The Hamilton Motor Men and Conductors Go Cut on Strike.

About 50 of the 80 or more motor men and conductors employed by the Hamilton Electric Street Railway Company went out on strike Wednesday afternoon. The men left their cars standing on the tracks all along the lines of the company. About 30 of the employes refused to strike and these, with a few unskilled men, are trying to keep some of the cars running. The strikers claim that the company have been working them fifteen hours a day for four days in the week, and four hours a day for two days a week, while the agreement with the city was that the men were not to be compelled to work more than ten hours a day. It is also said the company refuses to pay the motor men and conductors for overtime, as stipulated in the bylaw.

## Hamburg Hopeless

Cholera's Victims Buried at the Rate of 350 a Day.

The Disease on the Increase Throughout Russia.

Important Resolution Passed by the Ontario Health Board

Nothing Kills the Cholera Microbe Like Frost"-Description of the Asiatic Scourge-The Epidemic in Tcheran Ended.

HAMBURG HOPELESS.

HAMBURG, Sept. 7.—The cholera is making steady and rapid progress in this city, and the transparent denials of the authorities only deceive those who wish to be deceived. The appalling increase in the number of fresh cases and deaths Saturday left the people almost without hope. Now another heavy increase of the sick list and the death list has consummated their hopelessness and despair.

The newspapers are virtually dumb as to the increase, and most of the sanitary officials open their mouths only to faisify the facts. The number of inspectors and physicians employed by the city has been doubled, and one cannot walk the streets without meeting half a dozen agents of the health department. Trade in everthing except food, drink and medicine is dead. The loss of merchants and shopkeepers since the beginning of the plague are estimated at 200,000,000 marks (\$50.000,000). Fears of financial crash have become general within the last few days. In view of this perilous state of affairs, the banks have announced that they will give 30 days more time on payments due them. Services of prayer are held daily by the clergy. They are well attended. Just before and after the services there is a semblance of life in the streets, at other hours only servants going to market or officials of the Health Department are seen.

Late reports show that the disease is gaining ground in the city, and that the mortality is dispreportionately heavy among female patients. Many deaths are occuring in asylums and prisons.

THE INDIAN CHOLERA SCURGE.

Aubrey Murray, an English military-looking gentleman now on a visit to St. Louis, was right in the midst of all the frenzied excitement of the Indian cholera scourge of 1877 and maddening suffering of the epidemic, and refers to them with a shudder. He said recently to a Globe-Democrat reporter:

"Perhaps the strangest and most inexplicable peculiarity of the ravages of Asiatic cholera is its marked capriciousness. I was in the city of Peshawar when it was ranging there, and I saw an entire side of a street literally devastated, while the other side enjoyed the most perfect immunity. I have also known it to enter a berracks and claim for its victims the occupants of one entire row of cots, while soldiers sleeping not ten feet away would be entirely unaffected. During my stay in Peshawar I witnessed as many as 1,500 deaths a day from the scourge. Of course, there was neither the time nor labor to give these victims a separate burial. So we did the next best thing.

The lime, you see, greatly we have been so fall flesh and devoured it, and the open grave emitted not a particle of sickening stench from the decaying human flesh. I saw the same thing done at the cities of Scinde and Delhi, and in all I must have seen 50,000 natives who died from cholera buried in the manner described. The only difference was that at the latter two places prodigious trenches had to be dug, the sun's flerce rays having failed to provide the yawning gap in the earth.

That the Asiatic cholera—which, by "That the Asiatic cholera—which, by the way, is indigerous to India, and ought to be named for that country—is the most fatal of all varieties of the malady is generally known; but the suddenness of each in its path doesn't seem to be generally known. It usually runs its course in an hour. It seldom ever lasts longer than three."

AT THE FUMIGATING ROOM.

New York, Sept. 7.—The square iron room for fumigating purposes is said to be even more powerful than that at North Brother Island and the most complete in the country, if not in the world. The room is lined entirely with corrugated iron, and contains several hundred feet of coiled iron. A steam pressure of 227 pounds to the square inch can be obtained, with a temperature of 208 degrees Fahrenheit.

## A SURGICAL TRIUMPH.

A SURGICAL TRIUMPH.

Incisions Made in a Woman's Neck and Swallowed Teeth Removed.

St. Patt, Minn., Sept. 8.—Miss Josie Nelson of South Minneapolis, has been lying at the point of death at the Northwest Hospital for the past six weeks, but because of a remarkable surgical operation made recently will recover. She has taken only liquid food for more than a year, and had become so weak she could not raise her head. As a last resort physicians, by the use of a stethoscope, located an obstruction in the oesophagus, about two inches below the clavicle or collar bone.

Miss Nelson was given an anæsthetic and an incision made on the left side of her neck, about four and one-half inches in length. The doctors dissected down to the cosciphagus, opened it and there found two teeth, pointed downward, firmly inserted in the interior walls of the œsophagus. They almost entirely obstructed the passage. Questioned about the matter after she recovered conciousness, Miss Nelson said that six years ago, while in a fit of laughter, she swallowed the two teeth, which were then attached to a triangular piece of rubber. the week.

HOW MOORS EAT BUTTER.

Queer and Amusing Letter From a Government Agent at Casablanca. A butterine company of the Western States recently wrote to the United States consular agent at Casablanca, Morocco, asking if it would be feasible to introduce their product into that country. They re-ceived the following very curious and inter-esting letter in reply:

U. S. CONSULAR AGENT.

CASABLANCA, MONOCCO, July 19, '92. 
MESSRS, —Your favor of June 2s to hand and contents noted, and in reply I am sorry to say that nothing can be done in this locality with the class of goods you speak of. Native butter is too plenty and too cheap to undertake to compete with it at the distance you are writing.

And, again, you give your goods a very bad recommendation to sell to the matives. You say it won't turn rancid; by that the Moors would imagine they could get no stink out of it, in which case it would be quite tasteless to them. They say of butter: "No stink, no good!"

The Moors never put salt in butter, and to prepare it for use they press it into coarse stone jars, containing from 10 to 40 pounds, the aperture just large enough to pass their fists through; when tull or nearly so, they plaster the top over with soft cow dung, they bury it in the ground, and when it has been there from three to five years it is taken out all ready for use. It then contains all the colors of the rainbow, and as many different tastes and scents. Butter Making as a Fine Art—Interesting Report From Middlesex.

The traveling dairy, managed by F. B. Linfield, B.S.A., has been working in the county of Middlesex for the past two weeks. Meetings have been held at Newbury, Glencee, Appin, Napier, Delaware, Stratiney, Adelaide, Parkhill and Allsa Craig. The meetings have not been attended as well as might have been expected, but probably the busy season, threshing and fall wheat seeding has kept many away that would otherwise have been present. While, however, such a statement will apply to some, it does not apply to all. A great many are altogether indifferent to what may be learned at such a meeting. It is those who have the reputation of being the best butter-makers in the neighborhood that are always present. They understand that butter-making is one of the fine arts, and are only too anxious to take the opportunity and get the experience of those who have studied the art under some of the master workmen of the country, and they are not disappointed in their expectations. Though the gentlemen in charge handle their subject scientifically, yet the methods they illustrate and explain are such as any farmer in the country could practice with profit to himself and also the man who buys the article made.

There have not been many samples of milk brought to be tested, but occasionally quite a few samples were tested for cheese factories which were near where the meetings were held. A few samples taken at the Glencoe factory on Monday morning, from the milk as brought to the factory, illustrated forcibly the injustice of paying for milk by weight alone. The above lines from "The Castle of Indelence" aptly describe a little summer resort on the north shore of Lake Erie which, although until recently comparatively unknown outside of the Canadian cities in its immediate vicinity, has lately taken on a decided boom and is destined to be heard from in the future. As you approach the harbor of Port Stanley, Ont. you wonder where the town is. Situated at a point of Lake Erie where the land recedes perceptibly from the general contour of the Canadian shore, thus forming a sort of bay, the village nestles picturesquely among a number of high hills, which are apt to lead one to believe that the inhabiants are not at home, until the boat is fairly within the jaws of the harbor. Then you discover that although the folks may be at home they are not making much noise about it.

Although the town is more than half a

Although the town is more than half a century old, it has not been very prosperous in a business way, and at the present time does not contain a permanent population of more than 500 people. Old tumble-down warehouses, crumbling spiles and a general air of dilapidation along the dock speak of the once thriving lake trade which the port enjoyed. Fifteen years ago, say the old sailor residents, Port Stanley was as lively a little port as there was along the chain of lakes, and it was no uncommon thing to see 20 or 30 craft of all descriptions in the harbor at one time. Times were good for sailors those days and large quantities of coal were freighted across the lake from Cleveland and taken to London and other places on the cars. But times have changed, and now there are not 50 vessels, all told, seen in the harbor all season. Those that do come in are looking for shelter from the severe storms and sudden squalls which frequently rage on Lake Eric. The Canadian Government has neglected the dredging of the harbor and the water has become so shallow that it is now unsafe for a deeply laden vessel to enter the mouth of the piers in a heavy test.

PORT STANLEY AS A SUMMER RESORT.

Port Stanley possesses all the natural advantages of a first-class summer resort and is becoming more and more popular as the years roll by. Its situation among the hills and the baimy quiet which usually reigns throughout the village suggests the name of Peacetul Valley as a more appropriate one for the town. The river becomes a winding stream as it flows northward toward St. Thomas, nine miles distant, and at that place it is almost a bubble. The hill which surround the village are almost as high as the Black Hills of South Dakota, but unlike the latter, are densely covered with the stately nines and study oaks of tunlike the latter, are densely covered ith the stately pines and sturdy oaks of e forest, whose thick foliage bends and ays majestically under the influence of e summer winds. Over twenty years ago the Grand Trunk Railroad, then known as the Grand now known as the Fraser hill, and Wm. Erser, the present proprietor of the Fraser, the present proprietor of the Fraser House, sub-leased the hill and after rchased a considerable tract of land pon which he built a commodious summer otel and laid out grounds remarkable for neir natural beauty. Independent of the totel is a large dining hall for the accom-todation of picnickers, and on the grounds modation of pienickers, and on the grounds are dance houses, merry-go-rounds, swings, etc. The hill is 150 feet above a wide stretch of sandy beach, and the bank in some places is so steep and the overhanging binff so precipitate that it would seem like inviting instant death for a person to attempt the descent. In other places, however, the bank is on more of an incline, and the ascont from the beach below is made comparatively easy by flights of stairs placed at convenient points. On picnic days an elevated tramway is run from the beach to the hill. She is bowing merrily along under a moderate breeze, but in less than an hour's time she may be soudding for shelter, with searcely a stitch of canvas on. A beautiful panorama of white, blue and green greets the eye, and as you "list to the wild waves as they beat on the shore," a pleasing sense of rest comes over the senses, and you are almost lulled into a state of sweet repose. Rouse yourself and look north of you. A nice sandy bottom, combined with the pleasure of being able to wade into the lake for several hundred feet, attracts the multitude, regardless of sex or age, and the more turbulent the waves the greater the sport. And the stories of the great catches made by amateur fishermen would put to blush the fairy tales of Munchausen. Boating is also a favorite pastime, both lake and river being well patronized. When large excursions visit the town myriads of small craft of all kinds may be seen flitting hither and thither—provided the water is calm.

A great number of excursions are run to Port Stanley during the summer, the people coming mainly from the neighboring cities and towns. The London and Port Stanley division of the Grand Trunk road runs three trains daily, and as London is only 22 miles distant the village is the summer residence of a great many families of London's upper ten. Several picturesque little cottages have been erected, and the surroundings of some of them are calculated to inspire sentimental feelings in the breasts of the most prosy. Several of the cottagers have baptized their dwellings, and such signs as Erie Cabin, Glen Erie Lodge, Idle wild, Broadview and Willow Cottage are common.

When the health of Canada was threatened by no dire epidemic the Government in general, and Hon. John Carling in particular, saw no use in improving the quarantine arrangements at Grosse Isle.

Just now when there is danger the same eminent personages do little because it is too late to do much.

It does seem that in a matter of such grave importance the Government ought to be too big to borrow a policy from the Dutchman, who would not shingle shouse in fine weather because the roof did not leak and could not do the work when it was raining because it was wet.

The measure, extreme as it seems, will only be a partial defense and it is doubtful whether our quarantine officers can deal effectively with vessels from Eritish ports only.
