Today brought the coldest snap of his winter. The temperature at eight 'clock this morning was two degrees elow sero, but later in the day the hermometer went up about eight de-rees and throughout the day has re-nained at about six degrees above are

nained at about six degree iero. The highest temperature was sixteen above. In the evening there was a perceptible dropping and by nine o'clock the thermometer registered eight above. The temperature con-tinued to get colder during the night and fell below the sero mark early this morning. The falling in the tempera-ture was accompanied by a stiff wind which intensifies the bitterness of the cold wave.

In comparing the present with the weather conditions that prevailed about this time last year, it is found that on the ninth of December, 1902, the ther-mometer registered 14.2 degrees below zero. The eighteenth day of December last year was comparatively warm, the thermometer indicating thirty degrees above zero. From the sixth to the six-teenth of December last year there was an exceptionally cold spell. ### Carrying Butter from Montreal to Sell in P. E. I.

In P. E. I. In P. E. I. Arthur J. Beffin, of Charlottetown, commission merchant, passed through the city today on return from Mon-treal, where he has been on-business of a rather peculiar nature. Mr. Biffin purchased one thousand tubs of but-ter for shipment to Prince Edward Island. This appears strange in con-sideration of the fact that many tons of butter are sent from the Island every year. Daity produce is one of the principal exports and shippers are now buying butter in the Island for twenty-one cents. Much of this is sent to Cape Breton, for since the Sydney boom the bast use of markets near at home. In doing this they have neglected the local trade, and, as a result, butter has to be imported for home consumption. St. Dustan's college, in Charlottetown, has purchased a ton of Montreal butter, as there was no home product to be had.
