She has disregarded every convention of warfare and consequently is not entitled to consideration from her enemies. If it should happen that Allied aviators should appear over Berlin and damage that capital to the extent London and Paris have been damaged by German aerial visitors, there would be some to cry "shame" and to talk of the inhumanity of the proceeding-but there would be ten thousand times as many who would read with interest the ac-count of such an air raid and their only comment would be summed up in these words, "it serves them right."




