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

This Institution, following the policy of the Methodism of the United States, has maintained and cherished the same in the cities between Toronto and Belleville. ## ALBERT COLLEGE.

This Institution, founded in 1854, was the product of the zeal and wise policy of the Methodism of that early day and grew out of the conviction that Schools for the Christian education of the youth of the Church should be maintained and cherished by the Church. The location is exceedingly favorable. The City of Belleville is one of the most important and enterprising cities between Toronto and Montreal. It has a population of about 10,000 and is situated on the historic Bay of Quinte, in the direct line of the Grand Trunk Railway, and is the southern terminus of Midland Division of the G. T. R. Its advantages as a location for a seat of learning had long been noticed before steps were taken for forming one in its vicinity. When the prosperity of Canada began to make the multiplication of faculties for higher education a necessity the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in 1854, adopted a scheme—initiated in the Bay of Quinte Conference in the preceding year—for the erection and maintenance of an Educational Institution in Belleville “designed to teach a system of classical, scientific, and commercial instruction, free from sectarian tenets and Religious tests, while its moral government is based on religious principles as revealed in the Holy Scriptures.” Having been chartered by Parliament in 1857, as “Belleville Seminary” it was opened in July of the same year and entered upon its work under very favorable auspices, with a superior staff of instructors and a large number of Students. In the year 1866, by Act of Parliament, the name was changed to “Albert College” and a Senate created with ample powers. By the terms of the Union of the Methodist Churches of Canada, Albert College was retained in Belleville and adopted by the General Conference of the United Church as a Church School. The Charter was amended and the College was affiliated to the Victoria University, Cobourg. As now constituted it has an ample teaching staff for imparting instruction to ladies and gentlemen in the advanced branches of a liberal education—and a Senate, with full power to examine and grant Prizes, Scholarships, Medals, Honor Certificates and Diplomas in Music, Fine Arts, Commercial Science, Collegiate Courses, &c.

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# CURRICULUM.

The fee for the Preliminary Examination is two dollars.

All Candidates whose names are returned by the Board of Examiners in the list of "Passed Candidates" are required to appear before the Senate and subscribe the Roll.

Diplomas in Collegiate Course will be awarded to all duly qualified Candidates who shall have passed satisfactory examinations in the subjects prescribed in the following course.

Candidates for Teachers' Certificates or special courses are not required to pass the Preliminary Examination, but must satisfy the Council as to their knowledge of Elementary work before entering upon more advanced studies.

Candidates for Honors in any Department must take the subjects prescribed for pass in the Department of English.

Each Candidate for examination in any year is required to give notice to the Registrar of the subject or subjects in which the examination is desired. Applications must in all cases be accompanied by the prescribed fee.

Diplomas of Graduation in the Collegiate Course are accepted *pro tanto* on Junior and Senior Matriculation by the Senate of Victoria University.



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## Special Courses.

### EMBRACING MATRICULATION, TEACHERS' COURSES, ETC.

Albert College is, by Act of Parliament, in affiliation with Victoria University and is especially fitted to prepare students for both Junior and Senior Matriculation in the different Arts and Faculties of that University.

Ample opportunity is also afforded to those preparing for the examinations of the Board of Provincial Surveyors, the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, the Ontario College of Pharmacy, the Law Society of Ontario and the Literary and Scientific portions of the various Theological Examinations, of which advantages many have availed themselves with marked success.

Albert College possesses peculiar advantages for the preparation of Candidates for Teachers' Certificates. Large Classes are annually prepared for these examinations, and with gratifying results.

Special attention is given to the preparation of candidates for examination in the preliminary course for the Ministry of the Methodist Church. All candidates for this examination, who are non-matriculated students, will find the classes in the Primary and Advanced Forms adapted to meet their wants.

The Preliminary Conference Examination is held at Albert College, so that candidates do not need to go to their several Conferences for Examination.

Students are admitted into Albert College without examination.

Sons and daughters of Ministers and certificated probationers in the ministry of any denomination in Canada are allowed a reduction of one-half on the above Tuition Fees, *if boarding in the College or at home.*

All Tuition or Lecture Fees must be paid in advance to entitle the student to an Admission Ticket to Lecture Rooms.

# ACADEMY OF MUSIC.

PROF. J. A. STANISTREET, Director.

The aim of this department is to give an artistic, correct, intelligent and graceful performance, combined with feeling and expression and also to impart a thorough theoretical and practical musical education to those who wish to fit themselves as teachers, or who desire to thoroughly understand the great masters by analysis and practice.

Students registering in Albert College for Music are earnestly recommended to follow a regular course of instruction, but may take a single branch, as, Pianoforte, Organ, Harmony, or Singing, by paying the fee for that branch only.

Diplomas are issued under the order of the Senate, to all qualified Candidates who have completed any of the Courses of the Academy of Music, and have passed the required examinations, but no Diploma or Certificate of Standing can be issued to any student who has not followed a regular course.

## Pianoforte Course

This Course extends over a period of twelve terms but pupils of advanced standing after an examination by the Professor of Music, will be afforded every proper facility for completing the course in as short a time as is consistent with thoroughness and efficiency in their work.

# Vocal Culture.

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This Course extends over a period of three years and is subject to the same rules as Pianoforte with regard to entrance and length of course.

Studies ..... Voice Culture: Bassini, Concone, Randeggar, or equivalents.

Supplements ..... Sacred and Secular Songs; Ballads from the German, Italian and English Schools.

Theory of Music ..... Rhythm, Tempo, Phrasing, etc.  
Choral Singing, Sight Singing, and from Memory.

Attendance on Lectures in Elocution is particularly recommended in connection with the study of vocal music.

Before completing the Vocal Course Students must pass the examination in the subjects of the first year of the Pianoforte Course.

## GENERAL.

The students in this department are expected to furnish Music for the various College Societies which meet weekly throughout the year and all in turn appear on the programme.

An important advantage that a College Course affords to pupils in music is an opportunity for ensemble playing, *i. e.* playing together in Duets, Trios, Quartettes, etc., by which exactness and uniformity in time and method are acquired.

The Choral Class meets regularly throughout the year and attendance upon it is required.

Neat writing, correct spelling, and ability to form good English sentences are indispensable to students in course, and examinations must be passed in these subjects before graduation.

A test is made of the ability of each candidate for graduation in any course, to read music at sight, and execute from memory. Students must show proficiency in these things.

A full Musical Recital is given by the graduating class during the closing exercises of each year in which every member of the class must take part.

# Post Grad

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## Post Graduate Course in Music.

In order to provide facilities for the prosecution of musical studies beyond the ordinary course for graduation the following course of study has been prescribed by the Senate of Albert College.

### FIRST EXAMINATION.

Harmony, Canon, Fugue, Counterpoint.

Acoustics.

History of Music, in relation to the growth of Musical forms and rules.

Instrumentation, Orchestration.

Proficiency in playing Bach's Preludes and Fugues.

A critical knowledge of the score of some chosen work

German, French, or Italian language.

### SECOND EXAMINATION.

Harmony, Counterpoint in not more than five parts.

Canon, Imitation, Fugue (Ouseley).

Form in Composition : Instrumentation.

History of Music. (Hullah's Lectures)

A critical knowledge of the full score of Beethoven's Septuor or Handel's Saul.

Ability to perform at sight selections from the works of Masters which the examiner may choose.

Before entering upon the Post Graduate Course, candidates must have obtained a Diploma in the ordinary Pianoforte Course.

No candidate will be allowed to come up for examination in the Post Graduate Course, unless he has pursued musical studies in Albert College, for at least one year after having received the Diploma in the ordinary course.

Candidates for graduation in this course must have passed the examinations prescribed for the first year of the Collegiate Course with the exception of Latin and Greek. German or Italian may be substituted for French.

A Recital of at least one hour's duration must be given by each candidate for graduation in this course.

Upon the completion of the above course and the fulfilment of all statutory requirements, a Diploma will be awarded as Master or Mistress in Music.

A REDUCTION IN FEES of 10 per cent, is granted to students paying tuition fees in other departments and to those who take two or more branches in Music.

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## **LECTURERS.**

A Course of Lectures on Commercial Law, and other subjects of interest to the Student, is arranged during each year, and delivered by prominent Lawyers and Business Men of the city.

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Since 1877 a Commercial Department has been conducted in connection with Albert College, and with good success. During the present year enlargement became necessary, and the Department has been thoroughly re-organized. Large and well furnished rooms have been set apart for the work, and a complete set of offices equipped for the Actual Business Department.

The College is prepared to give a Practical Business Course combined with a thorough English Education, unexcelled by any Business College in Ontario, and at moderate rates.

## COURSE OF STUDY.

### BOOK-KEEPING.

**THEORETICAL BOOK-KEEPING** is taught from the simplest principles and covers both single and double entry. Students are made thoroughly conversant with journalizing, posting, balancing, correcting errors, closing accounts, making out bills, statements, and other business papers. Sets of books are worked illustrating the methods of Retailers, Jobbers, Wholesalers, Commission Merchants and Manufacturers.

**ACTUAL BUSINESS PRACTICE** is introduced as soon as the pupil has become acquainted with the general forms of books. Regular office practice is entered upon early in the course, and is carried on till the students become familiar with all the modes of book-keeping used in the best conducted business houses.

*English* **GRAMMAR, ARITHMETIC AND SPELLING.**  
It is very evident that business education is not complete without a practical knowledge of these important subjects.

Students receive regular class drill under competent teachers, and examination papers are set; a certain percentage being required before the student is granted a Diploma.

### COMMERCIAL LAW

Is taken up by Lectures and class-room drill. Pupils are made conversant with the forms, nature of, and law concerning contracts, negotiable paper, partnerships, agencies, etc.

A new Type-writer has been lately placed in the College for the use of students in this school. Instruction is given in the mode of operating the instrument, and time allowed for practicing speed. Students desiring to make a specialty of this branch will be afforded every opportunity of becoming thoroughly proficient.

### CORRESPONDENCE.

Including ordinary letter writing, business papers, folding, arranging, filing &c., is a necessary part of the business course.

#### TIME REQUIRED FOR COURSE.

The time required for an average student to complete the regular course of training is about five months. Many young men and women complete it in a shorter time, while young lads or those requiring much elementary drill may need longer time.

The holder of an Art Certificate is legally qualified to teach the subjects named therein in any Art School, High School, Model School or Mechanics' Institute. The Education Department will accept a Primary Certificate in lieu of the non-professional examination in drawing for any class or grade of public school teachers' Certificate.

Students of our school are earnestly advised to enter upon the course as prescribed, but may take such subjects as they deem proper, by payment of the required fee for the subject taken.

# SCHOOL OF ELOCUTION.

JOSEPH H. SHEPARD, DIRECTOR.

It is the aim of this Department to afford such thorough instruction in Elocution that its students may be able to analyze all forms of literature, and to apply artistically to each style of composition its appropriate form of delivery—in a word, to make natural, elegant, and forcible readers for the home circle, the drawing-room, the school-room, the church entertainment, the pulpit, and the public platform.

## Course of Instruction.

**1. Vocal Culture and Modulation.**—Training of the Vocal Organism. Diaphragm. Breathing. Placing and Projection of Tone. Control of Various Qualities of Voice. Development of Power. Eradication of Faults. Pitch. Rate. Force. Melody. Rhythm.

**2. Gesture and Aesthetic Gymnastics.**—Training of Body as an instrument of Expression. Posing. Attitudes. Facial Expression. Hands. Torso. Development of Ease. Precision and Harmony. Calisthenics.

**3. Articulation.**—Phonetic Analysis. Drill on elements to secure Delicacy, Accuracy, and Force. Principals of Orthœpy, Syllabication and Accent. Pronunciation of difficult words, and of words commonly mispronounced.

### 4. Analysis.—

1. LITERARY.—Philosophy and Qualities of Style. Methods of Treatment. Transitions. Order of Thought.

2. ELOCUTIONARY.—Emphasis. Tone. Color. Application of all the Modulations.

# ALEXANDRA COLLEGE.

It is the aim of Alexandra College to provide for young ladies an opportunity not only for thorough mental discipline but for intellectual, social and Christian culture as well; and to discover and direct the varied abilities so as to insure their best use and broadest influence in the future. A good foundation for this general culture is laid in the earlier requirements of any course, while the later elective studies permit the choice of work suited to the taste, talent, or special purpose to the student.

The ladies, except those who live at home or with relatives or guardians, reside in a portion of the building devoted exclusively to their use, under supervision of the Preceptress, to whom parents are earnestly requested to make such communications as may aid her in securing the highest welfare of their daughters.

All students meet in general exercises and the ladies of Alexandra College attend the same lectures and receive instruction in the same classes as the Students of Albert College. They enjoy the same privileges, subject to like condition of entrance, and receive like rewards or honors.

To those selecting Music, Drawing or Painting, we are able to offer as thorough and complete instruction as may be obtained in the Dominion.

The Business School furnishes practical instruction in the methods of transacting business, and the almost indispensable art of good penmanship.

Ladies may take special subjects as they deem proper, but regular courses of study are earnestly advised.

The Polymnian Society, Y. W. C. A. and Mission Band, which are conducted solely by lady students, afford excellent opportunity for work in special lines.

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**Course for M. L. A.**

To Lady Students who pass the examination of the Preparatory Department, and the succeeding examinations prescribed for the first, second and third years of the Collegiate Course a Diploma is awarded as Mistress in Liberal Arts.

A sufficient number of options is allowed in the third year of the Collegiate Course to permit candidates to proceed to the Diploma in such departments of study as are most suitable to their tastes.

**Course for M. M. L.**

To Lady Students who have completed the Painoforte Course in Music, and the Primary Art Course, and who pass the examinations of the Preparatory Department; and the succeeding examinations of the Collegiate Course, omitting the Classics throughout, and the Mathematics of the third year a Diploma is awarded as Mistress in Modern Literature.



## GENERAL INFORMATION.

### The Building.

The College Building is substantial, large, and convenient. It was erected originally for College purposes and is located in a quiet and healthy part of the city. During the summer of 1888 it underwent a thorough system of repair, a fifth story with new roof was added, a new steam heating apparatus was placed throughout the whole building and the older portions were thoroughly renovated. In its present state, there is accommodation for over 100 resident students, in rooms that are comfortable, and well warmed. The class rooms are centrally located and are easy of access from either the ladies' or gentlemen's departments. The Grounds are sufficiently large to provide accommodation for recreation and games of various kinds.

### Endowments &c.

In addition to the income from rents and tuition fees an endowment fund of nearly \$55,000 has been secured for the support of the Institution.

### Religious Supervision.

Although the institution is under the control and supervision of the Methodist Church, it is Christian without being Sectarian, and is attended by all denominations. But while Sectarianism is rigidly excluded the principles of pure Morality, and Evangelical Christianity are carefully cultivated.

All Students are required to attend College Prayers, unless released from attendance at the desire of their parents or guardians, or exempted by the permission of the President, or relieved from strict attendance for proper causes by an order in Council. Every student must attend twice on Sunday, such church as his parents or guardian may prefer, subject to like exemption as College Prayers.

### Residence,

Every student, whether lady or gentleman, must reside in Albert College unless the desire of his parents or guardians to the contrary be communicated in writing to the President and approved by the Council. Students out of Residence are not permitted to have rooms in places not approved of by the Council.

The charge for board, including room rent and fuel, is \$2.50 per week payable in advance. Rooms are not rented for less than a half term. Every room is furnished with stove, table, stand, bureau, mirror, chairs, bedstead, and mattresses. All other necessary articles, such as pillows, blankets, towels etc., students provide for themselves.

The cost of washing is at the rate of 50 cents per dozen pieces.

A small deposit is required of every student which is refunded at the close of the term, if room and furniture have been properly taken care of.

Students are not permitted to change rooms without the permission of the President. Tenants of rooms are responsible for damage and defacing done therein during their occupancy of them. For damages done upon public rooms and furniture, students are liable to assessment.

### Library.

The College Library owes its maintenance and increase to the exertions of friends of the College.

During the year 1871, a number of gentlemen formed themselves into a society for the purpose of increasing the number of the volumes by making and soliciting contributions. This Society obtained some important and valuable donations both in Scientific and General reading.

The Library contains much matter useful to the student, and its utility renders its enlargement a matter of personal interest to all in any way connected with the College. Any persons desirous of donating books, periodicals etc., will kindly send the same to Miss Ella Gardiner, B. A., the Librarian.

### The Museum.

The Museum has been gradually increasing in importance for the last ten years and now in the elegant new rooms which have been specially fitted for this purpose is a matter of large interest. The rooms are well lighted and the articles so arranged and classified that a visit will afford an hour of profit and pleasure.

The Botanic Department comprises over 2,000 specimens of North American Species contributed by Prof. Macoun.

The Mineralogical Department has been augmented by contributions from the Geological Survey, and by purchase from Mr. Legatt, of Montreal, and now contains 10,000 specimens of economic and other minerals arranged and mounted upon blocks of polished wood, also 200 specimens of French Rocks obtained by Mr. Legatt from the French Government.

The Geological Department has been enlarged by the purchase of a cabinet of Geological casts of the most noted fossils of the European and American Museums.

To these may be added the Canadian Archaeological contributions by the Rev. Thos. Webster, D. D., and others, besides many articles of interest and instruction to students.

The Murchison Society of Belleville has lately united with the College Authorities in the effort to enlarge and otherwise improve the museum and a great many objects of interest and value have been added during the last few months.

It is the intention to make a collection which shall embrace as far as possible, all the products of the country, and it is therefore greatly desired that any having specimens will contribute them to the Museum and thus help to increase its value and interest.

### Reading Room.

There is a Reading Room in the College well supplied with Newspapers and Magazines, under the management of a committee of the College Council and Philomathian Society. It is free to the use of all students, subject to such regulations as may be made by the Committee.
