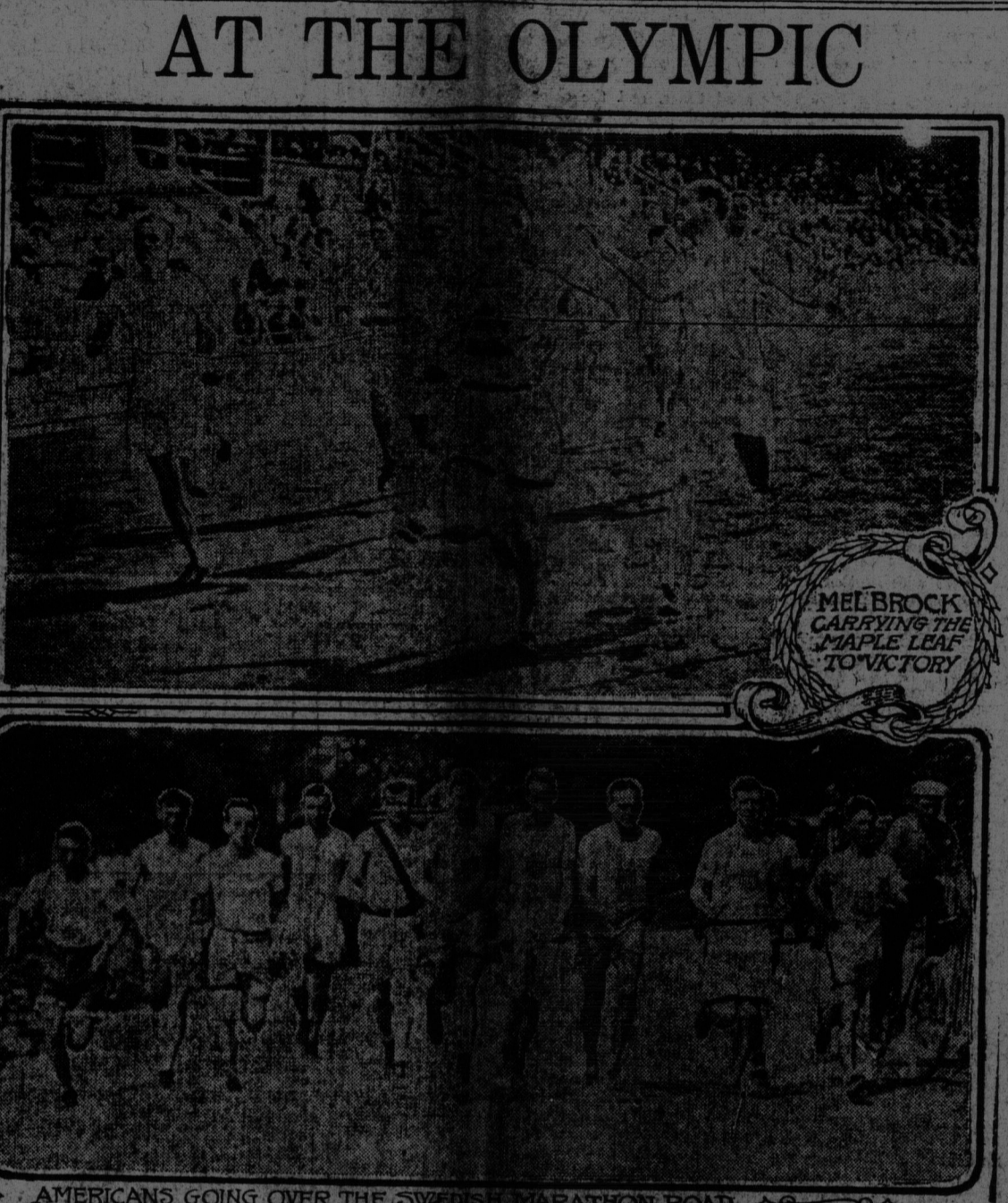

BOURASSA'S OPINION OF ANNEXATION

Article by Nationalist Leader Shows Leaning Towards That Direction

EFFECT ON FRENCH

Says They Have Nothing to Lose in Language or Religion—Sees Hope of Escape From Orange Influence

Mr. Henri Bourassa, the ally of Mr. Borden, has written in *Le Devoir* an article which favors strongly of annexation. The article is headed—"The Annexation, Spectra and Why French-Canadians No Longer Fear It," and contends that the French language and the Roman Catholic religion would be just as secure under the American Union as they are in Canada today.

The Nationalist leader declares that in the past French-Canadians strenuously opposed anything like annexation, but they are beginning to look the utility of their efforts, seeking in vain any gratitude on the part of their English-speaking compatriots.

After complaining of the infrequent use of the French tongue in parliament, in the courts of law, and elsewhere, Mr. Bourassa replies to the claim that once absorbed in the American Union, disaster would come to the French tongue and to the Roman Catholic faith.

As for religion, asks the writer, what difference is there to the advantage of the Roman Catholic faith between the constitution and the laws of the English provinces and the laws and constitution of the United States? In social life, in the press, and among the general public, Catholics are not less respected over there than in the most enlightened provinces of the confederation; while in no state do they hold up to ridicule by an Orange order.

"In no state," he declares, "do French-Canadians hear insults such as 'bristled Canadian population,' or 'comparing with the bishops and the pope to endanger the liberties of the American people,' as is the case in Canada."

"In the United States, too, the people let the faithful see their bishops and their family troubles between themselves, while in the Dominion Orange lodges and political demagogues work together as agents of persecution."

Speaking of the school question, he says there is no difference between the situation of French-Canadians in the United States and the position of those in the English-speaking provinces in which no separate schools exist. In the states, further, the Catholics had no previous rights, but in the dominion their rights were taken away from them, even when guaranteed by the law and by the most solemn promises which statesmen could make.

"As to the French language," declares Mr. Bourassa, "it is no shelter in Canada that it would lose by annexation to the United States." The usage of the French tongue in Manitoba, in the west territories has been abolished with the consent of the Canadian parliament. In Ontario the French tongue enjoys justice, hostility and hate unknown in the American Republics.

"Hervard," says the writer, "has done more for French culture than all similar Canadian institutions together, with the exception of McGill. French is spoken more correctly in the higher society circles of Boston, New York and Washington than it is in Toronto, or even in the English section of Montreal."

INTERESTING FIND NEAR KAMLOOPS

Human Bones and Archaeological Specimens Presented to National Museum

The Canadian Northern Pacific Railway has just given to the national museum of Canada, at Ottawa, a collection of human bones and archaeological specimens found during the construction of the western part of the road near Kamloops, B. C. The objects were sent by Mr. T. G. Holt, attorney for Macdonald, Mann & Co., Vancouver. This was done in compliance with orders by Mr. MacKenzie issued on behalf of the Dominion Archaeologists by Mr. Holt to the engineers on the construction work.

The bones are those of three men and were not buried very deep. They were placed side by side, and were found a little below the highest water mark. The discovery was made accidentally. These bones will be turned over to the Physical Anthropologist who is very expert in this line of work, having been trained at Oxford University, England.

The specimens include ten objects made of copper, two small copper tubes, and an axe head made of stone.

At the Elker convention in Portland, Or., George N. Henry of Stenbenville, Or., exhibited a coat of elk hide decorated with 6000 elk and antelope teeth. To make possible the decorations on the front of the coat, 150 antelopes were killed. It took him more than 12 years to finish it and it cost about \$10,000.

PREMIER BORDEN'S INSINCERITY IN BRITISH JOURNALS

Platitudes Instead of Promises—Tricks to Avoid Action—Playing the Party Game

(Moncton Transcript)

The British people are beginning to size up Premier Borden's insincerity in the naval contribution matter. Lofty sentiment does very well for one speech, but John Bull is both sentimental and practical when Mr. Borden's second speech came with diluted platitudes John Bull began to be interested and quite sure that Mr. Borden's contention that an Imperial Council should be formed before assistance was merely a political trick to avoid doing anything. The true imperialist it is now recognized is Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He started on a programme which would have materially helped the Mother Country. Mr. Borden, Canada is told, was taken into the imperial government's confidence and shown how imminent is the German peril. But what does Mr. Borden do? In the face of the prospective enemy's advance he wants an Imperial Council called to discuss issues along academic lines. But what the Empire needs from Canada is not the present of an academic theory but a substantial contribution permanently to the solution of the problem of Imperial naval defence. Little wonder that The London, England Daily News says—

"Beginning with an imperial council of defence would be more troublesome than the immediate adoption of an entirely new system. An imperial council of defence by itself could not be recognized with imperial autonomy, and would commit the dominions to imperial federation."

To impartial onlookers it would seem as if Mr. Borden were more interested in England in trying to play the game of Tory party over there than in promoting the true interests of Canada and the Empire. His throwing the question of an imperial council into the field of discussion as a condition for helping in the naval defence of the Empire, is not only indefensible, but it is ungrateful. Great Britain has hitherto been defending Canada, and if Canada is today growing into a mighty country, which is free from political control by the adjoining republic, it is because it has grown under the protecting arm of a mighty Empire. Mr. Borden sets aside ungratefully this fact and wastes now to discuss an academic question before Canada grants aid towards naval defence even though the prospective enemy is knocking at the door of the empire's heart.

It is little wonder then that the British newspapers are viewing Mr. Borden with suspicion.

The Daily Chronicle (Liberal) tells Mr. Borden that Great Britain is under no compulsion to decide this question quickly, and that time may work out the problem, but it cannot be pushed.

The Westminster Gazette (Liberal) says that the British parliamentary institutions are developing in the federal direction, but that at present the Dominions would be outvoted if they were in an imperial federation. This may be changed within a lifetime but at present "Canada's eyes must be fixed to do everything to help, and nothing to hinder the effective union within the present century."

No Canadian statesman has ever before had his duty pointed out to him so bluntly as has Mr. Borden by the Journal quoted.

The Morning Post, ultra Tory, as it is, is not satisfied with Mr. Borden's declaration and says that the attempt to force the pace can only result in disaster.

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PROVISIONS OF HEALTH INSURANCE ACT

Legislation Which is Causing Trouble to British Government. CHIEF FEATURES. Almost Every Worker Must be Insured—The Exceptions—Employers and Employees Both Contribute.

On Monday last week there went into effect in the United Kingdom an act providing for a far-reaching system of national insurance of employed persons which has been the subject of one of the most vigorous criticisms and of thorough-going legislation.

The chief interest of the Fifteenth Abstract of Labor Statistics for the United Kingdom lies in the evidence which it affords that the increase in the cost of living and the rise of prices are continuing.

The Northern Territorial Railway company will operate a line of steamships from the Hudson's Bay terminal to a British port.

The completion of the railway meant the opening of a vast empire, which only a few years ago was regarded as a barren waste and useful only as a hunting ground for the fur-trader and the sportsman.

Another important outlet for the north country is a system projected by the Alberta, Peace River & Eastern Railway company, capitalized at \$10,000,000 under a charter granted by the Dominion government in 1907.

I am greatly interested with the country and its possibilities. I have spent a month looking it over and it is all more than I was told about it. The railway is a good thing.

The route for which the charter was granted begins at the International boundary, south of Pincher Creek, Alberta, and thence to Pincher Creek, thence northward and west of Pigeon Lake, thence northward and west of Pigeon Lake, thence northward and west of Pigeon Lake, thence northward and west of Pigeon Lake.

The present charter is a combination of routes previously chartered under the Dominion and provincial governments. Charters for practically the same route, with the exception of the eastern portion, from the Peace River country to Hudson's Bay, are held by the Canadian Northern and the Alberta Pacific companies, which, however, have not done any of the construction work called for under their charters.

The provincial government of Alberta already has guaranteed the construction of that portion of the line of the Alberta, Peace River & Eastern Railway between Pincher Creek and a point west of Edmonton, and thence to the Pacific coast.

Premier Sifton, when seen at the government building, expressed the opinion that 600 more miles of railway will be in operation at the opening of the next session of the legislature than when the last session was prorogued. This estimate, he added, does not include the mileage on the main lines of the transcontinental roads, now building westward, which may be completed and in readiness for freight and passenger traffic in the meantime.

Premier Sifton would not say where the lines will run. However he intimated that the additional mileage is composed also of numerous new towns will dot the main. The additional mileage is composed solely of lines for which the province of Alberta has guaranteed bonds in the acts passed by the legislature.

SMALL APPLE CROP. The present indications show that the apple crop on Prince Edward Island will be short this season. The early apples have set fairly well, but the early fall and winter apples are making a poor showing.

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MARRIAGE LAW CASE BEFORE HOUSE OF LORDS

Wallace Nesbitt, K. C., Opens Argument for Appellants—Claims Canadian Parliament Has Power to Enact Federal Marriage Law

London, July 22.—In the privy council chamber at Whitehall today the opening arguments were heard in an appeal which will undoubtedly rank as historic in the annals of Canada. The famous marriage law case, involving the principle of the N. T. Temere Decree of the Roman Catholic church. The case came before Lord Chief Justice Halsbury, Lord Loreburn and Lord Haldane, ex-lord chancellor; Lord Macnaughton, Lord Atkinson, Lord Shaw and Chief Baron Pallas.

Wallace Nesbitt, E. F. LaFleur and Geoffrey Lawrence appeared to argue the case for the domestic government; Mr. Mignault and Mr. Hellmuth were present to argue other questions incidental to the case; E. C. Smith and A. Godfrin represented the attorney-general of Quebec.

Wallace Nesbitt Opens. This morning Wallace Nesbitt opened with a formal recital of the grounds of appeal. The first question for the court to decide, he said, was: "Has the parliament of Canada authority to enact in whole or in part Bill 3 of the first session of the twelfth parliament of Canada?"

The lord chancellor—"That was an act which is a Roman Catholic law." Mr. Nesbitt—"Yes, and the bill provides the following amendments." He quoted paragraph three: "Every ceremony or form of marriage, and the paragraph commencing 'Rights and duties as married people.'"

Mr. Shaw—"What the reference asks us to say is whether the provisions are all within the authority of parliament, and if not, which one is not." Mr. Nesbitt agreed, and proceeded to read question: "Does the law of Quebec render null and void unless contracted before a Roman Catholic priest, a marriage otherwise legally binding between (a) persons both Roman Catholics; (b) persons of whom one is a Roman Catholic?"

The third question was if (a) or (b) were answered affirmatively or both, has the Canadian parliament authority to enact the existing marriages or marriages contracted hereafter as legal?

BORDEN STILL LACKS A POLICY

Notifies Colleagues That Naval Policy Will Be Discussed in September—Foster Abandon's Australian Trip

Ottawa, July 22.—The cabinet ministers have all been asked by Premier Borden to arrange their summer itineraries that they will all be back in the capital city in September, when a full cabinet session is desired for the purpose of evolving the government's naval policy as a first step towards preparing the legislative programme for the next session.

No definite announcement as to what the government will do in regard to the navy can be expected until after the September deliberations of the ministers here, and it is understood that Premier Borden will return from London without giving any definite promises to the admiralty as to what Canada is prepared to do.

The Laurier government's plan of a Canadian navy was practically settled at the conference of two years ago with the admiralty, within three months after the unanimous resolution of parliament was passed declaring for the creation of a Canadian navy in co-operation with the imperial fleet.

The present government will soon have been in office a year and your correspondent can state with authority that "nothing definite has been decided yet," and further delay of several months is certain before any definite action is taken.

Hon. George E. Foster's projected trip to Australia to confer with the commonwealth government on a reciprocal trade agreement with Canada, has been indefinitely postponed on the plea that the minister will have to be in Ottawa this fall to assist in the preparation of the government's policy in the various matters of importance that will have to be dealt with next session. Another reason for the change of plans is understood to be the fact that at present there is practically no more likelihood of any satisfactory or comprehensive agreement being reached with Australia than there was during the regime of the late administration when Canada's offers were repeatedly turned down by Australia.

BELIEVE MANY LOST IN NELSON STORM

Empty Pleasure Boats Driven Ashore—Much Damage by Wind and Wave

Nelson, B. C., July 22.—Several persons are said to have been drowned, the weight scales building was levelled to the ground, boardings were picked up and carried scores of feet, street cars and houses were struck by lightning, and gardens and glass houses were damaged by a terrific rain and hail storm, punctuated by frequent flashes of lightning which swept over Nelson about 7 o'clock Sunday evening and a similar but less severe storm on Saturday.

Scores of persons were on the lake in launches, rowboats and canoes when the heavy clouds burst yesterday and several were driven on the rocks. Numerous empty rowboats were seen from passenger steamers, but no names of missing have been reported.

CANADA WILL SHARE IN EMPIRE'S DEFENCE

Increased Naval Programme Outlined by First Lord of the Admiralty in House of Commons

Necessity of Keeping Pace With Germany's Mad Race for Armaments—Churchill Counts on Canada-Borden to Announce Policy After Consultation With Colleagues

London (through Reuter's Ottawa Agency), July 22.—Hon. Winston Churchill, the first lord of the admiralty, introducing in the house of commons this afternoon the supplementary naval estimates, said that the direct costs of these additional estimates were the net German navy law, which he proceeded to examine in detail.

His main feature, he said, was the increase in striking force of ships of all classes immediately available and its general effect was the maintenance of four-fifths of the German navy in full permanent readiness. This meant that in case of war, the British navy would be ready to meet the German navy at any particular point.

Such preparation was remarkable and, so far as he was aware, found no parallel in previous practice of modern naval powers. The German plans, he added, involved a remarkable expansion of strength and efficiency.

Mr. Churchill, discussing the general question of the growth of modern navies, said that "cool, steady and methodical preparation, prolonged over successive years, could raise the margin of naval power. No relief could be gained from impulsive and erratic action. We should learn from our German neighbors how to build in the future."

ITALIAN SHOT DEAD IN MONTREAL

Killing Takes Place on Crowded Street—Man Hunt Follows But Murderer Escapes

Montreal, July 22.—Murder followed by a man-hunt which proved unsuccessful took place at the corner of Latour and Ste. Genevieve streets at 7 o'clock this morning, when Salvatore Mercurio, a young Italian, who arrived here two weeks ago from Vancouver, was shot and killed by a man whose identity is unknown.

The shooting took place just as the two men had stepped out of a corner grocery store and in the presence of a dozen people. Three shots were fired, two entering the left breast and one the abdomen. Death was almost instantaneous. Some of the eye-witnesses made a shift to seize the murderer but he sprang his revolver and made off along Latour street.

The arrival of the police encouraged the man who had hung back and, headed by the officers, they set out in pursuit. The murderer was followed along Latour street down Rusby Lane and along Craig street to a crowd of spectators who were gathered in full communion. There would thus be thirty-three ships against Germany's twenty-three.

This might not, perhaps, be considered a very satisfactory proportion, but the arrangements proposed would, in the opinion of the admiralty, be adequate to the needs of the years 1914 and 1915.

MRS. MAGEE ADMITS THE MURDER OF SIX CHILDREN

In Signed Confession She Tells How She Poisoned Her Little Ones—Great Interest in Verdict

Charlottetown, July 22.—Mrs. McGee, the wife of a farmer near Georgetown (P. E. I.), who was found guilty of the murder of her six children, has since made a confession that they all met death at her hands. The confession, given to Duncan Stewart, of Georgetown, is as follows: "I, Minnie McGee, confess to having administered the ends of matches containing sulphur and phosphorus to my children in April last. I gave it to them in sugar and water. I was feeling bad at the time I did it."

(Signed) "MINNIE MCGEE." This statement was filed in the court today and is expected to have an influence in shaping the fate of the unfortunate woman. Professor Rattan was especially anxious that, if possible, a confession should be got from the woman. The whole case will make an exceedingly interesting addition to medico-legal happenings.

Found Guilty of Murder. Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 20.—The jury returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Mrs. McGee, charged with poisoning her children, with a recommendation to mercy.

Special interest was attached to the examination of Mrs. McGee herself. The particular feature of her testimony was the flat denial of many things concerning her disposition made during the coroner's inquest. Mrs. McGee disclaimed any knowledge of the notes and, being asked who she thought might have written them, answered she knew not unless the Mahars themselves. Mrs. McGee also contradicted flatly the evidence of the Mahars regarding the amounts of matches bought by her. Several of her statements were at variance with those sworn to previously. When asked whether she cared or not which were true she replied she cared but little. She declared she did not know what became of all the matches. She saw them, but did not give them to the children in milk or anything else. Several notes were produced in court ordering various things, and among them matches. The Mahars and Mrs. Hicken, who also kept a store, had sworn that these notes were brought to them by the McGee children.

Mr. Edwards said that the business in the northern part of New Brunswick at Bathurst, the same can be said of the big Nova Scotia centres. The erection of the big car works at New Glasgow and the new works and other factories at Sydney are keeping things on the move and creating quite a stir in the business atmosphere.

The iron industry in particular is in a very prosperous condition at present. The general prosperity throughout the country in addition to the big strikes on in England, has resulted greatly in increasing the prices of iron and also in increasing the output.

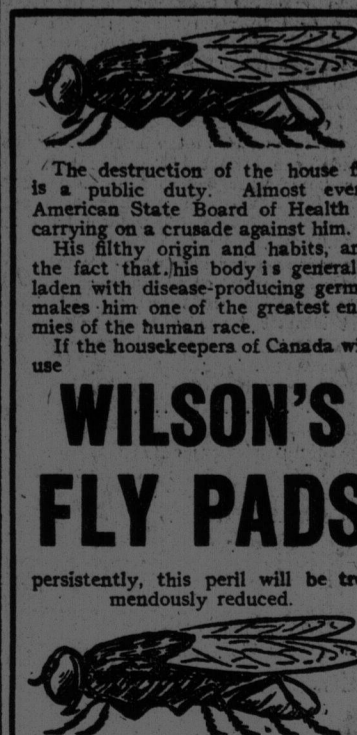
PERU TAKES ACTION TO END ATROCITIES

Many Responsible for Outrages, Have Been Arrested and Others Have Fled

Lima, Peru, July 22.—The immense distance between this city and the Butamayo rubber district, in regard to which Sir Roger Casement recently reported to the British foreign office that wholesale horrors had been committed on the natives, and the difficulties of communication, caused considerable delay in obtaining news from that region.

The Peruvian government, however, accompanied by a prefect and a body of troops to the district. On their approach several criminals escaped into the forests, while others fled to various countries from which the Peruvian government is asking for their extradition. As a consequence of the activity of the local police and the police several criminals have been arrested and are awaiting trial.

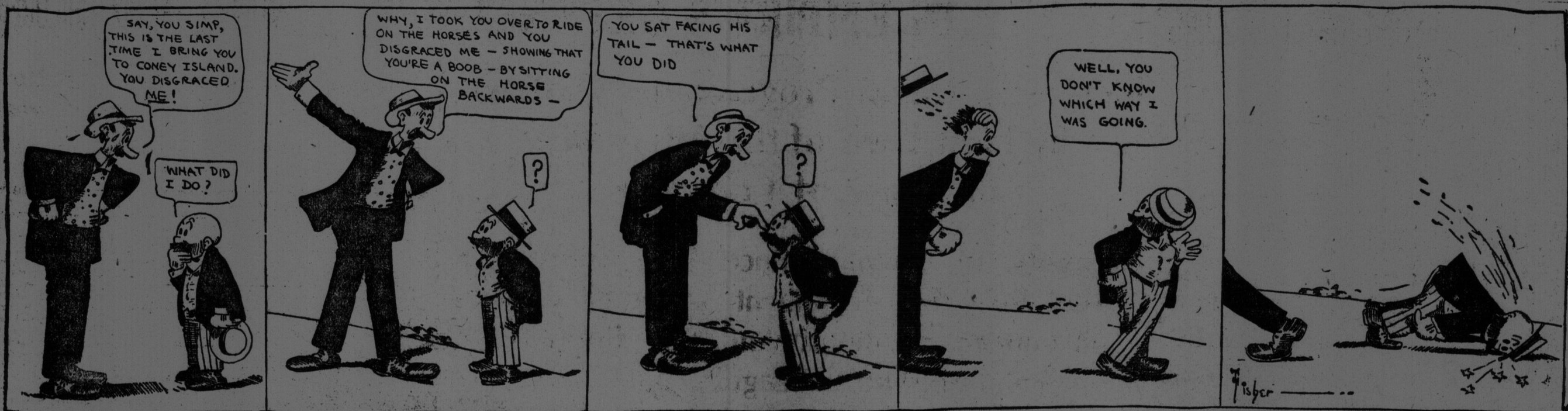

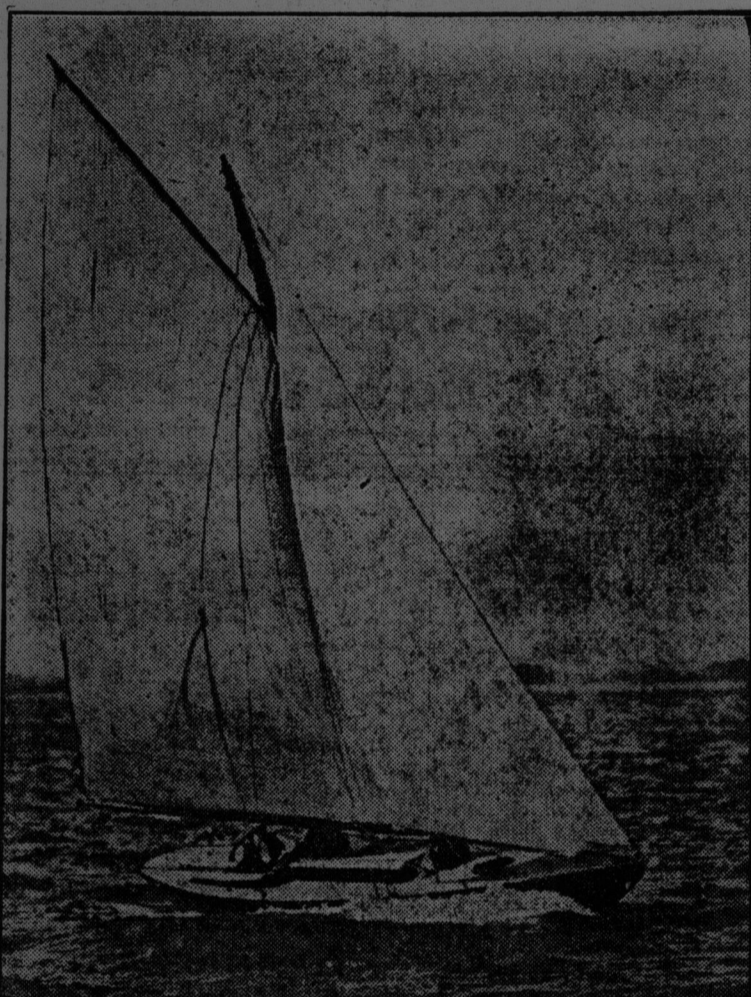
Baseball

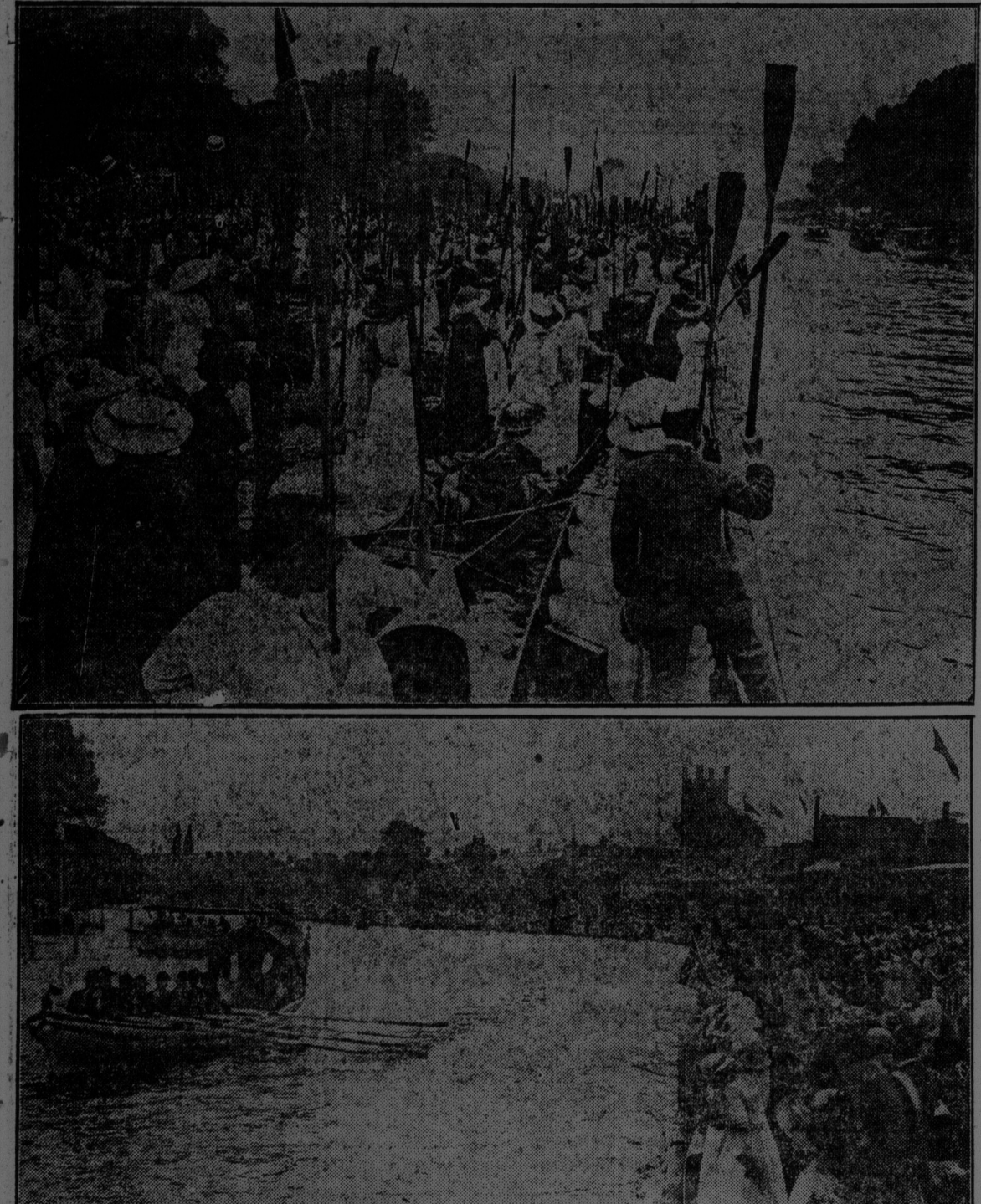
