, and after the last-named date finan-
 cial aid to cease." Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, seconded by Mr.
 Robert Darling, "That Messrs. H. W. Nelson and R.
 R. Cathron be appointed auditors for the ensuing year."
 Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. S. Baird, seconded by Mr. W. D.
 McIntosh, "That the Rev. Dr. Kellogg, Messrs. Thomas
 Kirkland, George Inglis, and R. M. Gray be a Com-
 mittee to attend to the printing of the annual reports of
 the congregation." Carried.

Moved by Mr. Jos. Bruce, seconded by Mr. Thomas
 Woodbridge, "That Messrs. D. S. Keith and John
 Cameron be a committee to advise the session in regard
 to matters pertaining to the service of praise in the
 church." Carried.

Mr. Wm. Kerr, in a few appropriate words on behalf
 of the congregation, then presented to Mr. John Douglas
 a marble timepiece and a pair of bronze statuettes as
 a token of appreciation of his long and valued services
 as leader of the Choir; and also to Mr. W. M. Douglas,
 a silver tea service in appreciation of the substantial aid
 given by him to the service of praise.

Mr. W. M. Douglas responded on his own behalf
 and on behalf of his father, who was prevented by sick-
 ness from being present.

The address which accompanied the presentation to
 Mr. Douglas is herewith subjoined:

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Mr. John Douglas :

The Session and Managers of St. James' Square Presbyterian Church cannot allow your retirement from the position so long and so successfully held by you as leader of the service of praise among us, to pass without giving, on this the first public occasion since your retirement, some formal and permanent expression to the feelings which fill the heart of every member of the congregation.

For the space of almost a generation the musical service of our church has been under your direction—a fact which of itself testifies more fully than can any words of ours, to the satisfaction which the congregation have experienced in the arrangement.

Not to speak of other matters it has been peculiarly gratifying, both to the successive pastors and to the office bearers and members of the congregation that this important part of the worship of God should have been so long under the direction of one, not only of your musical ability, but also of one who has been able to regard the musical part of the church service as intended less for the exercise of the artistic talents of those who take part than for the reverential worship of God.

We feel also that regarding the changes which in the past few years have been introduced into our musical service, the congregation may well be thankful that in the good Providence of God, this service has been in charge of one who while heartily accepting such changes as have been made, has yet been able none the less thoroughly to appreciate and respect the feelings of those who have been the most strongly impressed with the importance of maintaining simplicity of form in this part of Divine service.

Nor can we omit to refer on this occasion to the valuable services which, through these past years, members of your family have rendered in the Choir: services which have had their chief reward in the consciousness of giving most helpful assistance in the worship of God's house and in the very warm and grateful appreciation of the whole congregation. We cherish the hope, indeed, that the musical aid of the younger members of your family, who yet remain in the congregation, may not yet have finally ended; but however this may be, we deem this a fitting occasion to express what we know to be the hearty and unanimous feeling of the congregation with regard to their past assistance no less than your own. Whenever in after days the first thirty years of the history of this church shall be recalled, there are no names in the congregation entitled to be more warmly cherished among those whose services have been of special value to the church, than those of yourself and your esteemed family.

Your familiar face will be greatly missed from the Choir gallery, but we trust you may long be permitted to remain among us, and we feel assured of your continued interest and sympathy in all that concerns the improvement of the service of praise as in all else that pertains to the prosperity of the church. And best of all, we also rejoice in the assurance that when the days of our earthly praise

are ended, we may hope by the grace of Christ, to meet you and all yours among those who shall render praise unending before the throne of God in the heavenly sanctuary.

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Revenue.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES are made in three ways:—(1) Weekly Offerings in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath ; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions ; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to any one.

ENVELOPES are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings ; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. All those who occupy sittings are expected to contribute according to their means to the current expenses of the congregation.





Managers' Report.

The Board of Managers beg to submit to the Congregation their Report for the year 1889.

The following table shows the Treasurer's Statement and compares it with that of 1888:—

From the above it appears that there has been a perceptible decline in the contributions for the ordinary revenue of the Congregation.

The Managers are not unmindful of the fact that very liberal contributions have been made for the furtherance of very laudable schemes. The Congregation has given generously to the fund for the support of Rev. Mr. McGillivray, its Missionary in Honan, to the deficit in the Home Mission Fund, the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, also to the fund for the relief of the

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stricken districts of China. It should not be forgotten, however, that the necessary expenses of the Congregation constitute a primary and very important charge on the liberality of its Members.

The Managers regret that more attention has not been paid to the request made by them last year for an increase in the givings towards the ordinary revenue of the Congregation, and they would again respectfully suggest that all who possibly can should try to add from ten to fifteen per cent. to their weekly offerings. They believe that if all the members would give in proportion to their ability, the Schemes of the Church would not suffer, while all the necessary current expenses of the Congregation would be readily and fully met. They believe that the majority of the members are already doing all they can do, but they feel that some might without difficulty add to their liberality.

The mortgage debt on the church property remains at \$15,000, bearing interest at five per cent., and matures on 1st April, 1893.

The Managers have given their attention to the ventilation of the church during the past year, and while the results are not so satisfactory as might have been obtained, had there been funds in hand to warrant the required expenditure, they believe that at very little cost some improvement is noticeable in this regard. To this end, chiefly, electric lighting has been introduced, and it is expected that in the course of a few months satisfactory arrangements will be made for its permanent use throughout the church building, thereby contributing not a little to the comfort of all who attend the church, especially those who occupy seats in the gallery.

The Managers could not allow the occasion of the retirement of Mr. John Douglas from the leadership of the choir to pass without recording their sense of appreciation of his services during the long period of nearly thirty-five years. The Congregation is indeed deeply indebted to Mr. Douglas, and to the members of his family who have ably assisted him, for the efforts he

has made in seeking to promote the service of praise in the church.

By the removal from the city of Mr. James Peattie, the Board lost the services of a very efficient member, and it will be necessary for the congregation to appoint one to fill his place in addition to those chosen to succeed the six members whose term has now expired, viz: W. D. McIntosh, A. R. Christie, Alex. Nairn, R. C. Steele, Robert Darling and John Paton.

It is gratifying to be able to report progress in connection with our Sabbath School work during the past year. If the increase in our numbers has not been as large as we would like to have seen, or the amount of

moneys might have been even more, yet it is so far satisfactory to know we are better in these respects than a year ago. Nor do we think the interest in Bible study has been less than in former years, if we may judge by the very faithful and increased attendance on the classes, and—what doubtless is to all interested the most satisfactory outcome in connection with the work—by the considerable number of young persons from the more advanced classes who joined the fellowship of the church during the year. It is in this more than anything else we should find comfort in our work, and be stirred up to more earnest prayer and untiring efforts that He whom we call Lord and Master should see in our midst of the travail of His soul and be satisfied.

This shows an increase of thirty-one over last year. The number of teachers' names on the roll is thirty-three, seventeen male and sixteen female—an increase of one.

While, as in former years, there have been numerous changes in the staff of teachers, none, we are glad to say, have been removed by death. Not so, however, with our scholars. One—Mary Irwin—was called away during the year from the earthly to the heavenly home. While in attendance on Mr. Nelles' class she was deeply interested in the Word of God, and gave evidence of the new birth and the better life. It is when such changes as these come now and again into our midst, we feel the

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importance of the whole-souled earnestness and devotion of the true disciple, while seeking to be co-workers with Jesus in the saving of souls.

We cannot omit to notice the going forth, in September last, of Miss Gowans, one of our most excellent teachers, to prepare herself for the prosecution of mission work in the foreign field. Her heart is full of love to Christ, and she desires that her life should be wholly given to His service in mission work. The prayers of many hearts go with her, that the Lord may long spare her life, enabling her to be so useful in the kingdom that she may be the honoured instrument in leading many to taste of the peace of forgiveness and the joy of holiness.

The classes for young men and young women were not held during the summer months. Instead, however, of discontinuing the meetings of the infant and intermediate classes during the months of July and August, as in 1888, it was decided to meet on the Sabbath mornings of those months at half-past nine o'clock. This was found to be a change for the better, and might well be recommended as a permanent arrangement.

Monthly meetings of the teachers have been held during the year (except in the months of June, July and August), at which topics suitable for Sabbath School teachers were considered, Principal Kirkland bringing before the teachers at several of the meetings, in a most complete and thorough manner, the subject of "Teaching." These, as also the devotional meetings at the close of the teaching on the Sabbath afternoon, have been found exceedingly helpful. Business meetings of the teachers have also been held during the year as they were found necessary. The quarterly reviews of the lesson in the months of March, June and September, were conducted, as usual, by our pastor, and, to teachers and scholars alike, were very interesting and profitable.

In November last it was considered advisable to have a change made in the hymn book used in the Sabbath School. In place of the one recommended by the Assembly of our Church, and which has been used by us since it was issued, it was agreed to adopt the latest edition

of the work entitled "Songs and Solos." It is hoped the change will be to the profit of the whole school, and prove all that is desired.

The annual summer gathering of the school was held this year, as last, at Long Branch, on the 22nd June last. It was a glad day, and one not to be readily forgotten. There was as usual a large attendance of parents and children, and other friends.

Letters have been received from time to time during the year from various Mission fields—both Home and Foreign—and have been read to the school, deepening our interest thereby in the work of Christ everywhere, and leading us all, as we trust, to obey yet more heartily the command of our Saviour, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." This, we think, has been strikingly manifested in the growing interest and activity of such organizations among us as "The Wayside Gatherers," "The Boys' Missionary Society," and "The Society of Christian Endeavour."

There have been added to the library forty-six new books during the year, the number of volumes now on hand being six hundred. Miss Inglis still continues to act as organist, and deserves most heartily our very best thanks.

REPORT OF WORK IN CONNECTION WITH

St. John's Church.

So rapid and encouraging has been the progress of the work across the Don that the people who worship there themselves furnish a considerable part of the teachers required for the Sabbath School. The following members of our own congregation, however, still continue to labour there:—

The Sabbath School, for the present, has reached its limit of growth. The average attendance for 1889 has been 211. For some months the need of additional room has been much felt. During the month of December there were 267 pupils in attendance, which is much too great a number for comfort and success in teaching. Some of the classes are much too large, and there is not room for the formation of another class, however small. It was therefore agreed some months ago that the extension of the present building and the seating of the whole church was a necessity, primarily in the interest of the Sabbath School, and generally in the interest of the congregation. Plans for a suitable enlargement, which will double its present seating capacity, have been ac-

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cepted, and it is expected that by the end of May the extension will be completed, which, with comfortable seating, will make the church a more inviting place of worship.

The total contributions of the Sunday School for the year were \$130.67; of this amount, \$50 was given towards the salary of W. H. Grant, B.A., student missionary in Muskoka under the Students' Missionary Society of Knox College; to Foreign Missions (Indians of our North-West), \$25; Pointe-aux-Trembles School, \$25; Day Spring Mission Ship, \$25.

When the work in connection with St. John's is considered, it should surely be with great thankfulness to God for His constant manifest blessing upon it. From the time of the organization of the congregation, in November, 1888, until the present, there has been continued growth in every department of its work. With those placed on the communion roll at that date, there have been received into the membership of the church up to the present time 99. From this number must be deducted two removed by death and eleven disjoined, which leaves the present membership 86. Since the settlement of their pastor, in December, the members have been very active in the church's work. While foreseeing the danger of too much organization, they have been quick to adopt such as is necessary, and have shown encouraging heartiness in connection with it.

It is now very nearly a year since the St. James' Square Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor was organized. The object of this Society is "to promote an earnest Christian life among its members; to increase their mutual acquaintance, and to make them more useful in the service of God." This, we think, is being attained.

Although the growth in numbers has not been as rapid as we would have wished, still it has been steady, especially since the Convention held in this city in November last. Since then the young people have taken more interest in the Society, and have been more

in earnest in bringing others in. The membership consists of forty, thirty-seven active members and three affiliated.

Two socials have been held, both of which were well attended, and proved very enjoyable. The first was held in June, and the second in January. Their object was to bring the strangers of the congregation together, in order to make them feel more at home; and also with a view of having them become interested in the Society, so as in this way to increase its membership.

Cottage prayer meetings were commenced in connection with this Society last fall in the eastern part of the city, and much interest is being taken in them by those who attend. On the whole there is a very good attendance.

The Mission Committee visit among these families every week, and in this way come to know the people, and to make them feel that an interest is taken in them.

Christmas dinners and other treats were provided for about thirty families, for which great gratitude was expressed.

We sincerely hope that during the coming year greater interest may be taken in the Society, and that its influence may be largely felt throughout the Church, and in this way fulfil its motto, which is, "For Christ and the Church."





The Schemes of the Church.

The Lord has taught us plainly in His Gospel that we may not in our work for Him stop with the care of our own church or of those more immediately about us ; but, if we will be loyal to Him, must aim at carrying and sending the Gospel to the destitute in our own land and in all nations. For practical purposes our General Assembly has divided this work, committed to our trust by Christ, into several departments under the charge of special Committees, which are commonly spoken of as "The Schemes of the Church." The obligation to contribute to the support of these, as the Lord may prosper us, rests upon the Lord's last command, and from the responsibility no member of Christ's Church can be absolved.

These "Schemes" are divided by the General Assembly as follows :

I. FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

1. Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, Trinidad, S.A., the New Hebrides, our own Indian Tribes in the North-West, in Formosa, and in Honan, N. China.

2. The General Assembly of 1886 directed that a place among the "Schemes of the Church" be assigned to Jewish Missions. It may be said with regard to this work, as yet new to most, that although comparatively little has been done for the scattered nation, that little has been remarkably blessed, and the outlook among them has not been so bright for centuries, Let us

remember that it is written that "the Jews are beloved for their fathers' sake," and that at last "all Israel shall be saved," and that "the receiving of them" shall be "life from the dead" to the world.

II. HOME MISSION WORK

has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the three following departments:

1. The *Home Mission* Committee seeks to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellow-countrymen, who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain them.

2. It is the special object of the *Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends* to raise the salaries of the Ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$700 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the Congregations who need such help.

3. The work of *French Evangelization* seeks to bring the Word of God to the large French-Catholic population in our Eastern Provinces, and so, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from that bondage of superstition and subjection to the priesthood, in which Rome everywhere and always seeks to keep her votaries.

4. The *Church and Manse Building Fund*, as the phrase indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

III. EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Divinity Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important and fundamental than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, at home and abroad, especially in these days of so rapidly-advancing knowledge and widely opening doors. It should need no argument to commend this work to the sympathies of all our members.

IV. THE FUNDS FOR AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS, AND
FOR MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church, by contributing to their support when by sickness or old age they are disabled from longer service,* or by payment of annuities to their widows and orphans, when they have been removed by death.

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in the congregation the following organizations :

1. The ladies' *Murray Mitchell Auxiliary*, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Western Branch of the Canada Presbyterian Church.

2. The *Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band*, an organization of the young ladies of the Church, working and contributing for the same end as the last named.

3. *The Wayside Gatherers* is an association of the girls in the congregation for the same purpose.

4. The *Boys' Missionary Society*, as the words indicate, is an association of the boys of the congregation for the purpose of giving and receiving information as to the work of missions, and helping it, as they may be able, with their contributions.

5. The *Missionary Association* of the Congregation is an association whose work it is to secure and collect contributions for all the Schemes of the Church from all families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions to their support are asked of all members and adherents of the Church. Collectors are appointed

* N.B.—By direction of the General Assembly an effort is now being made to improve the condition of this Fund by raising by subscription an Endowment Fund. The income from congregational collections falls quite behind the need, which, in many cases, is quite imperative. Subscriptions to this Endowment, or pledges for the same, are earnestly solicited, and may be handed to the Assembly's Agent, the Rev. Wm. Burns, 15 Toronto Street, or, if more convenient, to the pastor.

for each Elder's District to visit each month all families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one will decide as in the presence of our Lord how much he ought to give each month to these purposes, and act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's wish is given the funds received by the collectors are annually allocated to the several Schemes in the proportion suggested by the General Assembly. But whenever a contributor may express a desire that his special gift should be assigned to a particular object, the wish will be regarded in the distribution of the funds. If any should be passed by in the collector's calls, they will kindly intimate the fact, with their wish to contribute, to the pastor or to Mr. R. Darling, Rosedale.

REPORT OF ST. JAMES' SQUARE

Boys' Missionary Society for 1889.

While the attendance at our fortnightly meetings has not been so large as we could desire, much interest has been manifested by the boys—the programmes for the meetings being mainly furnished by themselves, consisting of the Missionary Paper, which has been edited with much ability and zeal, and contained selections upon missionary topics in the various parts of the field in which our Church is interested; also some original papers, in addition to which some very thoughtful essays upon missionary subjects have been prepared and read before the Society by the various members.

The Society has been very much indebted to Rev. Dr. Kellogg, and the Rev. Mr. Smith, of Arnednuggar, India, and others who have kindly given us addresses throughout the season upon missionary topics, and also to Principal Kirkland for his very interesting experimental lecture, which could not fail to impress the minds of the boys with the wonderful power and wisdom of the Creator of the universe.

The members have been also brought closely in touch with and their interest deepened in Foreign Missions, by the interesting letters received from Mrs. Wilson, India, Mr. Goforth, and Mr. McGillivray, China, and others, which portrayed very vividly not only the manners and customs but the deep spiritual needs of the teeming millions in these foreign countries.

We feel that the meetings of this Society must tend greatly to strengthen missionary spirit and zeal of all

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who take part in its meetings. We would like to see every boy in the congregation between the ages of ten and twenty years enrolled as members of St. James' Square Boys' Missionary Society, and would earnestly urge upon the parents of our congregation the desirability of their boys joining our Society. The boys of to-day will soon be the men who are conducting the affairs of the Church and of the nation, and they cannot be too early enlisted in the glorious work of winning souls for Christ.

The Wayside Gatherers.

Looking back over the past year, we think we have great reason to be thankful for the measure of success which has attended our band. We have not been so successful financially as last year, but in other ways we hope we have been more so. Our object has been to learn more about our missionary fields, especially India, which we have taken up altogether. The first address given at our last annual meeting was on India by Mrs. Ewart, in which she spoke of the cruelty with which child-widows are treated, telling many interesting stories, and showing that all the money we give to missions is of no avail unless followed by prayer.

The first two months and a half of the year were spent in making preparations for the entertainment held on March the 16th, at which we realized by the sale of tickets a considerable sum. At our ordinary meetings in April, May and June, we made some articles for India and the North-West, and learned from the map where the different missionaries are located. In November, we held a thank-offering meeting, to which each member came prepared with a suitable text and a contribution in money. This was one of the most interesting meetings we have had. Miss Kellogg was present and told us a great deal about the home life of the people in India, their manners and customs, etc., which we hope not soon to forget. The thank-offerings amounted to \$4.90. We have had a few donations, and our funds have been increased by many little orders for work and by private sales, so that in all we have to hand in \$56.65. Trusting that our interest in missions has been increased and our efforts blessed, we close the year hoping to begin afresh with renewed energy and zeal, determined to do more during the coming year than we have done in the past.

An increasing interest in the Missionary work of the Church at large has been manifested by the members of the Congregation throughout the year just closed. This can probably be said, with equal truth, of all Christian bodies, as the result of a more intimate acquaintance with the work, its success, and the need for it, and let us hope also, in many cases, the deeper appreciation of the privilege enjoyed, leading, as it ought to do, to a desire for its extension to all those whom Christ died to save.

But our own zeal and interest have been still further quickened by the responsibility we have assumed in sustaining a Missionary of our own in the Foreign field. The communications received at intervals from Mr. McGillivray, in Honan, China, and from a number of others recently gone from our midst to engage in similar work, have lent a vividness and reality to missions, which we have not heretofore known, and the added interest thus gained has found expression in earnest prayers for the preservation and success of those, who, with so much devotion, are seeking, as our representatives, to commend the Gospel of Jesus to multitudes still strange to its life-giving efficacy.

The Treasurer's Report has in it many elements of satisfaction, and not least, perhaps, that the funds contributed are the free-will offering of the people, not raised by questionable means of any kind, but attended, we believe, by true consecration of heart, and in many instances involving something of genuine sacrifice for the sake of the blessed Master.

The allocation of funds, suggested for the approval of the Congregation, is in close accord with what has been done in previous years, and it will be interesting to study the comparative statement of contributions for Missionary and extra-Congregational purposes, which will be appended to this report, as evidence of a well sustained effort, and a reasonably steady increase annually for the past ten years. The contributions for this year are about \$300 more than last year, the largest amount that has ever been given by the Congregation, with the exception of 1887, and 325 per cent. greater than was given in 1879, the year in which the present church edifice was first occupied—it will also be found in excess of the amount contributed for our own Congregational purposes.

In moving the adoption of the above report, Mr. Henry W. Darling called attention to the summary, showing that for each of the Schemes of the Church there had been a progressive, well-sustained gift by the congregation for the past ten years, and in addition to this there was evidently a resource that could be counted upon when the necessity arose, and it commended itself to the members.

In the years 1882 and 1883 this liberality found scope in aiding the endowment fund of Knox College, immediately prior to which large demands had been made upon the congregation in paying for the erection of the new church and school house.

In the following four years considerable sums were given for Manitoba College, and the Western Church and Manse Building Funds. In 1887 the congregation took up City mission work, and gave largely and wisely to the St. John's Chapel, which is now a flourishing congregation. The present year finds us pledged to aid the endowment Aged Ministers' and Widows' Fund, quite as deserving and important in its way as any of the Schemes of the Church, and well worthy of our practical interest. The report was then seconded by Mr. R. C. Steele, when Dr. Kellogg called attention to the item of Mr. McGillivray's salary, in order to explain that his year began November 1st, 1888, and that the amount the congregation had undertaken to provide had been paid in full the first year, and already over \$520

had been paid in on account of the second year's salary, although only a quarter of the year had expired. The \$726 which appears under this head in the Report of Contributions does not, therefore, indicate a deficiency in the \$750 promised for the past year, but is due to the fact that a considerable part of the amount pledged for 1889 was paid in advance before the close of 1888, and so appeared in the report for that year.

The report submitted by the Committee of the Association was then unanimously carried.

On motion of Mr. Kilgour the thanks of the congregation were tendered to the lady collectors and to the acting treasurer of the Association, Mr. Robert Darling, for their valuable services rendered throughout the year.

The formal business of the evening having been thus completed, brief and interesting addresses were given by the Rev. James Smith, of Ahmadnagar, India, as representing Foreign Missions, and by Mr. Frank Nichol, of Knox College, giving a very graphic account of his experiences in the Home Mission field in the North-West; after which the meeting was closed with prayer, the doxology, and the benediction.

A Comparative Statement is subjoined, showing the progressive advance in the contributions of the congregation for various benevolent purposes, outside of local congregational expenditures, for the past ten years.
