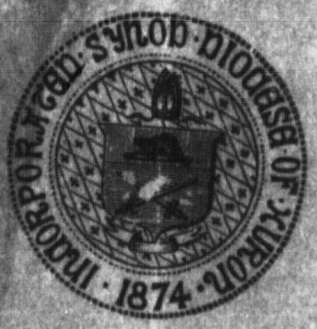

The Bishop stated that, on account of his inability to be present, he was in the meanwhile represented by the Dean.

The Lord Bishop then addressed the Synod from the platform, Rev. F. J. being the Moderator of the Synod of Rhode Island.

TWENTY-FIFTH SESSION.

*(Being the Eighth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874.)*

FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London, on Tuesday, 26th Sept., 1882.

Morning prayer was said in the Chapter House, commencing at 11 a m.

The sermon was preached by Rev. Francis J. C. Moran, B. D., Chaplain of the English Church, Rue D'Aguesseau, Paris, France, from Ephesians III, 20-21.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Dean, to the Clergy and Lay Representatives.

The Synod assembled at 3 p. m., in the Chapter House, for business.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

The usual prayers having been offered up by the Bishop, the rolls of the Clergy and Lay Representatives were called by their respective Secretaries, when 93 Clergymen and 71 Lay Delegates answered to their names.

Lay Secretary.

The Bishop stated that in consequence of Mr. Lawrence Skey's inability to be present, he had requested Mr. E. B. Reed to discharge in the meanwhile the office of Honorary Lay Secretary of Synod.

Admission to Seats in Synod.

The Lord Bishop then introduced, and invited to seats on the platform, Rev. F. J. C. Moran, of Paris; Rev. Mr. Magill, of the Diocese of Rhode Island, and John Shields, Esq., of Durham, England.

### Statement by the Bishop.

My Beloved Brethren of the Clergy and Lay Members of this Synod,—

Before delivering my annual address to you, it is but right and proper that I, as your Bishop and Presiding Officer, should give my reasons for convening the Synod at this unusual season.

The Constitution provides that the Synod shall meet annually on the third Tuesday in June. This year that day fell on June the 20th, the very day appointed for the holding of the Dominion elections.

Many members of the Synod, by correspondence and personal interviews, pointed out to me that it would be impossible to hold a session of Synod on account of the elections, and suggested that an adjournment should be made.

I was the more willing to approve of this adjournment, for, anxious as I am at all times to see a large gathering at our Synods, I was especially desirous to secure a full attendance at this meeting, inasmuch as many important measures, respecting the good government of the Church, were to be submitted to the Synod.

Not having, however, any power to change the date of the annual meeting, I was compelled to convene the Synod for June 20th, when at the meeting of members then present, a resolution was carried, adjourning the meeting to the 26th of September.

Technical objections have been raised by two Clerical and one Lay member, as to the legality of this adjournment. To remove, however, every objection, and to guard against obstruction, I have, in accordance with the power vested in the Bishop by the Constitution, convened this meeting of the Synod, having taken care that due notice was given of *all the* business intended to be brought before the members of Synod for discussion at this Session, as will be found on reference to the Convening Circular, a copy of which has been forwarded to every member.

I would especially request your regular attendance at our daily sessions, and I feel sure that you will, as usual, render me your loyal assistance in performing the duties for which we are met together.

The following is the Convening Circular referred to by the Bishop :

CHAPTER HOUSE, LONDON, ONT.,  
September 9th, 1882.

SIR,—

We are directed by the Bishop to notify you that the Synod of the Diocese of Huron will meet (D. V.) in the Chapter House, London, on Tuesday, September 26th, 1882, for the election and appointment of officers and Committees of Synod; the election of delegates to the Provincial Synod; the reception of the Annual Report of the Standing Committee; the submission of the Audited Accounts; and for the transaction of all the usual business of the Annual Meeting of the Synod; also, for the ratification of the business transacted by the Standing Committee at the meeting held June 22, 1882.

A statement is given herewith of the business sent to the Standing Committee in May last, and which also will be brought before the Synod.

Life members, and such incorporated members as are qualified by Section 2 of the Act of Incorporation, are entitled to the privileges of members of Synod, so far as its financial affairs are concerned.

By resolution of the Synod, no Lay Representative can take his seat unless all assessment due by the congregation he represents is paid.

#### The Bishop's Address.

His Lordship then delivered his Annual Charge to the Synod, as follows :—

*"Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."*

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD,—

While addressing you by this endearing appellation, borrowed from Apostolic usage, and adopted in all the offices of our Church, I remind myself and you of our union with the Adorable Head of the Universal Church, and of that communion and fellowship which subsists between all the members of His mystical body, wherever locally situated or in whatever position they hold in the Church of God.

It is also intended to remind us that all our resources are in Him, "from whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love."

With an affectionate greeting I bid you welcome in the name of the Lord to this our annual gathering, and I desire, in the very forefront of this address, to put on record my grateful sense of the manifold goodness of our God upon us.

Each Synod, as it comes and goes, leaves its distinct impress upon the Diocese, and each year of active work tells with marked effect on its strength and growth.

To detail the incidents that show the work and increase of our Diocesan affairs, so far as they come under the Bishop's supervision, is one of the chief designs of this annual address, while another purpose of it is to furnish suggestions and state views on the various movements which are going on around us in the Church.

With thankfulness to God, I heartily congratulate you on the

healthful and prosperous condition of our Diocese. Work is progressing everywhere, and gratifying results are visible on all sides.

I cannot speak of my labours without first expressing my heartfelt gratitude to God for His sustaining grace and preserving care, nor could I withhold my full acknowledgment of the uniform kindness which I have received from my Clergy and Laity in all the parishes I have visited.

#### OBITUARY.

It is with deep sorrow that we record the demise of Bishop Fauquier, the first missionary Bishop of Algoma. For a period of nearly thirty-eight years I enjoyed the personal, intimate and uninterrupted friendship of the late lamented prelate. During his association with me, as one of my Archdeacons, I could always rely upon his hearty and loyal co-operation. He understood the office of Archdeacon well and conscientiously discharged it, as the "*oculus episcopi*." His whole ministerial life, as is well known to most of us in this Diocese, was one of earnest and unreserved consecration to his Lord and Saviour. The news of his death brought with it a deep sense of loss, not only to the young missionary Diocese of Algoma, but to the Church at large. His unostentatious piety, his deep earnestness and sincerity on all occasions, commanded for him the utmost regard and respect. He was a man full of sympathy, which, combined with gentleness of disposition, eminently fitted him for the different positions which he filled, with credit to himself, with advantage to the Church, and with a single eye to the Glory of God.

I am grieved to have also to record the demise of two most estimable clergymen of this Diocese—the Rev. Canon Caulfeild, LL. D., and the Rev. H. B. Wray, B. A. Both were faithful ministers of the Gospel, and have grown old and grey in the service of their Lord and Master. Deeply do we sympathise with their bereaved families.

## PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

Soon after the demise of the lamented Bishop of Algoma, the Most Reverend the Metropolitan of our Ecclesiastical Province, summoned a special Session of the Provincial Synod for the purpose of electing a successor to Bishop Fauquier.

The Synod met in the City of Montreal on the 27th of April last, when on the following day the Rev. Dr. Sullivan, Rector of St. George's Church, Montreal, was unanimously chosen, both by the House of Bishops and by the Lower House, Bishop of Algoma.

This happy selection has given universal satisfaction and has caused much joy to all the well wishers of our beloved Zion. Dr. Sullivan in accepting the onerous position to which he has been so unexpectedly called—involving on his part many sacrifices—evidently considered this call not only as the "Vox Ecclesia" but the "Vox Dei." We feel confident that the Canadian Church will manifest her appreciation of Dr. Sullivan's worth, by aiding him effectually and substantially to carry on and onwards God's work in the Missionary Diocese of Algoma. He was consecrated in St. George's Church, Montreal, on the 29th of June last, (the festival of St. Peter, Apostle and Martyr.)

## DIOCESAN WORK, ETC., ETC.

Thank God every year shows an advance upon those preceding; and if we are faithful to the Church of our love and vows, and faithful to the truth and simplicity of the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, we shall realize and enjoy the promised descent of the Holy Spirit upon our efforts; and the wilderness part of our Diocese—the solitary places and moral desert—"shall rejoice and blossom as the rose, and all eyes shall see the glory of the Lord and the excellency of our God."

With a view of furnishing the members of the Church throughout the Diocese with correct official and reliable information of its actual prosperity, I took the opportunity of addressing you at the Session of 1880 on the remarkable progress made in all departments of Diocesan work, and then gave full and detailed statistics of the ten years covered by my episcopate. I need only refer you to that address, which was published and, by resolution of the Synod, read in all the Churches of the Diocese—a custom long in vogue, and I believe universally adopted in the sister Church of America. I am thankful to God and happy to be able to state that the rate of progression, then referred to, has been maintained in the two years which have since elapsed. Our Diocesan income from voluntary sources, which was \$13,300.25 in 1880, increased to \$15,007.86 in

1881; and this year there is a still further increase, amounting to \$15,560.79.

To impress you more deeply with the facts of the actual gratifying advance and prosperous condition which a gracious God has been pleased to vouchsafe to us, permit me to furnish you and all the members of the Church within the Diocese with a brief comparative statement of Diocesan statistics as set forth in the returns of our Rural Deans and from the audited accounts of our Synod during my episcopate :

No. of Parsonages in 1871, 34 ; in 1882, 65—increase, 31.

Value of Parsonages in 1871, \$53,300 ; in 1882, \$132,500—  
increase, \$79,200.

No. of Churches in 1871, 149 ; in 1882, 207—increase, 58.

Voluntary Diocesan Income in 1871, \$10,022.90 ; in 1882,  
\$15,560.79—increase, \$5,537.88.

Invested capital in 1871, \$522,465.60 ; in 1882, \$671,718.82—  
increase, \$149,253.22.

Interest from invested capital in 1871, \$27,418.35 ; in 1882,  
\$42,951.89—increase, \$15,533.55.

No. of Clergy on roll in 1871, 92 ; in 1882, 135—increase, 42.

No. of Sunday Schools in 1871, 110 ; in 1882, 166—increase,  
56.

Communicants in 1871, 4,390 ; in 1882, 8,910—increase, 4,520.

These statistics afford abundant and incontrovertible evidence that God is of a truth with us, and naturally inspire unreserved confidence in the executive of the Diocese, under whose careful management these gratifying results have been achieved. And here I feel it a duty and a pleasure to bear my strongest testimony to the faithfulness, efficiency, and unremitting devotion of our excellent Secretary-Treasurer to the work committed to his trust by the Synod.

As the years roll on we must naturally prepare for still wider fields of labor, and consequently an accession of episcopal toil and responsibility, and I trust that the day is not far distant when my hands may be strengthened by one who will share the burden with me. The increasing welfare may be traced to the unswerving, uncompromising loyalty to the Bishop and the Diocese which has ever marked the legislation of our Synod and the Executive, and the love of harmony which characterizes the action of Clergy and Laity, notwithstanding isolated exceptions. Facts prove the spiritual vitality and vigor of the Church, and you will, I feel sure, beloved brethren, agree with me in ascribing to God all the glory and praise due to His name for His continued favor towards us.

ably the most fertile in all our extensive territory, and is fitly described as the "Garden of Canada." Growth under God might therefore be expected in the Church and Diocese, and it is our duty to see that, with God's blessing, its moral and spiritual welfare keeps pace with the development of its resources. With our large population, of over 700,000, according to the census of 1881, the great majority of whom are Protestants, there are abundant opportunities for extending the work of the Church, not excelled in any part of the country.

Nor, in referring to our progress and to the extent of our Missionary operations, must we leave out of sight the amount which annually is available for our Superannuation and Mission Funds from the "Surplus Commutation." In 1880-81 the amount derived from this source was \$8,391.51, and during the past year it amounted to \$9,236.89. The lapse of time proves only more conclusively the wisdom of the action taken by this Synod when, after providing for our aged and infirm clergy, the balance of this patrimony is appropriated to the support and maintenance of our Missionary Clergy. In proportion as this sum augments, it is incumbent upon us to secure a corresponding extension of our Missionary work, and to ensure that the services of our Church are placed within the reach of all her members in this important portion of our Lord's Vineyard.

As I review the past and witness the strides that have been made, the increase of faithful laborers, the multiplication of communicants, the number of Churches and Parsonage-houses which have been erected, the large sums which have been contributed for Parochial and Diocesan objects, I feel constrained to exclaim, "What hath God wrought," and with reference to both past and future, to "thank God and take courage."

To admit that more might have been done and that we have not come up to the full measure of our ability and opportunities, is only to admit that we are human, and such admission must always precede effort after greater ends, and endeavor to reach, however far we may come short of it—a state of ideal perfection.

I do not think that our people are less liberal than others, and believe that if once the necessity of supporting more generously their Church is made plain to them, they will cheerfully do so. Nay, we see already that her faithful and loyal members in this our Canada are beginning to realize that the responsibility and privilege of supporting and extending the kingdom of Christ in this country devolves chiefly, if not solely, upon them. I am naturally anxious that new missions should be opened; large ones, beyond the power of one man profitably to serve, sub-divided; and to raise, if possible, the stipend of every hard-working missionary clergyman to at least \$1000 per annum. These objects, so very dear to my heart, cannot be secured with the means at our present disposal. More strenuous

efforts must be made to accomplish them. The resources of the country are ample to meet all our wants, and to aim at less than this would be unworthy of the temporal and spiritual blessings God has so graciously bestowed. Let the Clergy and Laity, as heretofore, put forth their united strength, under a full sense of their Christian responsibility, and the day is not distant when the wants named will meet with a generous and adequate response. For this end I would urge, as I did on a former occasion :—

- 1.—It behoves those missionary parishes which receive assistance from our Mission Fund, to become self-supporting as soon as possible, and be constituted Synodical Rectories.
- 2.—That each parish should redouble its efforts to increase the annual income of the Mission Fund.
- 3.—To contribute more liberally when the bi-monthly collections are taken up in the churches, and at the missionary meetings.
- 4.—To encourage the system of collecting funds by "missionary boxes" in Sunday schools and in the family household.

And last but not least :

- 5.—To increase the annual subscriptions and secure new subscribers.
- As in the past, so I feel confident in the future, our able and indefatigable Missionary Agent, the Rev. W. F. Campbell, will be a most efficient instrument to aid us in bringing about these desirable—nay, these indispensable—results. Already Mr. Campbell has rendered us valuable services, not only in the steady increase of our missionary income, but, what is more precious and enduring, he has, by his zeal and hearty earnestness, awakened, under God, a true missionary spirit wherever he has gone. We can only hope and pray that God may supply him with all the needed strength and health to prosecute his arduous work for many years yet to come with the same happy results as in the past. Fully appreciating his untiring energy and special aptitude for the work to which he has been called, I heartily commend him to your sympathy and co-operation in all his labours and efforts to advocate and advance the best interests of our Diocese. We have a large mission field to occupy, and it is to be hoped that sufficient men will come forward in this Diocese and from our Western University to supply our needs. To the Church in this Dominion, Huron has given many who now fill positions of honour and wide influence. Not only has this Diocese supplied from the ranks of its own clergy, its first as well as its present Bishop, but from us went forth the late Bishop of Algoma, the Bishops of Saskatchewan and Toronto, and the present Bishop of Algoma was here ordained and had his first pastoral charge in this immediate neighborhood. Besides these instances, many others will occur to you of those who occupy prominent and leading positions in the various Dioceses of our Dominion, and some also in the Motherland.

Let each and all of us strive to lengthen the cords and strengthen the stakes of our beloved Zion, that she may be a joy and a praise in the earth, and be not less zealous than others in publishing the glad tidings of salvation through Christ Jesus our Lord.

#### HIGHER EDUCATION.

Among the various evidences of growing activity on the part of the Christian Church, we may note the deep interest and careful attention that is being bestowed upon the advancement of that higher education, which, when sanctified by the Spirit of God, is one of the best preservatives from degrading superstitions, and one of the strongest bulwarks against scepticism and infidelity. The strenuous efforts which are now being made by all the leading denominations everywhere for the establishment of seats of learning and Christian training under their immediate fostering care, show us that they are becoming fully aware of the importance of the crisis at which we have arrived, and the necessity of increased and more actively intelligent exertions against the many varied forms of error by which the youth, yea, and the mature minds of our land are in danger of being misled. To the Church of England, which has ever been in the past the great foster-mother of high, literary and Christian education, the community naturally looks, if not for the initiation, at any rate for the countenance and encouragement of such efforts in this direction as may be suited to circumstances and best adapted to meet the exigencies of the times. They cannot comprehend that a branch of the Church, which, above all others in the old world, has effected so much and planted and sustained Schools and Universities that have attained to world-wide renown, should, under new conditions, appear to betray an indifference and apathy altogether opposed to her genius and ancient traditions. Surely we shall strive not to disappoint such well-founded expectations, and, satisfied with the achievements of the past, let slip the golden opportunities vouchsafed to us, of planting in this great and rapidly developing country such institutions for the efficient training of the young as shall be for the glory of God in all times, and a testimony to the zeal and faithfulness of His Church. To the Bishops and Clergy, and to the more intelligent and wealthy lay members, the Church must needs look for direction and guidance in movements of this description, and they should not fail her. Whatever educational efforts may be made by private individuals, it is only by the Church, in her corporate capacity, that these grand enterprises can be instituted and sustained, and, at the same time, their moral sense and religious feeling developed and cultivated. In these days, the Church or Diocese that does not rise to the exigencies and requirements of the times, can scarcely expect to hold its position in the public estimation, or to become a factor of any importance in the product of general advancement.



## "APPEAL.

"Whilst Toronto and several places in Eastern Ontario afford to their youth great facilities for obtaining the highest instruction in arts and sciences, and in the different professions, yet this most prosperous portion of the Province has, until within the last few years, been entirely destitute of such advantages. The time has now come when we ought to provide for our youth facilities for the best university education in their very midst.

"It is a fact, that whenever the opportunity has occurred to gratify the aspirations of our Canadian people to secure and advance educational institutions, they have never failed to manifest their deep interest in them, as illustrated by the generous and munificent gifts and bequests lately made by citizens of Toronto, Cobourg, Kingston, Montreal, and of the Maritime Provinces, towards the erection and endowment of Colleges. We believe our friends in this favored portion of the country will emulate these generous donors, and thus enable us to place the Western University, and that speedily, on a footing with the best educational institutions in our vast Dominion.

"We therefore earnestly make this public appeal in its behalf to all the friends of intellectual advancement who, independent of locality, denominational differences and other external conditions, desire the education of our youth in those principles which constitute the only sound foundation of Christian character, and the surest guarantee for the future welfare of the country at large."

Were the tenth part of the means and energy at the disposal of our people, in this section of the country, devoted to such enterprises, the foundation would be laid of a spiritual growth and temporal prosperity, such as has been rarely experienced, and this Diocese would be the centre of a work which would excite the admiration of the whole country.

And now, beloved brethren, whatever subjects for the general well-being and good government of the Church may be brought before you for deliberation, remember that the influence of your legislation, stops not with the present hour, but passes on, for good or for evil, to a far-off future. As men entrusted with the religious interests of this Diocese, and as Christians consecrated to the work of building up the Church "upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief corner-stone;" as men who will have to render an account to God for every act, every speech and every vote, let me entreat you to give each question brought before you, that prayerful, calm reflection, and that straightforward, honest regard which will best enable you to take the just and right views of truth, and act upon the best principles of duty to your beloved Church, as in the sight of God. Let us confer together with brotherly love, with that entire absence of prejudice, and with that single eye to God's glory, which will put us in the best position to know and to do His will. And, above all, let us fervently pray that the Holy Ghost, who alone maketh men to be of one mind in an house, may be especially with us, as a Spirit of Truth, Order and Holiness, and that by His blessed influence upon all our deliberations, we may continue to be knit together in the unity of spirit and in the bonds of peace, as those should be who are members of the same household of faith. Let us fervently

pray that God may so direct, sanctify and govern us in our present work, that the Gospel of Christ may be truly preached, truly received and truly followed in all places. May our Heavenly Father be pleased "to prosper all our consultations to the advancement of His glory, the good of His Church, and that all things may be so ordered and settled upon the best and surest foundation, that peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety may be established among us for all generations."

## CONCLUSION.

I cannot conclude this my address to you without once more acknowledging the affectionate kindness of the Clergy and Laity of this Diocese towards myself, officially and personally. The addresses and many letters to me, all embodying loving confidence in the Bishop and in the administration of the Diocese, the many and substantial tokens of interest in our diocesan and educational labours, have graven deep impressions on my heart. Most cordially do I thank you for your solicitude about me, and for the unusual warmth with which I have been welcomed everywhere. Let me assure you, if this is at all necessary, that your deeds and words of kindness and encouragement in my efforts for the present and ultimate good of the Diocese, will be well remembered and safely treasured, and will often, as years go by, furnish delightful reminiscences upon which my memory will feast as I call up one and another of the clergy or parishes, and go over anew the interesting events of the past. No Bishop in any Diocese has been more kindly treated and cared for. I therefore thank you, each and all, from the very depth of a grateful heart.

Whereas the Venerable Society, for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, has withdrawn its aid to this Diocese, therefore, be it resolved, "That this Synod cheerfully acquiesces in this decision of the Venerable Society, and desires to place on record its grateful acknowledgment of the long continued and liberal assistance which it has given to Church Missions in this Diocese, not only since its erection in A. D. 1857, but for many years previous; and also that this Synod expresses hereby its sympathy with the great and good work which this Society is carrying on in the Colonies of the Empire, and also in the regions beyond; and also with the Colonial and Continental Church Society, and with the New England Society, which Societies are continuing to this Diocese the aid generously bestowed in years past."

A fresh supply of S. P. C. K. books will be ready for sale in the course of a few weeks, of which due notice will be given. The number of books put in circulation in the Diocese through this medium since last Synod is about 1,000. The Committee desire to acknowledge the kind assistance rendered in this department by the Depository, Mr. E. B. Reed.

##### 1.—SUNDAY SCHOOL LITURGY.

A Liturgy for Church Sunday Schools has recently been compiled from the Liturgies of the Church of England Sunday School Institute, by your Committee, and which has received the sanction of the Bishop. Copies of the Liturgy are on sale at E. A. Taylor's Book Store, at the rate of \$3 a hundred. To poorer schools copies will be supplied gratis on application. Specimen copies may be seen at the Chapter House. The Committee beg to recommend the uniform adoption of this Liturgy throughout the Diocese.

##### 3.—S. P. C. K. TRACTS.

Your Committee having obtained specimen copies of the Tracts published by the Society for Promotion of Christian Knowledge, made selection of such Tracts as are likely to be most useful, and purpose making application to the Society for a grant of as many copies of such selected Tracts as may be applied for by the Clergy. Such applications to be sent to the Depository, Mr. E. B. Reed, by the 10th day of October. Specimen copies of selected Tracts will be kept at the Chapter House, and copies thereof may be ordered through the Depository on the first of each quarter.

His Lordship declared the Canon duly carried by over two-thirds majorities of both Clergy and Laity, respectively.

The following is the Canon as finally amended and passed, the amendments being printed in italics :

XXII.—ON THE DISCIPLINE OF THE CLERGY.

1. Every Clergyman holding any charge under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of the Diocese shall be amenable to the Bishop for offences committed by *such Clergyman*, in the manner and according to the provisions set forth in this Canon of Discipline.
2. *The clerical members of the Standing Committee shall be the Committee of Discipline for the purposes of this Canon.*
3. Every Clergyman shall be liable to trial for any crime or immorality, or for any scandalous or disorderly conduct, *or for publishing or circulating, or causing to be published or circulated, any document or documents, whether anonymous or otherwise, calculated to defame or injure the Church in this Diocese or elsewhere, or which unjustly reflect upon the character of its duly constituted authorities, or for teaching or maintaining doctrines contrary to the teaching of Holy Scripture, as set forth in the Liturgy and Articles of the Church of England, such teaching or maintaining being by way of writing, or printing, or preaching, or teaching, or circulating books containing such unsound doctrine; for holding service in any other Clergyman's Church or Parish without his consent; for irregularity or indecorum in the performance of Divine offices; for contumacy or disrespectful conduct towards the Bishop; for the introduction of innovations and novelties in the performance of Divine worship; for schism or separating himself from the communion of the Church; for discontinuing the exercise of the Ministry without lawful cause; for exercising any lay profession or occupation inconsistent with his sacred calling; for living in the habitual disuse of public worship, or of the Holy Communion; or who may otherwise act in a way inconsistent with his position as a Clergyman; or who becomes from any cause unfit or unable to discharge the duties of his office; or whose usefulness in any Parish to which he has been appointed appears to be gone; or for the violation of the Constitution or Canons of this Diocese.*
4. When the Bishop shall be informed by three members of the Church or by three Presbyters that a Clergyman is liable to trial under clause 3, *or whenever the Synod, or the Standing Committee of Synod, shall by resolution passed by two-thirds vote of the members present, declare that in their opinion a Clergyman named in the motion is liable to trial under said clause 3; or whenever the Bishop shall think that the interests of the Church require it, he shall give a commission under his hand and seal, directed to three members of the Committee of Discipline, and naming one of them Chairman, for the purpose of making enquiry as to the grounds of such charge or report. For all or any of the purposes of the said investigation, the Committee shall have the right upon at least six days previous notice in writing to such Clergyman, or left at his residence, to enter the Parish or Mission of such Clergyman, and there or elsewhere in their discretion, prosecute such enquiry, and upon at least six days previous notice in writing to him, or left at his residence, signed by the Chairman of the Committee, specifying such charge or report, summon such Clergyman to appear before the Committee at the time and place mentioned in the notice to answer such charge or report; and if he neglect or refuse to attend before the Committee upon such summons; or if he attend and will not answer any question put to him by any member of the Committee touching such charge or report, (without assigning any cause or without reasonable cause) they shall forthwith report him for contumacy to the Bishop, who may thereupon pass sentence of suspension upon him for contumacy, but such sentence may be subsequently reversed by the Bishop in his discretion. In all respects other than in this Canon provided, the mode of conducting the preliminary investigation shall be*

entirely in the discretion of the Committee. After investigation held, the Committee, or a majority of them, shall forthwith report to the Bishop the result of such investigation, together with the evidence taken therein, and they shall state whether in their opinion the accused should or should not be brought to trial on such charge or report.

5. When it is decided that a trial shall be held, the presentment shall be in writing, framed by the Chancellor, addressed to the Bishop, upon the report of the Commissioners appointed for the preliminary investigation, hereinbefore provided for, specifying the offences of which the accused is alleged to be guilty, with reasonable certainty as to time, place and circumstances. But, *except for crime or immorality*, no proceeding shall be instituted or complaint entertained under this Canon after one year from the time of the alleged commission of the offence.

6. *The Bishop shall nominate five members of the Committee of Discipline as a Board of Triers, and shall cause a copy of the charges and the names of the said Triers to be served on the accused, who shall, within seven days after such service, have the privilege to object to any one or more, not exceeding three, of such members. In case of such objection, the Bishop shall forthwith nominate the requisite number to complete the Board of Triers.* The said five Clergymen shall form a Board for the trial of the accused, and shall meet at such time and place as the Bishop shall direct, and shall elect their own Chairman, and shall have power to adjourn from time to time (not extending over more than six months in all) and from place to place, (but always within the Diocese), as they shall think necessary.

7. A written notice of the time and place of the first meeting of the Board shall be served by the Chancellor, under the direction of the Bishop, at least fourteen days before such meeting, on the accused, on one of the prosecutors, (if any), and on each member of the Board of Triers. All notices and papers contemplated in this Canon may be served by a summoner or summoners, to be appointed for the purpose by the Bishop, and whose certificate of such service shall be evidence thereof. In case of such service by any other person, the facts shall be proved by such person. A written notice or paper delivered to a party, or left at his place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

8. If, before a trial commences, or during its progress, it shall be deemed desirable to amend, add to, or strike out any allegations in the complaint or presentment, it shall be competent to the Board of Triers to do so, taking legal advice if they should deem it necessary, and the trial on such amended complaint or presentment shall thenceforth proceed as if it had been the original complaint or presentment.

9. If, before the appointment of a Board of Triers, the Clergyman presented shall confess the truth of the allegations contained in the presentment, the Bishop shall proceed to pass sentence; but if he shall not confess them as before mentioned, he shall be considered as denying them.

10. If a Clergyman presented, after having had due notice, shall not appear before the Board appointed for his trial, the Board may, nevertheless, proceed as if he were present, unless for good cause, they shall see fit to adjourn till another day.

11. If, at the time appointed for the first meeting of the Board of Triers, the whole number of five shall not attend, then those who do attend, being not less than three, shall proceed to the trial, and a majority of those attending shall decide all questions. They shall appoint a Secretary, who may be one of their own number, whose duty it shall be to keep a record of all proceedings had before the Board. *Any vacancy or vacancies occurring in the Board of Triers through death, resignation, or otherwise, pending the enquiry, shall be filled up by the Bishop from the remaining members of the Committee of Discipline, and no proceeding pending under this Canon shall abate by reason of any member or mem-*

12. When the Board proceeds to the trial, they shall hear such evidence as shall be produced, which evidence shall be reduced to writing and signed by the witnesses respectively. If, on or during the trial, the accused shall confess the truth of the charges as stated in the presentment, the Board may dispense with hearing further evidence, and may proceed at once to state their opinion to the Bishop as to the sentence that ought to be pronounced.

13. Upon the application of either party to the Board of Triers, and it being made satisfactorily to appear to them that the attendance of any material witness cannot be procured upon the trial, they may appoint a Commissioner to take the testimony of any such witness; and both parties may attend and examine the witness. The examination, being reduced to writing, shall be, as nearly as possible, in the words of the witness, and signed by said witness.

The testimony thus taken shall be transmitted to the Board, certified by the Commissioner, under his seal, and shall be received by them as evidence.

14. Advocates or Proctors, who may be either Clergymen or Laymen, shall be allowed on either side; and if any difference of opinion shall arise as to the propriety of any question put, or on any point of order, the Board of Triers shall decide all such matters, taking legal opinion if they deem it desirable.

15. In every case in which, from the nature of the offence, it shall appear to the Bishop, after due enquiry, that great scandal is likely to arise from the Clergyman accused continuing to perform the services of the Church while such charge is under investigation, the Bishop shall cause a notice to be served on the accused at the same time with the service of the copy of the charge, or at any time pending the proceedings, inhibiting the accused from performing any services in the Church until the matter shall have been finally decided: and the Bishop may make provision for the service of the Church during the period of suspension, which suspension shall not exceed three months.

16. The Triers to whom the examination or trial of any accused person shall be committed, shall be bound not to divulge the sentence recommended until such time as it has been approved and confirmed by the Bishop; and further, that they will at no time whatsoever disclose the vote of any particular member of the Board.

17. Every witness, before examination, shall be asked to make a declaration in the following form of words, or in such other words as he or she shall consider or declare to be most binding upon his or her conscience:

"I, [A. B.] a witness at the trial of [C. D.] do most solemnly declare, in the presence of Almighty God, and as I shall answer to God at the great day of judgment, that the evidence I am about to give shall be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth."

18. The proceedings upon a trial shall be open to the members of the Church, unless, in the opinion of the Board, the circumstances of the case require that the trial should be private.

19. The Board, having deliberately considered the evidence, shall declare in writing signed by them, or a majority of them, their decision on the charges contained in the presentment, rendering their verdict of guilty, not guilty, or not proven, on the several counts presented; also stating the sentence which, in their opinion, shall be pronounced; and their decision, together with the evidence, shall be delivered to the Bishop, who shall pronounce such Canonical sentence as shall appear to him to be proper, provided the same shall not exceed in severity the sentence recommended by the Board; and the accused shall, during the continuance of such sentence, except in cases of removal or admonition, be deemed to be under Ecclesiastical censure.

20. Every Clergyman, whose case may have been disposed of and decided adversely to him, and who shall think himself aggrieved by such decision, or who shall make it appear that new evidence, having an important bearing on the case, has been discovered since the trial, of the existence of which he was not aware at the time of the trial, may within six months petition the Bishop for a new trial, or a rehearing of the case, either upon objections to be taken to the decision upon the facts, or because the judgment is not sustained by the laws and Canons of this Ecclesiastical Province, or of the Diocese, or for other cause or causes; or he may apply by petition to the Bishop for an arrest of sentence or judgment, upon causes to be shown; and in either case the Bishop shall, upon receiving such petition, refer the same and the whole subject, together with the evidence and the report made by the Board of Triers, to the Committee of Discipline, and their decision on the above questions, being approved by the Bishop, shall be final in so far as this Diocese is concerned.

In the event that a rehearing or new trial be granted, the case shall be transmitted to a Board of Triers, appointed as provided in Section 6, who shall proceed to hold a new trial, according to the rules hereinbefore set forth, within one month of the notice of such new trial being given to them by the Bishop.

21. Before pronouncing sentence, the Bishop shall summon the accused, and any three or more of the Clergy, to meet him at such time as may in his opinion be most convenient, in some church of the Diocese, which shall for that purpose be open at the time to all persons who may choose to attend, and the sentence shall then and there be publicly pronounced by the Bishop, or by some person commissioned by him.

22. The following sentences may be pronounced, and punishments imposed upon offending Clergymen, viz.: Admonition; suspension from the exercise of his office; withdrawal of license, removal from his charge in the Church; deposition or degradation from his sacred office.

23. For the offences set forth in the first column hereinafter written, the sentences set forth opposite to the same in the second column, and none others, shall be passed by the Bishop or person commissioned by him, upon any Clergyman found guilty thereof.

24. When sentence is pronounced in accordance with the above Schedule, it shall also be specified upon what terms, if any, the disability shall cease. When the penalty of suspension is inflicted the Clergyman shall not exercise the functions of his Ministry in his own congregation or elsewhere, on pain of deprivation or deposition by the Bishop, he being satisfied that the suspended Clergyman has so transgressed; and during such suspension the Bishop may appoint another Clergyman to supply the place of the suspended Clergyman, and may apply a part of the income or emoluments of the Parish, Mission or Cure to the payment of such substitute.

25. When a verdict of not proven is rendered, it shall be in the power of the Board of Triers to say whether, in their judgment, it is desirable for the interests of the Church that the accused should be removed to some other charge; and it shall be in the discretion of the Bishop to carry out this recommendation.

26. When the sentence of removal or deposition is pronounced, the connection between the Minister so removed or deposed and his Parish or congregation shall be *ipso facto* severed, and all offices, rents, issues, profits and emoluments which he may have held by virtue of such office or ministry from which he has been removed shall wholly cease and determine.

27. Whenever a Clergyman is deposed or degraded from the Holy Ministry, the Bishop who pronounces the sentence shall, without delay, give notice of such sentence to the Ministers and Churchwardens of the several congregations of the Diocese, and also to all the Bishops of the Anglican Communion.

28. It shall be the duty of the Chairman of the Board of Triers to see that all the proceedings of the Triers, as well as the sentence in each case, and the Bishop's action thereon are duly recorded by the Secretary to the Board in a book to be provided for that purpose; which book shall be kept in the custody of the *Secretary-Treasurer* of the Synod.

29. All the expenses necessarily incurred by the Commissioners or Board of Triers, in any investigation or trial under the Canon, and in the event of a verdict of not guilty or not proven being returned, the legitimate costs of the accused shall be paid by the Synod out of the Synod *Expense Account*.

# INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE OF HURON

For the Twelve Months Ending April 30th, 1882.

Embracing the whole period since the last report.

(Being the Eighth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874.)

In the good Providence of God we are again privileged to record progress in every department of the work entrusted to the management of the Standing Committee, as set forth in the following report :

#### DIOCESAN INCOME.

It is the pleasant duty of the Standing Committee to be able to report an increase for the past year. The amount received from the voluntary contributions of the Diocese is \$15,560.79, being \$552.93 in excess of the previous year. The Committee would point out that this increase has been effected, notwithstanding that no collection was made during the year for the Sabrevois Mission, which, during the previous year, received from the Diocese \$1185.99. The Committee desire to explain that this report covers a period of twelve months, being from the date of closing the books for last year. For many years the date of closing has been nominally March 31; but owing to the various delays (over which he has no control) in remitting to the Secretary-Treasurer many of the voluntary subscriptions payable during the year, both Mr. Reed and his predecessor in office have been compelled to keep the books open to a later date, and thus avoid what might otherwise prove a serious loss to the Missionary Funds of the Synod.

Of late years the books have, therefore, been closed on April 30, and the printed audited annual accounts have each comprised only a period of twelve months.

#### MISSION FUND DEBT.

In 1875, owing to the amounts paid out to the Clergy from the Mission Fund in excess of the income derived from the fund, a debt had been incurred amounting to \$10,400.60.

In the session of Synod held in 1875, the Standing Committee of the Church Society reported as follows :

"In the matter of the Mission Fund debt, the Committee recommend that the sum of \$1,500 be written off from the Depository account and placed to the credit of the Mission Fund, thus reducing the debt, and that the balance of said debt be transferred to and kept in a separate account from the General Mission Fund account."

"As a still further means of reducing this debt and of assisting the Mission Fund, the Committee recommend that the annual grant from the General Purposes Fund to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund be suspended for five years from March 31, 1874, and that a by-law to that effect be prepared and brought before the Synod."

This Report was adopted, and the necessary resolutions passed to carry it into effect.

In 1880 the Synod continued the amendment of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Canon above referred to for three years to March 31, 1882.

The Committee are rejoiced to be able to report that, during this past year this large debt has been completely paid off and extinguished. By this wise and judicious management the removal of this heavy burden of debt has thus been successfully accomplished without detriment or hinderance to any of the funds, and without diminishing in the slightest degree the incomes of the Clergy.

DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

The amount received from the Diocese during the year for Missionary work was \$11,245.24, being \$871.89 in excess of last year's income; 205 Missionary meetings were held, and the large amount of \$1922.90 was received from this source, a result that is especially gratifying, considering the difficulties of travel over bad roads, occasioned by the rough weather of the late unusually open winter. The deputation agent reports an increasing attendance at these meetings, and the Committee earnestly hope that the interest in this branch of our work may be maintained and strengthened, as it is upon this source chiefly that the Synod depends to obtain means for the furtherance of Missionary work in the Great North-west, to which this Diocese has voluntarily pledged its hearty support, and to which it contributes each year one half of the proceeds of the collections at the annual meetings.

The expenditure of the past year for Diocesan Missionary work reached the large amount of \$18,164.27, being \$877.66 over the previous year.

The Committee have to report that notwithstanding the increase in the income derived from the voluntary subscriptions of the Diocese, the Mission Fund is overdrawn some \$1811.24. This overdraft is accounted for, as follows:

1. The withdrawal of the grants from the English Societies, the S. P. G. and C. and C. C. S.
2. The great depreciation of the rate of interest on the invested funds, whose income supplements the Mission Fund.
3. The increased demand on the Superannuation Fund.
4. The increased expenditure for Mission work.

Thus the total income of the Mission Fund is \$759.32 less than previous years, while the total expenditure of the fund for the year is \$1,051.92 more than the previous year, making the total overdraft of \$1,811.24, and this notwithstanding the increase above referred to in the voluntary subscriptions from the Diocese.

With the increasing demands of this rapidly growing Diocese, it is quite evident that more strenuous exertions should be made to supplement the income of this fund, in order to enable the Synod to meet the necessary requirements.

As one means towards this desirable end, the Committee would recommend that the annual payment to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund from the General Purposes Fund, which has been used for the last seven years to extinguish the Mission Fund debt, be suspended for 5 years from April 1, 1882, and the amount allowed to go to the Mission Fund.

The Widows' and Orphans' Fund has for many years been built up and supported by this annual payment. During the last seven years while this payment has been appropriated to the Mission Fund debt, not only have the annual pensions of the fund been promptly paid, but the capital has been increased from the surplus income of the fund by the amount of \$12,360.

The Committee therefore feel no hesitation in recommending this course for the adoption of the Synod.

The collection on the Day of Thanksgiving was the largest yet received from the Diocese.

The Committee recommend that inasmuch as owing to the death of the late Bishop Fauquier, only \$411.30 was paid from the Thanksgiving collection on the Bishop's stipend account; the sum of \$188.70 be paid to the Rev. Dr. Sullivan, the present Bishop of Algoma, being the unpaid balance of the \$600 heretofore annually paid to the stipend of the Bishop of Algoma.

The Committee also recommend that the remainder of the last year's Thanksgiving collection, \$371.13, be paid to the Mission Fund of Algoma.

With regard to the \$800, being one-half of the net proceeds of the collections at the annual meetings, the Committee recommend that \$400 be given to each of the Dioceses of Rupert's Land and Saskatchewan, and that \$200 of the grant to Saskatchewan be devoted to the support of a teacher in Sioux in Emmanuel College.

It will be seen from the following report that the Diocese of Huron will have complied with the suggestion of the Central Board of Missions in Montreal, and provided its annual quota of \$2,000 for the North-west Missions and Algoma :

At the late meeting of the Provincial Synod to elect a successor to Bishop Fauquier, a fresh assessment was made of the amounts required from each Diocese towards the stipend of the Bishop of Algoma.

The assessment for Huron was increased from \$600 to \$700.

This arrangement, the Standing Committee feel assured, will be cheerfully concurred in by the Synod, and they cordially recommend compliance with the suggestion of the Provincial Synod.

The Committee are pleased to be able to report such a satisfactory proof of the continued prosperity of the Diocese, and the increasing interest in the great cause of Missionary work.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The amount received from the Diocese during the past year was \$1171.72, being \$68.36 less than the previous year.

Pensions amounting to \$4115.00 were paid to 21 widows.

As usual the Committee have been enabled to supplement the capital of the Fund, having added this year \$641.30, making the present total capital \$56,771.05.

From the very satisfactory state of this Fund the Committee have, as already referred to, thought it well to suggest to the Synod the propriety of suspending for the present that clause of the Widows' and Orphans' Canon relating to the grant from the General Purposes Fund.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTIONS FOR DIVINITY STUDENTS.

The amount received during the past year was \$364.36.

The Synod placed the collection of the previous year at the disposal of the Bishop, and the Standing Committee recommend that the same course be adopted this year.

They are gratified to learn from His Lordship that he was enabled by means of these funds to assist several Students, three of whom would, without such aid, have been unable to prosecute their studies, and would have had to leave the College.

The Committee sincerely trust that this annual appeal will be maintained and supported liberally by the various congregations of the Diocese.

SUPERANNUATION.

The amount paid for this purpose during the year was \$4,396.72.

Twelve Clergymen received pensions during the year.

REV. J. T. WRIGHT.

This case has been carried to the Court of Appeal, and will probably be argued some time in the month of November next.

REV. E. R. STINSON.

No decision has yet been given by the Vice-Chancellor, before whom this case was heard.
