Great Harbor Front Deal Completed

S. Gregory Now in Possession of Hilyard Property

Will Operate Plant—Rumors of Big Corporations Having Eye on the Place But Purchaser Says He is Alone in the Transaction

One line in Dun's record, issued today, gives the key to one of the largest property deals put through in St. John for some time, involving the transfer of the harbor front property on the Strait Shore to J. S. Gregory, who now controls the harbor front in an unbroken line from Long wharf to the Sayre property next to the Portland Rolling mills in Chesley street. The price is said to be in the vicinity of \$150,000 and there are many interesting rumors as to the use of the property, although Mr. Gregory declared today that he was acting for himself only in putting through the deal.

Recruiting for the battery has been going on for some time, by of the men being brought from Cobalt mining district and mobilized the Grenadier Guards army here.

HE PROBABLY IS WORRYING MORE JUST NOW

The Gentle Kaiser and the Declaration of War, as Von Moltke Deems it Wise to Present Matter

Berlin, via Amsterdam, Jan. 22—There has been published in a local newspaper an interview with Lieutenant-General Count von Moltke, former chief of staff of the German army. The recital is largely in the form of question and answer and is as follows: "The resolve to declare war must have fallen heavily upon Emperor William," the interviewer asked. "Striking the table with his fist and otherwise giving evidence of his emotion General von Moltke answered. "Very heavily indeed. Do people ever stop to consider how tremendous is the responsibility of a conscientious monarch, who must pledge the blood of his people? That step a monarch like the Emperor takes only when the life and death of his people is at stake."

PANAMA PROTEST TO BRITAIN AND JAPAN

Washington, Jan. 22—Advisors to the Pan American legation here today are that the presence of five British and Japanese cruisers, with several colliers and other auxiliaries, in or about the harbor of Puerto Pinar, Panama, for five days, and the sending ashore of detachments of marines, are a serious protest by Panama to Great Britain and Japan.

OTTAWA'S POLICEMAN DRIVEN TO DEATH AFTER FAILURE OF ATTACK ON GERMANS

Ottawa, Jan. 22—Constable Alex. Bain, a reservist, who left the Ottawa police force to rejoin his regiment as a corporal soon after war broke out, has written Chief Ross, describing a bayonet charge on December 18, as a result of which he lost his reason. Bain is now in a hospital in Edinburgh.

KILLED DETECTIVE

Toledo, Ohio, Jan. 22—Kaiser Bardecki, a city detective, was shot and killed by Peter Skiriber of New York, last night, when attempting to arrest Skiriber, who had shot and seriously wounded Pawlina Misun, aged twenty-six, also of New York.

OBJECTS TO TAX ON ABSENTEE BELGIANS

Montreal, Jan. 22—A Gazette cable says that a despatch to L'Independance Belge reports that the proposed tax upon absentees has been rejected unanimously by the permanent deputation representing East Flanders. Certain Belgian communities which were in financial straits proposed a special tax on all citizens who had not returned to their homes by March 1, half of the tax to be appropriated by the municipality, and half by the German government, which promised to use it in the interests of the Belgians.

COLONEL GRANT HERE FROM HALIFAX ON INSPECTION TRIP

A VISITOR TO THE CITY TODAY WAS COLONEL J. A. GRANT OF HEADQUARTERS, HALIFAX, ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF MEDICAL UNITS, WHO MADE A THOROUGH INSPECTION OF THE LOCAL MILITARY PROPERTIES, QUARTERS OF THE MEN ON DUTY, AND DEVOTED SOME TIME TO THE MATTER OF SANITATION AND OTHER DETAILS.

A little after noon today the men of the 26th Battalion marched off to the vicinity of the golf links to carry out a programme of field exercises in attack and defence. They returned to the city about five o'clock. Although no word as yet has been definitely received concerning the matter of the arrival of the 173 horses for the Army Service unit in West St. John, Stables have been secured for their housing. A portion of the big stables of A. C. Smith & Co., on the west side has been arranged for, while some of the animals will be quartered at the remount depot at the armory. Extra stalls have been built there. It is understood that the purchase of the horses, which will be used by the unit, is now well advanced, but no advices have been received as to when they may be expected.

BURY BABY BOY ALIVE IN SNOW

Terrible Affair in Which Three Ontario Lads are Implicated Found After Hours, Badly Frozen

Stratford, Ont., Jan. 22—In a spirit of childish mischief, three small boys nearly caused the death of four-year-old Jack McDougall, son of Mrs. Thomas McDougall of Harrington, on Wednesday night. Jack Craig, Waldon Soehner and Robert Smith, with whom the little fellow was playing, took off his cap, shoes and stockings, placed a box over him and buried the boy alive in the snow. The lad's mother instituted a search, but failed to locate him. One of the boys was rescued from sleep and questioned repeatedly, but disclaimed any knowledge of his comrade's whereabouts.

GERMANS CAUGHT WITH CONTRABAND

Amsterdam via London, Jan. 22—The Telegraph in illustrating the close watch the Dutch are keeping against the smuggling of contraband across the border, states that just before a German freight train left Venlo at midnight, for Rotterdam, the customs officials seized a car loaded with cauliflower under which they found a large shipment of leather. The German trainmen were arrested.

GERMANS FIGHT FERCELY IN WESTERN THEATRE; BUT ALLIES HOLD THEM

In Two Places Enemy Recapture Portion of Trenches Previously Lost—Evidences of Severe Work—Austrians Make Stand in Carpathians

Paris, Jan. 22—The French War Office this afternoon gave out the following: "In Belgium the enemy yesterday bombarded Nieuport with a fair degree of violence. Our infantry made some slight progress to the east of the Lombaert-zijde highway. Between Ypres and the Oise successful operations on the part of our artillery against field works, batteries and detachments of infantry of the enemy took place yesterday. "From the Oise to the Argonne the situation in the vicinity of Soissons shows no change. Near Berry-Aux-Bac, a trench which we were compelled to evacuate, following a violent bombardment, was recaptured by us. In the region of Perthes, the enemy delivered an attack during the night of January 20-21 at a point northwest of Beausjour, but without success. "Between the Meuse and the Moselle, to the southeast of St. Mihiel in the forest of Apremont, an exceedingly violent bombardment made it impossible for us to retain the German trenches occupied by us yesterday for a distance of 150 yards. "To the northwest of Pont-A-Mousson, in the forest of LePrete, the enemy yesterday recaptured a portion of the trenches taken by us on January 20, but we are maintaining ourselves at all other points of this position. "In the Vosges the enemy hurled against St. Die six projectiles of great calibre without, however, doing any serious damage. "At a point between Meunier, Bonhomme and Mount Schlicht there has been an artillery engagement in which the German batteries were reduced to silence. In Alsace the infantry fighting in the region of Hartmann and Wellerkopf is going on with great ferocity. The struggle is actually hand to hand."

MR. SCHOFIELD WILL REMAIN CHAIRMAN

H. B. Schofield has decided not to press his resignation as chairman of the St. John County Hospital commissioners while the building is in process of erection and equipment, as requested by the county council at Tuesday's meeting. The commissioners have met since their appropriation was reduced and decided to make no protest. Their ability to get through the year to press for completion by July 25, which would allow for opening on August 1, in which case the money on hand would hardly be sufficient to last until the end of the year. Excellent progress is now being made with the inside work on the building.

EXPIATORY SERVICE IS ANNOUNCED BY POPE

Rome, Jan. 22—The Pope today held a private and public consistory. He pronounced several bishops and delivered an allocution dealing chiefly with the war. He emphasized the neutrality of the papacy and referred to his efforts to mitigate the disastrous consequences of the conflict. He urged his hearers not to heed those conditions which separated the faithful, but rather to consider those which made them brothers in the faith, and he called upon the invaders of territory of the enemy not to commit excesses.

DRIVEN TO LIVE IN HOLES IN SNOW

London, Jan. 22—A despatch from Kiev, Russia, to Reuters' says: "Hiding from the Austrians, who are retreating from Bukovina the population of the Carpathians have left their homes and are living in holes dug in the deep snow, where many are perishing from exposure and starvation. Their plight is rendered more dangerous by hungry wolves that are hunting them."

HEAVY ARTILLERY FIRING

Berlin, Jan. 22—Exceptionally heavy artillery firing is going on in the region of Germany and Thann in Alsace. The German wounded say, according to reports that the frozen ground makes shell fire more deadly as the projectiles in striking the hard surface, explode with increased violence, scattering frozen clods of earth which cause ugly wounds.

GERMAN TORPEDO SINKS A BRITISH STEAMER

London, Jan. 22—The British steamer Durward, says a Rotterdam despatch to Reuters' Telegram Company, has been torpedoed by a German submarine. The Durward was bound from Leith to Rotterdam and was struck by the torpedo while twenty two miles off the coast of the Maas Lightship. The crew took the boat and reached the lightship from which a Dutch pilot boat conveyed them to Rotterdam.

TOURIST ASSOCIATION TALKS OVER SITUATION WITH GRANT CUT OFF

The advisability of discontinuing the work of the N. B. Tourist Association was discussed this morning at a meeting of the directors with F. A. Dykeman, the president, in the chair, but it was decided to take no action until the annual meeting. While the association is not short of funds at present, the withdrawal of the grant of \$750 would seriously affect their plans for 1915. The 50,000 booklets which the association distributes have already been ordered and the directors felt they were placed in a rather unpleasant position by the unexpected withdrawal of civic aid with nothing but the provincial grant of \$1,500 to depend on.

BOYS IN TROUBLE

In the juvenile court this morning Magistrate Ritchie gave orders that the parents of three young boys: William and James Moore and Charles Connell, who gave themselves up last night when they learned that the police were seeking them in connection with a recent robbery in Trenton's grocery store, Coburg street, be summoned to court. The boys were not brought into court. The two Moore brothers were recently allowed out on five years suspended sentence by Judge Forbes on a charge of stealing. Their case will in all probability be dealt with this afternoon.

HINTS FOR THE COOK

Not Bread. One pint of water, half yeast cake, one tablespoon salt, two cups of rolled oats, half cup molasses, two tablespoons lard, four to make stiff (one quart) one pound cut up walnuts. Set over night as any bread. Chocolate Custard. Cook 4 teaspoons cocoa in 1/2 cup hot water till thick, then add 4 cups hot milk. Pour over 2 well beaten eggs and stir well. Strain into a pudding dish and steam 20 minutes. Serve with whipped cream piled on top, sweetened and flavored. One cup sugar should be added to the custard. Delicious Dark Pudding. One-half cup molasses, one-half cup of brown sugar, one-half cup of sour milk, one-third cup of melted butter, one egg, one-half teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon of baking powder, one teaspoon of cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon of cloves, a little nutmeg, one-half cup of walnut meats cut in small pieces, one cup of chopped raisins, one cup of currants, one quarter pound of citron cut in small slices, two cups of sifted flour. ELIOT SEES NO ROAD TO PEACE IN RELIGION

Only Hope, He Says, Is in Law and Faith Keeping Nations.

"Roads to Peace?" is the title of an article by President Emeritus Charles W. Eliott of Harvard in The Cosmopolitan, a monthly publication connected with the activities of the allied Cosmopolitan Clubs of the American continent. The article and others by Prof. Hugo Münsterberg and Prof. Anesaki were obtained by Alexis J. Krachmalnikoff, a Harvard junior. Mr. Krachmalnikoff shortly afterward received notice that he must join the Russian army and he left recently for the fighting zone. Dr. Eliott in his article says in part: "The existing roads toward peace are not short, but long and arduous. What ever increases the general intelligence and mutual understanding of neighboring peoples will promote peace in the world. If other conditions are favorable so that universal elementary education on the whole leads toward peace, in spite of the fact that some of the best educated nations today are also highly belligerent. Constitutional government, liberty of association, and good courts all tend toward peace. Dr. Eliott says. Then he continues: "The various roads all lead to a slow, gradual amelioration of the condition of the human race. Must we await the completion of this slow process before we can expect the advent of universal peace? Is there no shorter road? If there be any shorter road, it must lie through the region of ethics.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES

It is suggested that tourist traffic to Great Britain may be discouraged this year on account of the war. Russia has appropriated \$30,000,000 for the relief of the people in the region of Warsaw. An opera, The Golden Age, has just been copyrighted in Canada. The author is Joseph N. Doyle of Belleville. It was presented in Toronto next month. Fire in Salem today caused \$25,000 loss. Canada's parliament will open a week from next Thursday. It is estimated that war revenue of \$150,000,000 will have to be raised.

The interior of the legislative building is being renovated in preparation for opening of the house. Three inches of snow fell here tonight.

WAR NOTES

Another defeat of Turks by Russians is reported. It is officially announced that only a small portion of the Canadian troops have gone to the front from Salisbury Plain. Noted Frenchman Dead. Paris, Jan. 21—George Thiébaud, a well known French publicist, died yesterday. He was born at Toulouse in 1850. "They are all alike in this respect—Greek, Roman, Lutheran, and Anglican. Each national church supports the National government, and every ruler is as belligerent."

GERMAN DEFENSIVE BROKEN AS WAS THEIR OFFENSIVE

"The German offensive has been broken, the German defensive will be broken in its turn," says an official statement given out by the French war office yesterday summarizing the operations from November 18 to January 18. According to the statement the allies made ten general advances and the Germans twenty voluntary withdrawals, the only pronounced German gain being the victory northeast of Soissons, where the French lost from 1,800 to 1,850 yards. Holland has asked Germany for an explanation of a report that German airships passed over the Netherlands on their way to attack England. Great Britain has found time to deal with the Mad Mullah, who has been stirring up scissions in Somaliland and his adherents have been defeated and scattered.

A HALF CENTURY OF NEGRO PROGRESS

(Presbyterian Witness.)
Statistics just contributed to the New York Evening Post show surprising progress on the part of the negro race during the last half century. Fifty-three years ago the negroes in the United States numbered only 4,000,000. They had just emerged from a long period of bondage and were dependent, helpless, friendless wards of the nation. A great race lay before the negro, in the struggle for a place in the national life of his country. Fifty-three years after the signing of the immortal document giving him his freedom, he stands today no longer a dependent, friendless ward of the nation, but an integral part of its national life and conscience. He numbers over ten million people scattered throughout the nation, from an ignorant and inefficient laborer, he has become a competent and effective laborer. There are over 2,000,000 farmers, 36,000 miners, 20,000 barbers, 21,000 teachers, 15,000 clergymen, 2,200 physicians, 2,000,000 mistresses of independent homes, and 2,000,000 children in the public schools. From a penniless slave he pays taxes on property valued at \$750,000,000. His part in the national government is contributed in the 9,000 negro officers in the executive service of the nation, and in the state and municipal civil service he holds at least 10,000 offices. He furnishes four competent regiments to the regular army, and contributes 600,000

CANADA'S EXPORT TRADE

St. John Interested in Discussion at Ontario Meeting

Problem of Extension—Some C. P. R. Views—The Case of a Shipment of Leather Sent to This City

Berlin, Ont., Jan. 22.—A representative meeting of Waterloo county manufacturers was held here yesterday, to consider the extension of Canada's export trade. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, in writing about the matter, said: "The C. P. R. Company would gladly lend its aid for patriotic reasons, if not for selfish reasons."

H. P. Timmerman, C. P. R. industrial commissioner, said that both the home and foreign markets were worthy of attention. He expressed the opinion that the Canadian manufacturers should have some one in Ottawa to keep in touch with the department of trade and commerce. He laid special stress on the home market, which was a valuable one, well worthy of investigation by the manufacturer.

George Peppall, assistant foreign freight agent of the G. T. R., said something should be done to assist the small manufacturers in securing a part of the foreign trade. There were many smaller concerns, able to compete on the foreign market, but which could not afford to keep paid agents in foreign fields.

L. J. Brethaupt, president of the Brethaupt Leather Company, Berlin, who are large exporters, said he would like to see something done by the transportation companies in transporting to the seaboard goods for export. He cited a case where his firm shipped a car of leather on December 18, for St. John, N. B., and it arrived only yesterday.

A committee of trade in the county with D. B. Detweiler as chairman, was appointed to investigate the matter more fully.

OFFERS \$500 FOR CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY WORK

St. John Lady Will Give This If Others Make Up Sufficient

AN ENCOURAGING NOTE

In Face of Withdrawal of City Grants, Organizations Will Hope Other Generous Friends Will Help in Time of Need

The first response to the appeal of those organizations which have been handicapped by the withdrawal of grants is of such a nature as should not only give great encouragement to those interested in the work of these organizations but should inspire other generous citizens to give substantial assistance.

The Children's Aid Society of St. John never got beyond the point of organizing, because it had no funds. Nine months ago the Municipal Council granted \$1,500 but the amount was not available from any of its funds last year, and the general reduction in estimates prevented its being placed on the list for assessment this year.

Yesterday, however, a lady who is deeply interested in children, and who deeply regretted that the required grant was not available, informed A. M. Heiding, the president of the society, that she would contribute \$500 if a sufficient additional sum could be secured to begin the society's work on a permanent basis.

If two other citizens contributed a like amount the \$1,500 would be available, and the society would be in a position to begin its work on a small scale at least; and, once established, the value of the institution would be so well illustrated that it would never lack friends in the future.

The action of the lady in question will give great encouragement to all the organizations whose grants have been withdrawn to hope that every one of them will also find many generous friends in this time of need.
