



WALKER'S SAWMILL AND BOX FACTORY AT ORONO, ME., TOTALLY DESTROYED BY FIRE—LOSS \$150,000.

Orono, Me., Aug. 24.—After having been in operation sixty years or more, the saw mill and box factory of James Walker & Co. at Basin Mills, a part of this town, were totally destroyed by fire late today.

The mill, which probably was the oldest of its kind and one of the largest in the state, was deserted except for the presence of the watchman, when the fire broke out about 3.30 o'clock, most of the 250 employees and their families being in Bangor in attendance at the annual Eastern Maine Fair.

WIRELESS DESPATCHES STATE THAT ALLEGED MURDERER AND FELLOW-PRISONER ARE KEPT IN SECLUSION.

London, August 25.—The London morning newspapers print wireless despatches from the White Star steam ship Megantic, which say that Dr. Hawley H. Crippen and Ethel LeNeve are making the voyage from Quebec to Liverpool in complete seclusion from other passengers.

At any rate, it seems certain that the prosecution will fall to make good its claim that the fragments were those of a woman who once underwent an operation, the overwhelming weight of medical evidence being that it is a sheer impossibility to find such traces in remains in the condition of the Hildrop discovery.

As to the significance of Crippen's flight with Miss LeNeve, his typist, the defence will point out that it was perfectly natural for the doctor, in view of his wife's admittedly mysterious disappearance, to feel that it was by no means surprising for him to shrink from a police inquiry.

The finding of the human remains and the flight of the doctor are the only possible bits of evidence the prosecution has, Newton contended. "The only real view" he says "is that Crippen ran away, and upon that point the prosecution must make its entire fight."

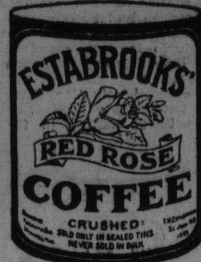

HASSAM PLAN IS ENDORSED FOR WATER ST. CONFLICTING EVIDENCE IN THE PAVING INVESTIGATION

General Foreman of Main Street Work Swore to Story Last Night Which May Affect Mr. Carleton --Another Hearing Held by Investigating Committee--Mr. Low Makes an Offer.

Council Yesterday Instructed City Engineer to Withdraw Order for Hand-Mixed Concrete on Water Street.

A special meeting of the Common Council was held yesterday at eleven o'clock to decide what provision should be made to obtain legal advice during the recorder's illness, and just what action should be taken with regard to the resolution previously passed, to have the Hassam Paving Company requested to lay the remainder of the concrete necessary for their pavement by the hand-mixed method.

Those present were Mayor Frink, Common Clerk Wardrop and Ald. Wigmore, Sprout, McGoldrick, White, Elkin, Smith, Jones, Baxter, White-Hayes, Potts and Sculley and R. S. Low of the Hassam Paving Co.

The meeting was called to order by the mayor, who explained his reasons for calling it.

Ald. Sprout called. In reply to the Mayor he said he was a member of the Board of Works last year. He said he and Ald. Holder were members of the sub-committee appointed to consider the specifications prepared by the engineer. They had submitted a verbal report, stating that they thought the specifications were of an iron clad character.

Ald. White said he had noticed the alternative clause, and considered it all right. A provision of a similar nature was inserted in nearly all contracts. As a mason he had often been told by architects that if an alternative method was good, he could use it.

Ald. Jones said he had had a conversation with Mr. Carleton, and that he had seen Mr. Carleton giving directions to the men.

Continuing witness said that in view of the fact that the concrete was laid on a damp sub-soil and covered in a day or two with wet sand and pebbles, he did not expect it to be as hard as if it had been exposed to the air.

To Ald. Jones he said he had heard Mr. Carleton complaining about the wall, and later stated that he would have his say when the work was finished.

Some Good Tests. To Ald. Jones he stated that he had made several tests of the work. A briquette taken on July 5, after setting 24 hours, broke at 35 pounds pressure.

The plot thickens. But whether the ethiopian in the Main street stone mill will be "coached" remains to be seen.

Assistant Engineer Hatfield stated that tests made from time to time possessed a greater tensile strength than the C. P. R. specifications for bridge work called for.
