



Ottawa, July 23—With a view to investigating the oft repeated charges that steam trawling is destructive and will eventually end in the total killing off of the fish supply the governments of Canada, Newfoundland and the United States have decided to appoint competent officers to personally probe into and report upon the matter. The department of marine and fisheries will send two officers on a fishing expedition with steam trawlers so that the information secured will be first hand and reliable.





NEAR KAMLOOPS

Human Bones and Archaelogical specimens Presented to National Museum

The Canadian Northern Pacific Railway has just given to the national museum of Canada, at Ottawa, a collection of human bones and archaelogical specimens found during the construction of the western part of the road near Kamloops, B. C. The objects were sent by Mr. T. G. Holt attorney for Mackenzie, Mann & Co., at Vancouver. This was done in compliance with orders by Mr. MacKenzie issued on behalf of the Dominion Archaeologist by Mr. Holt to the engineers on the construction work.

The bones are those of three men and were not buried very deep. They were place did by side, and were found a little below the highest water mark. The discovery was made accidentally. These bones will be turned over to the Physical Anthropologist who is very expert in this line of work, having been trained at Oxford University, England.

The specimens include ten objects made of copper, two small copper tubes, and an axe head made of stone.

At the Eliks' convention in Portland, or George N. Henry of Steubenville, O., exhibited a coat of elk hide decorated with 4000 elk and antelope teeth. To make possible the decorations on the front of the coat, 150 antelopes were killed. It took him more than 12 years to finish it and it cost about \$10,000.



On Monday of last week there went into effect in the United Kingdom an act providing for a far-reaching system of national insurance of employed persons which has been the subject at once of the most vigorus criticism and of thorough-going laudation. This is the so-called National Health Insurance law, under which, with certain exceptions, every person between the ages of sixteen and seventy in the service of an employer must be insured. 
