ART IN ST. JOHN.

Yesterday many hundreds of our citizens visited the exhibition of the school in connection with the Drawing Art Institute, to view the work done by the pupils during the past term. The exhibit was a large one, and included oils, water colors, and crayons, the oils being the most numerous, and while the pictures were of very unequal merit as a work of art, it is certain to be, enough to show to the public that there is in St. John not only a great deal of artistic taste and feeling, but also an inconsiderable amount of artistic ability.

It will be seen by this that New Brunswick makes a highly respectable showing in completed railways, and presents a very decided contrast to its condition thirty years ago, when practically it had no railways at all in operation. Most people are of the opinion that we have now many railways in this province as we require, and that when the present subsidized lines are completed no new ones should be granted.

Now that the proposed Harvey Salisbury line project is disposed of, and the outside enemies of St. John have been defeated, it is time for our people to consider their position with reference to the question of placing the harbor in commission. On the 15th May St. John and Portland will become one city, and by a resolution of the council a vote of the citizens of St. John is to be taken on the harbor commission question on the 21st. As the Common Council of the present city of St. John cannot make regulations which will bind the new city, and as after the 18th inst. St. John will include Portland, it seems clear that the committee should on the harbor commission question cannot be taken, and therefore it would perhaps be well for the present council to rescind their former action. But when the new city is formed this harbor commission question should be one to be dealt with, either by a vote of the people or by the vote of the common council, as provided for in the act of assembly.

Some of the people of St. John appear to have awakened to the fact that the building of the railway from Fredericton to Salisbury would really be an injury to St. John, a view which we have been endeavoring to impress on the people of that town for some time past. The Montreal folk were very anxious for the building of the railway from St. John to Halifax, but its construction was refused to Montreal, and only the building of the Intercolonial saved that place. Why should Montreal struggle for a railway junction at Salisbury?

In the refusal of the Canadian Pacific Company to build the Harvey-Salisbury line the people of Halifax may read their fate. The Canadian Pacific Company take no interest in Halifax as a winter port. They own or control the line from Montreal and St. John and not beyond, and the terminus of their line will be here. The Intercolonial people may make such arrangements as they please for carrying passengers on to Halifax, but the freight terms of the Short Line will be St. John.

The Halifax steamship company running to Boston has made a combination with the American company in regard to freights, the Halifax boat taking the Nova Scotia trade and the other boats the Island trade. It would have been much better for the Halifax people to have constructed a mate for their line new steamer and driven the Yankees of the route entirely.

We publish elsewhere an account of some disgraceful scenes which marked the great inauguration ball in New York. The people of the Republic to the north of us do not seem to have improved much on the methods of the effete despots of Europe in their manners of managing great festivals. Where the Bowery town and the east side street walker are placed on the same footing with ladies and gentlemen matters are apt to get rather mixed.

The date of the opening of the Short

Line to Montreal is not known with certainty, but it is very near at hand. There is no question that it will be in full running order some time in June, and perhaps earlier. Mr. Vanhorn will be in St. John in the course of a few days, and our merchants and others will have an opportunity of conferring with him in regard to the trade which is to be developed between the east and the west.

The King of Holland has recovered, and resumed the duties of his position, so that the European complications which were expected to result from his death or continued illness will, for the present, be set at rest. Nevertheless, as the King is now advanced in years and may die soon, the treaty can only be a brief one, and the position of Holland as a European state may shortly take the place of the eastern question as the "big show" of European diplomacy.
