PREMIER FLEMMING.

Premier Fleming has been talking to the Standard. At least the Standard says so, and its assurance may be accepted for the purpose of this article.

The report of yesterday afternoon's proceedings in the matter of the Southampton Railway, printed in today's Times, is very interesting reading for the electors of New Brunswick.

The citizens of St. John will watch very keenly the course of justice in the matter of criminals, and even minor offenders, brought before the courts during the next few months.

A group of big boys had a cache of stolen goods near Long Lake. A group of small boys had a cache of stolen goods near the foot of Orange street. And yet there are those who would discredit the suggestion that there are gangs among the boys.

The Chatham World, referring to certain champions of Premier Fleming, says: "Those who proclaim his innocence in advance and assail everybody as scurrilous and vicious who wants the charges inquired into, are injuring instead of helping him."

The three immigrants at Dalhousie who were jailed for taxes, almost before they had got fairly settled in the place, will not be likely to write home to their friends and tell them what a fine place New Brunswick is for settlers from the old country.

The question most frequently asked in St. John at the present time relates to the condition of Policeman Frank E. O'Leary, whose gallant and apparently more hopeful fight with death, following his splendid example of courage and devotion to duty, has stirred all hearts to sympathy.

Will the recent revelations of youthful delinquency move the citizens of St. John to take some action to surround the boys with better influences, and try to give them something better to do than read pernicious literature, form gangs and commit petty crimes?

One of the ships of Canada's "tin-pot navy," the Rainbow, has been accepted by the British government as a part of the Behring Sea patrol. Thanks to the Laurier government, Canada is able to do at least this much in the matter of giving assistance to the home government.

The Times prints today some observations made by the London Journal of Commerce, touching the matter of the safety of navigation in the Bay of Fundy. In view of wholly incorrect statements made from time to time by those who have an interest in discrediting the port of St. John, the article is so influential a journal as the London Chamber of Commerce is of special value.

Still a Land of Promise. Some time ago two brothers in Jaffa—the apostolic Joppa, where the hungry Peter had the vision of things to be eaten—descended in a sheet from heaven, formed an apian on novel principles. They conceived the idea of furnishing the bees with the material for honey-making purposes through eight months of the year. Camping first at a low altitude they waited until the flowers of that locality were over, and then conveyed their bees on camels back to a higher place, thus following up the consecutive blossoming of different flowers. They were even able to separate the honey of these over-worked bees into "orange-blossom honey," "thyme honey" and "lavender honey."

The experiment has been sufficient to show how very capable is this ancient method of honey production. By using modern extracting machinery and replacing the combs one hundred hives were made to yield six tons of honey in the year. This is nearly three times as much honey per hive as the maximum yield on the honey farms of Australia and America.

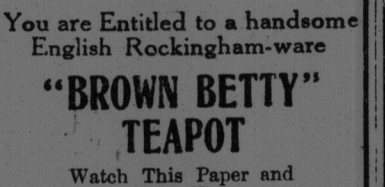

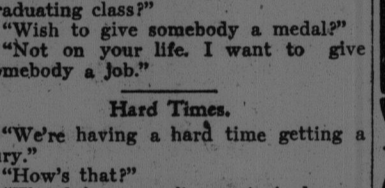

TESTING CIGARS (London T.H.B.) A well-known cigar expert has been dispelling some popular misconceptions about the fragrant weed. He alluded to the belief that the whiter the ash and the longer it holds on, the better the cigar. This is quite wrong, he said. The length of the ash depends on the size of the pieces used in the filler, and a clear steel-grey ash denotes the best Havana. Then, again, nearly every man will reject a spotted cigar, but the spots mean absolutely nothing as regards quality. Most men think they can tell a cigar by squeezing it or smelling. Neither test is the slightest good. And every smoker believes that a dark wrapper denotes a strong cigar, a light one a mild cigar. The color has nothing whatever to do with the strength. As a matter of fact, for the average smoker there are practically no outward indications of the quality of a cigar. The only test for the non-expert is in smoking it.

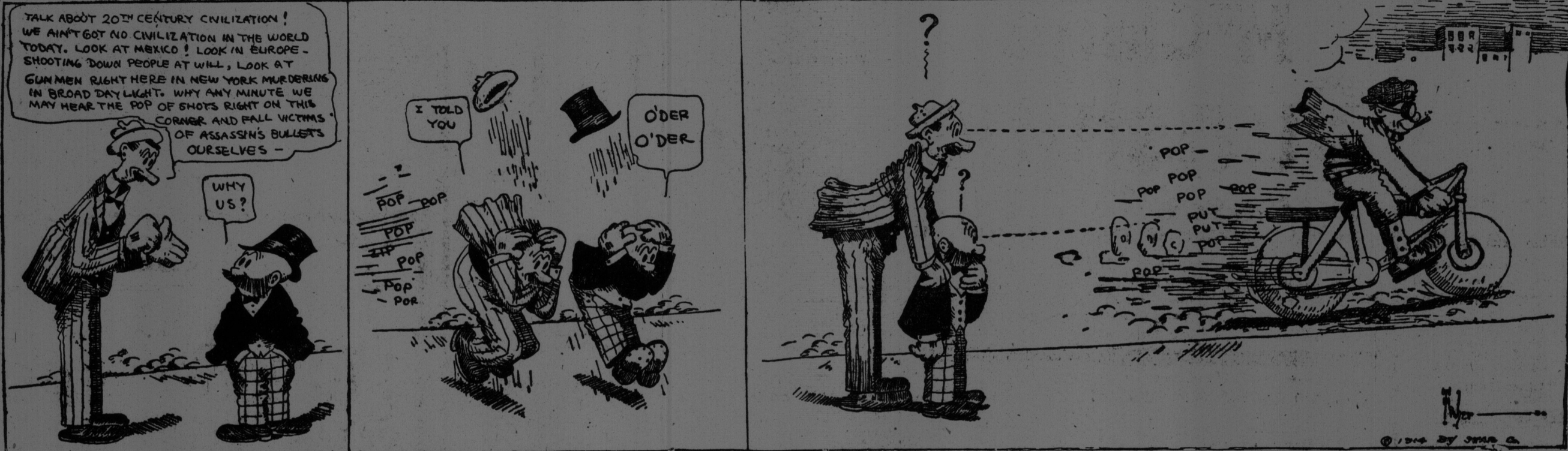

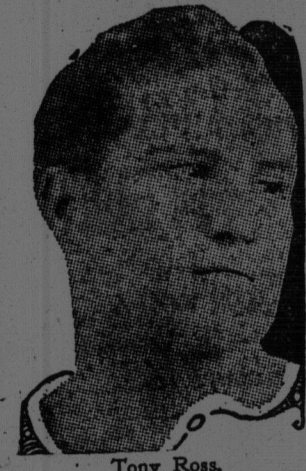

FORFEITED GAME BRINGS UP POINT IN BASEBALL; FULLERTON CALLS BACK RULE A JOKE

(By Hugh S. Fullerton.)

Washington's recent forfeit of a game to the Athletics revives a condition that the baseball law-makers should have remedied long ago.

The biggest joker in the rules of the National games is in the two defining a legal pitch and a balk. Regardless of the justice of Umpire Ollie Chill's decision in striving to compel Engel to deliver the ball legally to the batter and his forfeit of the game when Griffith and his pitcher refused to obey the order; Griffith had just cause of complaint. Chill undoubtedly was right; yet at the same time he was inflicting a punishment upon Engel for an offense against the rules that is indulged in by every pitcher, almost in the country.

The pitchers, or most of them, either "sneak a step" or take a hop in delivering the ball, instead of standing upon the rubber, facing the batter, as prescribed in the rules.

No one knows this better than Manager Griffith. When he was a pitcher he cheated the rule almost every time he pitched—and did it so cleverly that it took a trained eye to tell whether he



took a step while pitching or whether he stepped ahead of the pitcher to get the drive of his body into the pitch. Usually the pitchers stick close to the law until the situation becomes threatening. Then, knowing that the umpires cannot watch everything, commence to take a step. They all do it, either hopping clear of the rubber or swinging the foot back and then forward. Engel must have made it rather rare.

It is rather picturesque justice that Griffith should be punished for this as he is one of the greatest sappers at opposing pitchers who offend. He constantly appeals to umpires to "watch his foot" usually knowing that the umpire will not penalize the pitcher, but hoping to make the pitcher change his motion and step through fear of punishment.

The balk rule is just as much a joke to the skilled pitcher. He works months to perfect a "balk motion" which is merely a balk made in such a way as to draw detection by an umpire. Every manager insists upon his pitchers developing balk motions.

We had a discussion on the problem of balks at the White Sox park not long ago. Three of us agreed to jot down what we thought were balks; Jim Scott made eleven. In five innings, his opponent, nine in six innings—and not one was called and only three claimed. There were twenty balks that we three agreed were balks under the rule—and the umpires paid no attention to them.

Plainly something ought to be done; either permit balking, or amend the rule so as to stop it entirely and make more base running—which was the idea when the rule was made.
