

# BASE RUNNING

Managers Should Not Belittle Important Feature of Game

Once again it is necessary to revert to or the season and its significance, says a Philadelphia baseball expert. Because

for the season and its significance, says a Philadelphia baseball expert. Because the Braves stole only 139 bases for the season, and won the pennant, the fans are figuring that base stealing as an aid to winning ball games has been greatly over-estimated. Managers are about ready to "can" the base-running game as a result of this revelation. But both fans and managers should go slowly in throwing base running into the discard, pennant or no pennant.

The Braves played a different sort of game because they had different material than the other clubs. The Braves were content to make a run at a time, using the sacrifce when necessary, and they could afford to do this because they possessed pitchers who were able to hold the opposition to low scores. The Braves were able to win games with one, two or three runs, and did not try to make them in clusters.

McGraw, with his Giants, was up against a different proposition. His pitchers could not hold the enemy to a few runs, and, in order to win, he had no make runs in bunches. He had to have four or five or he was not in the game at all. So the base-running game was adopted, the hit and run and the steal. These (if successful, usually produced two or three runs at a time.

Stallings is not a manager to be trifled with. His players do not care to try for a stolen base and fail. It means some hard words for them, and Stallings had a different kind of campaign mapped out. He was willing to try for one run at a time, and, with his excellent pitching and fine defensive team, he was able to get away with it. So do not belittle base running. It is one of the fine arts of the game.



#### Baseball Suit On

Forces of organized baseball attacked by the Federal League as a combination operating in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law were before Judge Landis in the U. S. District court in Chicago on Wednesday fighting for an injunction sought by the Federals. Briefly the facts in the suit are as follows:

Briefly the facts in the suit are as follows:

The Federal league seeks to dissolve organized baseball which operates under the so-called national agreement, as it is alleged it violates the anti-trust law. Organized baseball includes practically every league in the nation, exclusive of the federal organization.

The Federals also seek to enjoin the individual defendants from interfering with players now under contract to the federal organization and also asks that the contracts with players made by the defendants and each of them under the national agreement be declared null, void and of no effect.

If the Federals are successful in the quest for a temporary injunction, steps will immediately be taken to obtain a permanent order.

Should contracts be declared null and void it would make "free agents" of all players except such as are now signed by equitable contracts.

The defense of organized baseball that it does not operate in violation of the anti-trust law will be based on section 6 of the Clayton act recently passed by the U. S. Congress. This section declares that the labor of a human being is not a commodity or article of commerce.
