Dominion Parliament.

Ottawa, March 24.
The Speaker took the chair at 3 p. m. After routine a number of petitions were presented, among which were several praying for a remission of the duties on type and printing materials. On motion of Sir John Macdonald, it was decided that when the House adjourned this evening it would stand adjourned till Wednesday.

CUSTOM TAILORING.

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Mr. Domville thought the people of New Brunswick would be disgusted with the conduct of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

He and Mr. Mitchell had sat together the last five years in the house, but nothing had been heard of this matter.

Mr. C. J. Smith demanded a la

Huntington, that if there was anything to charge him with, let a Committee be appointed.

Mr. Domville moved for a statement of damages to cattle, goods &c., on

Intercolonial Railroad paid during 1878.

Mr. Ordren moved for the correspondence relating to the duty imposed by the United States on tin cans containing lobsters, salmon and other

sea food, which under the Washington Treaty, should not be imposed.

Mr. Killam said an order in Council had stopped the fishing between the

10th of Aug. and the 1st of April, and he would like to know why the rules should be modified, as it was altogether needless.

Mr. Killam said that a rule would be of no benefit whatever.

Mr. Robinson (Shelburne) said a difference of opinion prevailed upon the subject; some preferred the close season, some the reverse.

Mr. Ordren expressed himself as being in favor of the close season, as

productive of larger lobsters. Fish packed in the summer were of a better kind than those in the winter.

Mr. Robitaille said that if the result was to be ruinous to the packers, it

would not save the fish from ruin. The close season now fixed was absolutely necessary.

Mr. Flynn said that what was suitable for a close season in one part

of the coast was not so in another. The practice of fisheries differed. In his constituency fishermen were compelled to support themselves for a year by three months fishing.

Mr. Snowball said a close season was as necessary for Lobsters as for

other fish, but a close season which would save the fish from ruin, not suit the Northern coast of New Brunswick where the season and circumstances were different.

Mr. Ordren said that nearly all the packers in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, had

been asked to sign a petition in favor of the new order. If the order had not been passed the packers would have lost out packing on the 1st Aug. as the market was over stocked with fish.

Mr. Ives (Richmond and Wolf) followed.

He admitted the importance of the question before the house, but deprecated the discussion of the general principles of Protection at such a length as it was going on. He thought it was somewhat absurd for gentlemen on the opposite side of the House going over all the stock arguments against the principle of Protection when the country had declared overwhelmingly in its favor.

Hon. Mr. Pope denied the accusation, and promised the papers.—Motion carried.

Sir A. J. Smith moved for accounts and bills showing in detail, with prices, the goods and supplies furnished to the Department of Marine and Fisheries by the late firm of Messrs. Mitchell & Co., Montreal, from January 1870, to 1st January, 1874, &c.

Mr. Pope was surprised at such a motion from a member who had had the control of the Department for the last five years.

Sir John said some reason should be given, but he thought there was no need to look for it. During the last five years Hon. Peter Mitchell was present in house; now he was absent.

Sir A. J. Smith shirked that point, he did not like it. He said there would be found to be important public reasons for a third year's delay.

He started off to talk about some light house keeper or other, till called to order by Sir John Macdonald. Then he was found to be a martyr and that some member was always attacking him and then he sat down.

Mr. Oliver (North Oxford), spoke against the Tariff. He argued that the manufactured goods that came into Canada from the United States were a small proportion of the total of manufactured goods consumed in Canada.

Mr. Tilley claimed that Canada would speedily afford a home for thousands of the surplus people of England.

There was land and room for millions; and the people of England and of Canada, when they knew the increased duties were necessary to develop the resources of the country and might denounce the changes which had been made, but he ventured to say that the great mass of the people in the country would endorse them, because they were in the interest of the people and for the good of Canada.

Mr. Tilley said he estimated that next year 105,000,000 pounds of sugar would be imported.

To do this, 120,000,000 lbs. of raw sugar would have to be imported, and at 4 cents per pound, \$4,800,000 would be paid, and the people would pay \$2,800,000 more of the cost of the sugar.

Mr. Tilley said the refined sugar trade would for the future be more with England than with the United States.

The same might be said of the Tea Trade and Wines and Spirits. Brandy from France, Gin from Geneva, Whiskies from Great Britain, Rum from West Indies, Wines from France, and other products of the same kind, would be more of French manufacture.


