invoke the principle of limited liability in war and that all parts of the empire must sink or swim together. He expressed much sympathy with the school of political thought, which had arisen, more prominently in Canada, which objected to being obliged to spend their blood and treasure in any war which did not affect their rights and interests, and which they might hold to be morally indefensible.

Hence arose a disposition to say that their armed forces should be entirely under their control. He did not think that Great Britain disputed that, but neutrality and belligerency were functions of sovereign states. A power could no more be neutral in part and belligerent in part than a man could be married in part and single in part. No foreign country would recognize any such "in and out" arrangement.




