Curtain Stretchers, several Waterways Association to Develop Interest Among the People of the

CHICAGO, April 3—A conference betw-en the board of governors of the Lakes—to the Gulf—deep waters, and board of governors of the waterways association, will be held tomorrow night to decide upon the work to be done by the board of the waterways association. Plans will be made for an extended educational campaign along the Mississippi Valley. The deep waterway association is striving to have the government open up channels through all the rivers that contribute to the Mississippi river system. To help in the work it is desirable to have the people realize the tremendous advantages which would accrue from the opening of natural waterways. The conference will also plan to assist the waterways commission recently appointed by the government in making its report before the next Congress meets. They will also discuss the advisability of supporting men for election to Congress from the Mississippi states who will work for the deep water way.

LIGHTING PLANT BURNED AT A LOSS OF \$2,500,000

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., April 3.—
The destruction of the electric light and power house of the San Francisco Gas and Electric Light Company, at 2nd Avenue Scuth and Georgie street, by fire last night, plunged almost the entire city in darkness, resulted in the injuring of five firemen at least one of whom will die, and caused a loss of about \$2,500,000.





The buildings and plant are modern. Everything has been planned to make lador light and facilitate the filling of large contracts with the utmost speed. The latest addition to the buildings is that of the rolling mill, just completed, and which will be in operation by the first of April. This is probably the first of America, Such a mill has long been required in order to supply the Company with the bar channel iron so necessary in car building, and which has of late been so difficult to get in the large quantities used by it. The erection of this mill is in line with the general policy of economy practised by the Company in its various departments, as it enables it to use up the scrap iron, which hitherto has been reshipped at considerable expense, to outside mills. While the management has been proceeding with the expansion of the plant by the addition of new buildings, care has been taken to avoid the possibility of any serious conflagration. With this in view, the Company has its own fire fighting system, thoroughly equipped with all modern fire fighting appliances, operated by a fire brigade, composed of its employees, thoroughly organized and drilled. This, with the patent roofing and complete system of automatic sprinklers installed throughout the works and a full water supply, creatly enhances the value of the buildings and reduces the risk of less by fire and the cost of insurance to a minimum. In this respect the management has benefitted by the experience of former years, and every endeavor has been made to make a large fire impossible. In addition to the Company's own service, the town of Amherst has an excellent fire fighting department.

\$95,000,000 IN DEATH DUES

Receipts in Britain Last Year Beat all

LONDON, April 2.—It is now known that the receipts from death duties during the fiscal year just ending beat al previous records. The total, in round figures, will be \$95,000,000. Since the passage of Sir William Vernon Harcourd's Finanace Act twelve years ago the total receipts from death duties have exceeded \$1,000,000,000. The largest sum paid on any one estate was \$4,500,000, on that of Geo, Smith, generally known as "Chicago Smith," who lived at the Reform Club at an average rate of eighteen shillings a day.

The treasury has issued the budget figures for the financial year ending March 31, showing a total revenue of £155,036,485, against £153,878,866 for the previous year.
