The General Conference of "The Free Christian Bap tist Church of New Brunswick" met in social conference with the Church at Waterville, Carleton Co., N. B., on the morning of Saturday, the 4th Oct., A. D. 1873. The services commenced at 10 o'clock, A. M., the house being crowded. It was a time of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. The Spirit of God was present, and the hearts of the brethren and sisters, as they spoke of the joys of the Christian life and their hope of peace, joy and rest beyond the grave, warmed with its influence. All left the House feeling that it was good to serve God, and to have a place with His people.

and successes of another ecclesiastical year.

THE FIRST and most northwardly of our Districts contains nineteen churches, for the most part situated in the county of Victoria, and on the tributaries of the upper St. John, and contains a membership of four hundred and seventy-three. Its last District meeting was held with the Church at Gallop neighborhood, on the first of July. From the report of the Clerk, we learn, "while the reports of the churches show considerable weakness, they are more favorable than last year." Within the range of these churches is a vast extent of the most fruitful part of our Province, which is fast filling up with an intelligent, and hardly veomanry, and it can be but a few years when its primeval forests will give place to fruitful fields, and its solitary districts swarm with teeming inhabitants. Hitherto our principles and doctrines have been predominant, and to maintain that influence, and hold the ground for Christ and our denomination, necessitates that they be supplied with consecrated, and intelligent labourers, to instruct and bring them to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Elder Noble spent the entire year in labouring on this District. His field was so large, and the churches so widely separated, that, to give each a portion of labour, rendered it impossible to concentrate that effort in any one place that would have insured revival. Yet his labours have been invaluable in encouraging and strengthening the churches, and some souls have been given him as seals to his ministry. He visited nearly all the churches in the District, but the principle part of his labour was expended with the churches at Perth, Wicklow, and at Bath. In the last named place God was pleased to bless his labours with manifestations of his saving power, and seven were baptised; these, with twenty others, were organized into a church. He baptised, during the year, eight.

Elder McMullen also visited many of the churches in this District,

and extended, as he had opportunity, his fatherly care and gave council and encouragement, rendered doubly valuable by his age.

Licentiates D. P. Harris, Harvey Hagerman, and Wm. Dewier, are reported as expending valuable labour to many of the churches in this District, and are greatly encouraged by their success to continue on the field. Bro. Hagerman, who resides within its bounds, received a license from the District meeting for one year.

THE SECOND DISTRICT embraces all the churches on the eastern side of the St. John river, from Northampton to East Florenceville, together with the churches at Gordonsville, Knowlsville, Beckaguimac, and the contiguous settlements. On the western side of the river, its most northwardly boundary is the church at Tracy's Mills, willnot parish, and its branch at Knoxford, thence down to Woodstock, also extending westward over the boundaries of the neighboring State of Maine. membership of sixteen hundred and thirty. This is numerically the largest and most influential District in our Province, and residing within its borders are thirteen of our ordained Elders and a number of Licentiates. The reports of this year show a decided improvement over the past few years, in the number of churches supplied with pastoral oversight. Seventeen report this year having pastors, a part, or all the time, against six in 1871, and twelve in 1872. It is to be hoped this increase will still continue until none of its number should be without labor or care. The area covered by this District is agriculturally the most fruitful, by far, of any in the Province, and for enterprise and intelligence its inhabitants are unsurpassed. And that our doctrines are popular with the masses is shown by the recent census returns, giving the number of Free Baptists in Carleton Co. as 7,374, or almost one-half of its entire inhabitants. Taking into consideration these facts and figures, a sense of our responsibility should impress us, and with increased earnestness and zeal, we should endeavour to cultivate well and faithfully, this most important field which the great husbandman has committed to our care.

The 1st church at Woodstock, has had the pastoral care of Elder T. Vanwart for a part of the time during the year. He has laboured faithfully, and appreciatively, and during the past winter was blessed to see-some revival; four were by him baptised, and, with six others. added to the church.

This church occupies an important position, situated, as it is, in one of the centres of influence, having a large and constantly increasing population, and numbering among its membership, and congregation, men of piety, wealth, and talent, there seems but little to hinder it from becoming in time one of the most prosperous and useful churches in the denomination. Elder Vanwart has also had the pastoral care of the church at Lower Brighton. Under his labours in connection with this church, a most glorious revival was experienced, the church was much strengthened and encouraged. Thirty-two were by him baptised, and, with six others, added to its number. This church is also honoring God by building a house for His worship. When completed, as it will be in a few months, it will be a more graceful monument of their christian loyalty and patriotism "than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." May the glory of the latter house be greater than that of the former.

Elder Vanwart has also extended care to the church at Northampton and other places, as his time would permit.

The 2nd church, Woodstock, is still maintaining its integrity, and standing fast in the faith. Elder G. T. Hartley is reported as labouring with them with much acceptance and profit. They have also enjoyed visits from Elder McMullen and others, and are looking forward with hope that the good seed sown may bring forth an abundant harvest.

The church at Lower Wakefield reports a blessed work of revival under the labours of Elder Orser. Three are reported as converted and by him baptised and added to the church. Bro. Orser has the pastoral care of this church. stock, also extending vestential over the handling

Elder McMullen and others have made them visits, and they are reported as striving to maintain the unity of the spirit in the bonds

The church at Hartland has also the pastoral care of Bro. Orser. His labours are reported as acceptable, but no special revival has been experienced during the year. Licentiate D. McL. Vince expended a number of weeks labour with them, assisted by Elder McMullen; the church was encouraged and strengthened. Elders Lancaster (Free Will Baptist) and Doncette made them visits of comfort and profit. A tasty and commodious house is being erected here for God's worship. May it be speedily finished and filled with people and the glory of God.

The 1st Wakefield church has enjoyed the labour of Elder Aaron Kenney during the year. Although there has been no especial revival, the church is in union and co-operate heartily with the zealous labour of their pastor in the promotion of the cause of Christ. Their new house of worship is approaching completion, and will, when finished be a lasting monument of their love to Christ and devotion to his cause. Elder Kenney has also laboured with the church at Rockland for a length of time, and with marked success. Eighteen have been by him baptised and twenty added to the church. He was assisted in this work by Elder Lancaster, who has become a member of one of our churches.

The 2nd Wakefield church, where we are assembled to-day, has had the care of Elder T. Connor one-quarter of the time. His labours have been both profitable and acceptable. He has also spent a quarter of his time each, with the churches at Palmer Settlement. and Seventh Tier Jacksontown. Although there has been no especial revival, these churches are showing the benefit of faithful pastoral

care in their progress and influence.

The church at Tracy's Mills has had the pastoral care of Elder G. W. McDonald three-fourths of his time, and they report that he has laboured "efficiently and acceptably." That he retains so large a place in the affection and confidence of his people, after a pastorate of six years, is indubitable evidence of his faithfulness and zeal in the promotion of the cause of Christ and success in his pastoral work.

He has also given a quarter of his time to the branch church at Knoxford, where he was favoured to see a precious work of revival. Twenty-one souls were hopefully converted to God, and thirty-three were added to the church. Both the church and its branch, are united and loyal to Christ and the denomination, and are a tower of strength in their influence for good in the community.

Elder Macdonald has also visited other churches and preached

to them the word of life.

The churches at Gordonsville and Bridgewater have had pastoral care a part of the time from Elder J. Gravenor. His labours among them have been highly appreciated, and a help to the cause.

The First Bridgewater and Williamston Churches have been under the care of Elder S. Smith. The Churches report his labors "great-ly appreciated, and the fellowship of the spirit enjoyed in the bonds

of peace." Brother Smith also expended labor, both timely and profitable, with the Church at Greenfield. This little Church is making a commendable effort to build a creditable house for God's worship. Brother S. also visited and preached to other Churches in the District as opportunity offered. The Churches at the Mouth of Big Presquisle, Knowlesville, Second Peel Upper Peel, Celd Stream, Third Tier, Windsor, Jacksonville, Brookville, East Alva, and North Branch of Beckaguimae, have been without stated pastoral care, but have been visited at different times by Elders Doucette, Vanwart, G. Hartley, Siprell, Kenney, Orser, and McMullin; also Licentiate D. McL. Vince rendered efficient service in extending to them labor and care as opportunity served. The visits of these men of God were gladly received, and highly prized. Although without pastors these Churches are endeavering to maintain the worship of God, and though "weak," are still "pursuing."

A revival is reported in connection with the Church on the North Branch of Beckaguimae under the labors of Brother Charles H. Orser. As the result of that revival, Elder G. W. Orser baptized ten, and

added them to the Church.

Brother D. McLeod Vince, Church Licentiate, received a License from the District Meeting to preach the Gospel for one year.

THIRD DISTRICT.—The Churches of this District are located within the boundaries of the County of York, and number twenty-six, with an aggregate membership of fifteen hundred. It embraces the Churches on the Western side of the St. John River, from Fredericton to North Lake, and on the Eastern Side, from Upper Southampton to Marysville, including those at Caverhill, Campbell, and other Settlements, and those on the Nackawick and Nashwaak Streams. Nine of these Churches report having pastoral care—a part all the time, but the larger part of them have depended upon occasional visits from Ministers for their public labor. The cause in the District is reported as rather encouraging, revivals being experienced in many of the Churches, and there is still a determination manifest, to hold fast their integrity, and at all hazards continue to maintain the worship of God, and sustain the interests of his cause.

The Church at Fredericton has had the constant pastoral oversight of Elder J. McLeod for the past year, and report themselves in a healthy and progressive state. Especial Meetings were held in addition to their regular services during the past winter, the results of which are of lasting benefit in the revival of the Church and the gathering in of precious souls from the ranks of sin to become willing soldiers in the army of Jesus. Thirteen were baptized by their pastor, and added to the Church.

The Churches at Millville, Lower Southampton, Caverhill, and Lower Queensbury, have had the labor each a quarter of the time, of Elder S. E. Curry, since the last Conference. In connection with the Church at Lower Southampton, Brother Curry was favored to see the fruit of faithful labor in the gracious outpouring of God's converting grace. Wanderers were reclaimed, Saints rejoiced, and sinners were found earnestly enquiring the way to Zion with their faces tarned thitherward. Brother Curry baptized twenty-three,

who were added to the Church, with a number of others. This revival interest is still progressing. Thirty-seven were baptized in connection with the Churches at Lower Southampton and Upper Queensbury, seven at Lower Queensbury, ten at Doronton Hill, and two each at Temperance Vale, and Caverhill. Brother Curry's labors in this District have been abundant and highly successful. Elder McMullin also made a timely visit and rendered valuable assistance in this work.

A revival was also reported in progress in connection with the Church at Lower Canterbury, under the faithful labors. Elder-Mo-Mullin. and Brethren Hagerman and Orser. Brother Curry baptized twenty-three as the fruits of this labor.

The Church has engaged the labors of Brother Hagerman for six months.

The Church at Douglas has had the labors on Sabbaths, of Elder Kinghorn, which they report as a source of strength and comfort. Elder J. E. Reud came to his assistance in July last, and commenced a series of Special Meetings, which were continued for some weeks, and resulted largely in good. God was pleased to pour out abundantly of his Spirit. The Church was greatly revived, and twenty-two, by him, were baptized and added to its number.

The Church at Lower Prince William have engaged the services of Licentiate A. G. Lounsbury, half the time, for six months. Being destitute of pastoral oversight, in the past, they became weak and scattered, but are striving to maintain a Christian course, and feel hopeful that, under the faithful labor of Brother Lounsbury, it may be God's "set time to favor Zion," and they may experience a gracious display of His saving power.

The Church at Campbell Settlement have had no stated labor. They report visits from Elder Doucette and Brother Hagerman, which were enjoyable and profitable. Elder J. S. Jones also made them a visit of a few days, which proved a blessing. Four were by him baptized and added to the Church.

The 2nd church, Nashwaak, has had the pastoral care of Elder Gunter during the past year. Although there has been no especial interest religiously in this church, yet they have regularly maintained their stated services, both public and social, and are uncompromising in their loyalty to Christ and his cause. At present they are engaged in the commendable effort of erecting a more commodious house for worship, which, judging from their enterprise and zeal, will speedily be accomplished. Bro. Gunter baptised four in connection with the 1st Nashwaak church, the fruits of labour bestowed by young Bro. Bubar. This church is without pastoral care.

The church at Nackawick has had visits from Elder Curry, whose labours were blessed.

Licentiate Hagerman has also made them timely and profitable visits. They, too, have resolved to "arise and build," and a creditable house is in course of construction, which, they are hopeful, will be the birthplace of many souls.

They also had visits from other ministering brethren, which were sources of encouragement and strength. Licentiate Hagerman laboured with them one-quarter of his time.

The church at Middle Southampton have had no stated labour, but have been visited by Elders Vanwart, Fitzherbert, Curry, Jones, Gray, and Connor, and Brethren Lounsbury and Orser. The interest in the church, reported weak and scattered; but there are still some faithful ones, who are praying that "God will revive his work, and

in the midst of deserved wrath, remember mercy."

Bro. A. G. Louisbury received a license from this District to

preach the Gospel for one year.

At Kingsly and the adjacent settlements, efficient and faithful labour was bestowed by Elder Kinghorn and licentiate Henderson. God owned their labour abundantly, and in connection with, and as the fruit of it, thirty-six were baptised by Bro. Kinghorn, and a church was organized of thirty-four members, eight others having since united with them.

An interest was also experienced at Woodland, and thirteen were baptised in connection with it, and a church was organized by Bro. Kinghorn of thirteen members. Bro. Henderson's labours have been abundantly blessed in this District, and he has reason to rejoice that God has made him the instrumental means of saving precious souls.

THE FOURTH DISTRICT held its annual session with the church at Upper Gagetown, in September last, Fifteen churches are reported as belonging to this District, with a membership of eleven hundred and fourteen. How many of them reported at the District meeting, I am not informed, but the religious interest in the District is not as encouraging as desirable. Some revival is reported in connection with the church at North Branch, Oromocto, under the labours of Elders Gray and Brown. Bro. Gray baptised three, and Bro. Brown twenty-nine, which were added to the church. Bro. Brown is still labouring with them.

The church at Rushagornish also had the care of Elder Brown for three months, which was highly acceptable. The cause was

revived and four were baptised.

The church at Upper Hampstead had the pastoral care of Elder J. E. Reud until July, since which time they have been without a pastor. Bro. Reud's labour with this church was highly appreciated and his influence for good in the community, constantly on the increase; he felt, however, that a change of field was desirable, and has engaged for the current year with the church at Douglas, where, so recently, God has blessed his labour in the conversion of souls.

The churches at South Branch, Mill and Patterson Settlements, have been cared for by Elder J. G. McKenzie, for a part of the year, His labours have been much blessed, and the church much encourag-

He has also spent a part of his time among destitute Churches of this District, giving encouragement and council, and faithfully preaching the word.

Elder Solomon Smith, under the direction of the District Home Mission Society, spent one month at Waterville and other places in the District.

A Church at Otnabog, (colored) consisting of twenty-six members, applied for admission into the District, and was received.

THE FIFTH DISTRICT contains sixteen Churches, for the most part in the County of Queens. It held its Annual Session with the Church at Shannon Settlement in July last. It reports a membership of eight hundred and thirty-eight. But ten of its Churches reported at the last Meeting. Out of these but seven have had pastoral care.

The First and Fourth Hampstead, and the Jerusalem Churches report having the labors of Elder Taylor, for a part of the time during the year. Brother Taylor's labors are highly spoken of, as of great strength and encouragement, and these churches are looking forward in hope when the good seed he has so faithfully sown, will bring forth its harvest of souls.

The First and Second Churches in Kars, and the First and Sixth in Wickham have had the pastoral care of Elder B. Merritt, each a part of the time. These Churches report themselves as struggling for the life and vitality of religion, and are determined never to be among those "having a form of Godliness, but denying the power."

A blessed revival was experienced by the First Wickham Church. Eight were baptized by their pastor and added to their number. Visits from Elders McMullin and Connor, and Licentiate Carpenter, are highly spoken of and greatly appreciated.

Brother T. W. Carpenter spent six months with the Fourth Church, Wickham. His labors were largely blessed in the revival of the Church, and the general strengthening of the cause of Christ. The Second Church, Johnston, has had the pastoral care of Elder

The Second Church, Johnston, has had the pastoral care of Elder Fitzherbert half the time since the first of March. Meetings generally interesting, and the cause revived. One quarter of Brother Fitzherbert's time was spent with the Church at the Cove with much encouragement.

The Fourth Hampstead and Second Wickham Churches were without pastoral care, but report visits from Elders Merritt, Fitzherbert, Connor, McMullin, and Downey, and Licentiates T.W. Carpenter and Colpitts, which resulted largely in their strength and encouragement.

SIXTH DISTRICT.—This District embraces the churches in Kings, Westmorland and Albert Counties, numbering twenty, with a membership of ten hundred and sixty. At the annual meeting, convened at North River, in Sept last, thirteen churches reported. Some revival has been enjoyed by some of the churches in this District. but many

A number of the churches have been singularly unfortunate in being deprived of the labours of a pastor, even after they had secured one. The churches at Middleland, Erle Settlement, and Dutch Valley secured the pastoral care of Elder J. Shaw, but, in consequence of continued sickness and bereavement in his family, he has been able to spend but little time with them. He, however, saw some revival, and baptised three, and added six to the churches under his care.

ngs, emned vivany The churches at Corn Hill, Petiteodiac, North River, and Coverdale engaged the services of Elder French for the year. Bro. French entered with zeal and earnestness upon his work, and in the few months he spent with them, began to see the waters troubled and marked indications of good, when, by an inscrutable Providence, he was removed by a lingering illness—from which he has not yet recovered—from the field of his active toil, and compelled most unwillingly to relinquish his much loved work. Subsequently, under the direction of the Home Mission Board, Elder B. A. Sherwood was sent to visit those churches, and, assisted by Elder Weyman, was favored to see a precious revival in connection with the Church at Cornhill. Fourteen were kaptised upon a profession of their faith by Bro. Sherwood, and seventeen added to the Church.

Bro. Bamford Colpitts, a licentiate, has expended valuable labor with many of the churches on this District, and has always been received cordially, and his labor highly praised.

The churches at Millstream, Upper Millstream, Penobsquis, and Portage, have enjoyed the pastoral care of Elder C. T. Phillips, and report that difficulties of long standing have been removed, and the cause of Christ much encouraged and strengthened. Bro. Phillips has also extended care to other churches, as his circumstances would permit.

Assisted by Elder Perry, they organized a Church at Apohaqui, in Angust last, of thirteen members. Two were baptised by Bro. Phillips in connection with this interest.

At the Annual Session of this District the importance of ministerial labor was recegnized, and a Committee appointed, consisting of one Delegate from each Church to lay off the District into Circuits, and contemplate raising funds to employ a Minister to take charge of each, and thus supply themselves with much needed labor. The Committee performed their part of the work satisfactorily, and now should the scheme be carried out, and the Circuits consent to accept the services of men who are available, we may expect the reports of next year coming from these Churches to be far more encouraging than those received the last. And it would not be presumptous to anticipate gratifying results.

Brether N. Price, a Licentiate from the Middleland Church, under the direction of the Home Mission Board, made visits to the churches at Kingston, Long Reach, and other places, and his labours were gratefully received, and productive of much good. He received a license from the District meeting for the current year, and intends spending his whole time in active labor in the vineyard of the Lord.

THE SEVENTH DISTRICT embraces the churches in St. John and Charlotte Counties, numbering ten, with an aggregate membership of about eight hundred and ninety-five. At the last annual meeting, held in Carleton, St. John, eight of those churches reported.

This District experiences more difficulty in getting a representation at its annual meetings than any other in the denomination, owing to the fact that the churches are situated for the most part up on Grand Manan, Campobello, and islands adjacent, separated long distances from each other, and depending almost entirely for communication upon favorable winds and pleasant weather. Storms, adverse winds, or calms, frequently render their most anxious desire to meet at District meeting an utter impossibility. Six of the eight churches reported, have had pastoral care the whole or part of the time, and a number of them have experienced some revival.

The first Church in St. John is still under the pastoral care of Elder J T. Parsons. It maintains three religious services on the Sabbath, and three during the week. It reports the ordinances regularly administered, its congregation increasingly large, and its meetings deeply interesting. Especial meetings were held for five weeks in the Spring, and God was pleased to give the Church a season of refreshing. Forty-seven were baptised and sixty-six added

to its number.

The Church at Carleton, St. John, continues to retain the services of Elder G. A. Hartley as its pastor: It also experienced an abundant display of God's saving power during a saries of meetings held last winter and spring, when, under the earnest labours of its pastor, nobly assisted by the Church, thirty-nine were baptised and fifty-five added to its number.

The churches at Grand Harbor, Seal Cove, and White Head Island, Grand Manan, were under the pastoral care of Elder Barnes during the year. Bro. Barnes has laboured faithfully, and, though the results may not be as encouraging as some years in the past, he has not been left without some demonstrative evidence that he has not laboured in vain, or spent his strength for naught. On White Head Island, God gave him souls for his hire, as seals to his ministry. Twenty were baptised, and, with three others, added to the Church.

The Church at North Head, Grand Manan, had the pastoral care for a part of the year of Elder Babcock, and occasional visits from other Ministers, at present is without a pastor, and is anxiously praying the Lord of the harvest to send a faithful labourer to take

charge of the important interest in that place.

The churches on Campobello sent no report to the District meeting, but we learn, with the exception of the labour of Elder Malloch, who is a resident there, and occasional visits from others, have been without public labour, and are doubtless suffering the weakness consequent upon such destitution.

The churches at Beaver Harbour and Fair Haven have also been without pastors. They have had visits from Elder Garraty, but nothing especially interresting is reported in connection with them.

Thus your Secretary has gone over the several Districts, and as far as the information flurished him would serve, has given you an idea of the condition of the cause of Christ, in connection with our denominational field. The report, he is well assured, is imperfect; it could not well be otherwise; he is obliged to write of Churches, localities, and persons of which he has no personal knowledge, and depends entirely for his information upon the reports he receives from District Clerks, and from the Elders as they assemble at General Conference. If any Church or persons feel that they have not been correctly reported, or if any have been overlooked, it is not intentional, but because proper information regarding them was not available.

A brief resume of the information given in the Report will be of service in enabling any who are desirous to remember the prominent points of interest.

Living at present in the Province we have *Thirty-six* ordained Elders. During the past year *Twenty-cight* have been engaged in pastoral work, *two* have been on the Mission field, and *six*, through age, infirmity, or other causes, have been without a pastoral charge.

The number of Churches in the denomination is One Hundred and thirty-four, containing a membership of Seven Thousand five hundred and seven. Fifty-four of these Churches were supplied with pastors the whole or a part of the time during the past year, and the number added by baptism is FOUR HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FIVE.

Dear brethren, we live in an eventful period of the world's history, and have a most important part to perform. We have to hold to the gospel in its integrity and preach it in its fulness; in days of skepticism, question and debates. By presenting it with such scriptural accurracy and manly intelligence that it may be seen to be wisdom, with such living emphasis that it may be felt to be power, we shall do more than we possibly could in any other way to purify society and help on the real progress of mankind. For only as the principles of the gospel of Christ permeate education, politics, science, literature, and every other department of private or social life, will that movement that never stops, be a movement in advance, and lead on to the perfection that the gospel contemplates.

Above all let us seek that consecration of heart and life that it is the will of God we should acquire. Only thus shall we achieve great spiritual results, and be the instrumental means of saving the lost, raising the fallen, and bringing glory to our Divine Lord. Oh, let us not forget our responsibility; let us labour most conscienciously and faithfully to discharge our trust. Our Elder brothren, honoured and beloved, how fast are they falling! Colpitts, Cronkite, Mesereau, Shaw, Hartt, McLeod, names of blessed memory, for their consecration and usefulness indeliably inscribed on the records of our denominational history, how quickly they have followed each other! they are gone and have left the field to us. Oh, let us with the spirit of

prayer and full consecration throw ourselves anew into the work, labour with more and more skill, as experience gives facility, and more and more diligence, as the lengthening shadows admonish us that the day is far spent. And when the darkness of eventide comes, as come it will, may we with girded loins and unwavering trust, step with confidence into the river of death, and forget the tolls and sacrifices of the past in the joy of the "well done" that will greet us on the other shore.

BRO. MODERATOR.—Your Delegate to the Free Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia, begs leave to submit the following report:-

I find the main objects of these delegations are : First-To report the standing and success of our own denomination. This I attended to according to the best of my knowledge and ability. I was glad to have the privilege of meeting with and reporting before was glad to investig of the same hearts and touched with the same blessed spirit as our own. TEMPERANCE.

It is fitting that each year this Conference should have under consideration the subject of Temperance, since each year the deadly work of intemperance goes on. And though a mere protest on paper may seem a useless thing, and as of no avail as a preventive force, and may by some abstainers be lightly esteemed, and by lovers of strong drink and those who profit by it, be laughed at and derided, your Committee do not forget that "constant dropping wears the stone," and that the annual protest of a Conference representing so large a body of christians as does this, cannot be for naught, especially as it indicates a corresponding

effort.

Your Committee cannot but deplore the prevalence of drinking usages. They see with sorrow how this enemy of mankind has secured a foothold almost everywhere, making his deadly influences to be felt in all grades of society. The prospects of the young are dimmed, the hopes of parents are blasted, the gray hairs of age are brought in sorrow to the grave, the sacred precints of home are invaded and all its sweetest joys are blighted. wives are made widows, children are made orphans, society is corrupted, our Alms Houses and Penitentiaries are filled, men go down prematurely and dishonorably to the grave, and hell is peopled by this fell destroyer of human kind. Even the Church of Christ suffers; and many whose lives seemed full of promise of usefulness, bave yielded to the fascinations of the "cup that inebriates," have forgotten their "high calling," and their lives have been miserable wrecks. No person, no organization, no position is safe from the attacks of this enemy. Is it strange, in view of what is thus briefly indicated and outlined, that alarm should have been aroused in many hearts? The people would need to be harder than adamant that could see and hear all the fiendish work that rum is doing and be unmoved. No man who desires the good of society, of his family, or of himself, can be an uninterested, unmoved witness of the evils and sorrows that grow out of the rum traffic. Too long it carried on its work, not only unchecked and unprotested against, but having the sanction and encouragement of the professedly moral and pious. We rejoice, however, that a change has taken place.

The time was when the temperance movement was laughed at, and its promoters pitied as fanatics, or derided and abused as hypocrites. But that day, thank God, is passed. The movement, despite all opposition, has steadily gained ground. The reasonableness and necessity of total abstinence have commended it to the mind of men of all classes in all civilized countries. The handful of advocates of a low years ago have grown to be a mighty bost, and the claims of the movement are such as to compel consideration where it is not voluntarily given. Let those who are disposed treat it with assumed contempt if they will, or join hands with those who profit by the unboly traffic, to burk if they choose, yet the fact remains that the temperance question is now, and will continue to be, one of the leading questions of social, religious and political life.

In Great Britain, the agitation in favour of prohibition goes steadily forward. Twenty years ago a score of temperance reformers formed the United Kingdom Alliance, its object being the legislative suppression of the traffic in all intoxicating liquors. The agitation by the Alliance, though meeting the sternest possible opposition, has not been barren of good results. It has generated and propagated a public opinion strongly in favour of legislative restriction. Prohibition is the end sought, and already there is a minority of no inconsiderable numbers and influence in

the House of Commons who are prepared at any time to vote in favour of local or general prohibition. In the United States the agitation has assumed immense proportions, so much so that politicians, who have hitherto held aloof from active participation in it, begin to see the necessity to identify themselves with it if they would hope to preserve their political life. At the National Temperance Convention, recently held at Saratoga Springs, measures of the utmost importance were adopted. It was resolved "that the time has arrived fully to introduce the temperance issue into State and National politics; that all friends of temperance make it henceforth the paramount issue; to co-operate with easiting party organizations, where such will endorse the legislative policy of prohibition, and nominate candidates pledged to its support; otherwise to organize and maintain separate, independent party action in every State, and in each Congressional and Electoral District of the United States." Nor is this a mere meaningless resolution, answering the purpose of an escape valve. There were present at the Convention the ablest representatives of the Temperance Reform, and they only expressed the convictions and determinations of tens of thousands of the staquechest teetotalers scattered all over the Union. It is safe to predict that National prohibition will be the ultimate result of the movement so vigorously pushed to: ward.

In our young Dominion the friends of temperance and prohibition have not been idle. Slowly, it may be, but surely, temperance principles have gained ground, till in every nook and corner of our country there is a conviction, stronger or weaker, that decisive action is necessary to overthrow the curse of the nineteenth century—the traffic in and use of intoxicants. At the last session of the Dominion Parliament a large number of petitions, praying for a law to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, were presented from Ontario and Quebec. The first that were presented received no attention whatever, but as they continued coming, day after day, Parliament was compelled to take some notice of them. They were referred to a select committee, the report of which committee is a very interesting, instructive and encouraging document. 447 petitions were presented; 68 were from Municipal Councils, three from Church Courts, the others contained 36.224 names, of persons in all ranks of society; and then, in addition to these, the Legislature of Ontario presented a petition, which certainly is a very significant fact. We cannot do better here than to embody a portion of the report of that committee as submitted to the Parliament. They say:—

'Your Committee are fully convinced that the traffic in intoxicating liquors is detrimental to all the true interests of the Domition, mercilesely slaying every year hundreds of her most promising citizens: plunging thousands into misery and want; convertiog ber intelligent and industrious sons, who should be her glory and her strength, into feeble instrictes, her burden and her shame; wasting millions of her wealth in the consumption of an article whose use not only imparts no strength, but induces disease and insanity, suicide and murder, thus diverting into a hurtful channel the capital that should be employed in seveloping her resources, eatablishing her manufactures, and expanding her commerce; in short, it is a cancer in the body politic, which, if not speedily eradicated, will man the bright prospects and blight the patriotic hope of this noble

"Your Committee are not unmindful of the serious apparent diminution of revenue which would temporarily result from the suppression of the manufacture and sale of these destructive liquors; that it would be much less in reality than appearance is perfectly clear, for a very large amount

of the expenditure for criminal jurisdiction, and maintainance of gaols, penitentiaries and asylums, would be saved immediately, and should be deducted from the apparent loss; but even were it otherwise, your committee would regard it as directly contrary to the spirit and fundamental principles of our truly British code of laws to allow any consideration of loss of revenue to hinder the removal of this great national eril, or to accept any amount of revenue us an equivalent for legalizing a traffix sypernicious in its inevitable effects upon the community. They are, moreover, firmly of opinion that, instead of impoverishing the revenue, the effect of a prohibitory liquor law, faithfully enforced, would be largely and permanently to increase it, saving the fifty millions of dollars now expended annually in the Dominion for these liquors, and converting that immense sum, now lost, into a capital yielding large returns from its being employed in trade and manufactures.

"Your Committee regard it as the first and highest duty of Parliament to legislate for the peace, happiness, and material prosperity of the people, and consequently for the removal and prevention of evils such as are proved to be now injuring and threatening the country through the common use of intoxicating liquors; and would respectfully recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be favourably entertained, and that the Scnate, at the commencement of the next session of Parliament, do appoint, with the concurrent action of the House of Commons, a joint committee of both Houses upon the subject to consider what areps should

then be recommended to Parliament in connection therewith."

But Ontario and Quebec are not alone in this movement. In this Province the friends of temperance have not been idle. True, their attempts hitherto to secure proper legislation have measurably failed, yet they are not discouraged. It having been established that a prohibitory law, such as is needed, can be enacted only by the Dominion Parliament, the prohibitionists of this Province have resolved to co-operate with Quebec and Ontario, and there is no doubt the other Provinces will come at once into line. A few weeks ago the initial steps were taken in the organization of the "New Brunswick Temperance and Prohibitory League." Petitions have already been circulated, which, after being signed, are to be forwarded to Parliament. That they will be largely signed there can be no doubt, and that they will have some weight in Parliament cannot be questioned. The promoters of this movement co not expect to accomplish their purpose in an hour, nor without persistent, self-denying effort, but they do expect to be successful sooner or later. The foregoing facts are full of encouragment, and should incite to zealous, increasing efforts.

Your Committee think it cause for sincerest thankfulness that the denomination here represented has always been avowedly in favour of total abstinence, and that its tuinisters and other prominent members have given no little assistance to the movement. That the denomination has done more than its duty, your committee does not think, for no christian body can be too outspoken in such a matter, nor make too strenuous exertions for the furtherance of total abstinence principles. That the denomination will continue to do as heretofore, we believe; and we only suggest that in whatever respects there may have been detects in the practical carrying out of the principles professed, there may be remedy applied at once. If, for instance, church members are given to tippling; let them be disciplined, for that church cannot be pure and strong that retains in its membership one who is addicted to the use of rum, especially if the church, as is the case with ours, has in its covenance a binding pledge to abstinence. E. C. Freeze, Esq., from the Committee on Education, submitted the following Report:

Your Committee on Education is not unconscious of the responsibility which rests upon it, when called upon to report upon a subject of such vital importance, surrounded as it has been by prejudices, and beset with difficulties.

That God designed that the faculties with which He has endowed us should be improved, and that these faculties thus improved should be used for his glory and the welfare of the human family, none can deny. The most illiterate person cannot but admit that an educated man-all other things being equal-possesses greater powers for good than he who remains in ignorance.
The question then, with us, is not so much whether we should

educate, as it is how we shall accomplish it.

Taking this view of the case, your committee will, as briefly as possible, make a few suggestions and leave this conference to take such action as it, in its wisdom, may see fit to adopt.

1st. Seeing that the educational facilities in this Province, through the Free Non-Sectarian School system, have been largely increased, and that all may now avail themselves of their advantages, from the lowest grade of schools to that of the University of the Province, and that all special grants for separate schools have been swept away, your committee are of the opinion that the establishment of a purely literary institution, as a denominational school, is, at the present time, not required, and to attempt the establishment of one would be injudicious, until a more urgent necessity shall be felt.

2nd. That a strong desire exists among many of our people to assist young men, whom God has called to preach the gospel, in procuring an education, and especially a more extensive knowledge of theology, is well known, and that some, at least, of the young men thus called are desirous of studying to show themselves approved unto God, by endeavouring to extend their usefulness by an increase of knowledge, is also evident. In view of these things your committee would suggest the propriety of an effort being made by the Conference to meet the requirements of the latter by encouraging the liberality of the former.

3rd. Seeing that there is now in existence, in connection with the Free C. Baptist denomination of this Province, an Educational Society, your committee would suggest that this Conference not only recommend but encourage the Society to establish, as soon as practicable, an institution at which our young men, who are contemplating entering the ministry, can secure at least a partial theological training, should they desire it.

4th. That a higher standard of literary attainments be required from time to time of young men seeking ordination, as the facilities increase for an education.

5. That in the meantime, should the Education Society raise a Loan Fund, to be used in assisting young men having the Ministry in view, to procure an education, the Conference give its full sympa-thy to this movement, provided the same Society shall make provision that such young men shall be none other than those who have been approved by this Conference.

6. Your committee are of the opinion that any young man who feels to be called to preach the gospel, should make himself at least familiar with the rules of his own language before asking to be set apart to the ministry, and your committee would recommend that persons

The Executive Committee has not been able to presecute the Home Mission work this year to the same extent as formerly, in consequence of the formation in several of the Districts, of District, or Local Societies. Your Committee has held five Meetings for the transaction of business. They have employed four Missionaries for short periods, amounting to eight months, and have expended for the same \$192.90.

The balance in the Treasurer's hands is \$253.28.

On account of the inclemency of the weather, the Foreign Mission Society held its Ninth Annual Meeting with the Church at Waterville, on Wednesday evening, 8th instant, at 8 o'clock, instead of Tuesday evening, as advertised.

Rev. T. Vanwart, President, in the Chair. Meeting was opened by singing and prayer.

In his opening remarks the President spoke of the object of the Meeting, and of the doings of the Society, in promoting Foreign Missionary work.

The Treasurer, Brother W. Peters, reported the Financial state of the Society, and expressed an earnest desire that enough might be raised at this meeting to pay our Missionaries' salaries up to July 1st, 1873.

The Corresponding Secretary of the Society, the Rev. John Perry, was called upon, and read the following Annual Report:

we have come before you with the pleasant task of reporting sure and steady progress, but the year just closed has witnessed a more than usual display of Divine blessing on the efforts of our Missionaries, and we can but join with them in that beautiful exclamation of the Psalmist, "Sing praises to the Lord which dwelleth in Zion, declare among the people His doings." In giving a general outline of the work at all the stations, the Missionaries say: "Every one of our churches has been refreshed, and the accessions by baptism have been comparatively large. The Christian community has become stronger, not only numerically, but spiritually stronger. The working power of the native Church has been developed and augmented more than in any previous year. No more cheering fact than this can be recorded of Mission work amongst the heathen." The Church at Midnapore, over which Bro. Phillips minsters, and in which we are the more immediately interested, has partaken not a little of these Divine blessings, as the following statistics will show: Received by baptism 44; received by letter 3; restored 4; dismissed by letter 1; excluded 1; present number 113. The one dismissed is now a worthy member of the Sartipore church. The person excluded is a victim to qunja, a poor debilitated, half-demented wretch, with whom the Church has long borne in vain. Though the son of a native preacher, born in the Mission, he has sold his Lord for the intoxicating indulgence, and brought himself and his family to poverty and shame. It is a fearful warning to all who tamper with intoxicating drugs; yet, notwithstanding this painful instance of intemperance, we are thankful to say that the temperance movement is gaining ground in the Church and the community, and has already done much good. Four wandering prodigals have come back to their Father's house. They had long been a reproach to the name of Christian and a stambling block in the way of others, Those who have been baptized are almost without an exception leading exemplary lives. The members at the two sub-stations have been doing well, particularly at Bhimpore, among the Santals, where there have been several accessions. The most cheering feature of the year, has been the hearty interest nearly every one of our Church members has taken in the welfare of the unconverted. The special revival meetings, fraught with so much good here among our own Churches, has been adopted by Bro. Phillips with cheering results; he says, "In June a series of special services were held daily, for a fortnight, and two brethren from abroad were invited to assist us in labours for the salvation of souls. Their kind help and labour of love will not soon be forgotten. The blessing of God attended our united efforts and a goodly number were added to the Charch. One memoer of the Church, who has been a lay preacher for several years, has received licence from the Association and entered upon his duties as a regular native preacher. The Church has assumed the entire responsibility of his support. This is a step in advance and will bring a blessing, we have no doubt. The Sabbath School, Bible Class, Dispensary, Printing Press and Bazaar Book Room, are each receiving the attention of the Missionaries, and much good is being accomplished through them. The Bazaar, or street preaching, is

continued with much promise for the future. Here the truths of Christianity are brought to the attention of many who otherwise might never hear of the plan of salvation through the crucified Redeemer, and where once the Missionaries' time was taken up with religious controversy, more for the purpose of interruption than information, now a more respectable attention to the Gospel message is observed, and in some instances people have followed the preachers to their homes and begged earnestly to be better instructed in the way of life, which indicates a spirit of earnest inquiry abroad amongst the people that we firmly believe will yet lead many to the Lamb of God. The visiting the women and children at their own homes, is a branch of the work that, under the superintendance of our Missionary's wife, employs in this district twelve teachers, most of whom are from the girls' home. The uniform earnestness exhibited by these girls, in their daily work, has been very pleasing, and it is with grateful hearts that these faithful, zealous toilers notice a growing distrust in idol worship among the people as the fruits of their efforts." The Santals Schools, of which we have learned much about in Bro. Phillips' former reports, are steadily progressing under his guidance. They number forty-nine. The number of pupils enrolled is eight hundred and ninety-seven. It is a significant fact that sixty-two of these are Santal girls. The old superstition against teaching girls to read and write is fast yielding to a better judgment, and now, in some schools, the girls are winning honors which are not to be surpassed by the boys. The schools are highly appreciated by the people wherever established, and more schools might be opened at once were the teachers forthcoming. This deficiency will be supplied in time, however, by young men now in training. Several of the teachers have declared their purpose to become Christians at whatever cost, and it is loped that they may have the courage to face the persecution of their friends. With such a large number of children, under the immediate instruction of Christian teachers, what a glorious harvest may we not anticipate at no distant day. God speed the time! The cold season, as usual, has been taken advantage of by our Missionaries and party, in preaching tours through the country. More ground has been gone over than in any previous year, and many incidents that have gladdened the heart of the disciples of Christ and quickened their zeal in the Master's cause, have come under their notice. We regret that our space will not admit of a more extended notice, but the following highly instructive and carefully compiled figures, furnished us by Bro. Phillips, from the Census of 1872, will give our friends some idea of the magnitude of the Midnapore district, in which our Missionary is endeavouring to scatter the Bread of Life, and the great amount of work yet to be accomplished before this part of the field becomes christianized. The district of Midnapore has an area of 5,082 square miles, and a population of 2,540,965 souls. There are, therefore, on an average five hundred souls to a square mile. But our Santal work extends into the adjoining districts of Bancoorah, Purulia, and Singbhoom, so that probably not less than three million human beings are depen-dant solely upon the Midnapore mission for the Bread of Life.

If so, are we (like our Baptist brethren in this Province,) willing to arise at once and do all we can to supply this great, this urgent want? God help us one and all to decide aright. Again, and again, have our hearts been overflowed with compassion for the poor Santals, who, thirsting for the Gospel message, appeal continually to us for "Some one to teach them in the jungle," asking imploringly, "How can we learn?" Among this interesting tribe, Bro. Phillips longs to devote his life, and looks forward with bright anticipations (when freed from the cares at the Statiou,) to the happy time when this, the dream of his younger days, may be realized. Brethren, is it too much to ask of the Parent Society that our Missionary and wife be permitted to devote themselves to the salvation of the Santals? Think of it. We feel that God is calling leudly to us,—bidding us move in that direction. Financially, we feel to say that we have no fears. At our last Annual gathering, a number of responsible brethren came forward and pledged themselves to become responsible for our Missionary's salary by taking shares, and we know that these pledges will be forthcoming, now that they are needed. But should any deficiency occur, we feel confident that the amount, which our friends here assembled intend contributing, will place us beyond embarrassment. Brethren, as we turn to the work of a new year, let us go from this place determined, by God's help, to dare to do greater things for our Foreign Mission, and our Heavenly Father will continue to smile upon us.

MINUTES

OF THE

Fourth Annual Meeting of the Sabbath School Convention.

WATERVILLE, CARLETON COUNTY, Oct. 4, 1873.

The Fourth Annual Meeting of the Sabbath School Convention was held with the Church at Waterville, on the 4th instant, at 7 o'clock, P. M.

President, Rev. A. Kenney, in the Chair.

In the absence of the Secretary, Brother D. McLeod Vince was appointed pro tem.

Convention opened by singing and prayer by Rev. W. Kinghorn.

R. C. Freeze, Esq., Sabbath School Agent, read the following Report:—

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT,

BROTHER CHARMAN,-

Your Agent, who has for some years past, endeavoured to present statistical and other information on Sabbath Schools, would do his work with pleasure, could be secure a ready and hearty co-operation from the Sabbath School Superintendents and District Clerks; but, from some cause, many of them have, thus far, failed to make

returns, while others have promptly done so.

The Sabbath School becomes more and more a necessity. In this age of the world, when men's minds are so engrossed with care and anxiety, a day when the God of this world reigns supreme, when mammon is more the object of devotion than, probably, at any former period of the world's history, it requires the Church to raise up a standard of Christian light to stay, if possible, this tendancy, and lead the young to Christ. The wildest enthusiasm prevails in society for wealth and pleasure; steam and electricity apparently have given strength to this feeling, and nothing but truth, God's truth, accompanied by his Grace will check the evil. Experience has proved that, early impressions are the more lasting, which corresponds with that saying of God's word, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." While this injunction should rest with weight upon parents, it is an incentive to the diligent and faithful child of God, who is labouring in Sabbath School work.

Youth is the time to plant the seeds of truth, just as spring calls forth the husbandman to labour in the deposit of the grain; and the more the Sabbath School laborer examines the evident tendency of this fast age, the more will his heart become anxious that truth should be the foundation of every character formed under his hand.

I am pleased to state from enquiry, as well as from reports in my possession, that the Free Baptists of this Province are not relaxing their efforts in this department of Christian work, but, that the reverse is true. Schools are more regularly and promptly organized in the spring, where it is found not convenient to keep them open the whole year, and greater exertions are being put forth to make each individual School a success; and hence, success as a whole must follow. Times are changing, the educational institutions of the country are improving, greater facilities are now given for a common school education than formerly, and hence a greater necessity to induce the young to guard against the light literature every where far too common, and too much read by persons of all ages. It is important that a taste for literature of the opposite nature should be begotten, and this can be done by training the young mind to reflect upon the truths which flow from Divine revelation.

In this we have a necessity, which should be promptly met, a staff of instructors is required who are competent to impart such truths. Among the many complaints made, by the Superintendents writing me, is the want of teachers competent to instruct a class,

and impart truth in an interesting manner.

While we have labored earnestly for the conversion of the adult, and God has abundantly blessed our labors, we have not turned our attention sufficiently to the young. In some instances the Sabbath School has been wholly separated from the Church, and members of the Church seem to feel as though it was no part of their duty to even contribute towards its support. If this be so, we then, as a denomination, should be awake to the truth that a serious defect exists among us, and at once direct our attention towards its removal. this point you will allow me to suggest that an arrangement be made for the preparation and publication, during the incoming year, of not less than six articles on subjects like the following:—

1st-"The duty of Church members towards the Sabbath

School."

2nd—"The Sabbath School a part of Church work."

3rd—"Preparation necessary for Sabbath School teaching." 4th-" Advantages of uniformity of Sabbath School lessons."

5th-"Books of novel tendency should be excluded, and the best means of doing so."

6th..." The necessity of early religious training."

Such articles, if carefully prepared and published in the organ of the denomination, one every second month during the year, could not fail in doing much good. I hope an effort will be made to carry out this suggestion. The uniformity of lessons is now being adopted the world over, and should have our attention. The facility for securing books for this department, is every day increasing. The British and American Book and Tract Society of Halifax, whose agent has been, and is now in the Province laboring to introduce their works is well calculated to supply the wants of School Libra-

That Society contemplates opening a depository in Saint John; should this be done, then I would suggest a Committee, whose duty should be to reject objectionable books, (which work their way from time to time, into almost every S. S. Library,) in case Libraries

should be selected there.

We cannot be too guarded on this point, for good impressions made in youth are enduring, but bad ones are doubly so; hence, books which are silently leaving impressions on the young mind should contain nothing but purity. I have made no attempt to prove the necessity of a Sabbath School for every community, for the day has happily gone by when any person of intelligence objects to their necessity and utility. I must make an appeal to all friends of this body of Christians, labouring for the extension of the kingdom of Christ, to see that in every place where it is at all possible, that an efficient Sabbath School is kept in active operation; the times demand it, the Church requires it, and God will hold us accountable for our remissness of duty to the young. I consider this the more reliable as returns from the other six districts are only partially in. I have reckoned this as one-fifth of the whole which is probably below the actual number.

From this estimation we get the following:-

Quite a number of conversions were reported, but I am not able to make even an approximation of the whole during the year. It is gratifying to know that God so abundantly blesses the labours of the Sabbath School officers and teachers as to make His truth the instru-

ment for their conversion.

In closing this Report allow me to present a suggestion offered by a Brother, that an effort be made to secure the services of some competent person or persons, in the early part of the Spring, to labor in organizing Sabbath Schools, and in every way to encourage the friends of the Schools—secure a prompt and early opening of the same, and that a fund be raised to defray the expenses. The idea is a good one, and I have no doubt it would be attended with success. I trust the suggestions contained herein will receive careful consideration.
