





Crabtree of this city for the organization next month of a Portland cement company at Rapid City, which will operate on extensive gypsum beds west of here. The company is to be capitalized at 33.-500,000. It will control 1180 acres and the plant will have a capacity of 4000 barrels a day. Owing to the nature of the limerock here, mining is easily accomplished in the gypsum industry, and the limerock is gravitated to the crushers. It is said that because of these things cement can be manufactured here fifteen cents a barrel cheaper than in other parts of the country.
