SEVERE TEST OF SUBMARINES

Totally Submerged for 24 Hours Without a Mishap.

Newport, R. I., May 16.—With all hands well, equipped with a bountiful supply of fresh sea and with records of submergence broken, the submarines Octopus and Lake rose to the surface of Narragansett Bay at 4 o'clock this afternoon, ending a test of 24 hours under water.

The Octopus rose first, having been the first to sink yesterday, and the Lake soon followed her rival to the surface. The members of the naval trial board crowded about the Octopus as the conning tower hatched few open.

Both crews passed the time comfortably while at the bottom of the bay. They slept well and managed to get thoroughly rested after their labors in connection with the maneuvering tests that have preceded the submergence trial.

THE WORLD'S SHAME

The statement of the British foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, that the British government could not wait indefinitely for action by the Belgian parliament in regard to reform in the Congo Free State, or its annexation to Belgium, is an indication that what has been termed the most colossal crime of modern times must cease to haunt itself before the world.

The provincial government of New Brunswick might get a hint from New Zealand on the subject of settling young men upon agricultural crown lands. The Toronto World prints an interview with Mr. P. C. Freeth, a New Zealand journalist, now in Canada, as follows:—Mr. Freeth spoke of the land laws of New Zealand, which are giving general satisfaction. The government settles farmers on crown lands and under a new law has power to seize any estate if the owner is found not to be putting it to proper use and blocking settlement.

been gleaned, that even if the pending negotiations in the Belgian parliament should terminate in a definite vote of annexation, which is considered very doubtful, the annexation would be little more than a nominal transfer, and would affect no radical changes. "The net result," it says, "would be to seal the fate of the Congo natives, who, while in fact no less subject than before to the mercy of Leopold, would be nominally under Belgian protection, and thus practically outside the reach of international assistance."

The other powers are waiting to learn what the Belgian parliament is willing to do, but, as indicated by Sir Edward Grey's remarks of yesterday, they are waiting with an ever-growing impatience. In the end reforms must be introduced, although every effort will be made by the inhuman King of the Belgians to delay them as long as possible. The world has heard the cry of the Congolese. Even if slowly, the world must answer the cry.

The strongest terms the Congo regime. One was by Prof. Cattier of the University of Brussels, an authority on the affairs of Congo administration, and the other by Father Vermeersch, a Belgian Jesuit priest. Prof. Cattier charged that the king had taken from what is called the "Crown Domain" \$10,000,000 for his own purposes, and without application to the welfare of the natives (other authorities estimate the king's Congo revenue at \$6,000,000 to \$12,000,000); and he added:—"The king has thought himself entitled to dispose of the Congolese treasury as though he owned it. The native population has been oppressed, abused, decimated. Such proceedings may be justifiable in strict law, since absolutism is above law, but public morality condemns them."

ROCKWOOD PARK TRAGEDY RECALLED BY AWFUL MURDER

IN EAST BOWDOINHAM, ME., Sydney Prebble, 15 Years Old Murdered His Boy Chum and Then Buried the Body—When Questioned He Calmly Admitted His Guilt and Said He Was Ready to Pay the Penalty.

A case that in many features resembles the celebrated Higgins-Doherty-Goodspeed tragedy in Rockwood Park, a few years ago, is now exciting the little city of Auburn, Me.

As in the Higgins case both the principals are boys and one shot the other dead and then buried his body by the roadside. When charged with the crime he admitted his guilt and said he had planned and executed the murder.

The Bangor Commercial tells the story in the following despatch from Auburn, Me.: AUBURN, Me., May 16—Sydney Prebble, aged 15, of East Bowdoinham, is now confined in the county jail at Auburn.

He threatened to shoot me two weeks ago. I kicked his dog a month ago and he threatened me then. I planned to kill him when I got the chance. I had planned to do it two weeks ago. I was afraid he would kill me as he said he would.

"When I wrote that note to his mother I thought she would take his revolver but she didn't, so I had to use my gun. It is a single barrel 12 gauge shot gun, breach loading, that father gave me for a Christmas present."

"I borrowed the shells of Earl Brown told my brother Henry needed them. The reason why I asked Mrs. Heath for the shells was because when Norris went out with the revolver, he usually took the bicycle with him. I hid the bicycle in the woods."

Leaving against the bare wall of the lockup, with downcast eyes the boy continued the terrible story of his crime. In his brown coat and cap and overalls the same suit he had worn when he killed his friend, he seemed utterly incapable of possessing the mind to plan or the strength to carry out in such a cold-blooded manner the death of a boy two years older than himself.

"Just before 8 o'clock I went over to Williams' mill and started to walk home with Norris when he was through work. I had my gun with me. I was on good terms with Norris to his face, but I had planned all the time to kill him when I got a chance.

"We talked of hunting crows' nests on the way home and we got over by the woods. Spinnys' woods we always called them. I tried to get him to go into the woods with me to look at a crow's nest. I had planned to kill him in the woods as it would have been easier, but he wouldn't go in the woods. He said we must go home as he wanted to do the work and get back to the village.

"So I let him get ahead of me, and I loitered behind a little. He never noticed that I wasn't close up with him, and when he was about five feet away from me, he turned his head around the other way, and I shot him and fired. I killed him instantly. He fell right down and never quivered. I shot him in the back of the head just behind the ear, the shot blew his brains out. I have used a gun ever since I was 11 and know how to use one all right.

"After I found he was dead I dragged him into the woods and down near a pool of water. Then I covered him up with leaves and dirt.
