INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT SALMON

Mr. Alexander Mowat Visits Kedgwick for Parent Fish for Hatchery.

Mr. Alexander Mowat, Dominion Fishery Officer has just returned from the Kedgwick River, where he has been collecting some breeding salmon in order to supplement the supply of eggs gathered at the New Mills retaining Pond.

Mr. Mowat reports the fish very plentiful in the upper pools of the rivers. He took 105 very large salmon in one draw of the seine and 200 in all for the supply of the hatchery. All these fish were taken from one pool near the Junction of the Kedgwick and Restigouche. The fish are retained in a wire inclosure in the river for a few weeks, when their eggs will be collected and transferred to the hatchery at Flat Lands.

The parent fish are marked with silver tags before being liberated, the length and weight of the fish are taken, with the date and number of tag which are all recorded. This method of marking is leading to wonderful information as to the movements migrated and growth of the salmon. Also a few scales are taken from some of the fish and forwarded to certain professors at Ottawa and in the United States, who have made a life study of the habits of the various fishes. There appears to be no question of doubt but what the age, and movements of a salmon can be determined from a scientific examination of the scales, that is the annual growth of the fish, how long it has remained in the ocean before migrating into the rivers and how many years before it has reached maturity and so forth and so forth.

At least one of the marked hatchery salmon supposed to belong to one of the rivers on the North Shore below Quebec, was caught this season in Bay Chaleur. Another off the coast of Newfoundland, so that the information along these lines is becoming interesting.

Mr. Mowat reports that big game on the Kedgwick and Upper Country are very plentiful, where the poacher has been unable to reach. He thinks the Government are deserving of great deal of credit for the manner in which they are protecting the game and administering the lumber regulations. The two great assets of the province but much remain to be done, especially in the protection of the game and the setting apart of another game reserve in the County of Restigouche.

He is survived by his wife and three daughters: Mrs. Harold V. Shaw, Montreal; Mrs. Sterling Bachan, Port Arthur; and Miss Georgie at home, to whom the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended in this their very sudden and sad bereavement.

British Estates Are Now Rapidly Changing Hands

Wealthy Men Selling Out

THE ownership of England is rapidly changing hands—the physical ownership. The history of British real estate has seen nothing like the present. In the past, the ownership of the land was concentrated in the hands of a few great families. But now, the ownership is being sold off in small parcels to the general public. This is due to the fact that many of the great families are now selling out. They are doing so for a variety of reasons. Some are doing so because they need the money. Others are doing so because they want to live in the country. Still others are doing so because they want to pass on the land to their children. In any case, the ownership of the land is being sold off in small parcels to the general public. This is a great change for England. It means that the land is now being owned by the people, instead of by a few great families.

Various explanations are offered for the great activity in the British real estate market. In the case of the Marquis of Bute, who has just sold his great Welsh coal land holdings, the reason is fairly obvious. He was a witness at the Coal Commission and the miners subjected him to a merciless cross-examination. There were many pointed questions about the origin of his title to his lands, and the origin of the commission's deliberations was a report recommending the nationalization of the coal industry. It is conceivable that Lord Bute thought he would sleep better if he got out of the coal business.

On the other hand, there has been wide discussion of the advisability of some form of nationalization of the land, cutting up the great estates and distributing them among small holders. Before the war this was a heated political topic, and Lloyd George carried the hatred of Conservatives by his advocacy of the policy of counselling great land-owners to sell their holdings to their tenants at a government determined price. In 1915 the Duke of Rutland created a sensation by putting a large part of his Scotch holdings on the market. Since the war the demand has been to cut up the big estates and give land to the returning soldiers and sailors.

Just as the Marquis of Bute seems to have thought it wise to get out of the coal business, large owners of land may deem it wise to get out of the real estate business. The selling state of public opinion to let some one else meet the demand for land for the soldiers. The question part of it is that there are just as many people willing to take a chance on the land being nationalized as there are those who want some one else to hold the bag.

And this brings up the point that there have been many large and unexpected fortunes made in England by the war. In other words, there are numerous war profiteers who are diverting themselves by purchasing estates, while the present proprietors cannot resist the opportunity to gather in the huge profits to be realized by selling at inflated prices. For there is an even greater and a more universal lack of housing in England than there is in the immediate neighborhood of New York.

As an illustration of the way the real estate business has opened out in England this year, while the sales now are averaging \$5,000,000 a week, they only amounted to approximately \$57,000,000 for the whole of 1915, and the sales for the first week of July this year were more than a fourth of the total sales for July, August and September, 1918. Included in the sales in the first week of July were about 370 square miles of Scottish land.

A remarkable thing about the movement of British real estate has been the large proportion of it which has been sold by auction. The Swine Gilmour estate of 143,800 acres in Ross and Sutherland counties, Scotland; E. M. Stewart's estate near Perth, of 3,200 acres, and C. A. Cunningham's estate of 2,400 acres at Roxburgh were sold at auction. Sir Richard Glyn's Dorset property brought \$1,000,000 under the hammer, while Lord Chalmers's Barrow property brought over \$500,000 on the block. Sales bringing from \$200,000 to \$1,000,000 are not at all uncommon.

Old farmhouses have been carefully treated so as to bring out, in the literal sense of the term, the beauty of beamed ceilings and new old half-timbered work, which had been concealed by a generation that sometimes paper over antique oak panelling, and did other equally reprehensible things. Until lately, in a number of ways and for purely humanitarian ends, many tenanted houses in London took on a new lease of life, after alteration, as private dwellings, and the real estate turning shops to purely residential purposes is still going on in some of the "suburbs."

Some fifteenth and sixteenth century houses are included in properties shortly to be sold. Chaucer owned the manor and advowson to the living of Weyhill, which were presented by Charles I to Queen's College, Oxford, for services rendered during the civil wars.

Rival to Telephone.

An invention of great commercial possibilities which is equal in importance to the telephone, is the hot wire microphone, and it was the subject of a claim by the inventor, Major Tucker, before the Royal Commission of Awards to Inventors sitting in London, England.

Mr. Romer, for the claimant, said the award of £4,000 was made in March on the undertaking that the patent be handed back to the inventor. The award had not been paid, and a letter had been received from the Treasury to say that the Government desired to reassign the patent absolutely to the patentee.

Claimant desired to have the patent for his own use. Experiments were constantly proceeding, and the Government was one of world-wide importance. Therefore, the patentee was not anxious to get rid of any of his prospective rights.

It was used by a great many people, and had been captured by the enemy.

An arrangement was made, on the lines of a suggestion by the chairman, that the patent be given to Major Tucker with a license to the crown to use it as they thought fit. Major Tucker will, therefore, have the commercial use of it, but the state will have the use as far as the post office is concerned. The chairman expressed the hope that the £4,000 would be paid very promptly by the Treasury.

Danish Dairymen.

In view of the fact that the people of the United Kingdom have accustomed themselves to eating margarine instead of butter during the war, Danish dairymen expect that the butter exports to the United Kingdom in the future will be only a fraction of what they were prior to the war. At the present moment the production of butter is down to 16,000 cwt. (112 lbs.) weekly as compared with 25,456 cwt. weekly before the war.

One result of the foregoing circumstances is that the Federation of Danish Dairies has turned its attention to the export of new milk to the neighboring countries lying to the northeast, east, and south of Denmark. During the last five or six years the sale of cream in Denmark has undergone a peaceful revolution through the introduction of homogenized-sterilized cream in bottles. The cream is passed through a machine which homogenizes it—i.e., breaks the fat globules in the milk into such fine fragments that are so small that they no longer float to the surface but become an integral part of the milk. The homogenized cream is then bottled and sterilized at a high temperature for fifteen minutes in an autoclave. Cream treated in this manner keeps for an unlimited period.

ROMANTIC OLD EMPIRE

AUSTRIA BROKEN ASUNDER BY PEACE PACT.

History of the Country. What of the Hapsburg Dynasty and Austria Was Never a Nation in the Modern Sense of That Word—The Rise and Fall of the Holy Roman Empire.

THE hands of the peace treaty to the Austrian delegates at St. Germain-en-Laye marked the end of what was perhaps the proudest and most romantic of modern empires. Unlike modern Germany, the legacy with which Austria inspired its subjects and partisans did not lean on a superior material grandeur and technical organization but on a sentimental background of historical memories and associations. Austria was the successor of the Holy Roman Empire—that is, the successor of a fiction, the supreme political anachronism in the twentieth century.

Austria has never been a nation. It begins in the ninth century as a military frontier of the Frankish Empire; it became later the family estate, first of the Babenbergs, then of the Hapsburgs. In the first half of the seventeenth century it was the armed camp of counter-reformation militant Catholicism; in the second half the standard-bearer of Christian Europe against the Turk; in the first half of the nineteenth century, the spirit behind the Holy Alliance; in the last fifty years the outpost of German militarism on its road to Constantinople. But it has never been a nation; rather, its existence was a negation of the national idea, and it was the victory of the principle of nationality, also called the self-determination of peoples, which sealed its fate.

The history of Austria is the history of the Hapsburgs. The Babenbergs, who in the tenth century received the "Ostmark" or Eastern margravate of Bavaria as a fief from Emperor Otto the Great, built up, in the struggles of three centuries, the nucleus of the Austrian state merely to prepare the way for the advent of the Hapsburgs. In 1282 when Rudolf, the first Hapsburg emperor, installed his sons Rudolf and Albert as dukes of Austria and Styria.

From that time Austria was, in times of good fortune, the base of Hapsburg campaigns for continental supremacy, in periods of adversity their last refuge and stronghold. With the Emperor Frederick III, in the middle of the fifteenth century, Austria ascended to European hegemony. Characteristically, this ruler, who was beaten in all his wars, laid the cornerstone of glory that was to come. His son, Maximilian, one of the most brilliant rulers in European history, while making the prestige and machinery of the Holy Roman Empire an appendage of Austrian grandeur, also founded Hapsburg world power in the treaties which insured his house the succession to the thrones of Burgundy, Spain, Hungary and Bohemia. His grandson, Charles V, German King, Roman Emperor, was also ruler of Spain, the Netherlands, the larger part of Italy and the Americas. But the consolidation of the future Hapsburg realm was accomplished by Charles' brother, Ferdinand, King of Hungary and Bohemia and Archduke of the Austrias.

The century preceding the Treaty of Westphalia in 1648 received its stamp from two great historic events: one, the Reformation, the other the aspiration of the House of Austria for continental supremacy. In the first decade of the Thirty Years' War, from 1620 to 1630, this aspiration was realized in full. Bohemia was crushed by the imperial armies, Denmark and the North German prince, were humiliated and for a brief time even the Baltic became an Austrian lake. The cause of Roman Catholicism saved the empire from the wreckage of the Thirty Years' War.

The alliance of Roman Catholic France and Lutheran Sweden, while ending the religious character of the struggle, wrested most of the fruits of this victory from Austria. In the peace of Westphalia, which also sealed the disintegration of the Holy Roman Empire. This event also marked the beginning of a more clearly Austrian, as distinguished from German, orientation of the Hapsburgs. Between the years 1650, the battle of St. Gothard, and 1690, the Peace of Karlowitz, falls what is perhaps the most glorious period of Austrian history, that of the wars of liberation which ended in breaking forever Turkish hegemony in Europe. With the attack of Frederick the Great on Maria Theresa, in the middle of the eighteenth century, began the struggle for the leadership of Germany between the Houses of Hohenlohe and Hapsburg, which ended in 1866 in the full victory of the former.

The victory of Napoleon crushed the last vestiges of life from the anemic body of the Holy Roman Empire and promptly and completely abandoned the older title and consoling himself with that of Emperor of Austria.

The expulsion of the Hapsburgs from the German Confederacy in 1866, and the simultaneous loss of the last Italian dependencies, ushered in the last epoch of Austrian history, that of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy. Through this period the German financiers and industrialists of Vienna and the Magyar landholding aristocracy oppressed and exploited the Slav masses of the confederation. This drove Austria-Hungary into the arms of German imperialism, a combination which challenged the mortal enmity of Russia.

A PROPHECY BY HEINE.

He Foretold Germany's Madness 80 Years Ago.

The war Germany waged against the rest of humanity was prophesied about eighty years ago by a great poet of Germany, Heinrich Heine, according to an article by Alfred Pargant, which appeared in the *Giornale d'Italia*, a newspaper published in Rome, Italy.

The article quotes, in a translation from the German, Heine's prophecy. Following are the significant parts of the quotation:

"You have, oh Frenchmen, no suspicion of what it (the German revolution) will be like; the German revolution will be neither milder nor more violent because the criticism of Kant, the transcendental idealism of Fichte, the philosophy of the philosophers of nature, preceded it. These theories have developed revolutionary forces, and are only awaiting the proper moment to explode and fill the world with terror and admiration. Then will appear the followers of Kant, who will no longer wish to hear piety mentioned when referring to the world of facts any more than they allowed of it in the world of ideas; and they will turn upside down with club and hatchet our entire European life in order to eradicate the very last root of the past. On the same scene, will come the followers of Fichte and will be impossible for vain volitional fanaticism to be dominated either by fear or by self-interest for these philosophers live in the pure idea, and disdained material things, similar in this to those primitive Christians who were to be conquered neither by corporal punishment nor by the alliance of terrestrial joys. The philosophers of nature will be terrible in that they put themselves in connection with all the original powers of the earth, evokes the occult forces of German tradition calls to life again the forces of the entire German pantheon, revivifies that fury of battle, which we find in the ancient Teutonic peoples which wished to fight not in order to overcome his enemy, but to fight simply for the sake of fighting."

"Then in that day, oh men, you will see! The God Thor will rise with his gigantic hammer and demolish the Gothic cathedrals. When, on a near neighbor of France, shall hear the uproar and the tumult, be on your guard, and do not occupy yourselves with that which we in Germany will be doing, for you might get into grave trouble. Take care not to blow on the fire, take care also not to attempt to put it out, for you might burn your fingers. The peoples of Europe will group themselves as upon the steps of an amphitheatre around Germany to see a great and terrible game. I advise you, oh Frenchmen, to keep quiet, and above all, to take care not to applaud! We could so easily misinterpret your intentions, and push you a little brutally according to our coarse and impetuous way."

"You understand perfectly that when the wish comes to fight, you, the Germans will have no difficulty in finding an excuse on that occasion. I counsel you to be on the alert. Whatever happens in Germany, whether the royal prince of Prussia or Doctor Wirth becomes dictator does not matter. You, oh Frenchmen remain always armed, and remain quietly in your place. But at attention. I have for you only good intentions, and was almost terrified when I heard just lately that your ministers were contemplating the disarmament of France."

"Fragments of the prophecy were quoted by French and Italian newspapers at the time of the bombardment of the Rheims Cathedral, but in that form it lost its significance. Alfredo Panzani was the first to quote it in its entirety."

A Prelude to Oblivion.

Religious fanatics are again busy prophesying the end of the world, arguing that the four years of war-horror is but a prelude to oblivion for everyone.

Meanwhile, however, the man in the street is not worrying. Perhaps he remembers the many occasions when the prophets have tried to make his flesh creep with similar bogies.

Now and again, however, people have taken them seriously. The appearance of comets has often been thought to foretell the speedy dissolution of this world. If the fall of a comet touched the earth we should all go up in smoke in the fantastic manner which has been revived at intervals during recent years.

The story of the comet spread great alarm, however, throughout Europe in 1832, and many persons refrained from undertaking or concluding any business during that year, in consequence solely of their apprehension that the terrible comet would dash us and our world to atoms.

October 13th has been a favorite date for prophesying the end of the world. This has its origin in the prophecy of the famous mathematician, Blaise Pascal, who, in 1666, said that the world would be destroyed in that year on October 13th.

Crowds of people assembled in the big open spaces of London on that date, nothing happened, and Winston Churchill became the laughing stock of the metropolis.

Schleswig Rich Land.

Schleswig, the northern portion of the province, Schleswig-Holstein of Prussia, is adjacent to Denmark, says an exchange. The northern part of the former duchy is peopled mainly by Danes. Excellent harbors are on the eastern coast and the agricultural land is there also. The western coast consists of marshy but fertile marine alluvium. Agriculture is the chief occupation and much rice, wheat, barley and hay are produced. The province is famous for its excellent cattle, which are exported to the world over for breeding purposes. Manufacturing industries are little developed. Its position relative to the Baltic Sea and the North Sea has increased its commercial importance to a great extent.

The seal is a typical marine animal, and hence the occurrence of a species of plover in Lake Balikal, which is of fresh water and has no connection with the sea, is of special interest. Dr. Charles Rose has obtained skins and skulls of two specimens of the Balikal seal, which have been offered to the Museum of Natural History, where the species have not hitherto been represented. It is a fish-like animal, which habitually lives in fresh water, though the common seal will often resort to estuaries, and even ascend rivers, as one did some time ago in the Trent, as far up as Huddersford, where it was shot. The Viktor is again common in the Arctic regions, and also found in the north of the Baltic, occurs in lakes Ladoga and Onega. It is able, however, to reach these from the Baltic by means of the rivers Neva and Svir. The Balikal seal, on the other hand, has no communication with the ocean. Their occurrence in Lake Balikal, along with abundant salmon, points to a change in the physical geography of the district. They suggest that in former times an arm of the sea stretched from the Arctic Ocean to the south of the present lake.
