## MR. SMITH AND TEMPERANCE.

E. Tennyson Smith Endeavoring to Arouse Newcastle Audiences.

#### FAIR ATTENDANCE

Meetings Gaining in Interest And Good Results are Confidently Expected.

It takes something out of the ordinary to attract a large audience, especially to a temperance lecture, and much more to arouse any degree of enthusiasm in Newcastle, but Rev. E. Tennyson Smith has been able to do both to a marked degree and each evening his meetings are becoming more and more interesting and arousing more enthusiasm, so that the temperance people are confident that much good will be achieved. Mr. Smith is a forcible speaker who uses strong language in dealing with the liquor question; which he has evidently made a deep study of judging by the manner in which he deals with it and those who carry on the trade. His humorous and pathetic sketches of the drunkard or those under the influence of liquor and those on whom temperance casts its shadow are rendered in such a style that the audience is provoked to laughter or brought to tears.

These meetings should be attended by all our citizens, and people from surrounding villages should not miss the opportunity of hearing such a renowned speaker as Mr. Smith. The meetings are held each evening and no charge is made for admission except Friday, when the trial of Alcohol will take place.

On Monday evening Tennyson Smith at his meeting in the Opera House, commenting upon the press reports of the attack made upon him by Magistrate Kay of Moncton delivered himself as follows:— "I must compliment Magistrate Kay upon his discretion, although not upon his courage, in reserving his attack upon me until I had left the town and the district. It is the motto of pettifoggery lawyers all the world over if you have no case abuse the opposite side, and Magistrate Kay is calling me "an irresponsible little-brained Carrie Nation tramp fanatic" simply proves his willingness to substitute personal abuse for intelligent argument. For myself I never fling the mud of personal abuse at my opponents, because I have the rocks of truth and sound argument at hand.

The fact is Magistrate Kay is still pursuing the tactics which he adopted at the public meeting in Moncton when I asked him a straight-forward question in a respectful manner. He simply attempted a game of bluff and talked long but wide of the mark and aroused the audience to irritation and indignation against him. He apparently thinks that the best way for him to burke further enquiry is to continue this game of bluff and attempt to throw dust in the eyes of the public.

Now let me tell Magistrate Kay that it does not affect the question of the disgraceful state of affairs which I criticised at Moncton, whether I am "little-brained" or whether I am "an irresponsible tramp fanatic," or whether I am "paid \$30 a night," and I once again ask him publicly to give a straightforward answer to a definite question, side issues alone. The question is this.

"Why were not the commitments against the liquor sellers whom he had sentenced to jail put in force until three weeks after they had been issued by the clerk."

When in Moncton I blamed no one in particular simply because it was then impossible to locate the blame, but over and over again I stated that I did not believe the fault lay with the police. Now if Magistrate Kay knows that the police were not to blame let him be honorable enough to clear them, for he knows whether or not he gave the commitments to them with instructions to set upon them and whether they neglected to do their duty or whether the delay was occasioned by his own failure to do his part.

## FIGHT BETWEEN CHURCH AND STATE IN FRANCE

Roman Extremists Show Sympathy with France—More Hopeful Feeling at Paris to-day.

Paris, Dec. 17.—Interviews with Ecclesiastics as well as the tone of the Clerical press indicates a feeling favorable to the reception of the Government's bill amending the Separation Law of 1905, and the prevalence of the belief that it will prove acceptable to the church as it places the clergy under a real regime of common law.

Rome, Dec. 17.—The extreme parties strongly protest against the repression of yesterday's popular demonstrations here in sympathy with France and are organizing new manifestations. The leaders meanwhile urge their adherents to leave their cards at the French Embassy where they are piling up by thousands. The Spanish Government has notified the Vatican that it objects to taking charge at present of archives of the Papal Nunciature at Paris. Spain certainly would have accepted the task if requested by the Vatican to do so. When the Papal Nuncio at Paris, Monsignor Lorenzelli, was recalled, as France then could not have made any objection. But after the expulsion of Montignor Montagnini, the Secretary of the Nunciature and the search of the archives, such an act might have been regarded as hostile to the French Government.



# King Alcohol Will be Placed on Trial on Friday Night

In the Opera House, Newcastle.



KING ALCOHOL ON TRIAL.

Unique Closing of Tennyson Smith's Crusade Against Liquor, Which Will be Seen in the Opera House Friday.

This picture shows a scene in defense of alcohol in addition to Tennyson Smith's famous "Trial of Alcohol," which is to be held in the Opera House, Newcastle on Friday evening the closing night of the campaign.

This is generally looked forward to as the principal event of Mr. Tennyson Smith's meetings, and is quite unique, for it is different from the usual mock trial in several respects. For instance, Mr. Smith, who acts as Prosecution Attorney, does not know if he will win or lose the case and the verdict is not arranged beforehand, but depends upon the view which the jury take of the evidence is not sham evidence, but the witnesses will testify only what they know to be actual facts with regard to the doings of Alcohol, who as the prisoner in the case is charged with the crimes of "robbery and murder."

The positions of Judge, Clerk of the Court, Sheriff, and Crier are filled by local gentlemen.

The committee secure the services of an able lawyer to undertake the defence of the prisoner Alcohol, and from reports in the press of the Trial in other places a very strong defense is frequently put up.

Sometimes two lawyers are engaged for the defence, and we learn that on several occasions the liquor dealers have sprung a surprise upon Tennyson Smith and his Committee by supplying a lawyer at the last moment to take up the

done elsewhere.

At Newcastle, Pa., when Mr. Smith had leading attorneys against him, he lost the case. Alcohol being discharged. Mr. Smith, however, applied for a new trial which was granted although we understand he always opposes strongly an application for a new trial when the verdict is "guilty."

Several local people will appear as witnesses to give evidence of the evil wrought by alcohol. An effort is being made to secure as jurors, leading citizens who are likely to give an unbiased verdict as it is desired by the committee that the prisoner shall have a fair trial. In other cities we understand the most prominent citizens have sat as jurors, and have taken considerable interest in the case. In case extreme prohibitionists are put on the jury the attorney for the defense has the right to object to them on the ground that they are unduly biased against alcohol. Mr. Tennyson Smith, who holds very strong views on the temperance question, will no doubt bring forward some strong evidence against alcohol, but on this occasion he will have to back up his assertions with indisputable proof, and it remains to be seen whether he will win or lose the case.

In many cities the largest buildings have been taxed to their utmost capacity. At St. John every reserved seat was bought up, to numbers of those

who had failed to secure early door tickets before the day was glad to pay for standing room. At Washington and Chicago so much interest was aroused that the committee desired Mr. Tennyson Smith to repeat the entertainment but his engagements did not permit of this.

It is therefore expected that a large crowd will assemble on Friday night, especially as this will be the last opportunity of hearing the distinguished English orator who is considered the most dramatic speaker of the day.

The usual charges for admission to the Trial are 50 cents and 25 cents, but in Newcastle the Committee has arranged that there shall be a charge of 25 cents to all parts of the building and no reserved seats.

An advantage is however to be given to those who purchase tickets beforehand as they will be admitted by an "early door" without extra charge. It will be seen by an advertisement in our columns that these tickets may be obtained from any member of the Temperance Committee.

The following gentlemen will take part in the trial.

Judge—Ald. John Clark; Counsel for Defense—T. H. Whalen; Counsel for Prosecution—E. Tennyson Smith; Clerk—B. P. Steeves; Constable—Thos. Hill.

A jury of well known men will be chosen, and a number of interesting witnesses will give evidence

After years of mismanagement, it says, Mr. Emerson introduced a series of reforms and economic and administrative plans which have put to rest the calamity howlers and "white elephant" writers who pleaded for the sale of the "Intercolonial" and praised without stint the great "C. P. R." the largest private corporation endowed with public property in the whole Dominion. He has shown that a railway under government control may be so operated as to bring the total of the red-ink column to read "success." Australia and New Zealand have contributed generously to the advanced school of world economics. Canada, the while, has conservatively accepted the conventionalities of finance and been content to laugh at the "confessions" which the reform movements in the United States have so effectively, at times brought forth. Now, since Mr. Emerson has shown that a government railway which has developed and made stable a group of provinces can also record a balance of a quarter of a million of dollars, the "white elephant" agitators may be given a chance to retire.

Collier's has no bias, is under no political influence, and is far enough removed from the turmoil of Canadian party disputes to view Canadian matters in fair proportion. Its generous commendation of the work of the Minister of Railways is no more than just and undoubtedly voices the opinion of all whose minds are honest and eyes unclouded by partisan prejudice or corruption control.

In Charlottetown last week Commissioner McEwen was engaged in looking into a peculiar case in which the leading figure was Jas. Nowlan, alias Strong, alias McAdam, a half-breed hailing from Nova Scotia. Nolan reached Prince Edward Island about 1870 and married Phoebe McAdam. In 1882 a Bathurst Indian woman appeared at Nolan's home, and, for some reason, not waiting an interview with her, Nolan took his departure, going to Stirling and changing his name to Strong. At St. Peter's, C. B., he married again, and in due time deserted his second wife. At Sydney he entered the liquor business and married again, this third time. In 1906 he died, leaving an estate worth \$20,000. In his will he recognized the children of all three marriages. It is over the will that trouble has arisen. It is claimed that Nolan was four times married. Another complication in the case is caused by the fact that Phoebe McAdam was herself married after being deserted by Nolan. The next commission for taking evidence in the case will meet at Bathurst, N. B.

The question of providing efficient inspection of canned meats and fish, brought up in the Canadian Commons last week, is a very important one, both from the standpoint of the national health and of our foreign trade. We trust that the mistakes of the Americans, as regards the packing and canning establishments, will not be repeated on this side of the line.

By permitting religious bodies, whose clergy have not complied with the new law, to retain the use of their churches if their laymen apply for permission to hold services therein, the French government have for the present solved the difficulty raised by its dispute with the Roman Catholic church. Probably the matter will be settled by mutual concessions without an appeal to arms.

The demand of the manufacturers for higher customs duties has received a very decisive answer from the Liberal members of the three prairie provinces, who have informed the government—that they are unanimously opposed to any increase in the tariff. The Western farmers are supported by those of the East, and the great bulk of consumers will agree with them. The day of higher protection is not yet.

Fuel is still very scarce in Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba on account of the long dispute between the coal operators and their employees only recently settled. The remaining coal areas should be kept in the government's possession so that no difference between a few men can so disarrange the country's business and imperil the safety of its citizens. Let us keep the remaining natural resources free from liability to be locked up from use at any time in a private quarrel.

Great deposits of coal, iron and clay have been discovered in Northern Ireland. This should make Ulster a great manufacturing province. There are enough minerals in sight in different parts of the world to last humanity for many thousands of years. So with the wood supply, if it were properly looked after, but at the rate forest fires are allowed to sweep through Canada year after year, our lumber will soon be exhausted. And then we must plant trees, and gather all sorts of vegetable refuse for the manufacture of paper while the wood is growing.

Although the House of Lords gave the radicals Trades Disputes Bill its second reading, it has, besides killing the spirit of the government's Education Bill, by amendments, unceremoniously rejected the Lower House limiting each property holder to one vote, no matter in how many counties he has estates. The Lords seem bent upon finding out how far they can oppose popular legislation without precipitating a revolution. But if the people resolutely back up their representatives, the irresponsible body that considers itself the Upper house will have to surrender or pass out of existence. The day of its dominion has passed.

expression of disapproval of the course followed by some Liberal newspapers, his remarks being founded on a discussion reported to have taken place in the late caucus of the Liberal members in Ottawa. There are members of Parliament, on each side of the House, on which the party traces sit so snugly that they consider it heresy, on the part of spokesmen of the party or of journals supporting the general policy of the party, to utter any sentiments or express any opinions that have not received the hallmark of the party's approval. Of course, the great majority of the members of Parliament hold no such views, but recognize that all they can fairly expect from any public journal, worthy of the name is that independent support that comes from acquiescence in a general line of policy. The journal that undertakes to give more than this degenerates into an organ, and holds the respect of neither friend nor opponent.—Montreal Herald.

Those who have the interest of their own town and country at heart will not send their money to distant cities for goods which can be obtained as cheaply from their fellow-townsmen. The home merchant's should be able to give as good value as Montreal and Toronto firms can afford to do after paying heavier freight. Money sent a thousand miles west will not tend to make living conditions any better here. Let us, whenever all other things are equal, patronize our own people, those who live in our midst and spend their incomes among us.

The influence of the Russian revolution, which has not yet succeeded in freeing Russia, has been widespread. Last year, the Austrian and Hungarian governments, fearful that the armed strife would spread into their territories, granted manhood suffrage and abolished all property qualifications for members of parliament. And, lately, little Montenegro's ruler has granted his principality a constitution and parliament.

The general progress of the Western nations has been the means of establishing a parliament in Mohammedan Persia, and the Chinese government has commanded its people to prepare themselves for a constitutional system.

## DECLINE OF MILITARISM.

The military spirit shows signs of decay in many quarters. Last week the German Reichstag unexpectedly voted against the government's proposal to keep at least

3000 soldiers permanently in Southwest Africa, refusing to make provision for more than 2500. The Kaiser, in disgust, dissolved the House; but, considering that the socialist vote in Germany increased from 25 per cent. of the total in 1898 to 32 per cent. in 1903; and is still growing, to say nothing of the Populist and other Reform parties, it is doubtful if the next House will be any more docile than the last. The German parliament were evidently tried of the attempt to reconquer the revolted Africans; and like the Italian Chamber in 1895 when Italy's army was expelled from Abyssinia refused to increase taxes to promote the glory of a few military leaders.

Last year a war between Sweden and Norway was averted by the Swedish workmen giving their government to understand that they would not sanction an unnecessary waste of blood and treasure.

France has reduced the term of military service from three to two years; and the lack of volunteers for the Canadian army has to be balanced by the enlistment of men from the British service.

Among all the white nations there is a growing tendency towards peace and an increasing aversion to military service and hasty declarations of war.

planted in 1421 by a Princess of Na-

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

## MOVING TOWARDS CHURCH UNION.

**General Committee at Toronto is Making Good Progress.**

**Maritime Baptists Afraid Organic Union is not Practical—Anglicans have their Cardinal Points to Consider.**

Toronto, Dec. 14.—At the general committee meeting on Church Union in the Metropolitan church Thursday afternoon, the session was largely given up to correspondence from the Anglican and Baptist churches, stating their attitude on the question of organic union with the three denominations that now have it under discussion. The report of the special committee on correspondence with the above bodies was read and adopted. It provides for the appointment of several committees to confer with representatives of these two churches.

The correspondence from the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces shows that the church in the east does not think favorably of organic union as being practicable yet speaks favorably of federal union. The Baptists throughout the other parts of Canada appear disposed to meet the committee and consider what steps might be taken.

At the last conference the Baptists appointed the strongest committee they could name, but so far no steps have been taken in the matter other than their expressed courtesy of the invitation extended them and a willingness to confer with the committee on the subject.

The committee will also meet with the Anglicans, and though the outlook, so far, is indefinite regarding that body, it will show that the way is open to take preliminary steps towards the great end. If the union is affected with the church of England, four cardinal points will have to be accepted by the other denominations that is, that the Bible is the sole rule of faith; apostles and nicene creed the rule of doctrine; that the words "institution of" and that the two sacraments, and historical continuity of the church cannot be shaken. The church is willing to do away with its liturgies and special forms of worship, but will not yield the above points.

The report of sub-committee on church policy elicited considerable discussion. The chief objection raised to the report as submitted was that it was too indefinite. It was felt that definite clear, business-like system of church governing bodies of churches interested would wish to have a clear understanding of what the proposal involves. The report was, therefore, after discussion of the first two clauses, referred back to the sub-committee to prepare a more detailed statement, and report at a later stage in this conference, or at a future meeting, as may be convenient.

The clauses, as submitted and discussed, read as follows:

"(1). That local affairs of individual churches, charge circuit or congregation directly or by local boards, sessions or committees, shall be conducted by the local authorities of the churches, and that the general committee shall have no direct interference with them."

At St. John, Dec. 14.—The Salvation Army authorities are now busy perfecting their arrangements for placing a large number of immigrants in the maritime provinces during the ensuing year. The Allan liner Ionian, which is due at Halifax on Saturday, will have on board sixty-nine people coming out under the army's auspices, half of whom will settle in the provinces. The remainder, mostly women and children, will go forward to join relatives in the west.

Adjutant Jennings, who is in charge of this branch of the army's work in the maritime provinces, would be glad to hear from any farmers or others who may require help between now and next June. By forwarding applications for men now a better chance is given for the army to fill the openings as they arise.

Quite a number of those coming from the old country will, it is said, be on the lookout for farms for themselves, and the adjutant has already a list of suitable farms for sale. He will willingly add the name of any who have farms they wish to dispose of. Communications should be addressed to him either in St. John or Halifax.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

**Homestead Regulations.**

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.

(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
