EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA IS DEAD; GERMANS CAPTURE CRAIOVA

FRANCIS JOSEPH REIGNED 68 YEARS

Aged Austrian Emperor and King of Hungary Passed Away at Nine O'Clock Last Night in Royal Castle of Schoenbrun---Had Been in Poor Health for Some Time.

SUCCESSOR OF FRANCIS JOSEPH IS ARCHDUKE CHARLES FRANCIS, GRAND NEPHEW OF THE LATE EMPEROR—DARK AND TRAGIC HISTORY OF THE HOUSE OF THE HAPSBURGS.

London, Nov. 22.—Emperor Francis Joseph died last night at 9 o'clock at Schoenbrun Castle, according to a Reuter despatch from Vienna, by way of Amsterdam.

The first intimation received here that Emperor Francis Joseph's health was again the subject of volicitation was contained in a despatch dated Nov. 12, emanating from a Vienna news agency, which reported that the Emperor had been suffering for some days from a slight catarhal affection.

Subsequent reports from various sources, more or less conflicting, represented that his condition was becoming worse, but none of them indicated that his illness threatened to reach a critical state, and from Vienna came assurances that he was still able to give audiences to one or more ministers daily.

The New Emperor.

What gave some credence to the suspicion that his condition was much graver than the official bulletins indicated was the report, which still lacks official confirmation, that it had been decided to associate the heir to the throne, Archduke Charles Francis, in the government of the country, and

duke Charles Francis, in the government of the country, and that he was to assume the position on December 2 on the 68th anniversary of the Emperor's ascension to the throne. So far as is known here Archduke Charles is still at the front in command of the army.

Archduke Charles Francis, grand nephew of Emperor Francis Joseph, became heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary by the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand in Bosnia prior to the outbreak of the war. He has been in command of the Austrian armies on various fronts during the past two years

FEARED ROUMANIAN TROOPS CUT OFF

German Report of Fall of Important Town of Craiova Not Doubted in London as There Has Been No. Report from Roumania Since Sunday Last.

DEUTSCHLAND Rumford, Me., Nov. 21.—George Gallant, a French Acadian hailing from Westmorkand County, N. B., faces a murder trial in consequence of the death of Joseph Leonard, whose body was found last Friday morning in his bunk at the lumber camp of White & Partelle at Ten Degree Siding, above Houghton.

An investigation was begun by the authorities yesterday with the result that Gallant in locked up here charged with killing Leonard. The New Brunswick man will be given a hearing next Saturday, Gallant is 30 years old and came to Maine recently to work for the winter.

It develops that the two men were drinking together last Thursday night and a row started. Leonard was injured and was carried to his bunk.

The authorities have held a medical examination, but it failed to disclosed the cause of death. Leonard's stomach and heart will be examined at the Bowdon College Medical School. Brunswick, tomorrow.

FIRE INSURANCE EXPERTS

Report of Representatives of National Board of Fire Underwriters, Now in Hands of N. B. Underwriters, Contains Some Sensational Statements as to Conditions in This

It will be recalled that last summer four men from the National Board of Fire Underwriters spent some three or four weeks in the city charting and grading it from every angle of fire risk. They dealt with the fire hazards in various phases, the fire fighting facilities, water supply, fire department, fire alarm system and fire department auxiliaries, and their conclusions are now presented in a report to the New Brunswick Board of Fire Underwriters, just published.

They find that St. John is a hilly city with heavy grades. 52 1-3 miles of streets, of which about four miles are paved. The paved streets in fair condition, the rest mainly poor. 

Returned Hero at Bathurst.

Lieutenant Frank Meahan, of Bathurst, who was promoted on the field of battle for conspicuous bravery, and who also has been recommended for the D. S. O., is at present at his brother's home in Bathurst, on leave of absence. He arrived on Saturday afternoon and was met at the railway station by a large number of his fellow townsmen who had assembled to do him honor.

When the war broke out Lieut Meahan was employed on the staff of the Royal Bank of Canada at Calgary. He enlisted in the 31st Aiberta Battailon under Lieut. Col. Bell and after six months' training at that city he crossed over to England. Here he underwent further training, and in August, 1915, he proceeded to the trenches in France, where he was in the thick of the fighting until he was wounded at St. Eloi. His story is a thrilling one.

During the engagement he and three

During the engagement he and three companions found themselves cut off from their main body, and to this meagre handful of Canucks fell the tremendous task of holding that portion of the line where they were. It was a most important segment, and for forty-one hours Lieut. Meahan and his little band of three held the fort, beating back attack after attack of the foe. Against overwhelming odds they succeeded after a defense as stern and dogged as any told in the annals of this war. So near were they to destruction that at one point a German infantryman leaped on to their parapet and with the butt of his rifle dislodged two of Lieut. Meahan's teeth. The lieutenant lost his ivories but retained his nerve, and since then his antagonist has taken no further interest in dental or any other matters.

antagonist has taken no further interest in dental or any other matters. When at the last gasp the dauntless four were relieved and escorted to the rear and safety.

Lieut. Meahan was found to be suffering from a dangerous shrapped wound in the shoulder and he was promptly sent to the hospital. Here he remained four months after which he undertook light duty at Shorn-cliffe, in England.

He has been recalled for further service, this time with the 236th, and when the Kilties are ready Lieut. Meahan will accompany them to old scenes where he will doubtless win fresh laurels for himself, and further reflected glory for the town of his birth.


