She has a lengthy police police court record, having been fined for keeping houses of illrepute, and driven from the city by the police authorities. Her companion, Stella Baker, also mentioned in the Wiarton dispatch, shares her unenviable record, and has appeared in police court along with Mrs. Thomas a number of times. The younger woman was in the city this week for a few hours, but the local police have maintained a constant vigilance over their actions while here, and have frustrated every effort on their part to locate. The women camped on the outskirts of the city during the Old Boys' reunion last August, and were fined and driven out at the time. Mrs. Thomas is a native of Owen Sound, but resided in Goderich for several years, where she gained an unsavory reputation. Her son, Lorne Thomas, was sent to the Kingston Penitentiary i.y the Stratford authorities on a two-year sentence for a diamond robbery which occurred some time ago.

BRILLIANT EVA'S ENGLISH CAREER

Revised Her Name to Agree With That of Earl.

LIVED HIGH FOR SOME TIME

Tricked One Hotel and Tradesman After Another and Finally Made Good Her Escape.

London, Aug. 20 .- The detention in New York of "Mrs. Eva Fox-Strangways," who passed herself in America as the daughter of an earl and succeeded in obtaining the confidence of persons prominent socially in New York and Philadelphia, recalls her career here.

She was a fascinating young Englishwoman, and represented herself to be the Hon. Eva Fox-Strangways, the daughter of the Earl of Ilchester. With nothing to help her but her wits and an undeniable charm of manner, she succeeded in living at the rate of \$50,-000 a year without visible means of







But I desire no less emphatically to have it understood that we have undertaken and will undertake no action of a vindictive type, and above all, no action which shall inflict great or unmerited suffering upon the innocent stock holders, and upon the public as a whole. Our purpose is to act with the minimum of harshness compatible with obtaining our ends. In the man of great wealth who has earned his wealth honestly, and used it wisely, only be done under modern conditions through corporations and our purpose is to heartily favor the corporations that do well. The administration approsperous business conditions.

"All these are compatible with fair dealings, as between man and man and rigid obedience to the law. Our aim is to help every honest man, every honest corporation, and our policy means in its ultimate analysis a healthy and prosperous expansion of business activities, of honest businessmen and of honest corporations.

"I very earnestly hope that the leg-Islation which deals with the regulation of corporations, engaged in interstate business, will also deal with the rights and interests of the wage-workers employed by those corporations. Employers' Liability.

'Action was taken by the Congress last year limiting the number of hours that railway employes should be employed. The law is a good one; but strengthen it, it must be strengthened. We have now secured a national employers' liability law; but ultimately a more far-reaching and thorough-going law must be passed. It is monstrous that a man or woman who is crippled in an industry, even as the result of taking what are the necessary risks of the occupation, should be required to bear the whole burden of the loss. That burden should be distributed, and not placed solely upon the weakest in-Alvidual, the one least able to carry it. By making the employer liable the loss will ultimately be distributed among all the beneficiaries of the busi-

Often men who have been guilty of violating these laws have really acted in criminal fashion and if possible should be proceeded against criminally, and therefore it is advisable that there should be a clause TO BE NO LET-UP ON TRUSTS in these laws providing for such criminal action, and for punishment by imprisonment as well as by fine. By means of earthenware pipes connected with the engine, moist air, containing the carbonic acid required for the sustenance of the plants, is diffused in carefully regulated quantities through apertures into every part of the house, while in iron pipes heat is also diffused to maintain the desired temper-



London, Aug. 20 .- The American Government, which as taken the lead at The Hague peace conference, in endeavoring to promote arbitration, will be responsible for giving The Hague tribunal the most important case yet submitted to it, in the Newfoundland fisheries dispute, which undoubtly will be taken there as a result of the negotiations conducted in London between the foreign office and the American ambassador. Whitelaw Reid.

Both the foreign office and the embassy maintain diplomatic reserve. but it has been learned from unquestionable sources that the long correspondence between the two governments made it seem clear that their contentions could not be harmonized and had reached an "impasse." Finally, Mr. Reid pre sented a proposal to submit the dispute to the arbitration of The Hagus tribunal, having the authority of President Roosevelt and Secretary Root to do so. After a week or two of consideration the British Government accepted the proposal and then the American Government proposed that for another year, while the matter was in process of arbitration, the fisheries
